Janitor Closet:

One recommendation at this location, you also had mention is removal of the rolled up carpets in the janitor storage room. Installing at least three vapona strips in the janitor room will help control and prevent a clothing moth infestation.

Vapona Strips: Plastic resin strips, such as pest strips contain Vapona or DDVP, an insecticide that slowly vaporizes and effectively kills small flying insects in confined areas. Hanging a strip in a seldom-opened closet will help protect fabrics from adults, but it will have little effect on larvae already infesting materials. A strip should last for about six months. Some people dislike the odor of DDVP, but it normally goes away after the item has been aired for one or two days. The strips should never be used in rooms where people are exposed to the vapors for extended periods of time.

Coat Check at main entrance:

In the coat check section at the main front entrance, installing at least 3 clothing moth monitors to inspect for any new activity.

Option One: Above information

The cost for this service will be \$117.00 +GST. This includes the cost for 3 clothing moth monitors, 3 vapona strips (\$60.00 for clothing moth monitors & \$12.00 for vapona strips) and cost for installing the devices (\$45.00). The monitors will be inspected during regular pest maintenance service.

Option Two: Pesticide aerosol and residual treatment in Janitor Closet.

The cost for this service will be \$125.00 + GST one time treatment. During and after treatment people will have to remain out of the area for 6 hours.

Option one is a safe way to deal with these pests. I am worried if the janitor closet is treated with aerosol and residual it will be difficult to seal the room afterwards and make it uncomfortable for you staff to work in the surrounding area.

Please contact me if you have any questions.

I am scheduled at this location tomorrow to inspect all the doors for bottom door seals to prevent mice from entering the building. You may ask me questions on this issue as well.

Thank you for the opportunity to help solve the bird problem that is present at this location. After a visual inspection of the property, we have discovered pigeons & seagulls are roosting along the rooftop ledge that surrounds the perimeter of building. In order to resolve the issue, please refer to the following:

Preventative Bird Spiking:

One row of 8inch stainless steel bird spike will be installed along the rooftop ledge of the Queen Elizabeth Theatre. The spikes will be fastened into place with Sikaflex polyurethane adhesive, and installed along the sections of rooftop ledge that are located directly above the windows.

- South ledge (Approx. 150 linear Ft)
- West ledge (Approx. 250 Linear Ft)
- North ledge (Approx. 50 Linear Ft)
- East ledge (Approx. 275 Linear Ft)

This job will require two technicians, and fall protection gear to comply with W.C.B. Regulations (Rooftop access will be required).

The cost of this exclusion will be \$4,995.00 (Plus GST) and will come with a 5-year warranty on all materials and fastenings.

Janitor Closet:

One recommendation at this location, you also had mention is removal of the rolled up carpets in the janitor storage room. Installing at least three vapona strips in the janitor room will help control and prevent a clothing moth infestation.

Vapona Strips: Plastic resin strips, such as pest strips contain Vapona or DDVP, an insecticide that slowly vaporizes and effectively kills small flying insects in confined areas. Hanging a strip in a seldom-opened closet will help protect fabrics from adults, but it will have little effect on larvae already infesting materials. A strip should last for about six months. Some people dislike the odor of DDVP, but it normally goes away after the item has been aired for one or two days. The strips should never be used in rooms where people are exposed to the vapors for extended periods of time.

Coat Check at main entrance:

In the coat check section at the main front entrance, installing at least 3 clothing moth monitors to inspect for any new activity.

Option One: Above information

The cost for this service will be \$117.00 +GST. This includes the cost for 3 clothing moth monitors, 3 vapona strips (\$60.00 for clothing moth monitors & \$12.00 for vapona strips) and cost for installing the devices (\$45.00). The monitors will be inspected during regular pest maintenance service.

SCHEDULE A -SCOPE OF GOODS AND SERVICES

A) Requirement A - Preventative Services

Purpose

An Integrated Pest Management (IPM) approach will cover all of the City's facilities as identified in Schedule B — Prices for Supply on an ongoing pest maintenance program. The purpose of the regular pest maintenance visits is to keep the pest concerns to an ultimate minimum by providing multiple lines of defense, which primarily rely on monitoring devices in and around the affected buildings and sites.

Coverage

Coverage at each of the sites would include pest control maintenance for the most common structural pests, including but not limited to rats, mice, cockroaches, silverfish, store product pests and non-wood boring ants.

Frequency of Service

Services are to be provided as defined in Schedule B – Prices for Supply. The City's ongoing maintenance schedules would be serviced at a time and/or day that cater to their facility's needs, on either a monthly, bi-monthly or seasonal basis.

Maintenance Visits

Upon each service, Supplier will perform inspections and/or treatments for the services listed below.

i) Inspections

At each of the sites, the Supplier will be meeting with the site designate to check in, get updated reports from the site's logbook (where necessary) and treat as necessary. However, one of the major duties at each visit will be inspections and reporting. These inspections will be in all of the common areas, and the Supplier will look for any potential or existing pest problems that may be evident in the facilities. Site inspections also provide suggestions regarding potential entry points of rodents and even wildlife, to

ensure the activity of these pests do not interfere with the public's well-being. Inspections are to provide a preventative approach to the pest management program,

ii) Treatments

Once on site for on call or ongoing maintenance visits and after thorough inspections have taken place, the Supplier will propose to treat in the least invasive, yet highly

effective manner possible. Treatment is to be in a way that is safest to all

disruption to the building's occupants. See Appendix I (of the Supplier submission)for a sample "Notice of

Pesticide Use" sign that would be posted at a City of Vancouver location.

Pest Maintenance Summary

The Supplier's proposed pest maintenance program will provide the City and It's respective sites, site designates and everyone that uses these facilities, residences and sites with the most extensive coverage using sustainable and proactive inspection / treatment techniques, while balancing that coverage with value and practicality.

B) Requirement B - Reactive Services

This section explains, in detail, the pests and wildlife we are able to control, as well as the treatment methods used, the frequency of visits needed to control / eradicate the problem pest as well as warranties.

All methods and procedures, shall be in

accordance with the Integrated Pest Management (IPM) Act. The Act enforces the lesser use of pesticides by implementing Integrated Pest Management (IPM) procedures to eliminate or control existing pest problems. These signs indicate that a pesticide treatment is taking place, and also include the name of the company applying the product, the date of the treatment, the product used and contact numbers for further information.

The overall idea behind the Act is to reduce the overall use of pesticides in structures and grounds, as well as bring awareness to the public on what product is being applied should a pesticide need to be used to solve a pest problem. All of the treatments for any pest incorporate IPM practices, including monitoring, promoting improved sanitation, structural modification recommendations / renovations, education to tenants, building

contacts / site designates, mechanical, biological and the use of low-toxicity pesticides (in the event the non-pesticide alternatives do not provide suitable pest threshold limits deemed satisfactory by the tenants and/or building contact(s)).

All pesticide products will be used in accordance to the label. Also, any waste encountered on the job site shall be discarded with respect to the pesticide label, the IPM Act, WCB guidelines and federal, provincial and municipal regulations / bylaws. Illustration of control plans for each of the pests that are expected to be encountered is shown below:

Ants - Carpenter

Inspection

The Supplier will look for any potential nesting sites and see if it is possible to eliminate / replace

these sources (for example, tree stumps, rotten fence posts, siding, beams, etc.). We will recommend any shrubs that are right up against the side of the structure to be trimmed back at least two feet, or be removed completely.

Treatment Procedures

These ants are found in rotting wood; wood in contact with soil or under slab. In the event they are found in a suite, we would have to have neighbouring units beside, above and below the problem suite inspected in order to assess the extent of the problem.

Treatment Procedure(s)

These ants are just a nuisance pest and pose no real threat or structural damage to a facility. In the event they are inside a suite or other area and need to be eliminated, the Supplier

will first use a low-toxicity insecticide bait. This bait is applied with a syringe and is applied inside cracks and crevices where the ants hide. The ants eat the bait and subsequently feed the rest of their nest too. No odours are present during this application as it is a food bait, so this treatment does not require vacating the premises or the posting of signs.

Should the insecticide bait not work, the Supplier will then progress to an insecticide, residual

treatment. Here, 0.5% permethrin formulation shall be used for this problem. Treatment indoors involves applying a crack and crevice treatment to all baseboards, door and window frames. Outdoors, our treatment would include a crack and crevice treatment along the perimeter of the building, where the foundation meets the soil, as well as all cracks in concrete surrounding the problem area(s). All applications will be done using a hand held compressed air sprayer. In the event they are in a common area, all proper postings and notifications will be given.

These ants are typically found in soil, mostly underneath slab and concrete. In the event they are found in a suite, we would have to have neighbouring units beside, above and below the problem suite inspected in order to assess the extent of the problem.

Trealment Procedure(s)

These ants are just a nuisance pest and pose no real threat or structural damage to a facility. In the event they are inside a suite or other area and need to be eliminated, the Supplier

will first use low-toxicity insecticide bait. This bait is applied with a syringe and is applied inside cracks and crevices where the ants hide. The ants eat the bait and subsequently feed the rest of their nest too. No odours are present during this application as it is food balt, so this treatment does not require vacating the premises or the posting of signs.

Should the insecticide bait not work, the Supplier will then progress to an insecticide, residual

treatment. Here, we would use a 0.5% permethrin formulation for this problem. Treatment indoors involves applying a crack and crevice treatment to all baseboards, door and window frames. Outdoors, our treatment would include a crack and crevice

a habit of invading neighbouring suites / rooms. They are also excellent at hiding in the smallest of openings, making detection extremely difficult.

The use of scent detection dogs as a form of bedbug inspections shall be incorporated.. The Supplier's K9 teams shall be professionally accredited and undergo daily training to keep up with their inspection techniques.

II) Treatments

i) Environmentally Friendly Techniques

The Supplier will incorporate the use of a dry steamer and a HEPA vacuum in the bedbug

treatments. The key to success is thoroughness. The Supplier will go through all of the materials within a room, turning over upholstered cushions, mattresses, box springs and going through dresser drawers, closets, containers and anywhere else where bed bugs hide. The Supplier will also clean along baseboard areas, especially where the

carpet or floor meets the wall.

ii) Environmental Pest Control Products

Bed bug encasements that envelope the box spring and

Mattresses shall be used. Also, all clothing and bed sheets must be washed in warm or

water and then heat dried to kill off any bed bugs that may be present. The Supplier also

recommend the use of bed bug monitors and "climb ups" that allow continual monitoring of bed bug activity. An example of where these would be useful would be in the firehalls, where there are beds and lockers full of personal belongings that could potentially become bedbug infested.

iii) Alternate Techniques

In the event the environmental techniques are not delivering results, the Supplier will elevate the service to include a low-toxicity pesticide treatment. The Supplier would proceed to treat with 0.5% permethrin along all baseboards and everywhere else bedbugs are found (as mentioned earlier). For mattresses, box springs and upholstered furniture, we will use a non-residual product called "pyrethrins" so as to eliminate any chance of exposure to the pesticide.

Carpet Beetles

Inspection

The placement of monitoring devices (referred to as glueboards) will be placed in problematic areas, and potential harbourage areas. These areas include pantry and clothes closets and clothes storage areas (such as dressers, armoires and clothes trunks).

These monitoring devices would be checked within three to seven days after placement, to give us a better idea of the population and activity levels throughout the affected areas.

Once the data is retrieved, the Supplier will then make an assessment as to where the problematic areas are, and provide a treatment solution. Any suites / rooms that have a

In other cases, your buildings may have a dead bird, squirrel or rodent exposed on a lawn or tenant's patio / balcony. Once the Supplier is notified, they shall come out and

dispose of the carcass. All waste will be discarded with respect to the IPM Act, WCB guidelines and federal, provincial and municipal regulations / bylaws. Carcasses will not be disposed of on the building or work site.

Environmental Cleanup

This is a service that can be provide, in the event they want an attic, wall void or crawlspace professionally cleaned up of all rodent droppings. The cleanup is done by first applying a Viricide treatment to the affected area(s), which contains any pathogens that might get dispersed upon removal of the droppings, waste or insulation. Once the viricide has been applied, The Supplier will then proceed to remove all waste material (our technicians are protected with Tyvec suits, eye goggles and gloves). The room or area being worked in is enveloped with plastic to prevent cross contamination. The waste material is properly discarded with respect to WCB guidelines and federal, provincial and municipal regulations / bylaws. The Supplier will then use a HEPA Vacuum and

remove any remaining waste matter that might not have been picked up on the initial removal.

Once completed, the area is reinsulated and screen off any points of entry that mice or rats can potentially get into using 1/2" galvanized screen. This will help keep the cleaned area free of any future rodent infestations and their waste matter.

Fleas

Inspection

Fleas are an ectoparasitic pest that feed on pets as well as people. Fleas are typically found around pet's bedding areas, as well as where people sit or sleep. To determine if there are fleas present in suite, visual sitings are the ideal way to ensure that they are in fact fleas, and not another pest like bedbugs.

Treatment Procedure(s)

The initial treatment would involve a vacuuming. If thorough vacuuming (using HEPA filters) or steam cleaning does not work, the Supplier will proceed to install flea traps (such as our

light traps) in all problem areas. These will be placed away from tenants or pets, but still accessible to fleas.

If these are not enough, a pesticide treatment using 0.5% permethrin and an insect growth regulator called "Precor" (Material Safety Data Sheets available upon request) will be used. Application involves spot treatments throughout the problem area(s) using a hand held compressed air sprayer. In the event they are in a common area, all proper postings and notifications will be given.

In cases where a tenant or site designate finds a "bug" or sample of something, and they're not sure what it is, to the Supplier will come out and provide a "bug i.d.". If the sample cannot be identified on the spot, the Supplier will utilize their lab and technical library to help identify any "bugs" that might be found that cannot be immediately identified on site. The Supplier's reference materials and electronic microscopes will be used o fully identify any pests that the City of Vancouver's buildings might get, help formulate a strategic pest treatment programs to eliminate or control a problem. Once identified, depending on the pest, the Supplier may want to further inspect neighbouring

suites / rooms beside, above and below the problem unit, so as to contain the situation. Once our inspection is complete, a treatment plan will be formulated.

Mice Baiting / Trapping

Harbourage and feeding areas would be sought after. These areas include around compost bins, woodpiles, exterior clutter, sheds, attics and crawlspaces. Rub and gnaw marks would indicate an activity area. The use of black lights indicate runways as they would pick up phosphorous from urine deposits. Any suites / rooms that have a problem, would have to have neighbouring units beside, above and below the problem suite inspected in order to assess the extent of the problem. Treatment Procedure(s)

A thorough inspection shall be made of the premises to see why they might be in a particular area, From here, elimination of food sources / clean up of organic matter will be instructed to the tenant(s). If there are active entry points, screening may be installed using 1/4" galvanized hardware cloth, provided it won't trap the mice inside the premises. Traps will then be used, and checked on a weekly basis thereafter, until the problem is resolved. Any fecal matter that needs to be cleaned up would be done by disinfecting the matter first, then vacuuming using a HEPA filter.

Should traps not work, the Supplier will then escalate the service to involve the use of rodenticides, which will be placed in areas safe from small children and pets. The bait will also be in tamper-resistant bait stations, offering further protection. All bait and bait stations will be used in accordance to the label and federal regulations. For a sample label of the bait used as well as a guide to the proper use of bait stations which is to be complied by, please refer to Appendix K (of the Supplier's proposal) The Supplier shall also supply a written report to the appropriate City of Vancouver contact(s),

Inspection

Harbourage and feeding areas would be sought after. These areas include around compost bins, woodpiles, exterior clutter, sheds, attics and crawlspaces. Rub and gnaw marks would indicate an activity area. The use of black lights indicate runways as they would pick up phosphorous from urine deposits.

Treatment Procedure(s)

Snap traps would be set for the elimination of rats within a structure. The traps will be placed in inaccessible areas or inside a tamper resistant bait station to avoid someone accidentally getting their fingers or feet caught in the trap. All locations of traps will be marked in the Suplier's logbook. Screening of obvious points of entry will be sealed using 1/4"

galvanized hardware cloth, but only after the problem has been rectified. Weekly monitoring of the traps will be performed, until the problem is resolved. Any fecal matter that needs to be cleaned up would be done by disinfecting the matter first, then vacuuming using a HEPA filter.

Assuming the building is properly sealed from rats, in the event there is an exterior rat problem, the Supplier will use rodenticides in anchored, tamper-resistant bait stations around the perimeter of the complex, ensuring they are placed in areas inconspicuous from people and pets. A written report to the appropriate City of

Vancouver contact(s), indicating location, date of installation and removal of any bait Boxes shall be provided. All bait and bait stations would be used in accordance to the label and federal

regulations. For a sample label of the bait used as well as a guide to the proper use of bait stations which the Supplier will comply by, please refer to Appendix K (in Supplier's submission).

Visual sightings both inside and outside, as well as inspections around the interior and exterior window and doorframes, foundation perimeters and baseboards are the likely areas where spiders are found.

Treatment Procedure(s)

Removal of webs and spiders using a vacuum will be done first. If more of a preventative measure is required, a residual treatment using 0.5% permethrin along the interior baseboards, window and door frames and wherever webs are found is applied. Outside, a residual treatment using 0.5% permethrin along the exterior foundation area, any shrubs up against the side of the structure, lower level downspouts, soffits, lights, window and door frames will be applied. In the event they are in a common area, all proper postings and notifications will be given. If the outside of the structure is vinyl sided, permethrin will not be used as it will stain, so "Prelude" shall be used instead (MSDS available upon request).

Inspection

The placement of monitoring devices (referred to as glueboards) will be placed in problematic areas, and potential harbourage areas. These areas include under kitchen and bathroom sinks, pantry closets and storage areas. These monitoring devices would be checked within three to seven days after placement, to give a better idea of the population and activity levels throughout the affected areas. Once our data is retrieved, we can then make an assessment as to where the problematic areas are, and provide a treatment solution.

Treatment Procedure(s)

It is imperative to determine what type of stored product pest we are dealing with, which our inspection will identify. Once identified, the Supplier shall then make the appropriate recommendations to the tenant(s). The motto is, "if in doubt, throw it out!". Any nonperishable food stored in kitchen and pantry cupboards is susceptible. Once this procedure is done, the next step is to thoroughly clean all the kitchen and pantry cupboards. Using a vacuum cleaner is recommended, so as not to push any more organic matter into the cracks and crevices in the cupboards, as these cracks act as feeding troughs to stored product pests (as well as cockroaches!).

If there is a high population of bats, the guano on walls will indicate where the point of entry is. If there is a small population, the customer may know where the point of entry is, or the Supplier would have to inspect the building at dusk to observe where the point of entry is. It is important to note that bats are protected and cannot be killed, therefore, we can only perform work between September to March, otherwise the young will be trapped and eventually die.

Treatment Procedure(s)

Assuming the treatment period is between September to March, the Supplier can treat as the bats have migrated South, so they will not be in the structure. Screening can be done during the day (assuming they have left, otherwise, screen at night in the event they are still around). Once all possible points of entry are determined, screening would done using 1/4" gauge screen.

If bats are evident between April to August, a supervisor would go out to the site to evaluate if the job can be done, assuming a special permits from the Federal government can be obtained to proceed with the treatment. Supplier would then "viricide" (MSDS

available upon request) the problem areas after the bats are gone.

There are several species of birds found throughout the Lower Mainland, usually consisting of crows, gulls, pigeons, sparrows, starlings and woodpeckers. Inspection includes determining the point of entry, roosting or nesting sites (many times visible). Points of entry can be found by the tenant or building site designate pointing it out or from the accumulation of droppings in a particular area. Usually a ladder or a set of binoculars is used in assessing the extent of a bird problem.

Treatment Procedure(s)

Depending on the species (as some are protected, whereas others are not), it usually includes nest removal. The caveat is that if the birds are protected, the removal may have to wait until it is legal to do so (eg. Gulls). Once the nest is removed and the area is professionally cleaned, exclusion devices such as "Bird Spike", "Piano Wire", Polyethelene "Netting", "Shock Strip" or "1/4" gauge screen will be installed In some cases where exclusion is not an option due to the size or the feasability of the procedure (eg. Rooftops), a trapping program can also be implemented. Here, the Supplier would

start off with a "pre-baiting" program for several weeks, and then install our live traps once the target bird is conditioned in eating our bait. These traps would be checked on a frequent basis and humanely removed. This would be a "low-key" approach as we do CoV Initial:

points of entry. Then schedule to go back in approximately one week to remove the door and screen off the original point of entry, assuming there are no young and all adults have left the attic. If there are young (i.e. usually between March to May), we would physically remove the litter and the mother, humanely relocate the family according to the BC Wildlife Act, and then screen off the opening.

points of entry. Trenching of the perimeter and a "curtain wall" is necessary for control. If there are young (usually between April and June), we would humanely remove the family and then seal up the opening with 1/4" galvanized screen.

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SCHEDULE A -SCOPE OF GOODS AND SERVICES

A) Requirement A - Preventative Services

Purpose

An Integrated Pest Management (IPM) approach will cover all of the City's facilities as identified in Schedule B — Prices for Supply on an ongoing pest maintenance program. The purpose of the regular pest maintenance visits is to keep the pest concerns to an ultimate minimum by providing multiple lines of defense, which primarily rely on monitoring devices in and around the affected buildings and sites.

Coverage

Coverage at each of the sites would include pest control maintenance for the most common structural pests, including but not limited to rats, mice, cockroaches, silverfish, store product pests and non-wood boring ants.

Frequency of Service

Services are to be provided as defined in Schedule B – Prices for Supply. The City's ongoing maintenance schedules would be serviced at a time and/or day that cater to their facility's needs, on either a monthly, bi-monthly or seasonal basis.

Maintenance Visits

Upon each service, Supplier will perform inspections and/or treatments for the services listed below.

i) Inspections

At each of the sites, the Supplier will be meeting with the site designate to check in, get updated reports from the site's logbook (where necessary) and treat as necessary. However, one of the major duties at each visit will be inspections and reporting. These inspections will be in all of the common areas, and the Supplier will look for any potential or existing pest problems that may be evident in the facilities, Site inspections also provide suggestions regarding potential entry points of rodents and even wildlife, to ensure the activity of these pests do not interfere with the public's well-being. Inspections are to provide a preventative approach to the pest management program.

ii) Treatments

Once on site for on call or ongoing maintenance visits and after thorough inspections have taken place, the Supplier will propose to treat in the least invasive, yet highly

effective manner possible. Treatment is to be in a way that is safest to all

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disruption to the building's occupants. See Appendix I (of the Supplier submission)for a sample "Notice of

Pesticide Use" sign that would be posted at a City of Vancouver location.

Pest Maintenance Summary

The Supplier's proposed pest maintenance program will provide the City and it's respective sites, site designates and everyone that uses these facilities, residences and sites with the most extensive coverage using sustainable and proactive inspection / treatment techniques, while balancing that coverage with value and practicality.

B) Requirement B - Reactive Services

This section explains, in detail, the pests and wildlife we are able to control, as well as the treatment methods used, the frequency of visits needed to control / eradicate the problem pest as well as warranties.

All methods and procedures, shall be in

accordance with the Integrated Pest Management (IPM) Act. The Act enforces the lesser use of pesticides by implementing Integrated Pest Management (IPM) procedures to eliminate or control existing pest problems. These signs indicate that a pesticide treatment is taking place, and also include the name of the company applying the product, the date of the treatment, the product used and contact numbers for further information.

The overall idea behind the Act is to reduce the overall use of pesticides in structures and grounds, as well as bring awareness to the public on what product is being applied should a pesticide need to be used to solve a pest problem. All of the treatments for any pest incorporate IPM practices, including monitoring, promoting improved sanitation, structural modification recommendations / renovations, education to tenants, building

contacts / site designates, mechanical, biological and the use of low-toxicity pesticides (in the event the non-pesticide alternatives do not provide suitable pest threshold limits deemed satisfactory by the tenants and/or building contact(s)).

All pesticide products will be used in accordance to the label. Also, any waste encountered on the job site shall be discarded with respect to the pesticide label, the IPM Act, WCB guidelines and federal, provincial and municipal regulations / bylaws. Illustration of control plans for each of the pests that are expected to be encountered is shown below:

Ants - Carpenter

Inspection

The Supplier will look for any potential nesting sites and see if it is possible to eliminate / replace

these sources (for example, tree stumps, rotten fence posts, siding, beams, etc.). We will recommend any shrubs that are right up against the side of the structure to be trimmed back at least two feet, or be removed completely.

Treatment Procedures

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Inspection

These ants are found in rotting wood; wood in contact with soil or under slab. In the event they are found in a suite, we would have to have neighbouring units beside, above and below the problem suite inspected in order to assess the extent of the problem.

Treatment Procedure(s)

These ants are just a nuisance pest and pose no real threat or structural damage to a facility. In the event they are inside a suite or other area and need to be eliminated, the Supplier

will first use a low-toxicity insecticide bait. This bait is applied with a syringe and is applied inside cracks and crevices where the ants hide. The ants eat the bait and subsequently feed the rest of their nest too. No odours are present during this application as it is a food bait, so this treatment does not require vacating the premises or the posting of signs.

Should the insecticide bait not work, the Supplier will then progress to an insecticide, residual

treatment. Here, 0.5% permethrin formulation shall be used for this problem. Treatment indoors involves applying a crack and crevice treatment to all baseboards, door and window frames. Outdoors, our treatment would include a crack and crevice treatment along the perimeter of the building, where the foundation meets the soil, as well as all cracks in concrete surrounding the problem area(s). All applications will be done using a hand held compressed air sprayer. In the event they are in a common area, all proper postings and notifications will be given.

Environmental / Conventional Pest Control Products Used Insecticide Bait (a.k.a. "Drax", "Avert", "Maxforce" and "Safers")

Ants - Pavement

Inspection

These ants are typically found in soil, mostly underneath slab and concrete. In the event they are found in a suite, we would have to have neighbouring units beside, above and below the problem suite inspected in order to assess the extent of the problem.

Treatment Procedure(s)

These ants are just a nuisance pest and pose no real threat or structural damage to a facility. In the event they are inside a suite or other area and need to be eliminated, the Supplier

will first use low-toxicity insecticide bait. This bait is applied with a syringe and is applied inside cracks and crevices where the ants hide. The ants eat the bait and subsequently feed the rest of their nest too. No odours are present during this application as it is food bait, so this treatment does not require vacating the premises or the posting of signs.

Should the insecticide bait not work, the Supplier will then progress to an insecticide, residual

treatment. Here, we would use a 0.5% permethrin formulation for this problem. Treatment indoors involves applying a crack and crevice treatment to all baseboards, door and window frames. Outdoors, our treatment would include a crack and crevice

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a habit of invading neighbouring suites / rooms. They are also excellent at hiding in the smallest of openings, making detection extremely difficult.

The use of scent detection dogs as a form of bedbug inspections shall be incorporated. The Supplier's K9 teams shall be professionally accredited and undergo daily training to keep up with their inspection techniques.

II) Treatments

i) Environmentally Friendly Techniques

The Supplier will incorporate the use of a dry steamer and a HEPA vacuum in the bedbug

treatments. The key to success is thoroughness. The Supplier will go through all of the materials within a room, turning over upholstered cushions, mattresses, box springs and going through dresser drawers, closets, containers and anywhere else where bed bugs hide. The Supplier will also clean along baseboard areas, especially where the

carpet or floor meets the wall.

ii) Environmental Pest Control Products

Bed bug encasements that envelope the box spring and

Mattresses shall be used. Also, all clothing and bed sheets must be washed in warm or hot

water and then heat dried to kill off any bed bugs that may be present. The Supplier also

recommend the use of bed bug monitors and "climb ups" that allow continual monitoring of bed bug activity. An example of where these would be useful would be in the firehalls, where there are beds and lockers full of personal belongings that could potentially become bedbug infested.

iii) Alternate Techniques

In the event the environmental techniques are not delivering results, the Supplier will elevate the service to include a low-toxicity pesticide treatment. The Supplier would proceed to treat with 0.5% permethrin along all baseboards and everywhere else bedbugs are found (as mentioned earlier). For mattresses, box springs and upholstered furniture, we will use a non-residual product called "pyrethrins" so as to eliminate any chance of exposure to the pesticide.

Carpet Beetles

Inspection

The placement of monitoring devices (referred to as glueboards) will be placed in problematic areas, and potential harbourage areas. These areas include pantry and clothes closets and clothes storage areas (such as dressers, armoires and clothes trunks).

These monitoring devices would be checked within three to seven days after placement, to give us a better idea of the population and activity levels throughout the affected areas.

Once the data is retrieved, the Supplier will then make an assessment as to where the problematic areas are, and provide a treatment solution. Any suites / rooms that have a

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In other cases, your buildings may have a dead bird, squirrel or rodent exposed on a lawn or tenant's patio / balcony. Once the Supplier is notified, they shall come out and properly

dispose of the carcass. All waste will be discarded with respect to the IPM Act, WCB guidelines and federal, provincial and municipal regulations / bylaws. Carcasses will not be disposed of on the building or work site.

Environmental Cleanup

This is a service that can be provide, in the event they want an attic, wall void or crawlspace professionally cleaned up of all rodent droppings. The cleanup is done by first applying a Viricide treatment to the affected area(s), which contains any pathogens that might get dispersed upon removal of the droppings, waste or insulation. Once the viricide has been applied, The Supplier will then proceed to remove all waste material (our technicians are protected with Tyvec suits, eye goggles and gloves). The room or area being worked in is enveloped with plastic to prevent cross contamination. The waste material is properly discarded with respect to WCB guidelines and federal, provincial and municipal regulations / bylaws. The Supplier will then use a HEPA Vacuum and

remove any remaining waste matter that might not have been picked up on the initial removal.

Once completed, the area is reinsulated and screen off any points of entry that mice or rats can potentially get into using 1/4" galvanized screen. This will help keep the cleaned area free of any future rodent infestations and their waste matter.

Fleas

Inspection

Fleas are an ectoparasitic pest that feed on pets as well as people. Fleas are typically found around pet's bedding areas, as well as where people sit or sleep. To determine if there are fleas present in suite, visual sitings are the ideal way to ensure that they are in fact fleas, and not another pest like bedbugs.

Treatment Procedure(s)

The initial treatment would involve a vacuuming. If thorough vacuuming (using HEPA filters) or steam cleaning does not work, the Supplier will proceed to install flea traps (such as our

light traps) in all problem areas. These will be placed away from tenants or pets, but still accessible to fleas.

If these are not enough, a pesticide treatment using 0.5% permethrin and an insect growth regulator called "Precor" (Material Safety Data Sheets available upon request) will be used. Application involves spot treatments throughout the problem area(s) using a hand held compressed air sprayer. In the event they are in a common area, all proper postings and notifications will be given.

Light Traps

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Inspection

In cases where a tenant or site designate finds a "bug" or sample of something, and they're not sure what it is, to the Supplier will come out and provide a "bug i.d.". If the sample cannot be identified on the spot, the Supplier will utilize their lab and technical library to help identify any "bugs" that might be found that cannot be immediately identified on site. The Supplier's reference materials and electronic microscopes will be used o fully identify any pests that the City of Vancouver's buildings might get, help formulate a strategic pest treatment programs to eliminate or control a problem. Once identified, depending on the pest, the Supplier may want to further inspect neighbouring

suites / rooms beside, above and below the problem unit, so as to contain the situation. Once our inspection is complete, a treatment plan will be formulated.

Mice Baiting / Trapping

Inspection

Harbourage and feeding areas would be sought after. These areas include around compost bins, woodpiles, exterior clutter, sheds, attics and crawlspaces. Rub and gnaw marks would indicate an activity area. The use of black lights indicate runways as they would pick up phosphorous from urine deposits. Any suites / rooms that have a problem, would have to have neighbouring units beside, above and below the problem suite inspected in order to assess the extent of the problem.

Treatment Procedure(s)

A thorough inspection shall be made of the premises to see why they might be in a particular area. From here, elimination of food sources / clean up of organic matter will be instructed to the tenant(s). If there are active entry points, screening may be installed using 1/2" galvanized hardware cloth, provided it won't trap the mice inside the premises. Traps will then be used, and checked on a weekly basis thereafter, until the problem is resolved. Any fecal matter that needs to be cleaned up would be done by disinfecting the matter first, then vacuuming using a HEPA filter.

Should traps not work, the Supplier will then escalate the service to involve the use of rodenticides, which will be placed in areas safe from small children and pets. The bait will also be in tamper-resistant bait stations, offering further protection. All bait and bait stations will be used in accordance to the label and federal regulations. For a sample label of the bait used as well as a guide to the proper use of bait stations which is to be complied by, please refer to Appendix K (of the Supplier's proposal) The Supplier shall also supply a written report to the appropriate City of Vancouver contact(s).

Rat Baiting / Trapping

Inspection

Harbourage and feeding areas would be sought after. These areas include around compost bins, woodpiles, exterior clutter, sheds, attics and crawlspaces. Rub and gnaw marks would indicate an activity area. The use of black lights indicate runways as they would pick up phosphorous from urine deposits.

Treatment Procedure(s)

Snap traps would be set for the elimination of rats within a structure. The traps will be placed in inaccessible areas or inside a tamper resistant bait station to avoid someone accidentally getting their fingers or feet caught in the trap. All locations of traps will be marked in the Suplier's logbook. Screening of obvious points of entry will be sealed using ½"

galvanized hardware cloth, but only after the problem has been rectified. Weekly monitoring of the traps will be performed, until the problem is resolved. Any fecal matter that needs to be cleaned up would be done by disinfecting the matter first, then vacuuming using a HEPA filter.

Assuming the building is properly sealed from rats, in the event there is an exterior rat problem, the Supplier will use rodenticides in anchored, tamper-resistant bait stations around the perimeter of the complex, ensuring they are placed in areas inconspicuous from people and pets. A written report to the appropriate City of

Vancouver contact(s), indicating location, date of installation and removal of any bait Boxes shall be provided. All bait and bait stations would be used in accordance to the label and federal

regulations. For a sample label of the bait used as well as a guide to the proper use of bait stations which the Supplier will comply by, please refer to Appendix K (in Supplier's submission).

Spiders

Inspection

Visual sightings both inside and outside, as well as inspections around the interior and exterior window and doorframes, foundation perimeters and baseboards are the likely areas where spiders are found.

Treatment Procedure(s)

Removal of webs and spiders using a vacuum will be done first. If more of a preventative measure is required, a residual treatment using 0.5% permethrin along the interior baseboards, window and door frames and wherever webs are found is applied. Outside, a residual treatment using 0.5% permethrin along the exterior foundation area, any shrubs up against the side of the structure, lower level downspouts, soffits, lights, window and door frames will be applied. In the event they are in a common area, all proper postings and notifications will be given. If the outside of the structure is vinyl sided, permethrin will not be used as it will stain, so "Prelude" shall be used instead (MSDS available upon request).

Stored Product Pests

Inspection

The placement of monitoring devices (referred to as glueboards) will be placed in problematic areas, and potential harbourage areas. These areas include under kitchen and bathroom sinks, pantry closets and storage areas. These monitoring devices would be checked within three to seven days after placement, to give a better idea of the population and activity levels throughout the affected areas. Once our data is retrieved, we can then make an assessment as to where the problematic areas are, and provide a treatment solution.

Treatment Procedure(s)

It is imperative to determine what type of stored product pest we are dealing with, which our inspection will identify. Once identified, the Supplier shall then make the appropriate recommendations to the tenant(s). The motto is, "if in doubt, throw it out!". Any nonperishable food stored in kitchen and pantry cupboards is susceptible. Once this procedure is done, the next step is to thoroughly clean all the kitchen and pantry cupboards. Using a vacuum cleaner is recommended, so as not to push any more organic matter into the cracks and crevices in the cupboards, as these cracks act as feeding troughs to stored product pests (as well as cockroaches!).

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Wildlife - Bats

Inspection

If there is a high population of bats, the guano on walls will indicate where the point of entry is. If there is a small population, the customer may know where the point of entry is, or the Supplier would have to inspect the building at dusk to observe where the point of entry is. It is important to note that bats are protected and cannot be killed, therefore, we can only perform work between September to March, otherwise the young will be trapped and eventually die.

Treatment Procedure(s)

Assuming the treatment period is between September to March, the Supplier can treat as the bats have migrated South, so they will not be in the structure. Screening can be done during the day (assuming they have left, otherwise, screen at night in the event they are still around). Once all possible points of entry are determined, screening would done using 1/4" gauge screen.

If bats are evident between April to August, a supervisor would go out to the site to evaluate if the job can be done, assuming a special permits from the Federal government can be obtained to proceed with the treatment. Supplier would then "viricide" (MSDS

available upon request) the problem areas after the bats are gone.

Wildlife - Birds

Inspection

There are several species of birds found throughout the Lower Mainland, usually consisting of crows, gulls, pigeons, sparrows, starlings and woodpeckers. Inspection includes determining the point of entry, roosting or nesting sites (many times visible). Points of entry can be found by the tenant or building site designate pointing it out or from the accumulation of droppings in a particular area. Usually a ladder or a set of binoculars is used in assessing the extent of a bird problem.

Treatment Procedure(s)

Depending on the species (as some are protected, whereas others are not), it usually includes nest removal. The caveat is that if the birds are protected, the removal may have to wait until it is legal to do so (eg. Gulls). Once the nest is removed and the area is professionally cleaned, exclusion devices such as "Bird Spike", "Piano Wire", Polyethelene "Netting", "Shock Strip" or "1/4" gauge screen will be installed In some cases where exclusion is not an option due to the size or the feasability of the procedure (eg. Rooftops), a trapping program can also be implemented. Here, the Supplier would

start off with a "pre-baiting" program for several weeks, and then install our live traps once the target bird is conditioned in eating our bait. These traps would be checked on a frequent basis and humanely removed. This would be a "low-key" approach as we do CoV Initial:

points of entry. Then schedule to go back in approximately one week to remove the door and screen off the original point of entry, assuming there are no young and all adults have left the attic. If there are young (i.e. usually between March to May), we would physically remove the litter and the mother, humanely relocate the family according to the BC Wildlife Act, and then screen off the opening.

Wildlife - Skunks

Inspection

Usually skunks are found at ground level of a building, especially under front stairs, under a foundation or a shed. The point of entry is easily identifiable as we look for a runway leading under the structure, which is at least fifteen centimeters in width. *Treatment Procedure(s)*

The Supplier shall install a "one-way door" and screen off (with 1/2" gauge screen) all other potential

points of entry. Trenching of the perimeter and a "curtain wall" is necessary for control. We would then schedule to go back in approximately one week to remove the door and screen of the original point of entry, assuming there are no young and all adults have left the den. If there are young (usually between April and June), we would humanely remove the family and then seal up the opening with ½" galvanized screen.

Identification of the point of entry must be found. Most times, the occupant or the building site designate will be aware of where this is. If not, we are trained to find the point of entry via rub or gnaw marks, or visual sighting (usually these are found in soffits or roof junctions).

RELATING TO: THE SUPPLY OF PEST CONTROL SERVICES

DATED September 30, 2015

SUPPLY AGREEMENT

THIS AGREEMENT is made as of September 30, 2015

BETWEEN:

Care Pest and Wildlife Control, a corporation organized under the laws of British Columbia and having an office at #1 - 3888 North Fraser Way Burnaby, British Columbia, V5J 5H6

(hereinafter referred to as the "Supplier")

AND:

CITY OF VANCOUVER, a municipal corporation continued under the *Vancouver Charter*.(British Columbia) and having an office at 453 West 12th Avenue, Vancouver, British Columbia, V5Y 1V4

(hereinafter referred to as the "City")

WHEREAS the Supplier is in the business of Pest and Wildlife Control;

AND WHEREAS the City wishes to procure Pest Control Services from the Supplier upon and subject to the terms and conditions hereinafter set forth,

NOW THEREFORE, in consideration of the premises and the covenants herein contained, the parties hereto agree as set forth herein.

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ARTICLE 1 INTERPRETATION

1.1 Definitions

In this Agreement, unless something in the subject matter or context is inconsistent therewith:

- (a) "Agreement" means this agreement, including the schedules hereto, and all amendments made hereto or thereto by written agreement between the Supplier and the City;
- (b) "Background IP" has the meaning ascribed thereto in Section 14.4;
- (c) "Business Day" means a day on which banks are open for business in Vancouver, British Columbia, except a Saturday, Sunday or statutory holiday;
- (d) "Change in Control" means an occurrence whereby a person (or persons acting in concert) acquires control of the relevant entity;
- (e) "City Policies" means any or all (as the context requires) of those procedures, standards and/or standard specifications, requirements, policies and the like listed in Schedule H or notified to the Supplier from time to time, as the same may be updated, modified, expanded, revised, supplemented and/or replaced from time to time by the City (as notified to the Supplier);
- (f) "City's Manager" means a manager who at the relevant time carries such designation from the City under, or in accordance with, ARTICLE 5;
- (g) "Competent Authority" means:
 - any multinational, federal, provincial, state, regional, municipal, local or other government or governmental body and any ministry, department, division, bureau, agent, agency, commission, board or authority of any government or governmental body, domestic or foreign;
 - any domestic, foreign or international judicial, quasi-judicial or administrative court, tribunal, commission, board, panel, arbitrator or arbitral body acting under the authority of any of the foregoing; or
 - (iii) any quasi-governmental or private body exercising any statutory, regulatory, expropriation or taxing authority under the authority of any of the foregoing;
- (h) "Confidential Information" means all or any confidential information (however recorded or preserved) disclosed before, on or after the date of this Agreement by either Party or any of its Representatives to the other Party or its Representatives in connection with this Agreement, concerning:
 - (i) this Agreement; or

(ii) the affairs, operations, processes, know-how, suppliers, plans or intentions of the disclosing Party or of any member of the disclosing Party's Group, including, without limitation, any information which is not generally known to the public or which has been specifically identified as confidential or proprietary by the disclosing Party,

but does not include:

- (iii) any information that is or becomes generally available to the public or to industry professionals (other than as a result of its disclosure by the receiving Party or its Representatives in breach of this Agreement);
- (iv) any information that was available to the receiving Party on a nonconfidential basis prior to disclosure by the disclosing Party;
- (v) any information that was, is or becomes available to the receiving Party on a non-confidential basis from a person who, to the receiving Party's knowledge, is not bound by a confidentiality agreement or other duty of confidentiality with or to the disclosing Party or a member of the disclosing Party's Group or otherwise prohibited from disclosing the information to the receiving Party;
- (vi) any information that was known to the receiving Party before the information was disclosed to it by the disclosing Party or its Representatives and was not subject to a confidentiality agreement or other duty of confidentiality (including any obligation under this Agreement) with or to the disclosing Party or a member of the disclosing Party's Group;
- (vii) any information that the Parties agree in writing is not confidential or may be disclosed; and
- (viii) any information unrelated to this Agreement that is developed by or for the receiving Party independently of and without reference to the information disclosed by the disclosing Party;
- (i) "Consent" means an approval, clearance, registration, franchise, right, privilege, certification, quota, consent, permit, licence, qualification, filing, exemption, certificate or permission and any such other matter or authorization whatsoever, including any condition thereof, that is lawfully and necessarily required under any Law or from any Competent Authority in connection with the Supply or the Site;
- (j) "Contract Price" means the amounts payable (subject to and in accordance with the terms of this Agreement) by the City to the Supplier in return for the proper performance by the Supplier of its obligations under this Agreement, as detailed in Schedule B;
- (k) "Defect" means any part of the Supply (or omission therefrom) which is defective, deficient or incomplete or does not otherwise comply with the requirements of this Agreement;

- (I) "Documentation" means calculations, computer programs and other software, drawings, designs, plans, manuals, records, reports, documents, papers, photos, typographical arrangements, models, contract documents, deliverables, agreements, tender/enquiry documents, and all other materials in whatever form, including but not limited to tangible copies and electronic forms, supplied either by or on behalf of the Supplier or generated collaboratively by the Parties in the course of the provision of the Supply under this Agreement;
- (m) "Effective Date" has the meaning ascribed to such term in Section 2.1;
- (n) "Encumbrance" means any mortgage, charge, pledge, hypothecation, security interest, assignment, lien or claim of lien (statutory or otherwise), easement, deemed or statutory trust, restrictive covenant, adverse claim, exception, reservation, right of occupation, any matter capable of registration against title, right of pre-emption, privilege or other encumbrance or third party right of any nature or any other arrangement or condition that, in substance, secures payment or performance of an obligation;
- (o) "Environmental Law" means any Law which imposes any obligations relating to:
 - the protection, management, conservation or restoration of the natural environment;
 - reporting, licensing, permitting, investigating, remediating and cleaning up in connection with any presence or Release, or the threat of the same, of Hazardous Substances; and
 - (iii) the manufacture, processing, distribution, use, treatment, storage, disposal, transport, handling and the like of Hazardous Substances, including those pertaining to occupational health and safety.
- (p) "Force Majeure" means, exhaustively, any:
 - (i) war, hostilities (whether war is declared or not), invasion, act of foreign enemies;
 - rebellion, terrorism (or threat of terrorism), revolution, insurrection, military or usurped power or civil war;
 - (iii) riot, civil commotion or disorder, strike or lockout by persons other than the Supplier's personnel and other employees, Subcontractors or any other person for whom the Supplier is responsible;
 - (iv) natural catastrophe such as an earthquake, forest fire, landslide or flood; or
 - (v) change in Law or action by a Competent Authority, which makes it illegal or impossible for either Party to perform its obligations under this Agreement;

- (q) "Good Industry Practice" means, in relation to the Supply or the performance of any other obligation under this Agreement, the practices, and the application of the skill, care, diligence, prudence and foresight, which would reasonably and ordinarily be expected from a skilled and experienced international contractor carrying out or procuring equivalent services of similar type, scope and value, in the same or similar location and in similar circumstances to those pertaining to the Supplier:
- (r) "Group" means:
 - (i) in respect of the Supplier, the group constituted from time to time by:
 - (A) the Supplier;
 - (B) all persons that directly or indirectly control or are controlled by the Supplier; and
 - (C) all persons that are directly or indirectly controlled by any person that directly or indirectly controls the Supplier; and
 - (ii) in respect of the City, the group constituted from time to time by:
 - (A) the City; and
 - (B) all bodies corporate directly or indirectly controlled by the City.
- (s) "Hazardous Substance" means any substance or material that is prohibited, controlled or regulated by any Competent Authority pursuant to any Environmental Law including pollutants, contaminants, dangerous goods or substances, toxic or hazardous substances or materials, wastes (including solid non-hazardous wastes and subject wastes), petroleum and its derivatives and by-products and other hydrocarbons, all as defined in or pursuant to any Environmental Law;
- (t) "Intellectual Property Rights" means any and all current and future proprietary rights provided under patent law, copyright law, design patent or industrial design law, or any other applicable statutory provision or common law principle, including trade secret law, that may provide a right in ideas, formulae, algorithms, concepts, inventions, know-how, computer software, database or design, or the expression or use thereof, whether registered or unregistered, together with any right to apply for or register any of the foregoing;
- (u) "Key Project Personnel" means the persons named in Schedule I (Key Project Personnel) and any replacement(s) approved by the City in accordance with ARTICLE 7;
- (v) "Laws" means all laws, statutes, codes, ordinances, decrees, rules, regulations, by-laws, judicial or arbitral or administrative or ministerial or departmental or regulatory judgments, orders, decisions, rulings, determinations or awards of any Competent Authority whether or not having

the force of law and any legal requirements or bases of liability under the common law or civil law, including all such Laws relating to Taxes, the environment, human health or safety, pollution and other environmental degradation, and hazardous materials, which affect or are otherwise applicable to the Supply, the Supplier, the Site or any other lands affected by the Supply;

- (w) "Letter Agreement" means an agreement in the form of Schedule K.
- (x) "OHS Requirements" means all Laws applicable to the Supply and related to occupational health or safety, and all of the City Policies that relate to occupational health or safety, and includes without limitation the WCA;
- (y) "Other City Entity" means the Vancouver Public Library Board;
- (z) "Parties" means the City and the Supplier and "Party" means one of them or either of them, as the context requires;
- (aa) "Permitted Purpose" has the meaning ascribed thereto in Section 15.3;
- (bb) "Preferred Supplier" means a person named in Schedule F;
- (cc) "Proposal" means the Supplier's proposal dated April 20, 2015, submitted by the Supplier to the City in response to the RFP;
- (dd) "Release" means any release or discharge of any Hazardous Substance including any discharge, spray, injection, inoculation, abandonment, deposit, spillage, leakage, seepage, pouring, emission, emptying, throwing, dumping, placing, exhausting, escape, leach, migration, dispersal, dispensing or disposal;
- (ee) "Representative" means a Group member of a Party, or an official, officer, employee, agent, subcontractor or other representative of a Party or any member of its Group, or any other person for whom the Party is responsible;
- (ff) "RFP" means the City's Request for Proposal number PS20140603;
- (gg) "Safety Incident" means:
 - (i) a failure by the Supplier or any Subcontractor to comply with any OHS Requirements; or
 - (ii) any hazard, incident or accident caused by the Supplier or a Subcontractor.
- (hh) "Sales Tax" has the meaning ascribed to such term in Section 16.1;
- (ii) "Site" means each of the worksites at which the Supply shall be performed and each other place where the Supply is performed;
- (jj) "Subcontractor" means any person named in a schedule to this Agreement as a subcontractor, or any other person appointed by the Supplier, in accordance with this Agreement, to perform any part of the Supply;

- 'Supplier's Manager" means a manager who at the relevant time carries such designation from the Supplier under, or in accordance with, ARTICLE 5;
- (II) "Supply" means the provision of the goods, services and works described in Schedule A (or, as the context requires, the particular such goods, services or works provided or to be provided by the Supplier to the City at a particular time or times and in the particular combinations and quantities directed by the City in accordance herewith), and any other services to be provided by the Supplier pursuant to this Agreement;
- (mm) "Taxes" means all taxes, duties, imposts, levies, assessments, tariffs and other charges imposed, assessed or collected by a Competent Authority, including:
 - (i) any gross income, net income, gross receipts, business, royalty, capital, capital gains, goods and services, harmonized sales, value added, severance, stamp, franchise, occupation, premium, capital stock, sales and use, real property, land transfer, personal property, ad valorem, transfer, licence, import, customs, profits, windfall profits, environmental, carbon, emissions, pollution, payroll, employment, employer health, pension plan, anti-dumping, countervailing, or excise tax, duty, import, levy, assessment, tariff or other charge;
 - (ii) all withholdings on amounts paid to or by the relevant person;
 - all statutory remittances, employment insurance premiums and social security or pension plan contributions or premiums and Canada pension plan contributions;
 - (iv) any fine, penalty, interest or addition to tax;
 - (v) any tax imposed, assessed, or collected or payable pursuant to any taxsharing agreement or any other contract relating to the sharing or payment of any such tax, levy, assessment, tariff, duty, deficiency or fee: and
 - (vi) any liability for any of the foregoing as a transferee, successor, guarantor, or by contract or by operation of law;
- (nn) "Time(s) for Completion" means the time(s) stated in Schedule E by which the Supply or any particular Supply or part thereof must be completed, as such time(s) may be adjusted (including in relation to a particular instance of Supply), strictly in accordance with this Agreement;
- (00) "WCA" means the Workers Compensation Act (British Columbia) and the regulations thereunder.

1.2 Headings

This division of this Agreement into articles and sections and the insertion of headings are for convenience of reference only and do not affect the construction or interpretation of this Agreement. The terms "hereof", "hereunder" and similar

expressions refer to this Agreement, including its schedules, and not to any particular article, section or other portion hereof. Unless something in the subject matter or context is inconsistent therewith, references herein to articles, sections and schedules are to articles, sections and schedules of this Agreement.

1.3 Extended Meanings

In this Agreement:

- (a) words importing the singular include the plural and vice versa, words importing
 a gender include all genders and words importing persons include individuals,
 partnerships, associations, trusts, unincorporated organizations and
 corporations, except where the context requires otherwise;
- any provision calling for "agreement" requires the relevant agreement to be recorded in writing and signed by both Parties;
- (c) the words "include", "includes", "including" and "included" shall be construed without implying limitation by the words which follow those words and without prejudice to the generality of the provisions to which such words relate, unless inconsistent with the context, and the rule of interpretation known as ejusdem generis shall not apply;
- (d) each reference to a specific statute, regulation, law or any subordinate instrument or statutory or regulatory provision shall be construed as including any legal or regulatory provision which subsequently amends or replaces the same, and shall include any and all subordinate instruments, orders, rules, regulations and bylaws made thereunder or guidelines issued in respect thereof;
- (e) each reference to a writing means a writing that is hand-written, type-written, printed or electronically made, and which results in a permanent un-editable record; and
- (f) "control" when used to describe a relationship between one person and any other person, has the following meanings:
 - (i) a person controls a body corporate if securities of the body corporate to which are attached more than 50% of the votes that may be cast to elect directors of the body corporate are beneficially owned by the person and the votes attached to those securities are sufficient, if exercised, to elect a majority of the directors of the body corporate;
 - (ii) a person controls an unincorporated entity, other than a limited partnership, if more than 50% of the ownership interests, however designated, into which the entity is divided are beneficially owned by that person and the person is able to direct the business and affairs of the entity;
 - (iii) the general partner of a limited partnership controls the limited partnership; and

(iv) a person who controls an entity is deemed to control any entity that is controlled, or deemed to be controlled, by the entity.

ARTICLE 2 EFFECTIVENESS

2.1 Effective Date

This Agreement shall come into full force and effect on the date hereof (the "Effective Date").

2.2 Term

- (a) Unless earlier terminated pursuant to ARTICLE 12 this Agreement shall terminate on the third anniversary of the Effective Date or on such later date as the Parties may agree in writing.
- (b) Subject to termination pursuant to ARTICLE 12, but notwithstanding Section 2.2(a), the term of this Agreement may be extended for up two successive oneyear periods following the third anniversary of the Effective Date, at the option of the City, upon written notice from the City to the Supplier.

ARTICLE 3 SUPPLY; GENERAL TERMS

3.1 Supply

- (a) During the term of effectiveness of this Agreement, the Supplier shall provide the Supply to the City, at the times and in the quantities directed by the City, and otherwise in accordance with the directions of the City and in conformity with this Agreement.
- (b) Notwithstanding any other provision hereof, any goods, services or works described in Schedule A shall be provided to the City only upon receipt by the Supplier of a purchase order from the City or another instruction given by the City pursuant to Section 5.1 relating to such Supply.

- (c) The Supplier shall maintain at all times sufficient business capacity and inventories of the supplies necessary for the provision of the Supply, to meet the business plans and requirements of the City.
- (d) In connection with the Supply, the Supplier shall provide to the City, without additional compensation, all services, conveniences, materials or features proposed in the Proposal that are not otherwise expressly provided for herein, as well as all other ancillary materials or services that are not expressly mentioned either herein or in the Proposal, but are reasonably inferable from the descriptions of the Supply herein or from the descriptions of proposed services, conveniences, materials or features in the Proposal.
- e) During the term of effectiveness of this Agreement, the City may also, from time to time, direct the Supplier to make Supply to one or more of the Other City Entities at the price(s) specified herein and otherwise on the terms and conditions stated herein, and the Supplier shall comply with each such direction. Moreover, the Supplier shall, upon the further request of the City, promptly enter into a Letter Agreement (or failing that shall be deemed to have entered into a Letter Agreement) with each relevant Other City Entity memorializing that the Supplier shall make Supply to such Other City Entity in accordance herewith.

3.2 Application to Prior Acts

Insofar as the Supplier has commenced any part of the Supply prior to the Effective Date, such services shall, as of the Effective Date, be deemed to be performed under and subject to the terms of this Agreement, unless otherwise expressly agreed between the Supplier and the City.

3.3 Sufficiency and Competence of Personnel

- (a) The Supplier shall have and maintain at all times and in accordance with all applicable Laws, sufficient numbers of fit, skilled, qualified and experienced personnel to carry out the provision of the Supply within the times and in the manner required by the City.
- (b) The Supplier warrants that it has (and its Subcontractors, if any, have) the experience, competence, certifications, qualifications and capacity necessary for the Supply.
- (c) Insofar as the Supply involves the Supplier in performing design work, such design work shall be carried out by qualified designers who are engineers or other professionals who comply with the criteria stated in Schedule A (Scope of Goods and Services) or, where not so stated, in accordance with Good Industry Practice.

3.4 Design Review - Intentionally Omitted

3.5 Standards and Requirements

The Supplier shall (and shall procure that its Subcontractors) provide the Supply and perform all other obligations under this Agreement in an expeditious manner and at all times in accordance with:

- (a) all applicable Laws and Consents;
- the specific requirements of Schedule A (Scope of Goods and Services) and the instructions of the City;
- (c) the City Policies; and
- (d) where no higher standard is expressly required of the Supplier under this Agreement, Good Industry Practice,

and the Supplier shall comply with the standards and requirements in Sections 3.5(a) to 3.5(d) in the order of priority in which such standards or requirements are listed (with Section 3.5(a) being of highest priority).

3.6 Consents

The Supplier shall, at the Supplier's sole expense; obtain, maintain and comply with all Consents required by Law to enable it to perform its obligations under this Agreement, except to the extent otherwise expressly stated in the schedules hereto.

3.7 Warranties

- (a) The Supplier warrants that the Supply shall be performed in accordance with this Agreement and to the best practice standards of diligence, skill, care and efficiency expected of a competent contractor performing work of a similar nature to the Supply.
- (b) The Supply shall, when completed, constitute a fully operable, turn-key, ready for immediate use by the City and fit for the use for which it is intended and the Supplier warrants that the Supply shall, upon completion, be without defects or imperfections and shall function correctly and adequately and without any need of repair or improvement for at least twelve months following the completion of the Supply or such defects, imperfections or failures to function correctly and adequately shall be remedied by, or such repairs or improvements shall be undertaken by, the Supplier, without cost or liability to the City and the Supplier shall indemnify and hold the City harmless in relation thereto.
- (c) All goods or materials provided under the Agreement as part of the Supply shall be new and fully warranted for a period of one year from the time of delivery to the City, against defects in design, manufacturing, materials, workmanship and performance, and the Supplier affirms and covenants that such warranty is, and shall be, provided by the Supplier if and to the extent it is not fully and

- effectively provided to the City by third-party manufacturers or suppliers of the goods or materials.
- (d) All goods, works and materials provided under the Agreement as part of the Supply shall be non-defective and fit for their intended purposes and shall function safely in all respects.
- (e) All costs associated with warranty replacements or repairs shall be the responsibility of the Supplier, including repair, adjustment, and shipping costs, and replacements of goods or materials.
- (f) If requested by the City, the Supplier shall handle and manage any claim on a manufacturer warranty for any defect in goods or materials provided as part of the Supply.
- (g) The Supplier shall deliver to the City all such documentation as the City may require to evidence any warranty required by this Section 3.7 or to evidence the Supplier's compliance with this Section 3.7, and the Supplier shall assign all warranties, and do all other things necessary, to ensure that the City receives the full benefit of each warranty or other covenant set forth in this Section 3.7.

3.8 Relationship Between the Parties

- (a) The Supplier in its provision of the Supply and its performance of its obligations under this Agreement shall at all times act as an independent contractor on its own account and shall have no authority to act as the City's agent unless expressly empowered to do so by the City. This Agreement shall not be deemed to create any relationship of partnership, agency, joint enterprise or other like relationship between the Parties, and the Supplier shall be solely responsible for all employment-related obligations in connection with its employees, its other Representatives and its Subcontractors and their employees.
- (b) The City is not bound to treat the Supplier as its exclusive supplier of any goods or services.
- 3.9 Variations Requested by the City -Intentionally Omitted.

3.10 Tests: Defects and Acceptance

- (a) If a Defect appears, the City shall notify the Supplier accordingly.
- (b) The Supplier shall remedy at its own cost and risk Defects in the Supply that the Supplier discovers or that are notified by the City, as soon as reasonably practicable following discovery or notification of such Defects, as the case may be.
- (c) If the Supplier fails to remedy any Defect in the Supply within a reasonable time, a date may be fixed by the City on or by which the Defect is to be remedied. The Supplier shall be given reasonable notice of this date.

(d) If the Supplier fails, without reasonable excuse, to remedy any Defect in the Supply by this notified date, the City may (at its option) elect to carry out the work itself or by others and shall be entitled to recover from the Supplier all direct, proper and reasonable costs of so doing (as a debt due on demand). The City's exercise of its election under this Section 3.10(d) shall in no event absolve the Supplier of its responsibility for remediation of other Defects or otherwise constitute a waiver by the City of its rights and remedies in relation to other Defects, nor shall it preclude or restrict the further exercise of such rights or remedies.

3.11 Title and Risk

- (a) The Supplier warrants that title in each good, work or improvement supplied by the Supplier hereunder, when it passes to the City hereunder, shall be free and clear of Encumbrances.
- (b) Title to any good, work or improvement supplied by the Supplier hereunder shall pass to the City upon the earlier of:
 - (i) payment therefor by the City;
 - (ii) its fixture to any part of the Site>; and
 - (iii) its incorporation into a work supplied by the Supplier.
- (c) The Supplier shall deliver to the City any documentation, including a bill of sale, which the City may reasonably require to evidence the transfer of title in and to goods to the City, free and clear of all Encumbrances.
- (d) The Supplier must not enter any contract that reserves ownership of goods or materials supplied by the Supplier hereunder in favour of any third party and, at the request of the City, the Supplier must provide evidence that no such contract has been entered into.
- (e) Notwithstanding the foregoing provisions of this Section 3.11, the Supplier is responsible for the care of, and bears all of the risk of loss or damage to, each good, work or improvements supplied hereunder and each material used in connection with the Supply, until the completion of the Supply to the satisfaction of the City.

ARTICLE 4 PREFERRED SUPPLIERS - INTENTIONALLY OMITTED

ARTICLE 5 CONTRACT MANAGERS

5.1 City's Managers

(a) The City hereby designates Brian Landels as "City's Manager." Each City's Manager, including any additional City's Managers designated by the City in accordance herewith, has, for so long as he or she remains a City's Manager,

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full authority to act on behalf of the City in relation to all matters arising under this Agreement.

- b) Any instruction from the City to the Supplier pursuant to this Agreement shall be issued through an executive officer of the City or through a City's Manager and shall only be effective if in writing or confirmed in writing within seven days of oral instruction. Failure to comply with this Section 5.1 shall render any purported City's instruction invalid. However, this restriction does not apply to any instruction issued in an emergency situation or which relates to a threat or potential threat to the life, health or safety of any individual.
- (c) Notwithstanding the foregoing, each City's Manager may, in writing, delegate his or her authority hereunder to others.

5.2 Supplier's Managers

- (a) The Supplier hereby designates each of Peter Steinfort and Karlissa Hughes as a "Supplier's Manager." Each Supplier's Manager, including any additional Supplier's Managers designated by the Supplier in accordance herewith, has, for so long as he or she remains a Supplier's Manager, full authority to act on behalf of the Supplier in relation to all matters arising under this Agreement, and any instruction given by the City (through an executive officer or City's Manager) to either of them shall be deemed to be valid and effective, if given as stated in Section 5.1(b).
- (b) Each Supplier's manager may, in writing, delegate his or her authority hereunder to others, upon the written agreement of the City.

5.3 Designation of New Managers

The City may designate new City's Managers, or remove that designation from any individual, and the Supplier may designate new Supplier's Managers, or remove that designation from any individual, from time to time, each at its own discretion, through notice to the other Party. In the case of the Supplier, any such designation or removal must be in writing to the City.

ARTICLE 6 SUPPLIERS' WARRANTIES AND COVENANTS

6.1 General Representations and Warranties

The Supplier represents and warrants that:

- the Supplier has the full right, power, and authority to enter into this Agreement and to perform the Supply;
- the Supplier is a corporation duly organized, validly existing and in good standing under the laws of British Columbia and is lawfully authorized to do business in the Province of British Columbia;

- (c) the Supplier is not a party to or bound by any agreement (written or oral), indenture, instrument, licence, permit or understanding or other obligation or restriction under the terms of which the execution, delivery or performance of this Agreement does or shall constitute or result in a violation or breach;
- (d) all statements made by the Supplier in its Proposal are true and accurate;
- the Supplier is fully experienced in the design and management of projects or works of a similar scope, purpose, complexity, size and technical sophistication as the Supply;
- (f) the Supplier possesses a level of skill and expertise commensurate with Good Industry Practice, which it shall utilize in the performance of its obligations under this Agreement:
- (g) the Supplier understands that the City is relying upon the skill, judgment and expertise of the Supplier and its Subcontractors (if any) in the carrying out of the Supply and the co-ordination and planning thereof;
- (h) the Supplier's and any Subcontractors' employees are accredited to carry out the relevant portions of the Supply to the extent required by applicable Laws and all of them are appropriately skilled, competent and experienced and possess relevant qualifications having regard to the nature and extent of the Supply and the Sites;
- 6.2 General Health and Safety-Related Acknowledgements and Covenants

The Supplier shall:

- (a) in the provision of the Supply, comply at all times with the OHS Requirements and take all reasonably necessary steps to ensure similar compliance from its Representatives and its Subcontractors, if any;
- (b) if the Supply involves any type of manual labour, prior to their attendance at any Site, deliver to each of its Representatives and each of its Subcontractors, if any, and to their employees, if applicable, copies of the OHS Requirements relevant to the Site;
- (c) at all times take all reasonable precautions to maintain the health and safety of workers:
- (d) be at all times registered and in good standing with the relevant workers' compensation insurance Competent Authorities, and provide to the City copies of any notices, correspondence or directions issued by any government or Competent Authority relating to workplace-related employment, human rights, labour, immigration policy, health, safety or environmental matters within 24 hours of the Supplier's receipt of such notice, correspondence or direction;
- appoint a qualified health and safety coordinator to ensure coordination of health and safety activities in the provision of the Supply;

- (f) report (with full details) any accident, injury, illness or other incident relating to workplace health and safety or the environment to the City as soon as reasonably practicable, investigate the accident, injury, illness or other incident reasonably thoroughly (and in any event in accordance with any applicable OHS Requirements) and promptly report to the City the results of each such investigation;
- maintain such records and make such reports concerning health, safety and welfare of persons, and damage to property, or the natural, physical or biological environment, as the City may reasonably require; and
- (h) to the extent a "prime contractor", as defined in the WCA, is not already designated by the City for any portion of a Site, be and act as the prime contractor, and the Supplier assumes and is wholly responsible for the health and safety of all persons at such locations on the basis described in the WCA.

6.3 Covenants Regarding Violations of Health and Safety Requirements

Without prejudice to any remedies available to the City hereunder, if any Subcontractor or person employed or engaged by the Supplier (or by a Subcontractor) violates any OHS Requirement, the Supplier shall:

- (a) ensure that the violation is promptly resolved;
- (b) ensure the violation is promptly and appropriately reported to the City and to the applicable competent authorities (if and to the extent required by the OHS Requirements);
- (c) promptly take all reasonable steps necessary to avoid recurrence of the violation;
- (d) communicate to the City its plan to avoid recurrence of the violation; and
- (e) without prejudice to the foregoing Section 6.3(c), promptly remove any person responsible for the violation from the provision of the Supply if reasonable to do so or if requested to do so by the City.

6.4 Covenants Regarding the Environment

- (a) The Supplier shall:
 - at all times, be conscious of the importance of the protection of the natural, physical and biological environment at and in the vicinity of the Sites;
 - (ii) conduct, and cause its Representatives to conduct, their respective activities that relate to the Supply in a manner that shall have the least possible adverse effect on the natural environment and in compliance with all Environmental Laws and Consents, all at the Supplier's expense;
 - (iii) perform the Supply with the least degree of environmental degradation during and as a result of such performance; and

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- (iv) without restricting the generality or application of any other provisions of this Agreement, comply, and cause its Representatives to comply, with all applicable Laws and Consents and with all plans and instructions contained in this Agreement or issued in writing by the City concerning the existence, Release, removal, handling, transport, storage, disposal and treatment of any Hazardous Substances or other materials that are or may be hazardous to the life or health of any person or that endanger the environment or that are regulated by applicable Law.
- (b) During the term of this Agreement, the Supplier shall not bring or store or permit to be used at any Site, any Hazardous Substances unless such Hazardous Substances are (i) reasonably required to carry out the Supply, and (ii) brought or stored or permitted to be used at any Site in compliance with all Laws (including Environmental Laws). The Supplier shall not Release nor permit the Release of any Hazardous Substances into the environment. The Supplier is solely responsible for all Hazardous Substances introduced to the Sites or the environment by the Supplier or its Representatives or Subcontractors, and the Supplier shall promptly and fully remediate, to the City's satisfaction, any release of Hazardous Substances on or from any Site, or in the vicinity of any Site.

6.5 Further Covenants Regarding the Sites

The Supplier shall:

- (a) at its sole cost, keep any portion of any Site used in connection with the Supply in a safe and tidy condition and to maintain and operate the Supplier's equipment in a good, workmanlike and safe manner; and
- (b) not to do anything at any Site which is or may become a nuisance, danger or disturbance to the City or to any other occupants or users of the Site or adjacent areas or to any works or structures or installations thereon.

6.6 Covenants Against Encumbrances

- (a) The Supplier shall keep each Site and the goods included in the Supply, and each part thereof, free of all Encumbrances filed pursuant to any Law or otherwise in respect of any such work or materials. In any event, if any Encumbrance has been filed in relation to the Site or any improvement thereon, or in relation to any goods included in the Supply, the Supplier shall cause any such Encumbrance to be discharged within 30 days after the Encumbrance has come to the notice of the Supplier.
- (b) The Supplier acknowledges and agrees that, in the event the Supplier fails to discharge any Encumbrance contemplated in Section 6.6(a) within 60 days of written notice of such Encumbrance being given by the City, in addition to any other right or remedy, the City may, but shall not be obligated to, discharge the Encumbrance by paying to the applicable Competent Authority, the amount claimed to be due or the amount due, together with a reasonable amount for costs and the amount paid by the City shall be paid by the Supplier to the City

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forthwith upon demand. In no case shall the City be required to investigate the validity of the Encumbrance prior to discharging the same in accordance with this Section 6.6(b).

6.7 Absence of Conflicts of Interest

- (a) Neither the Supplier, nor any of its Representatives has given or shall give or offer to give to the City or any official, officer, employee or agent of the City any gratuity, reward, advantage or benefit of any kind as consideration for doing or forbearing to do, or for having done or forborne to do, any act in connection with this Agreement.
- (b) To the best of the Supplier's knowledge, the Supplier, its Subcontractors, and their respective directors, officers, employees and agents have no pecuniary interests or any other current or past interests or dealings, including with any officials, officers or employees of the City, that would cause any conflict of interest or be seen to cause a conflict of interest in respect of the Supply. Should such a conflict or perceived conflict arise during the term of this Agreement, the Supplier shall declare it immediately in writing to the City. The City may direct the Supplier to resolve any conflict or perceived conflict to the satisfaction of the City. The Supplier warrants that neither the Supplier nor any of its Subcontractors, or any of their respective directors, officers, employees or agents, has any predisposition, affinity or association with any third party which would impair or be seen to impair or qualify the Supplier's provision of the Supply.

ARTICLE 7 PERSONNEL

7.1 Separate Personnel

- (a) It is the intention of the Parties that any personnel utilized or supplied by the Supplier or any Subcontractor hereunder shall remain employees of the Supplier or Subcontractor, respectively, for the purposes of any applicable Law and no activity performed by such personnel shall be deemed to create or imply any employment or other like relationship between such personnel and the City. If contrary to this intention such personnel are treated as employees of the City for the purposes of any applicable Law, the Supplier shall indemnify the City against any loss, cost, expense, complaint, claim, levy, assessment, penalty or fine (including any Tax liability) resulting therefrom.
- (b) Neither the City nor the Supplier shall, and the Supplier shall ensure that none of its Representatives or Subcontractors shall, induce any employee of the other, who may work in connection with the Supply, to leave his or her current employer, and neither of them shall, and the Supplier shall ensure that none of its Representatives or Subcontractors shall, employ or make an offer of employment to any such employee of the other during the term of this Agreement or the period of 365 days after the termination of this Agreement without the express prior approval in writing of the employee's current employer.

c) If any persons are brought by the Supplier into Canada for purposes of the Supply, the Supplier shall be responsible for all immigration matters, and for the expatriation and repatriation of such personnel, and the costs of the same shall be deemed included in the Contract Price.

7.2 Changes in Personnel

The City may request the removal or replacement of any personnel engaged by the Supplier or any Subcontractor in relation to any part of the Supply, provided that such request is made in writing stating the City's detailed reasons. The Supplier shall comply with such request as soon as reasonably practicable and shall bear the cost of replacement where the City is of the opinion that the personnel in question are guilty of misconduct, do not have acceptable qualifications or are otherwise unable or unfit to perform satisfactorily and safely. If the City requests a replacement for a reason other than the immediately aforementioned reasons, the City shall reimburse the Supplier its reasonable properly incurred costs of replacement.

7.3 Key Project Personnel

- (a) Where there are Key Project Personnel the Supplier shall:
 - use best endeavours to retain Key Project Personnel for the duration of the provision of the Supply;
 - take reasonable steps to ensure that Key Project Personnel dedicate their time fully to the Supply (unless otherwise agreed or approved by the City in writing);
 - (iii) promptly inform the City should any of the Key Project Personnel leave, or give notice of an intention to leave the Supplier, and obtain a substitute or substitutes;
 - (iv) not reassign or allow the reassignment of the Key Project Personnel to other projects during the term of this Agreement without the City's prior written consent (such consent not to be unreasonably withheld or delayed); and
 - (v) take all reasonable steps to ensure that the Key Project Personnel perform their roles and responsibilities in accordance with any organisational structure agreed in writing between the Parties.
- (b) If:
 - the Supplier wishes to reassign or to replace an individual designated as Key Project Personnel; or
 - (ii) an individual designated as Key Project Personnel gives notice of his or her intention to leave or is otherwise no longer able to perform the duties, including for reasons of illness, injury or personal hardship,

the Supplier shall provide a substitute with experience and qualifications equivalent or greater than the Key Project Personnel to be replaced, and shall provide documentation to the City to establish such experience and qualifications.

- (c) Key Project Personnel who are reassigned to other work shall, to the extent possible, remain available to the project team until completion of the Supply.
- (d) All the Supplier's Key Project Personnel must be fluent in both spoken and written English, except as may be agreed to the contrary between the City and Supplier in relation to specific individuals or positions to be filled from time to time.

ARTICLE 8 REPORTING

8.1 Progress Reports

- (a) Quarterly service reports shall be prepared by the Supplier and submitted to the City in a format reasonably acceptable to the City, or as otherwise required by the City, each within seven days after the last day of the month to which it relates.
- (b) Each such progress report shall include (as a minimum):
 - detailed descriptions of the quantities and costs for Supplies and Services provided at each of the City's Sites;
 - (ii) copies of any quality assurance documents;
 - (iii) disclosure detailing the type(s) and quantity(ies) of fuel(s) used by the Supplier and its Subcontractors to operate vehicles, equipment and machinery in the delivery of the Supply from the date of the last such report (or, if none, from the Effective Date) to the date that is 15 days before the date of the report.
 - (iv) information and statistics relating to health, safety, environmental and community relations aspects of the Supply;
 - (v) health and safety statistics, including details of:
 - (A) any Safety Incidents or other injuries, accidents, or safety or near-miss incidents relating to the safety of the Supply; and
 - (B) any hazardous accidents, incidents and activities relating to environmental aspects of the Supply or community relations, including any Releases of any Hazardous Substances; and

8.2 Assistance regarding Reporting Requirements

The Supplier shall, and shall cause its Representatives to, provide the City with reasonable assistance and information which is necessary to enable the City to comply with any Law.

8.3 Other Reports

(a) The Supplier shall provide any additional reports and information regarding the Supply or the Site reasonably requested by the City at any time.

ARTICLE 9 PAYMENT; AUDITS

9.1 Payment to the Supplier

- (a) Subject to ARTICLE 12 and Section 9.3, the City shall pay the Supplier for the Supply in accordance with Schedule B (Prices for Supply), following the receipt of invoices prepared and delivered in accordance with Section 9.2(b) and Section 9.3.
- (b) Unless otherwise expressly stated in the schedules hereto, the Supplier shall pay any and all costs, including freight, marine and transit insurance, Taxes, and transportation and delivery charges on all equipment or things of whatsoever nature provided by the Supplier as required by it for the purposes of the Supply and any other incidental costs and all such costs shall be deemed to be included in the Contract Price.
- (c) The Supplier shall be deemed to have satisfied itself as to the correctness and sufficiency of Schedule B (Prices for Supply) and to have obtained all information and to have taken into account all circumstances, risks and other contingencies that may affect the cost of performing the Supply (including any circumstances, risks or contingencies that a contractor exercising Good Industry Practice would typically expect to encounter) and any other obligation under this Agreement. The Supplier shall not be entitled to any additional compensation beyond the Contract Price (including without limitation for escalation in the prices of goods, materials and labour) except as otherwise expressly stated in this Agreement.
- (d) Notwithstanding any other provisions of this Agreement, the Supplier shall not be entitled to payment for any Supply that has not been performed in compliance with the provisions of this Agreement.

9.2 Purchase Orders: Content of Invoices

- (a) The City shall from time to time issue purchase orders to the Supplier in relation to the Supply. These shall not have the effect of amending or waiving the application of any provision of this Agreement.
- (b) Each of the Supplier's invoices shall set out, as a minimum (and in such form or format as required by the City):

- the number of the purchase order of the City relating to the particular Supply to which the invoice relates;
- (ii) an itemized list of the amounts owing;
- (iii) name of person requesting the service
- (iv) the time period to which the invoice relates;
- (y) a description of the portion of the Supply to which the invoice relates;
- (vi) the total amounts payable under the invoice;
- (vii) all supporting documentation relating to disbursements; and
- (viii) such other information as the City may require from time to time.
- (c) Any terms or conditions proposed by the Supplier to govern the Supply that are contained in any invoice (or in any shipping document, packing list or similar document) are void and of no effect, notwithstanding any statement in such document concerning the means by which the City may accept or be deemed to accept such terms or conditions.

9.3 Procedure for Invoices

- (a) The Supplier shall submit each of its invoices to the City, Attention: Accounts Payable, by email to APInvoice@vancouver.ca, or to such other address as is specified in an applicable purchase order. The City shall thereafter pay the invoice within 30 days, provided the other requirements of this Agreement have been satisfied and subject to the other provisions hereof.
- (b) The City shall not be liable for any interest on any invoice amount in respect of any period for any reason.

9.4 Currency of Payment

All currency amounts stated herein are denominated in, all invoices hereunder shall be stated in, and all payments hereunder shall be made in, Canadian dollars.

9.5 Contested Claims for Payment

If any item contained in an invoice submitted by the Supplier is contested by the City, the City shall give prompt notice thereof, together with reasons to the Supplier.

9.6 Audits

a) The Supplier shall maintain up-to-date records and accounts which clearly document the provision of the Supply and shall make the same available to the City upon request. The City may request copies of all such records and accounts which shall be provided to the City by the Supplier (subject to reimbursement of the Supplier's reasonable copying costs and any other direct costs and expenses, if any) at any time prior to the expiry of 365 days after

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completion of all of the Supply or earlier termination of this Agreement. For avoidance of doubt, any records and accounts provided by the Supplier in accordance with this Section 9.6(a) shall be deemed to be Confidential Information:

- (b) Not later than three years after the completion of all of the Supply or earlier termination of this Agreement, the City can itself, on notice of not less than 14 days, require that a firm of accountants, surveyors or other auditors nominated by it audit any such records and accounts of the Supplier by attending during normal working hours at the office where the records are maintained. For avoidance of doubt, any records and accounts or other documents provided by the Supplier in accordance with this Section 9.6(b) shall be provided only subject to the accountants, surveyors or other auditors, and each of them, being subject to and agreeing to meet such of the Supplier's reasonable requirements as to confidentiality as the Supplier deems (at its sole discretion) to be appropriate in the circumstances; and
- (c) Any overpayments by the City discovered during the course of any such audit pursuant to Section 9.6(b)shall be payable by the Supplier to the City within 30 days of such discovery, and if the overpayments have been caused by an act or omission of the Supplier and the amount of those overpayments is no less than one quarter of the total amount paid by the City to the Supplier in respect of the Supply, then the costs of the relevant audit shall be for the account of the Supplier.

9.7 Set Off

Notwithstanding any provision to the contrary in this Agreement and without prejudice to any other remedy which the City may have (whether in common law or equity), the City shall be entitled to deduct from and set off against any sum(s) otherwise due to the Supplier hereunder any sums which are due from the Supplier to the City or which the Supplier is liable to pay to the City under this Agreement or in connection herewith (including without limitation any monies overpaid to the Supplier under this Agreement or otherwise due and payable to the City by reason of any error in payment under this Agreement).

ARTICLE 10 CERTAIN ADDITIONAL OBLIGATIONS OF THE CITY

10.1 Scheduled Items

The City shall make available, free of cost and without delay or in accordance with any agreed timetable or schedule set forth in Schedule C (Items to be Provided by the City), to the Supplier for the purpose of the Supply, the personnel, equipment, facilities, services (including services of third parties) and information described in such Schedule C (if any), and in accordance therewith.

10.2 Other Information

The City shall, within a reasonable time following a written request by the Supplier, provide to the Supplier free of cost such further information, which the City considers

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relevant to provision of the Supply and which is either already in its possession or reasonably within its power to obtain.

10.3 Decisions in Writing

On all matters properly referred to it in writing by the Supplier, the City shall (wherever practicable) give its decision in writing within a reasonable time having regard to the Time(s) for Completion and the Supplier's obligations with regard to the Supply.

10.4 Access to the Site

Except to the extent prohibited by applicable Law or any Consent, the City shall grant to the Supplier non-exclusive, timely and in accordance with any agreed schedule, access (as the City is reasonably able to provide) to all necessary areas of the Site on and from the Effective Date and such other non-exclusive access as is necessary or appropriate to perform the Supply and the Supplier's other obligations in accordance with this Agreement.

Vancouver Police sites may require security clearance.

ARTICLE 11 LIABILITY AND INSURANCE

11.1 Covenants of Indemnification by the Supplier

- (a) The Supplier shall indemnify and keep indemnified and hold the City, the Other City Entities and their respective officials, officers, employees and agents harmless against all losses, liabilities, claims, demands, costs and expenses (including legal fees), fines, penalties and charges (including those imposed by statute or otherwise imposed), arising out of or in connection with, or consisting of:
 - (i) any:
 - (A) damage to a Site or any part thereof, or any property whether located at a Site or otherwise, which occurs during the provision of the Supply;
 - (B) any claim by a Subcontractor under the Builders Lien Act (British Columbia);
 - (C) damage to the natural environment, including any remediation cost recovery claims;
 - (D) loss or damage arising from a claim by any third party concerning or arising out of the Supply, or by any employee or Subcontractor of the Supplier for any reason;
 - (E) occupational illness, injury or death of any person, whether at a Site or otherwise, which occurs during, or as a result of, the provision of the Supply;

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- (F) failure by the Supplier to fully comply with the provisions of this Agreement;
- (G) breach by the Supplier or any Subcontractor of any Law in the course of, or as a result of, the provision of the Supply;
- (H) actual or alleged infringement of any Intellectual Property Rights caused by the provision of the Supply or the use of any process, work, material, matter, thing or method used or supplied by the Supplier or any Subcontractor in the provision of the Supply; or
- 1) breach of the warranties of the Supplier contained herein,

in each case to the extent that it is due to any act, omission or default, or any breach of Law or this Agreement, of the Supplier, a Subcontractor or any Representative of the Supplier or any employee, agent or contractor of any of them; or

- (ii) any defect in a good, work or material provided as part of the Supply or any failure of any such good, work or material to function safely or to satisfy any applicable safety standard.
- (b) Nothing in this Section 11.1 nor otherwise in this Agreement shall limit or exclude any direct liability (whether in contract, tort, for breach of statutory duty or any other legal basis) of the Supplier to any person, including without limitation any liability for:
 - (i) the Supplier's default hereunder or fraud, fraudulent misrepresentation or reckless misconduct in the provision of the Supply; or
 - (ii) any loss or damage flowing from the termination of this Agreement.
- (c) The Supplier appoints the City as the trustee of the Other City Entities and of their and the City's officials, officers, employees and agents in relation to the covenants of indemnification of the Supplier contained in this Section 11.1 and the City accepts such appointment.

11.2 Contamination of Lands

Without limiting any other provision hereof or any other remedy available to the City hereunder, the Supplier agrees and covenants that if, at any time during the term or following the expiry of this Agreement, the Site or any other lands affected by the Supply are found to be contaminated or polluted (as determined pursuant to Environmental Laws) as a result of or in connection with the Supply, the Supplier shall forthwith at its sole cost:

- (a) undertake all necessary audits, investigations, tests and surveys to determine the nature and extent of the contamination or pollution;
- (b) notify the City of the nature and extent of the contamination or pollution and any proposed or required work necessary to control, abate, dissipate or remove

(as appropriate) the pollution or contamination as required by Environmental Laws: and

(c) undertake the work referred to in the foregoing paragraph (b).

11.3 Conduct of Claims

In the event of any claims, statutory fees, costs, charges, penalties (including without limitation any legal costs), contributions, compensations, cost recoveries, expenses or fines being levied or claimed from a person in respect of which an indemnity is provided by the Supplier pursuant to ARTICLE 11, the following provisions shall apply:

- (a) subject to Sections 11.3(b), 11.3(c) and 11.3(d), where it appears that a person is or may be entitled to indemnification from the Supplier in respect of all (but not part only) of the liability arising out of a claim, such person entitled to indemnification may at its sole election and subject to:
 - approval by any relevant insurers (without prejudice to Section 11.3(f);
 and
 - (ii) the Supplier providing the party entitled to indemnification with a secured indemnity to its reasonable satisfaction against all costs and expenses (including legal expenses) that it may incur by reason of such action,

permit or require the Supplier to dispute the claim on behalf of the person entitled to indemnification at the Supplier's own expense and take conduct of any defence, dispute, compromise, or appeal of the claim and of any incidental negotiations; provided that the person entitled to indemnification shall give the Supplier (provided at the Supplier's cost) all reasonable cooperation, access and assistance for the purposes of considering and resisting such claim;

- (b) with respect to any claim conducted by the Supplier pursuant to Section 11.3(a):
 - the Supplier shall keep the person entitled to indemnification fully informed and consult with it about material elements of the conduct of the claim;
 - (ii) the Supplier shall not bring the name of the person entitled to indemnification (or any Group Member thereof) into disrepute; and
 - (iii) the Supplier shall not pay or settle such claims without the prior consent of the person entitled to indemnification, such consent not to be unreasonably withheld or delayed;
- a person entitled to indemnification shall be free to pay or settle any claim on such terms as it thinks fit (and without prejudice to its rights and remedies under this Agreement) if:

- the Supplier is not entitled to, or is not permitted or instructed, take conduct of the claim in accordance with Section 11.3(a); or
- (ii) the Supplier fails to comply in any material respect with the provisions of Sections 11.3(a) or 11.3(b);
- (d) the person entitled to indemnification pursuant to ARTICLE 11 shall be free at any time to give notice to the Supplier that it is retaining or taking over (as the case may be) the conduct of any defence, dispute, compromise or appeal of any claim (or of any incidental negotiations) to which Section 11.3(a) applies. On receipt of such notice the Supplier shall promptly take all steps necessary to transfer the conduct of such claim to the person entitled to indemnification, and shall provide to the person entitled to indemnification all reasonable cooperation, access and assistance for the purposes of considering and resisting such claim:
- (e) if the Supplier pays to the person entitled to indemnification an amount in respect of an indemnity and the person entitled to indemnification subsequently recovers (whether by payment, discount, credit, saving, relief or other benefit or otherwise) a sum which is directly referable to the fact, matter, event or circumstances giving rise to the claim under the indemnity, the person entitled to indemnification shall forthwith repay to the Supplier whichever is the lesser of:
 - an amount equal to the sum recovered (or the value of the saving or benefit obtained) less any out-of-pocket costs and expenses (including legal expenses) properly incurred by the person entitled to indemnification in recovering the same; and
 - the amount paid to the person entitled to indemnification by the Supplier in respect of the claim under the relevant indemnity,

provided that there shall be no obligation on the part of the person entitled to indemnification to pursue such recovery and that the Supplier is repaid only to the extent that the amount of such recovery aggregated with any sum recovered from the Supplier exceeds any loss sustained by the person entitled to indemnification;

- (f) the Supplier shall inform the person entitled to indemnification of the requirements of any insurer who may have an obligation to provide an indemnity in respect of any liability arising under this Agreement and in relation to such the person entitled to indemnification shall issue instructions accordingly; and
- (g) any person entitled to an indemnity from the Supplier must take all reasonable measures to mitigate any loss, damage or liability that it may suffer in respect of any such matter.

11.4 Insurance

- In addition to those mandatory insurance policies that the Supplier is required to carry by any applicable Laws, the Supplier shall take out and maintain in force, with a reputable insurance company, during the term of this Agreement and for a period of five years afterwards, commercial general liability insurance with coverage of not less than five million (\$5,000,000) per occurrence and at least five million (\$5,000,000) annual aggregate coverage endorsing the City as an additional insured on a primary and non-contributory basis and providing a waiver of subrogation in favour of the City.
- (b) The Supplier is required to carry an environmental impairment insurance policy with limits not less than five million (\$5,000,000) per occurrence with a deductible not greater than twenty five thousand dollars (\$25,000) covering third party bodily injury, property damage and clean-up costs arising out of a pollution event including but not limited to unexpected and unintentional spill, discharge, emission, dispersal, leakage, migration, release or escape of pollutants. Coverage will include the transportation. Loading and unloading of materials.
- (c) The Supplier is required to carry a motor vehicle liability insurance policy for vehicles owned and or operated by the Contractor in connection with this Contract with limits not less than five million (\$5,000,000) and a deductible of not more than twenty five thousand dollars (\$2,500).
- (d) The Supplier shall ensure that any Subcontractors also maintain the same insurance as the Supplier, having regard to the obligations under this Agreement which they are contracted to fulfil.
- (e) The Supplier's liabilities under this agreement shall not be deemed to be released or limited by the Supplier taking out the insurance policies referred to in Section 11.4(a).
- (f) The cost of the insurances arising under this Section 11.4 shall be deemed to be incorporated into the prices specified in Schedule B.
- (g) As a condition precedent to any payment from the City to the Supplier under this Agreement, and as and when reasonably requested by the City, the Supplier shall provide documentary evidence (to the reasonable satisfaction of the City, including by completing the City's standard reporting documents used for this purpose) that the insurances required by this Section 11.4 have been taken out and are being maintained.

ARTICLE 12 FORCE MAJEURE; TERMINATION

12.1 Force Majeure

(a) Neither Party shall be deemed to be in breach of this Agreement or otherwise liable to the other Party in any manner whatsoever for any failure or delay in

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performing its obligations under this Agreement reasonably due to Force Majeure.

- (b) If either Party's performance of its obligations under this Agreement is affected by an event of Force Majeure, then:
 - it shall give written notice to the other Party, specifying the nature and extent of the event of Force Majeure, within ten days after becoming aware of the event of Force Majeure;
 - (ii) performance of such obligation(s) shall be deemed suspended but only for a period equal to the delay reasonably caused by such event;
 - it shall not be entitled to payment from the other Party in respect of extra costs and expenses incurred by virtue of the event of Force Majeure;
 - (iv) the Time(s) for Completion shall be extended to take into account such delay; and
 - (v) within five days of the cessation of any Force Majeure event, the Party affected thereby shall submit a written notice to the other Party, specifying the actual duration of the delay of its obligations caused by the event of Force Majeure and the consequences resulting from such delay, and submit a specific plan to minimize and mitigate those consequences.
- (c) The affected Party shall use all reasonable diligence in accordance with Good Industry Practice to mitigate the cause and the result of an event of Force Majeure and to remedy the situation and resume its obligations under this Agreement, including complying with any instructions from the City, as to how to do so.
- (d) Notwithstanding the obligations of a Party affected by an event of Force Majeure pursuant to Sections 12.1(b) and 12.1(c), if the event of Force Majeure renders it impossible or impractical for the Supplier to provide the Supply in accordance with this Agreement for a period of at least 45 days, the City may terminate this Agreement upon notice delivered to the Supplier at any time following the expiration of such period of 45 days.

12.2 City Suspension and Termination Rights

The City shall have the following rights:

(a) The City may order the suspension of all or part of the Supply at any time and for such period as it determines, by notice with immediate effect to the Supplier, in the event of a Safety Incident; and upon receipt of any such notice of suspension, the Supplier shall immediately cease performing the Supply, minimise expenditure and comply with any reasonable instructions of the City relating to such Safety Incident, including any investigations.

- (b) Without prejudice to Section 12.2(a), the City may suspend all or part of the Supply (for such period as its determines) or terminate this Agreement at any time (and for its convenience) upon thirty days' written notice to the Supplier, which shall immediately upon receipt of such notice take all reasonable steps to wind down the performance of the Supply and to minimise expenditure, including complying with any instructions from the City as to how to do so.
- (c) If the City reasonably considers that the Supplier is not discharging any of its material obligations under this Agreement, the City may inform the Supplier by notice stating the grounds for the notice. If evidence of remediation satisfactory to the City, is not received as soon as practicable or in any case within fourteen days or such longer period as agreed by the Parties, the City may by a further notice to the Supplier of at least fourteen days terminate this Agreement.
- (d) The City may terminate this Agreement with immediate effect if:
 - (i) the Supplier becomes bankrupt or insolvent, goes into liquidation, has a receiver or administrator appointed over it or any of its assets of undertaking, enters into any arrangement for the benefit of its creditors, becomes the subject of any moratorium or carries on business under a receiver, trustee, manager or arrangement for the benefit of its creditors, or if any act is done or event occurs which (under applicable Laws) has a similar effect to any of these acts or events; or
 - (ii) a Change in Control of the Supplier occurs and the City reasonably considers that the Change in Control shall substantively affect the Supplier's ability to perform its obligations under this Agreement.

12.3 Supplier Termination Rights

After giving at least seven days' written notice to the City, the Supplier may terminate this Agreement, or at its discretion and without prejudice to the right to terminate, may suspend or continue suspension of performance of the whole or part of the Supply when:

- (a) Ninety days after the due date for payment of an invoice, it has not received payment of that part which has not by that time been contested in writing by the City and provided always that:
 - (i) the Supplier has issued a notice of reminder to the City following the due date for payment in relation to such unpaid sum; and
 - (ii) the termination notice may not be issued until the expiry of thirty days following the issue of such reminder notice; or
- (b) the City commits any material or persistent breach(es) of its obligations under this Agreement which render(s) performance by the Supplier of its obligations under this Agreement or a substantial part thereof impossible or significantly adversely affect(s) such performance of this Agreement as a whole and further which, remain(s) irremediable after sixty days.

12.4 Consequences of Termination

The following consequences shall apply upon a termination:

- a) On termination of this Agreement for any reason, the Supplier shall, as soon as reasonably practicable:
 - deliver to the City all work and Documentation produced by or on behalf of the Supplier during the course of performing the Supply;
 - (ii) return (or destroy if otherwise directed by the City in writing) all Confidential Information provided to it for the purposes of this Agreement;
 - (iii) return all of the City's Site access cards, equipment and other items provided under this Agreement, failing which, the City may enter the relevant premises and take possession thereof, and, until any such access cards, equipment and other items have been returned or repossessed, the Supplier shall be solely responsible for its or their safekeeping;
 - (iv) if so requested by the City, take reasonable steps to assign any Subcontractor contracts to the City and do all things and execute all documents necessary to give effect thereto; and
 - otherwise comply with all reasonable requirements of the City arising from the cessation of the Supply or the continuing development of the Site.
- (b) The Supplier shall be entitled to be paid its reasonable properly incurred costs of compliance with Section 12.4(a) and its reasonable demobilization costs, up to a maximum of \$5,000, in aggregate, save in circumstances in which the City reasonably claims that the termination was a consequence of a Safety Incident or a default by the Supplier in the provision of any part of the Supply, in which case all such costs shall be for the Supplier's own account.
- (c) On termination of this Agreement for any reason, the Supplier shall be entitled to payment for any completed portion of the Supply rendered in full compliance herewith prior to the time of termination, in accordance with Schedule B (Prices for Supply).

12.5 Other Surviving Rights and Liabilities of Parties

- (a) Termination of this Agreement shall not prejudice or affect the accrued rights or claims and liabilities of the Parties.
- (b) After termination of this Agreement, the provisions of Sections 3.7 and 9.6, ARTICLE 11, ARTICLE 14, ARTICLE 15 and ARTICLE 17 shall remain in force.

ARTICLE 13 ASSIGNMENT AND SUBCONTRACTING

13.1 Assignment

Neither Party shall assign, transfer, mortgage, charge or deal in any other manner with this Agreement or any of its rights and obligations under or arising out of the Agreement (or any document referred to herein), or purport to take any such action without the prior written consent of the other.

13.2 Subcontracting

- (a) The Supplier shall not subcontract the whole or substantially all of the Supply without written permission from the City.
- (b) Without prejudice to the foregoing Section 13.2(a), save in the case of Subcontractor(s) whose role in the provision of the Supply is expressly provided for in the schedules hereto (and only to the extent so provided for), the Supplier may not subcontract any part of the Supply without the City's prior written consent.
- (c) The Supplier shall include in each contract by which it engages a Subcontractor a provision allowing the benefit of such contract to be assigned by the Supplier to the City upon request.
- (d) The Supplier shall not without the written consent of the City (which shall not be unreasonably withheld or delayed) initiate or terminate any contract with a Subcontractor.
- (e) If the Supplier is unable to enter into a contract with a Subcontractor whose role in the provision of the Supply is expressly provided for in the schedules hereto, it shall as soon as reasonably practicable inform the City of the reason for such inability and procure the services of a replacement subcontractor that is acceptable to the City, acting reasonably.
- (f) The Supplier shall be responsible for the acts, defaults or neglect or any omission of each Subcontractor, its employees and agents in all respects as if they were the acts and defaults or neglect or omission of the Supplier its employees or agents themselves.

ARTICLE 14 INTELLECTUAL PROPERTY

14.1 Assignment

The Supplier acknowledges and agrees that the City is the exclusive owner of all right, title, and interests in and to the Documentation, including, without limitation, all Intellectual Property Rights therein. The Supplier shall assign and hereby assigns to the City all right, title, and interests in and to the Documentation, including, without limitation, all existing and future Intellectual Property Rights in and to the Documentation, effective upon their creation to the fullest extent permitted by Law.

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Insofar as such right, title, and interest do not so vest automatically or immediately in the City by operation of law or under this Agreement, subject to Section 14.2, the Supplier holds legal title of all right, title, and interests in and to the Documentation, including, without limitation, all Intellectual Property Rights therein, in trust for the City and grants to the City an irrevocable, perpetual, fully paid-up, royalty-free, worldwide, transferable and non-exclusive licence to, itself and through contractors and agents, use, copy, amend, reproduce, modify and create derivative works of such Documentation for any purpose. Such licence shall include the right to sub licence to any third party without restriction.

14.2 Further Assistance

If and to the extent that any of the right, title, and interest in and to the Documentation, including, without limitation, all Intellectual Property Rights therein, is not assigned automatically or immediately to the City under Section 14.1, the Supplier undertakes, at the expense of the City and at any time either during or after this Agreement upon request from the City (notwithstanding that the City may do so in its own name and at its own cost), to execute all documents, make all applications, give all assistance and do all acts and things as may, in the reasonable opinion of the City, be necessary or desirable to yest all right, title, and interest in and to the Documentation, including, without limitation, all Intellectual Property Rights therein, in the City and to register them in, the name of the City and otherwise to protect and maintain such right, title, and interest. The Supplier further agrees to cooperate fully with the City both during and after the termination of this Agreement, with respect to signing further documents and doing such acts and other things reasonably requested by the City to confirm the transfer of ownership of the Documentation or to obtain or enforce patent, copyright, trade secret, or other protection for the Documentation. The Supplier shall not receive any consideration or royalties in respect of such transfer of ownership, beyond the fees, provided that the expense of obtaining or enforcing intellectual property protection shall be borne by the City.

14.3 Supplier Undertakings and Representations and Warranties

- (a) The Supplier undertakes:
 - to notify the City in writing of the full details of Documentation promptly upon its creation;
 - (ii) whenever requested to do so by the City and in any event on the termination of this Agreement (as provided for in ARTICLE 12), promptly to deliver to the City all correspondence, documents, papers and records on all media (and all copies or abstracts of them), recording or relating to any parts of the Documentation which are in its possession, custody or power;
 - (iii) that the Supplier shall not, either during the term of this Agreement or thereafter, directly or indirectly, contest, or assist any third party to contest, the City's ownership of the Documentation or of any Intellectual Property Rights related thereto, and

- (iv) not to register nor attempt to register any Intellectual Property Rights in the Documentation unless requested to do so by the City.
- (b) The Supplier represents and warrants to the City that:
 - it has not given and shall not give permission to any Subcontractor or third party to use any of the Documentation, nor any of the Intellectual Property Rights in the Documentation, other than as provided for in this Agreement or otherwise in accordance with the instructions of the City;
 - (ii) it has not given, and shall not give, to the City, nor shall it use in the provision of the Supply, any confidential material or documents of any former client or customer of the Supplier or of any other third party, unless the Supplier has received prior written authorization to do so from the City and from the owner of the confidential material or documents:
 - (iii) it has the absolute right to make the assignments of the right, title, and interest in and to the Documentation contemplated in this Agreement and to grant the rights granted under this Agreement;
 - (iv) it is unaware of any use by any third party or any unauthorized use by a Subcontractor of any of the Documentation or any Intellectual Property Rights in the Documentation; and
 - (v) the use of the Documentation or the Intellectual Property Rights in the Documentation by the City shall not, to the knowledge of the Supplier, infringe any Intellectual Property Rights of any third party.

14.4 Background Intellectual Property

Notwithstanding and superseding anything to the contrary in this ARTICLE 14, each Party retains title to all Intellectual Property Rights owned or possessed by it or any of its affiliates prior to or independent of performance of this Agreement and used by it in fulfilling its obligations under this Agreement, as well as any modifications or improvements made thereto in the course of performing this Agreement ("Background IP"). To the extent that one Party acquires any right, title, or interest in and to any aspect of the modifications or improvements to the Background IP of the other Party. such first Party shall assign such right, title, and interest to the second Party, immediately following such acquisition. If any of the Supplier's Background IP is included in or required to use the Documentation provided by the Supplier to the City, the Supplier hereby grants to the City an irrevocable, perpetual, fully paid-up, royaltyfree, worldwide, transferable and non-exclusive licence (including the right to sublicence only to members of the City's Group) to, itself and through contractors and agents, use, copy, amend, reproduce, modify, create derivative works of, use, commercialize, and otherwise exploit the Supplier's Background IP but only to the extent required to use such Documentation for the purpose (or any reasonably inferred purpose) for which it has been provided or for the provision of the Supply under this Agreement (excluding any software source code).

14.5 Supplier Employees' and Subcontractors' Rights

The Supplier:

- (a) warrants that the Supplier's employees, Subcontractors and agents have waived or shall have waived in whole all moral rights (including, without limitation, any similar rights allowing the rights holder to restrain or claim damages for any distortion, mutilation, or other modification of works or any part thereof, and to restrain use or reproduction of works in any manner) they may have in the Documentation;
- (b) indemnifies the City, its officers, agents, contractors and employees against any liability, cost, loss or damage (including legal costs on a solicitor-client basis) suffered or incurred that arises under any breach of the warranty contained in Section 14.5(a); and
- (c) must do all things requested by the City, including signing or procuring the signature of particular forms, to give full effect to Section 14.5(a).

14.6 No Additional Remuneration

The Supplier acknowledges that, except as provided by Law, no further remuneration or compensation (beyond that expressly provided for in this Agreement) is or may become due to the Supplier in respect of the performance of its obligations under this ARTICLE 14.

ARTICLE 15 PRIVACY; CONFIDENTIALITY

15.1 Freedom of Information and Protection of Privacy Act

The Supplier acknowledges that the City is subject to the *Freedom of Information and Protection of Privacy Act* (British Columbia), which imposes significant obligations on the City's contractors to protect all personal information acquired from the City in the course of providing any service to the City.

15.2 No Promotion

The Supplier shall not, and shall ensure that its Subcontractors shall not, disclose or promote any relationship with the City, including by means of any oral declarations, announcements, sales literature, letters, client lists, press releases, brochures or other written materials, without, in each case, the express prior written consent of the City.

15.3 Confidentiality Obligations

Each Party shall keep the Confidential Information of the other Party confidential and each Party shall not use such Confidential Information except for the purpose of exercising or performing its rights and obligations under this Agreement or where, in the case of the City, otherwise necessary to pursue the public business of the City (a

"Permitted Purpose"), or disclose the Confidential Information in whole or in part to any third party, except as expressly permitted by this ARTICLE 15.

15.4 Disclosure to Representatives

A Party may disclose the other Party's Confidential Information to those of its Representatives who need to know such Confidential Information for the Permitted Purpose, provided that it informs such Representatives of the confidential nature of the Confidential Information prior to disclosure, and at all times it is responsible for such Representatives' compliance with the confidentiality obligations set out in this ARTICLE 15.

15.5 Disclosures Required by Law

A Party may disclose Confidential Information to the extent required by any applicable Laws or by any Competent Authority provided that, where legally permitted, it notifies the other Party before doing so, gives the other Party a reasonable opportunity to take any steps that the Party considers necessary to protect the confidentiality of that information, and notifies the third person that the information is Confidential Information. In any event, a Party shall furnish only that portion of the Confidential Information which it is legally required to disclose and shall use its reasonable endeavours to obtain a protective order or other reliable assurance that the Confidential Information shall be accorded confidential treatment.

15.6 Other Disclosures by the City

The City's obligations under this ARTICLE 15 are wholly subject to and qualified by, the applicable provisions of the *Freedom of Information and Protection of Privacy Act* (British Columbia) and, notwithstanding any other provision of this ARTICLE 15, the City may disclose Confidential Information in any manner compliant with such statute or otherwise in furtherance of its public role or duties, including in the course of publicly reporting to the Vancouver City Council.

15.7 Interpretation: Enforcement and Survival

- (a) Notwithstanding anything in this ARTICLE 15 to the contrary, nothing in this ARTICLE 15 shall affect the Parties' rights and obligations under ARTICLE 14.
- (b) The Parties acknowledge that a breach of any of the obligations or provisions contained in this ARTICLE 15 could cause the other Party to suffer loss which may not be adequately compensated for by damages and that the other Party may, in addition to any other remedy or relief, enforce the performance of this Agreement by injunction or specific performance upon application to a court of competent jurisdiction without proof of actual or special damage and notwithstanding that in any particular case damages may be readily quantifiable, and such breaching Party must not plead sufficiency of damages as a defence in the proceeding for such injunctive relief.

ARTICLE 16 TAXES

16.1 Taxes for Own Accounts

Unless otherwise expressly stated in this Agreement, any Taxes becoming due and payable by either Party pursuant to any applicable Laws as a result of the entering into, the performance of obligations under or the taking of payment pursuant to this Agreement, shall be for the account of that Party, and for greater certainty the Contract Price includes all such Taxes, except for applicable Taxes arising under all sales, excise and value added tax legislation (including, without limitation, the Excise Tax Act (Canada) and similar Canadian provincial legislation) (collectively, "Sales Tax") as a result of the sale of the Supply within Canada hereunder, unless it is clearly stated that they are intended to be Sales Tax-inclusive.

16.2 Withholding Taxes

- (a) Notwithstanding any other provision to the contrary, if the City determines that it is necessary to satisfy its obligations under any Law relating to Taxes, the City may:
 - (i) withhold an amount from a payment made to the Supplier; and
 - (ii) pay the withheld amount directly to the relevant Competent Authority.
- (b) If an amount withheld in accordance with Section 16.2(a) is paid by the City to the relevant Competent Authority, it is deemed to have been paid to the Supplier on the date on which the remainder of the payment to which it relates was paid to the Supplier.
- (c) The Supplier agrees and acknowledges that it has no claim against the City for any amounts withheld and paid to the relevant Competent Authority in accordance with Section 16.2(a).
- (d) If the City does not withhold an amount under Section 16.2(a) which it is required to withhold pursuant to any laws relating to Taxes, the Supplier agrees to pay that amount to the City; upon request by the City.
- (e) The Supplier agrees that the City shall not be required to increase any payment to the Supplier by the amount withheld by the City under Section 16.2(a)

ARTICLE 17 DISPUTE RESOLUTION

17.1 Optional Procedure

All claims, disputes or issues in dispute between the City and the Supplier in relation to this Agreement shall be decided by mediation or arbitration, if the Parties so agree in writing, or, falling any such agreement, by the courts of competent jurisdiction in the Province of British Columbia.

17.2 Arbitration

In the event that Parties agree to arbitration pursuant to Section 17.1;

- (a) the arbitration shall be conducted pursuant to the Commercial Arbitration Act (British Columbia) and shall be governed by the rules of the British Columbia International Commercial Arbitration Centre, except that the arbitrator or arbitrators shall be agreed upon by the Parties, and failing agreement by the Parties, shall be appointed by a court of competent jurisdiction within the Province of British Columbia;
- (b) the parties shall share equally the costs of the arbitration but shall be responsible for their own separate costs and expenses in relation to the arbitration including legal fees and disbursements; and
- (c) the arbitration shall take place in Vancouver, British Columbia and shall be governed by the laws of British Columbia.

ARTICLE 18 MISCELLANEOUS

18.1 Time of the Essence

Time is of the essence of this Agreement, including without limitation in relation to the Time(s) for Completion.

18.2 Costs

Each of the Parties hereto shall pay their respective legal fees and other costs and expenses incurred in connection with the preparation, execution and delivery of this Agreement and all documents and instruments executed pursuant hereto and any other costs and expenses whatsoever and howsoever incurred.

18.3 Benefit of this Agreement

- (a) This Agreement shall inure to the benefit of and be binding upon the respective successors and permitted assigns of the Parties hereto.
- (b) Except as expressly set forth in the foregoing Sections 18.3(a) or 11.1, nothing in this Agreement shall be construed to give any rights or benefits to anyone other than the City and the Supplier.

18.4 Entire Agreement

This Agreement constitutes the entire agreement between the Parties hereto with respect to the subject matter hereof and cancels and supersedes any prior understandings and agreements between the Parties hereto with respect thereto. There are no representations, warranties, terms, conditions, undertakings or collateral agreements, express, implied or statutory, between the Parties in relation to the subject matter hereof other than as expressly set forth in this Agreement.

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18.5 Amendments and Waiver

Subject to Section 3.9, no modification of or amendment to this Agreement is valid or binding unless set forth in writing and fully executed by both of the Parties hereto and no waiver of any breach of any term or provision of this Agreement is effective or binding unless made in writing and signed by the Party purporting to give such waiver and, unless otherwise provided, is limited to the specific breach waiver.

18.6 Notices

- Any order, demand, notice or other communication to be given to a Party in connection with this Agreement must be given in writing and must be given by personal delivery to a City's Manager or a Supplier's Managers, as applicable, or delivered by registered mail, by courier or by electronic transmission (with delivery confirmation), addressed to a City's Manager or a Supplier's Manager, as the case may be, or, in each case to such other individual as is designated in writing by the relevant recipient Party. If given by registered mail, courier or electronic transmission, any such demand, notice or other communication must be given at the relevant address or facsimile number listed below:
 - (i) if to the Supplier:

or to such other address or facsimile number as may be designated by notice given by either Party to the other, provided that, notwithstanding the foregoing, the Supplier's invoices shall be addressed as specified in Section 9.3 or as otherwise specified in the relevant City purchase order.

- (b) Any order, demand, notice or other communication shall be conclusively deemed to have been given:
 - (i) if given by personal delivery, on the day of actual delivery thereof;
 - (ii) if given by registered mail, on the tenth Business Day following the deposit thereof in the mail;

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- (iii) if given by courier, on the Business Day following confirmation by the courier that the notice has been delivered; and
- (iv) if given by electronic transmission, on the day of transmittal thereof if given during the normal business hours of the recipient and on the Business Day during which such normal business hours next occur if not given during such hours on any day.

Notwithstanding the foregoing, if the Party giving any demand, notice or other communication knows or ought reasonably to know of any difficulties with the postal system which might affect the delivery of mail, any such demand, notice or other communication must not be mailed but must be given by personal delivery, courier or electronic transmission.

18.7 Governing Law and Jurisdiction

- (a) This Agreement is governed by and must be construed in accordance with the laws of the Province of British Columbia.
- (b) All provisions of the International Sale of Goods Act (British Columbia) are specifically excluded from application to this Agreement.
- (c) This Agreement is subject to the exclusive jurisdiction of the courts in the Province of British Columbia except:
 - (i) as otherwise agreed by the Parties pursuant to ARTICLE 17; and
 - (ii) to the extent necessary to enforce, in another jurisdiction, any decision or award made pursuant to ARTICLE 17 or any judgment of any court in the Province of British Columbia.

18.8 Further Assurances

Each Party agrees to do all things and execute all deeds, instruments, transfers or other documents as may be necessary or desirable to give full effect to the provisions of this Agreement and the transactions contemplated by it.

18.9 Severance

If any term or condition of this Agreement is for any reason held to be illegal, invalid, ineffective, inoperable or otherwise unenforceable, it shall be severed and deemed to be deleted from this Agreement and the validity and enforceability of the remainder of this Agreement shall not be affected or impaired thereby. If any term or condition of this Agreement is found to be illegal, invalid ineffective, inoperable or otherwise unenforceable, but would not be so if some part of it were deleted, the term or condition shall apply with such modifications as may be necessary to make it enforceable.

18.10 Counterparts

This Agreement may be executed in any number of counterparts. All counterparts, taken together, constitute one instrument. A Party may execute this Agreement by signing any counterpart.

18.11 Independent Legal Advice

THE SUPPLIER ACKNOWLEDGES THAT THE SUPPLIER HAS BEEN GIVEN THE OPPORTUNITY TO SEEK INDEPENDENT LEGAL ADVICE BEFORE EXECUTING THIS AGREEMENT.

18,12 Electronic Execution

SCHEDULE A -SCOPE OF GOODS AND SERVICES

A) Requirement A - Preventative Services

Purpose

An Integrated Pest Management (IPM) approach will cover all of the City's facilities as identified in Schedule B – Prices for Supply on an ongoing pest maintenance program. The purpose of the regular pest maintenance visits is to keep the pest concerns to an ultimate minimum by providing multiple lines of defense, which primarily rely on monitoring devices in and around the affected buildings and sites.

Coverage

Coverage at each of the sites would include pest control maintenance for the most common structural pests, including but not limited to rats, mice, cockroaches, silverfish, store product pests and non-wood boring ants.

Frequency of Service

Services are to be provided as defined in Schedule B – Prices for Supply. The City's ongoing maintenance schedules would be serviced at a time and/or day that cater to their facility's needs, on either a monthly, bi-monthly or seasonal basis.

Maintenance Visits

Upon each service, Supplier will perform inspections and/or treatments for the services listed below.

i) Inspections

At each of the sites, the Supplier will be meeting with the site designate to check in, get updated reports from the site's logbook (where necessary) and treat as necessary. However, one of the major duties at each visit will be inspections and reporting. These inspections will be in all of the common areas, and the Supplier will look for any potential or existing pest problems that may

be evident in the facilities. Site inspections also provide suggestions regarding potential entry points of rodents and even wildlife, to ensure the activity of these pests do not interfere with the public's well-being. Inspections are to provide a preventative approach to the pest management program.

ii) Treatments

Once on site for on call or ongoing maintenance visits and after thorough inspections have taken place, the Supplier will propose to treat in the least invasive, yet highly

effective manner possible. Treatment is to be in a way that is safest to all



the occupants, facility contacts, on-site staff, and even other wildlife and domestic pets. This will include the use of non-pesticide monitoring blocks in secure, tamper-resistant bait stations (which can be referred to as a "rodent bait box") that will be installed in all commons areas (both on the exterior and interior of the buildings). Examples of locations of where the Supplier will install these boxes include parking areas, locker / storage rooms, hydro, electrical, mechanical and maintenance rooms, and around the exterior of the building (please note that these stations are tamper resistant, will be anchored and placed in areas inconspicuous to small children and pets). The Supplier will be sure to supply a written report to the appropriate City of Vancouver contact(s) which indicates the box location, date of installation and future removal.

The monitoring blocks, referred to as "Detex" (MSDS available upon request), allow the Supplier's qualified technicians to watch for activity, which means that pests such

as rats and mice are present. Once identified that the non-pesticide bait is indeed being eaten and rodent activity is confirmed, the next step is to initiate a rodent treatment program. One option is to incorporate a non-pesticide, environmentally friendly, trapping program. The traps that the Supplier's technicians will monitor regularly allow rodents to be caught and disposed of in a safe and effective manner, while keeping the pest population to a minimum and using environmentally friendly products. Traps will be set in areas safe from small children and pets, but very accessible to rodents. The Supplier will supply a written report

to the appropriate City of Vancouver contact(s) which indicates the trap location, date of installation and future removal.

Another alternative for a rodent treatment program is the usage of "Contrac Blox" (see copy of label in Appendix K), which would be used in conjunction with tamper resistant bait stations. The bait used is installed on fixed, stainless steel metal rods that make bait translocation virtually impossible, yet effective for the rodents to reach, eat and perish within days. Once the activity level has diminished to an acceptable level, we will replace the rodenticide bait with our monitoring blocks. The bait stations used will comply with federal regulations as illustrated in Appendix K (in Supplier's submission)in the "Guidance for Rodent Bait

Stations" excerpt from the Canadian Pest Management Association.

Other monitoring treatments will include the use of non-pesticide "sticky" traps for both insects and smaller rodents. These devices can be placed in and around the premises that will be checked, inspected and maintained at each of the scheduled preventative visits. Should there be an immediate necessity for treatment in any common areas (depending on the type of pest), a low-toxic application can be issued on the day of the visit, if there is no need for sign posting. In a case where signs would be need to posted to notify all tenants and workers, a scheduled appointment will be booked with the Supplier's office staff and the City of Vancouver site designate, in that all the appropriate stay-out times, and possible treatment products are listed and made evident. This ensures the safety of everyone involved, and keeps the treatment area very specific posing the least

disruption to the building's occupants. See Appendix I (of the Supplier submission)for a sample "Notice of

Pesticide Use" sign that would be posted at a City of Vancouver location.

Pest Maintenance Summary

The Supplier's proposed pest maintenance program will provide the City and it's respective sites, site designates and everyone that uses these facilities, residences and sites with the most extensive coverage using sustainable and proactive inspection / treatment techniques, while balancing that coverage with value and practicality.

B) Requirement B - Reactive Services

This section explains, in detail, the pests and wildlife we are able to control, as well as the treatment methods used, the frequency of visits needed to control / eradicate the problem pest as well as warranties.

All methods and procedures, shall be in

accordance with the Integrated Pest Management (IPM) Act. The Act enforces the lesser use of pesticides by implementing Integrated Pest Management (IPM) procedures to eliminate or control existing pest problems. These signs indicate that a pesticide treatment is taking place, and also include the name of the company applying the product, the date of the treatment, the product used and contact numbers for further information.

The overall idea behind the Act is to reduce the overall use of pesticides in structures and grounds, as well as bring awareness to the public on what product is being applied should a pesticide need to be used to solve a pest problem. All of the treatments for any pest incorporate IPM practices, including monitoring, promoting improved sanitation, structural modification recommendations / renovations, education to tenants, building

contacts / site designates, mechanical, biological and the use of low-toxicity pesticides (in the event the non-pesticide alternatives do not provide sultable pest threshold limits deemed satisfactory by the tenants and/or building contact(s)).

All pesticide products will be used in accordance to the label. Also, any waste encountered on the job site shall be discarded with respect to the pesticide label, the IPM Act, WCB guidelines and federal, provincial and municipal regulations / bylaws. Illustration of control plans for each of the pests that are expected to be encountered is shown below:

Ants - Carpenter

Inspection

The Supplier will look for any potential nesting sites and see if it is possible to eliminate / replace

these sources (for example, tree stumps, rotten fence posts, siding, beams, etc.). We will recommend any shrubs that are right up against the side of the structure to be trimmed back at least two feet, or be removed completely.

Treatment Procedures

CoV Initial:

Any nests that are found will be vacuumed up (using a HEPA filter), or low toxicity products like boric acid or pyrethrins will be used for elimination. Should these methods not be enough, we will then increase our treatment procedure to involve the use of a residual treatment, in this case, 0.5% permethrin (Material Safety Data Sheets available upon request). Treatment indoors involves applying a crack and crevice treatment to all baseboards, door and window frames and structurally exposed wood. Outdoors, our treatment would include a crack and crevice treatment along the perimeter of the facility, where the foundation meets the soil, as well as any potential ant nesting sites. All applications will be done using a hand held compressed air sprayer, actisol machine, foamer and/or duster. In the event they are in a common area, all proper postings and notifications will be given.

Ants - Field

Inspection

These ants are typically found in soil near rocks and foundations as well as under slab. In the event they are found in a suite, we would have to have neighbouring units beside, above and below the problem suite inspected in order to assess the extent of the problem.

Treatment Procedure(s)

These ants are just a nuisance pest and pose no real threat or structural damage to a facility. In the event they are inside a suite or other area and need to be eliminated, we will first use low-toxicity insecticide bait. This bait is applied with a syringe and is applied inside cracks and crevices where the ants hide. The ants eat the bait and subsequently feed the rest of their nest too. No odours are present during this application as it is food bait, so this treatment does not require vacating the premises or the posting of signs.

Should the insecticide bait not work, the Supplier will then progress to an insecticide, residual

treatment. Here, we would use a 0.5% permethrin formulation for this problem. Treatment indoors involves applying a crack and crevice treatment to all baseboards, door and window frames. Outdoors, our treatment would include a crack and crevice treatment along the perimeter of the building, where the foundation meets the soil, as well as all cracks in concrete surrounding the problem area(s). All applications will be done using a hand held compressed air sprayer. In the event they are in a common area, all proper postings and notifications will be given.

Environmental / Conventional Pest Control Products Used

Insecticide Baits (a.k.a. "Drax", "Avert", "Maxforce" and "Safers")

Ants - Moisture

Inspection

These ants are found in rotting wood; wood in contact with soil or under slab. In the event they are found in a suite, we would have to have neighbouring units beside, above and below the problem suite inspected in order to assess the extent of the problem.

Treatment Procedure(s)

These ants are just a nuisance pest and pose no real threat or structural damage to a facility. In the event they are inside a suite or other area and need to be eliminated, the Supplier

will first use a low-toxicity insecticide bait. This bait is applied with a syringe and is applied inside cracks and crevices where the ants hide. The ants eat the bait and subsequently feed the rest of their nest too. No odours are present during this application as it is a food bait, so this treatment does not require vacating the premises or the posting of signs.

Should the insecticide bait not work, the Supplier will then progress to an insecticide, residual

treatment. Here, 0.5% permethrin formulation shall be used for this problem. Treatment indoors involves applying a crack and crevice treatment to all baseboards, door and window frames. Outdoors, our treatment would include a crack and crevice treatment along the perimeter of the building, where the foundation meets the soil, as well as all cracks in concrete surrounding the problem area(s). All applications will be done using a hand held compressed air sprayer. In the event they are in a common area, all proper postings and notifications will be given.

Environmental / Conventional Pest Control Products Used Insecticide Bait (a.k.a. "Drax", "Avert", "Maxforce" and "Safers")

Ants - Pavement

Inspection

These ants are typically found in soil, mostly underneath slab and concrete. In the event they are found in a suite, we would have to have neighbouring units beside, above and below the problem suite inspected in order to assess the extent of the problem.

Treatment Procedure(s)

These ants are just a nuisance pest and pose no real threat or structural damage to a facility. In the event they are inside a suite or other area and need to be eliminated, the Supplier

will first use low-toxicity insecticide bait. This bait is applied with a syringe and is applied inside cracks and crevices where the ants hide. The ants eat the bait and subsequently feed the rest of their nest too. No odours are present during this application as it is food bait, so this treatment does not require vacating the premises or the posting of signs.

Should the insecticide bait not work, the Supplier will then progress to an insecticide, residual

treatment. Here, we would use a 0.5% permethrin formulation for this problem. Treatment indoors involves applying a crack and crevice treatment to all baseboards, door and window frames. Outdoors, our treatment would include a crack and crevice

treatment along the perimeter of the building, where the foundation meets the soil, as well as all cracks in concrete surrounding the problem area(s). All applications will be done using a hand held compressed air sprayer. In the event they are in a common area, all proper postings and notifications will be given.

Environmental / Conventional Pest Control Products Used Insecticide Bait (a.k.a. "Drax", "Avert", "Maxforce" and "Safers")

Ants - Pharaoh

Inspection

These ants are found in any void inside the structure (eg. walls, electronic and household appliances). Any suites / rooms that have a problem, would have to have neighbouring units beside, above and below the problem suite inspected in order to assess the extent of the problem.

Treatment Procedure(s)

These ants can only be controlled through the use of insecticide baits. Here, the Supplier will

inspect where the major areas of activity are, determine their runways, and install ant discs throughout these areas. As pharaoh ants are extremely difficult to control, the use of multiple baits is probably necessary, so different discs will be installed, as well as the use of ant bait applied from a syringe. The syringe application will be administered to all cracks and crevices where ants will travel, but in quantities too minimal to pose any hazard to children or pets in the room(s). Bi-weekly or monthly monitoring of our bait will need to be done to see if these ants are accepting the product(s) we have been placing. Material Safety Data Sheets available upon request for the ant discs and ant insecticide baits.

Environmental / Conventional Pest Control Products Used Insecticide Baits (a.k.a. "Drax", "Avert", "Maxforce" and "Safers") Insecticide Discs (a.k.a. "Maxforce") Boric Acid

Bedbugs

Bedbugs are rapidly emerging pests that are slowly starting to dominate the industry. With respect to C sites, we suspect areas that are vulnerable would be the dorm rooms in the fire halls. Bedbugs require an aggressive approach, beginning with thorough inspections.

1) Inspections

Inspections for bedbugs require a keen eye, a thorough inspection throughout a room, going through every conceivable area where they can hide (including mattresses, box springs, bed frames, night tables, curtain rods, picture frames, baseboards, closets, upholstered furniture, dressers, armoires, boxes, containers, etc.) and a very strong flashlight. The Supplier's senior staff shall have extended bed bug training. The Supplier will look for actual bed bugs or their fecal matter, which looks like a dark spot (equivalent to a pepper kernel size). Inspections should not be in the problem suite only, but the suites / rooms beside, above and below the problem unit(s), Bedbugs have

a habit of invading neighbouring suites / rooms. They are also excellent at hiding in the smallest of openings, making detection extremely difficult.

The use of scent detection dogs as a form of bedbug inspections shall be incorporated. The Supplier's K9 teams shall be professionally accredited and undergo daily training to keep up with their inspection techniques.

II) Treatments

i) Environmentally Friendly Techniques

The Supplier will incorporate the use of a dry steamer and a HEPA vacuum in the bedbug

treatments. The key to success is thoroughness. The Supplier will go through all of the materials within a room, turning over upholstered cushions, mattresses, box springs and going through dresser drawers, closets, containers and anywhere else where bed bugs hide. The Supplier will also clean along baseboard areas, especially where the

carpet or floor meets the wall.

ii) Environmental Pest Control Products

Bed bug encasements that envelope the box spring and

Mattresses shall be used. Also, all clothing and bed sheets must be washed in warm or hot

water and then heat dried to kill off any bed bugs that may be present. The Supplier also

recommend the use of bed bug monitors and "climb ups" that allow continual monitoring of bed bug activity. An example of where these would be useful would be in the firehalls, where there are beds and lockers full of personal belongings that could potentially become bedbug infested.

iii) Alternate Techniques

In the event the environmental techniques are not delivering results, the Supplier will elevate the service to include a low-toxicity pesticide treatment. The Supplier would proceed to treat with 0.5% permethrin along all baseboards and everywhere else bedbugs are found (as mentioned earlier). For mattresses, box springs and upholstered furniture, we will use a non-residual product called "pyrethrins" so as to eliminate any chance of exposure to the pesticide.

Carpet Beetles

Inspection

The placement of monitoring devices (referred to as glueboards) will be placed in problematic areas, and potential harbourage areas. These areas include pantry and clothes closets and clothes storage areas (such as dressers, armoires and clothes trunks)

These monitoring devices would be checked within three to seven days after placement, to give us a better idea of the population and activity levels throughout the affected areas.

Once the data is retrieved, the Supplier will then make an assessment as to where the problematic areas are, and provide a treatment solution. Any suites / rooms that have a

problem, would have to have neighbouring units beside, above and below the problem suite inspected in order to assess the extent of the problem.

Treatment Procedure(s)

In the event they are in a common area, all proper postings and notifications will be given.

Cockroaches

Inspection

The placement of monitoring devices (referred to as glueboards) will be placed in problematic areas, and potential harbourage areas. These areas include under kitchen and bathroom sinks, kitchen cupboards, behind kitchen appliances, pantry closets and any food storage areas. These monitoring devices would be checked within three to seven days after placement, to give us a better idea of the population and activity levels throughout the affected areas. Once our data is retrieved, the Supplier shall then make an

assessment as to where the problematic areas are, and provide a treatment solution. Any suites / rooms that have a problem, would have to have neighbouring units beside, above and below the problem suite inspected in order to assess the extent of the problem.

Treatment Procedure(s)

The Supplier will instruct tenants to clean behind any major appliances or any other problem areas where cockroaches harbour. Then see if any obvious cracks and crevices can be sealed using silicone compounds (i.e. caulking) and vacuuming (using HEPA filters) any existing adults or egg capsules.

Should this treatment not be enough, we will then use low odour gel bait called "Maxforce" or "Avert" (Material Safety Data Sheets available upon request) that is applied using a syringe. The syringe application will be administered to all cracks and crevices where cockroaches will travel or hide, but in quantities too minimal to pose any hazard to children or pets in the rooms. This bait is safe to apply when people are present, vacancy of the area is not required.

Environmental / Conventional Pest Control Products Used Insecticide Bait (a.k.a. "Maxforce" or "Avert")

Dead Rodent Removal

Occasionally, there will be a report from a tenant or site designate that there is an odouriferous smell emanating from a room. It's possible that there could be a dead mouse or rat in behind a wall or ceiling void. The Supplier will provide a service whereby they come

out and source where that rodent is, and retrieve it. It should be noted that before any cutting or removal of drywall or fixtures, the appropriate City of

Vancouver authorities will be notified first.

CoV Initial:

In other cases, your buildings may have a dead bird, squirrel or rodent exposed on a lawn or tenant's patio / balcony. Once the Supplier is notified, they shall come out and properly

dispose of the carcass. All waste will be discarded with respect to the IPM Act, WCB guidelines and federal, provincial and municipal regulations / bylaws. Carcasses will not be disposed of on the building or work site.

Environmental Cleanup

This is a service that can be provide, in the event they want an attic, wall void or crawlspace professionally cleaned up of all rodent droppings. The cleanup is done by first applying a Viricide treatment to the affected area(s), which contains any pathogens that might get dispersed upon removal of the droppings, waste or insulation. Once the viricide has been applied, The Supplier will then proceed to remove all waste material (our technicians are protected with Tyvec suits, eye goggles and gloves). The room or area being worked in is enveloped with plastic to prevent cross contamination. The waste material is properly discarded with respect to WCB guidelines and federal, provincial and municipal regulations / bylaws. The Supplier will then use a HEPA Vacuum and

remove any remaining waste matter that might not have been picked up on the initial removal.

Once completed, the area is reinsulated and screen off any points of entry that mice or rats can potentially get into using ¼" galvanized screen. This will help keep the cleaned area free of any future rodent infestations and their waste matter.

Fleas

Inspection

Fleas are an ectoparasitic pest that feed on pets as well as people. Fleas are typically found around pet's bedding areas, as well as where people sit or sleep. To determine if there are fleas present in suite, visual sitings are the ideal way to ensure that they are in fact fleas, and not another pest like bedbugs.

Treatment Procedure(s)

The initial treatment would involve a vacuuming. If thorough vacuuming (using HEPA filters) or steam cleaning does not work, the Supplier will proceed to install flea traps (such as our

(ight traps) in all problem areas. These will be placed away from tenants or pets, but still accessible to fleas.

If these are not enough, a pesticide treatment using 0.5% permethrin and an insect growth regulator called "Precor" (Material Safety Data Sheets available upon request) will be used. Application involves spot treatments throughout the problem area(s) using a hand held compressed air sprayer. In the event they are in a common area, all proper postings and notifications will be given.

Flies

Inspection

The placement of monitoring devices (referred to as glueboards) will be placed in problematic areas, and potential harbourage areas, depending on the type of fly (there are several different types that your tenants could experience, such as fruit, drain, house, cluster and blow flies).

Areas where flies are typically found include under kitchen and bathroom sinks, pantry closets, storage areas, garbage and compost areas. These monitoring devices would be checked within three to seven days after placement, to give better idea of the population and activity levels throughout the affected areas. Once the data is retrieved, an assessment as to where the problematic areas are, and a treatment solution is to be provided

Treatment Procedure(s)

To control these pests, the Supplier will thoroughly inspect the problem area (usually the kitchen)

to determine why they might be in the premises. The Supplier will instruct staff to clean behind

any major appliances, flush and clean the drains *I* garbage disposal unit(s) or any other problem areas where these flies might harbour. Should the problem still persist, the Supplier will

increase our treatment to using fly traps, including the use of lights, "Gold Sticks" or bottle traps. We also have an enzyme cleaner / foamer (a biological agent known as "Bio-Plus", Material Safety Data Sheets available upon request), which can be used in drains and under appliances where organic matter tends to accumulate. This will eliminate the adult flies as well as their feeding material, making it difficult / impossible to continue breeding.

Should the problem still persist, a product like "Tempo" will be used throughout the facility (Material Safety Data Sheets available upon request) in accordance to the label. A crack and crevice application to non-food areas and non-food preparation areas would be applied using a hand held compressed air sprayer (examples of these areas include baseboards, cracks and crevices in walls or false ceiling voids and under sinks or pipe openings). In the event they are in a common area, all proper postings and notifications will be given.

Inspection

In cases where a tenant or site designate finds a "bug" or sample of something, and they're not sure what it is, to the Supplier will come out and provide a "bug i.d.". If the sample cannot be identified on the spot, the Supplier will utilize their lab and technical library to help identify any "bugs" that might be found that cannot be immediately identified on site. The Supplier's reference materials and electronic microscopes will be used o fully identify any pests that the City of Vancouver's buildings might get, help formulate a strategic pest treatment programs to eliminate or control a problem. Once identified, depending on the pest, the Supplier may want to further inspect neighbouring

sultes / rooms beside, above and below the problem unit, so as to contain the situation. Once our inspection is complete, a treatment plan will be formulated.

Mice Baiting / Trapping

Inspection

Harbourage and feeding areas would be sought after. These areas include around compost bins, woodpiles, exterior clutter, sheds, attics and crawlspaces. Rub and gnaw marks would indicate an activity area. The use of black lights indicate runways as they would pick up phosphorous from urine deposits. Any suites / rooms that have a problem, would have to have neighbouring units beside, above and below the problem suite inspected in order to assess the extent of the problem.

Treatment Procedure(s)

A thorough inspection shall be made of the premises to see why they might be in a particular area. From here, elimination of food sources / clean up of organic matter will be instructed to the tenant(s). If there are active entry points, screening may be installed using ½" galvanized hardware cloth, provided it won't trap the mice inside the premises. Traps will then be used, and checked on a weekly basis thereafter, until the problem is resolved. Any fecal matter that needs to be cleaned up would be done by disinfecting the matter first, then vacuuming using a HEPA filter.

Should traps not work, the Supplier will then escalate the service to involve the use of rodenticides, which will be placed in areas safe from small children and pets. The bait will also be in tamper-resistant bait stations, offering further protection. All bait and bait stations will be used in accordance to the label and federal regulations. The placement of monitoring devices (referred to as glueboards) will be placed in problematic areas, and potential harbourage areas. These areas include pantry and clothes closets and clothes storage areas (such as dressers, armoires and clothes trunks)

These monitoring devices would be checked within three to seven days after placement, to give us a better idea of the population and activity levels throughout the affected areas

Once the data is retrieved, we can then make an assessment as to where the problematic areas are, and provide a treatment solution.

Treatment Procedure(s)

A thorough vacuuming of the problematic area(s) would be an initial step. Problematic areas include along carpet edging, window frames, dressers, closets, armoires and clothes trunks. Vacuuming must be done in conjunction to warm water washing or dry cleaning all of the clothes that might be stored in the problem area(s).

If this treatment does not deliver the desired results, a low-toxicity pesticide treatment using 0.5% permethrin will be done in all the problematic areas mentioned earlier.

These monitoring devices would be checked within three to seven days after placement, to give a better idea of the population and activity levels throughout the affected areas. Once the data is retrieved, an assessment will be made as to where the problematic areas are, and provide a treatment solution.

Treatment Procedure(s)

The motto is, "if in doubt, throw it out!". Any non-perishable food stored in kitchen and pantry cupboards is susceptible. Once this procedure is done, the next step is to thoroughly clean all the kitchen and pantry cupboards. Using a vacuum cleaner is recommended, so as not to push any more organic matter into the cracks and crevices in the

cupboards, as these cracks act as feeding troughs to stored product pests (as well as cockroaches!).

After this step, caulking any obvious cracks and crevices is recommended to help prevent future infestations or entry of pests from neighbouring suites / rooms. The next step is to install Indian meal moth traps that have a pheromone in them that attract male

moths, effectively eliminating any chance of reproduction. This trap process takes two to three weeks before results are noticed.

In the event there is still activity after several weeks, then elevate the treatment to a low toxicity pesticide treatment. The Supplier will treat along baseboards (especially behind kitchen appliances) and all cracks and crevices in kitchen and pantry cupboards using 0.5% permethrin.

Harbourage and feeding areas would be sought after. These areas include around compost bins, woodpiles, exterior clutter, sheds, attics and crawlspaces. Rub and gnaw marks would indicate an activity area. The use of black lights indicate runways as they would pick up phosphorous from unne deposits.

Treatment Procedure(s)

Snap traps would be set for the elimination of rats within a structure. The traps will be placed in inaccessible areas or inside a tamper resistant balt station to avoid someone accidentally getting their fingers or feet caught in the trap. All locations of traps will be marked in the Suplier's logbook. Screening of obvious points of entry will be sealed using ¼"

galvanized hardware cloth, but only after the problem has been rectified. Weekly monitoring of the traps will be performed, until the problem is resolved. Any fecal matter that needs to be cleaned up would be done by disinfecting the matter first, then vacuuming using a HEPA filter.

Assuming the building is properly sealed from rats, in the event there is an exterior rat problem, the Supplier will use rodenticides in anchored, tamper-resistant bait stations around the perimeter of the complex, ensuring they are placed in areas inconspicuous from people and pets. A written report to the appropriate City of

Vancouver contact(s), indicating location, date of installation and removal of any bait Boxes shall be provided. All bait and bait stations would be used in accordance to the label and federal

The placement of monitoring devices (referred to as glueboards) will be placed in problematic areas, and potential harbourage areas. These areas include under kitchen and bathroom sinks, lower level kitchen cupboards, behind kitchen appliances, pantry closets, storage areas, furnace rooms and pool / sauna and jacuzzi rooms. These monitoring devices would be checked within three to seven days after placement, to give a better idea of the population and activity levels throughout the affected areas. Once the data is retrieved, the Supplier shall then make an assessment as to where the problematic areas are, and provide a treatment solution.

Treatment Procedure(s)

Silverfish are attracted to areas of high heat and humidity. We would, if possible, recommend turning down the heat at least three degrees Celsius, and reducing the humidity in the room / area by at least five percent. Sealing of obvious cracks and crevices will be done using silicone compounds (i.e. caulking), and cleaning up of any organic matter or sealing of stored paper products (papers, books, cardboard boxes, etc.) will be recommended. Vacuuming any silverfish that are sighted can also be done. If the silverfish are still around, use of a 0.5% permethrin is recommended. If the outside of the structure is vinyl sided, permethrin will not be used as it will stain, so "Prelude" shall be used instead (MSDS available upon request).

It is imperative to determine what type of stored product pest we are dealing with, which our inspection will identify. Once identified, the Supplier shall then make the appropriate recommendations to the tenant(s). The motto is, "if in doubt, throw it out!". Any nonperishable food stored in kitchen and pantry cupboards is susceptible. Once this procedure is done, the next step is to thoroughly clean all the kitchen and pantry cupboards. Using a vacuum cleaner is recommended, so as not to push any more organic matter into the cracks and crevices in the cupboards, as these cracks act as feeding troughs to stored product pests (as well as cockroaches!).

With wasp, bee and hornet nests, the tenants or staff of the building typically report these. Once the location is sited, the Supplier will then be notified and they shall come out

An active nest can only be safely treated through the use of permethrin liquid residual (0.5% solution) or "Drione" dust (Material Safety Data Sheets available upon request). Due to the potential risks involved with these insects to tenants, staff and general public nearby, we do not recommend giving five days notice in advance of the treatment. Due to the possibility of kids or adults possibly suffering from anaphylactic shock from a wasp or bee sting, immediate treatment is advised. Treatment involves injecting either of the two products directly into the nest, or the opening in the structure the insects use to enter the nest. In the case of bees, if they are honeybees, the Supplier will call upon a local

beekeeper to extract the nest. Otherwise, the treatment is the same as for wasps and hornets.

If there is a high population of bats, the guano on walls will indicate where the point of entry is. If there is a small population, the customer may know where the point of entry is, or the Supplier would have to inspect the building at dusk to observe where the point of entry is. It is important to note that bats are protected and cannot be killed, therefore, we can only perform work between September to March, otherwise the young will be trapped and eventually die.

Treatment Procedure(s)

Assuming the treatment period is between September to March, the Supplier can treat as the bats have migrated South, so they will not be in the structure. Screening can be done during the day (assuming they have left, otherwise, screen at night in the event they are still around). Once all possible points of entry are determined, screening would done using ¼" gauge screen.

If bats are evident between April to August, a supervisor would go out to the site to evaluate if the job can be done, assuming a special permits from the Federal government can be obtained to proceed with the treatment. Supplier would then "viricide" (MSDS

available upon request) the problem areas after the bats are gone.

There are several species of birds found throughout the Lower Mainland, usually consisting of crows, gulls, pigeons, sparrows, starlings and woodpeckers. Points of entry can be found by the tenant or building site designate pointing it out or from the accumulation of droppings in a particular area. Usually a ladder or a set of binoculars is used in assessing the extent of a bird problem.

Treatment Procedure(s)

Depending on the species (as some are protected, whereas others are not), it usually includes nest removal. The caveat is that if the birds are protected, the removal may have to wait until it is legal to do so (eg. Gulls). Once the nest is removed and the area is professionally cleaned, exclusion devices such as "Bird Spike", "Piano Wire", Polyethelene "Netting", "Shock Strip" or "1/4" gauge screen will be installed In some cases where exclusion is not an option due to the size or the feasability of the procedure (eg. Rooftops), a trapping program can also be implemented. Here, the Supplier would

start off with a "pre-baiting" program for several weeks, and then install our live traps once the target bird is conditioned in eating our bait. These traps would be checked on a frequent basis and humanely removed. This would be a "low-key" approach as we do CoV Initial: ////,

Lastly, the hole raccoons require to access a structure would be quite large, at least twenty centimeters in diameter.

The Supplier shall install a "one-way door" and screen off (with \mathcal{U} "gauge screen) all other potential

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points of entry. Then schedule to go back in approximately one week to remove the door and screen off the original point of entry, assuming there are no young and all adults have left the attic. Here is what I recommended to Diane for the fruit flies:

- Replace organic waste receptacles at the bars and cap stations with lidded, step-pedal receptacles. Researched with Brandy Afoon, who comped us a few options to test. Rejected by bartenders. Subsequently advised cleaning staff to switch from cardboard liners to plastic in small green organics totes.
- Offered to provide wheeled totes in the bottles rooms for the storage of empty pop / beer cans and water bottles. Your specific bags for pricing would fit the totes. Researched with Brandy Afoon to provide appropriate totes. Rejected because the cans and bottles apparently would be too heavy to lift. If you opted to go in this direction, you may want to discuss budget with Ric.
- Trap options at the bars, cap stations and bottle rooms. Opted for natural solution (vinegar) in small containers at food prep areas such as bars and cap stations. Went with over-the-counter traps that Diane provided in the bottle rooms. Most of these containers have since disappeared.
- Recommended sinks and drains be thoroughly rinsed and that no food waste such as lime rinds be left in the sinks. It was my understanding that only clean water was supposed to be going down the sinks??? (see attached picture, which is how I found the sink in the salon on Friday morning).
- Altered show coverage duties to include as much of a post-show clean in the auditoriums as the staff can manage before having to leave for the night, with the focus on food waste and drink containers.
- I would add a further recommendation that the garbage containers in the dressing rooms be removed. They are open containers, and they do not comply with the City's Zero Waste initiatives.

According to our Orkin reps, from a maintenance point of view, we can spend a million dollars sealing the buildings and drilling holes in the walls to place traps and eradicate nests, and still the buildings would not remain mice free. So far we are averaging 2 to 4 sightings per month in the QET/PH and I have received one reported sighting in the Orpheum in the last 6 months. From a Pest Control point of view, this is well under control.

Now, this doesn't mean we ignore the sightings. The reported sightings seem to be concentrated around the Sales Office atop the Salon. Chad has saturated the area with traps and we have cleaned the area according to Chad's recommendations. There is also no sign of food being left out to attract the mice. Unless we can identify a source of attraction to the area, the next step might be drilling into the drywall to see if we can identify where they are nesting.

Orkin reps Chad and Jason do have standing recommendations on specific exterior doors and entrances where they feel sealing the gaps under the doors would help to improve control efforts. In the past, this has been visited from a budgetary view and, to date, there has been no movement.

And please, continue to encourage staff to log their sightings. This information is a vital piece of our control efforts.

From a cleaning approach, the only concerns I have are any food that is left in the auditorium floors after a show, as we do sometimes encounter candy, chocolate or spilled pop that has been left overnight, and any food being left in the dressing room areas post show.

Fruit flies. To be blunt, this is a user issue. Yesterday morning we mustered in our staff room at the QET and found that there were four glass mugs left on the counter that had been used for coffee and were not rinsed out, let alone cleaned properly. So, our room had fruit flies. Drains not thoroughly rinsed, unsealed beverage containers that haven't been rinsed or food waste that is left in waste containers without properly sealed lids; soiled reusable beverage containers like coffee cups left throughout the lobbies, the leakage from beverage containers that sit all over the bottle room floors and soak into the cardboard thrown down. These are all user issues that are causing the fruit flies and that continue to be unaddressed.

Again, I'm going to painfully blunt. I am happy to assist with this as I can, but as previously indicated I spent a lot of time and effort on this issue for Diane and it proved to be a waste of my time. There is little more the cleaning staff can do about the fruit flies without the co-operation of the users of the buildings.

Hi Jason,

I'm not sure what you are thinking of in terms of a dispenser? Where would you be looking to have them installed? They would need to be tied in to a sink. Were you looking to have them tied into the bar sinks?

We have chemical dispensers in the janitor rooms with Quat Plus and Azure glass cleaner in them, which are the Dustbane products that the City is contractually tied to through Grand & Toy. The City also has environmental and OH&S standards that all chemicals on site must meet, so when it comes to the chemicals, we pretty much have to stick to getting them through the City's procurement staff.

We do clean certain F&B areas as part of our base and event cleaning already, but I can certainly make some spray bottles available to your staff. We have always had a certain amount of concern to just opening up our janitor rooms to all staff due to the varying levels of diligence when it comes to equipment being returned etc, but as far as I know at the VCT, all jani closets with chemical dispensers are on the various generations of master keys, which means that the majority staff do have access to them.

I would be happy to provide a quick info session for your staff on the dispensers and the chemicals if you thought that might help, and I'd be happy to can discuss any ways that we can help improve the level of cleanliness in any of the F&B areas.

In addition, I'll just provide a bit of background to some of the pest control issues I've been involved with since coming on site...

We had a cockroach problem in both sites that, to the best of my knowledge, has been dealt with sufficiently. I've had no word of a sighting in at least 8 or 9 months.

We have an ongoing mice issue, which is not out of the ordinary for older buildings in dense population centers. I work with the two Orkin techs, Jason at the Orpheum and Chad at the QET/Playhouse, who attend the sites on a monthly basis. We are down to one or three sightings per building per month, and we log this info so that the techs can address them upon their next visit. In fact, Chad is due at the QET this Saturday and will be here between 8am and 10am if you were interested in meeting with him.

There are a series of ongoing site recommendations common to both sites that involve food storage, sealing exterior access points and sealing and cleaning interior runs.

Fruit flies. Always an issue, and I made a series of recommendations to the previous AS manager that included putting lids on the garbage cans at food service stations, leaving out small bowls of vinegar at the stations and getting storage totes in the bottle rooms that keep the floors from getting covered in beer and pop drippings. The bartenders refused to have lids put on the garbage cans, the small trays of vinegar have mostly disappeared and they refused any changes to the empty pop and beer can storage options in the bottles rooms. We did put fruit fly traps in both rooms. Perhaps putting them at the bar and coffee stations would be a better option than the vinegar?

I'd be happy to revisit the tote option in the bottle rooms. It wouldn't change the weight or capacity of the existing bags; as long as the beer and wine bottles continue to be stored separately on the shelves, the bags could quite easily be lifted out of the totes.

I hope this helps. Just let me know how I can be of help in the future.

- 1. Follow-up actions that need to be performed by the departments:

 - MM invoices with 45 –series PO numbers need to have the goods receipt (GR) or service entry (SE) created in SAP.

I know that we have been told to put all issues on the FOH Report, but I thought this particular issue warranted a private email.

After handing out a booster seat at the Playhouse today, I noticed a strange material on the shelf that I had just taken the booster seat from. Upon closer inspection of the material (little white, blue, and black bits the size of rice grains), I realized it was coming from little black boxes that were labeled as Rodenticide and had a pest control number on them. What appears to be mouse poison was scattered on the booster seats in the shelves in the Playhouse Coat Check! At least 3 of these seats went out to small children today at the Arts Umbrella show. I tried to get the seats back but the show was starting and I could not find the patrons. The BSWs cleaned the substance and disposed of that particular box, but I don't know how many more there are throughout the theatres.

Needless to say, it would be great if staff could be made aware of where poison is in the various houses, and perhaps it could not be put in places where it can get onto things that staff and patrons touch. I also think that the booster seats in the Playhouse should be cleaned.

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I know that we have been told to put all issues on the FOH Report, but I thought this particular issue warranted a private email.

After handing out a booster seat at the Playhouse today, I noticed a strange material on the shelf that I had just taken the booster seat from. Upon closer inspection of the material (little white, blue, and black bits the size of rice grains), I realized it was coming from little black boxes that were labeled as Rodenticide and had a pest control number on them. What appears to be mouse poison was scattered on the booster seats in the shelves in the Playhouse Coat Check! At least 3 of these seats went out to small children today at the Arts Umbrella show. I tried to get the seats back but the show was starting and I could not find the patrons. The BSWs cleaned the substance and disposed of that particular box, but I don't know how many more there are throughout the theatres.

Here is what I recommended to Diane for the fruit flies:

- Replace organic waste receptacles at the bars and cap stations with lidded, step-pedal receptacles. Researched with Brandy Afoon, who comped us a few options to test. Rejected by bartenders. Subsequently advised cleaning staff to switch from cardboard liners to plastic in small green organics totes.
- Offered to provide wheeled totes in the bottles rooms for the storage of empty pop / beer cans and water bottles. Your specific bags for pricing would fit the totes. Researched with Brandy Afoon to provide appropriate totes. Rejected because the cans and bottles apparently would be too heavy to lift. If you opted to go in this direction, you may want to discuss budget with Ric.
- Trap options at the bars, cap stations and bottle rooms. Opted for natural solution (vinegar) in small containers at food prep areas such as bars and cap stations. Went with over-the-counter traps that Diane provided in the bottle rooms. Most of these containers have since disappeared.
- Recommended sinks and drains be thoroughly rinsed and that no food waste such as lime rinds be left in the sinks. It was my understanding that only clean water was supposed to be going down the sinks??? (see attached picture, which is how I found the sink in the salon on Friday morning).
- Altered show coverage duties to include as much of a post-show clean in the auditoriums as the staff can manage before having to leave for the night, with the focus on food waste and drink containers.
- I would add a further recommendation that the garbage containers in the dressing rooms be removed. They are open containers, and they do not comply with the City's Zero Waste initiatives.

Hi Jason,

The first step is to report the rodent / moth sightings in a way that it is going to get back to the Orkin reps. We have a rodent log book for QET/Playhouse at stage door. I can put a similar log book at the Orpheum stage door. They can include it in a FOH report. They can email Elizabeth or myself directly.

For the cloth moths, I will have to a follow up with Chad at Orkin. Orkin's suggestion was to install monitor traps to help monitor activity. Chad has not been on sight as of yet, but I haven't had any sightings reported in two weeks.

Rodents. This will never be more than a control program. Given the age of the buildings, we are likely to always have a mice population. According to our Orkin reps, from a maintenance point of view, we can spend a million dollars sealing the buildings and drilling holes in the walls to place traps and eradicate nests, and still the buildings would not remain mice free. So far we are averaging 2 to 4 sightings per month in the QET/PH and I have received one reported sighting in the Orpheum in the last 6 months. From a Pest Control point of view, this is well under control.

Now, this doesn't mean we ignore the sightings. The reported sightings seem to be concentrated around the Sales Office atop the Salon. Chad has saturated the area with traps and we have cleaned the area according to Chad's recommendations. There is also no sign of food being left out to attract the mice. Unless we can identify a source of attraction to the area, the next step might be drilling into the drywall to see if we can identify where they are nesting.

Orkin reps Chad and Jason do have standing recommendations on specific exterior doors and entrances where they feel sealing the gaps under the doors would help to improve control efforts. In the past, this has been visited from a budgetary view and, to date, there has been no movement.

And please, continue to encourage staff to log their sightings. This information is a vital piece of our control efforts.

From a cleaning approach, the only concerns I have are any food that is left in the auditorium floors after a show, as we do sometimes encounter candy, chocolate or spilled pop that has been left overnight, and any food being left in the dressing room areas post show.

Fruit flies. To be blunt, this is a user issue. Yesterday morning we mustered in our staff room at the QET and found that there were four glass mugs left on the counter that had been used for coffee and were not rinsed out, let alone cleaned properly. So, our room had fruit flies. There is little more the cleaning staff can do about the fruit flies without the co-operation of the users of the buildings.

Hi Jason,

I'm not sure what you are thinking of in terms of a dispenser? Where would you be looking to have them installed? They would need to be tied in to a sink. Were you looking to have them tied into the bar sinks?

We have chemical dispensers in the janitor rooms with Quat Plus and Azure glass cleaner in them, which are the Dustbane products that the City is contractually tied to through Grand & Toy. The City also has environmental and OH&S standards that all chemicals on site must meet, so when it comes to the chemicals, we pretty much have to stick to getting them through the City's procurement staff.

We do clean certain F&B areas as part of our base and event cleaning already, but I can certainly make some spray bottles available to your staff. We have always had a certain amount of concern to just opening up our janitor rooms to all staff due to the varying levels of diligence when it comes to equipment being returned etc, but as far as I know at the VCT, all jani closets with chemical dispensers are on the various generations of master keys, which means that the majority staff do have access to them.

I would be happy to provide a quick info session for your staff on the dispensers and the chemicals if you thought that might help, and I'd be happy to can discuss any ways that we can help improve the level of cleanliness in any of the F&B areas.

In addition, I'll just provide a bit of background to some of the pest control issues I've been involved with since coming on site...

We had a cockroach problem in both sites that, to the best of my knowledge, has been dealt with sufficiently. I've had no word of a sighting in at least 8 or 9 months.

We have an ongoing mice issue, which is not out of the ordinary for older buildings in dense population centers. I work with the two Orkin techs, Jason at the Orpheum and Chad at the QET/Playhouse, who attend the sites on a monthly basis. We are down to one or three sightings per building per month, and we log this info so that the techs can address them upon their next visit. In fact, Chad is due at the QET this Saturday and will be here between 8am and 10am if you were interested in meeting with him.

There are a series of ongoing site recommendations common to both sites that involve food storage, sealing exterior access points and sealing and cleaning interior runs.

Fruit flies. Always an issue, and I made a series of recommendations to the previous AS manager that included putting lids on the garbage cans at food service stations, leaving out small bowls of vinegar at the stations and getting storage totes in the bottle rooms that keep the floors from getting covered in beer and pop drippings. The bartenders refused to have lids put on the garbage cans, the small trays of vinegar have mostly disappeared and they refused any changes to the empty pop and beer can storage options in the bottles rooms. We did put fruit fly traps in both rooms. Perhaps putting them at the bar and coffee stations would be a better option than the vinegar?

I'd be happy to revisit the tote option in the bottle rooms. It wouldn't change the weight or capacity of the existing bags; as long as the beer and wine bottles continue to be stored separately on the shelves, the bags could quite easily be lifted out of the totes.

I hope this helps. Just let me know how I can be of help in the future.

I will review the sightings with Chad during his next site visit.

There are a few things to consider. One is, we expected an increase in sightings as the weather turned colder and the theatres filled up with more people. Once Chad gets a sense of where the mice are congregating, he can then tailor his prevention program more specifically, and hopefully this will lead to an improvement. I keep a log of all sightings reported to me on my computer.

Second, if we review the recommendations from Orkin, we'd find most of them have been ignored. Food is not stored properly, the bottle room floors and shelves in both buildings almost constantly have leaked pop, juice, wine and beer all over them because the empties are not stored properly, and there has been little effort so far to seal exterior parts of the buildings where the mice gain access from outside. Until these recommendations are followed, no matter how many traps Chad puts out, we will still be living with a healthy mouse population here.

Here is what I recommended to Diane for the fruit flies:

- Replace organic waste receptacles at the bars and cap stations with lidded, step-pedal receptacles. Researched with Brandy Afoon, who comped us a few options to test. Rejected by bartenders. Subsequently advised cleaning staff to switch from cardboard liners to plastic in small green organics totes.
- Offered to provide wheeled totes in the bottles rooms for the storage of empty pop / beer cans and water bottles. Your specific bags for pricing would fit the totes. Researched with Brandy Afoon to provide appropriate totes. Rejected because the cans and bottles apparently would be too heavy to lift. If you opted to go in this direction, you may want to discuss budget with Ric.
- Trap options at the bars, cap stations and bottle rooms. Opted for natural solution (vinegar) in small containers at food prep areas such as bars and cap stations. Went with over-the-counter traps that Diane provided in the bottle rooms. Most of these containers have since disappeared.
- Recommended sinks and drains be thoroughly rinsed and that no food waste such as lime rinds be left in the sinks. It was my understanding that only clean water was supposed to be going down the sinks??? (see attached picture, which is how I found the sink in the salon on Friday morning).
- Altered show coverage duties to include as much of a post-show clean in the auditoriums as the staff can manage before having to leave for the night, with the focus on food waste and drink containers.
- I would add a further recommendation that the garbage containers in the dressing rooms be removed. They are open containers, and they do not comply with the City's Zero Waste initiatives.

Hi Jason,

The first step is to report the rodent / moth sightings in a way that it is going to get back to the Orkin reps. We have a rodent log book for QET/Playhouse at stage door. I can put a similar log book at the Orpheum stage door. They can include it in a FOH report. They can email Elizabeth or myself directly.

For the cloth moths, I will have to a follow up with Chad at Orkin. Orkin's suggestion was to install monitor traps to help monitor activity. Chad has not been on sight as of yet, but I haven't had any sightings reported in two weeks.

Rodents. This will never be more than a control program. Given the age of the buildings, we are likely to always have a mice population. According to our Orkin reps, from a maintenance point of view, we can spend a million dollars sealing the buildings and drilling holes in the walls to place traps and eradicate nests, and still the buildings would not remain mice free. So far we are averaging 2 to 4 sightings per month in the QET/PH and I have received one reported sighting in the Orpheum in the last 6 months. From a Pest Control point of view, this is well under control.

Now, this doesn't mean we ignore the sightings. The reported sightings seem to be concentrated around the Sales Office atop the Salon. Chad has saturated the area with traps and we have cleaned the area according to Chad's recommendations. There is also no sign of food being left out to attract the mice. Unless we can identify a source of attraction to the area, the next step might be drilling into the drywall to see if we can identify where they are nesting.

Orkin reps Chad and Jason do have standing recommendations on specific exterior doors and entrances where they feel sealing the gaps under the doors would help to improve control efforts. In the past, this has been visited from a budgetary view and, to date, there has been no movement.

And please, continue to encourage staff to log their sightings. This information is a vital piece of our control efforts.

From a cleaning approach, the only concerns I have are any food that is left in the auditorium floors after a show, as we do sometimes encounter candy, chocolate or spilled pop that has been left overnight, and any food being left in the dressing room areas post show.

Fruit flies. To be blunt, this is a user issue. Yesterday morning we mustered in our staff room at the QET and found that there were four glass mugs left on the counter that had been used for coffee and were not rinsed out, let alone cleaned

properly. So, our room had fruit flies. Drains not thoroughly rinsed, unsealed beverage containers that haven't been rinsed or food waste that is left in waste containers without properly sealed lids; soiled reusable beverage containers like coffee cups left throughout the lobbies, the leakage from beverage containers that sit all over the bottle room floors and soak into the cardboard thrown down. These are all user issues that are causing the fruit flies and that continue to be unaddressed.

Again, I'm going to painfully blunt. I am happy to assist with this as I can, but as previously indicated I spent a lot of time and effort on this issue for Diane and it proved to be a waste of my time. There is little more the cleaning staff can do about the fruit flies without the co-operation of the users of the buildings.

Hi Jason,

I'm not sure what you are thinking of in terms of a dispenser? Where would you be looking to have them installed? They would need to be tied in to a sink. Were you looking to have them tied into the bar sinks?

We have chemical dispensers in the janitor rooms with Quat Plus and Azure glass cleaner in them, which are the Dustbane products that the City is contractually tied to through Grand & Toy. The City also has environmental and OH&S standards that all chemicals on site must meet, so when it comes to the chemicals, we pretty much have to stick to getting them through the City's procurement staff.

We do clean certain F&B areas as part of our base and event cleaning already, but I can certainly make some spray bottles available to your staff. We have always had a certain amount of concern to just opening up our janitor rooms to all staff due to the varying levels of diligence when it comes to equipment being returned etc, but as far as I know at the

VCT, all jani closets with chemical dispensers are on the various generations of master keys, which means that the majority staff do have access to them.

I would be happy to provide a quick info session for your staff on the dispensers and the chemicals if you thought that might help, and I'd be happy to can discuss any ways that we can help improve the level of cleanliness in any of the F&B areas.

In addition, I'll just provide a bit of background to some of the pest control issues I've been involved with since coming on site...

We had a cockroach problem in both sites that, to the best of my knowledge, has been dealt with sufficiently. I've had no word of a sighting in at least 8 or 9 months.

We have an ongoing mice issue, which is not out of the ordinary for older buildings in dense population centers. I work with the two Orkin techs, Jason at the Orpheum and Chad at the QET/Playhouse, who attend the sites on a monthly basis. We are down to one or three sightings per building per month, and we log this info so that the techs can address them upon their next visit. In fact, Chad is due at the QET this Saturday and will be here between 8am and 10am if you were interested in meeting with him.

There are a series of ongoing site recommendations common to both sites that involve food storage, sealing exterior access points and sealing and cleaning interior runs.

Fruit flies. Always an issue, and I made a series of recommendations to the previous AS manager that included putting lids on the garbage cans at food service stations, leaving out small bowls of vinegar at the stations and getting storage totes in the bottle rooms that keep the floors from getting covered in beer and pop drippings. The bartenders refused to have lids put on the garbage cans, the small trays of vinegar have mostly disappeared and they refused any changes to the empty pop and beer can storage options in the bottles rooms. We did put fruit fly traps in both rooms. Perhaps putting them at the bar and coffee stations would be a better option than the vinegar?

I'd be happy to revisit the tote option in the bottle rooms. It wouldn't change the weight or capacity of the existing bags; as long as the beer and wine bottles continue to be stored separately on the shelves, the bags could quite easily be lifted out of the totes.

I hope this helps. Just let me know how I can be of help in the future.

Chad placed another trap. Anita wiped off your desks with a mild vinegar rinse (sorry if the smell is still lingering); mice don't like vinegar, so this should keep the little buggers off your desks.

Your office presents a bit of a challenge for the Orkin tech; mice will often chew through the wall behind the baseboard, but your desks cover most of this stretch of the wall space, so he could not determine where their access point was. If he can do that, he can bait the hole and seal it with steel wool. We could then clean along where we think the run is.

If you and the Booking Gang would like to proceed with this, just let me know, and we'll agree on a day and time. That way you can secure any precariously balanced items on your desks before we start yanking them out from the walls.

I met with Jason from Orkin this morning. He was unable to find evidence of rodent activity in the VSO Library Room. However, the room is quite crowded with stored items. His ongoing recommendation for storage spaces is to try keep the rooms tidy and items stored off the floor, to give the rodents fewer places to hide and nest.

He did make note of a few other small adjustments we can make in the rest of the area, such as making sure areas where wiring comes out of the walls and pillars are covered with plates, and that any exterior access doors have door sweeps to keep the pests from squeezing in under the doors (there was one door that joined the west stairwell to the mechanical room that doubles as the recycling room that was in need of this).

Beyond that, there is little he can do until the space is settled. Once the moves and renovations are completed, he can then come in and start laying bait stations and traps in line with what is being done in the rest of the building.

Here is what I recommended to Diane for the fruit flies:

- Replace organic waste receptacles at the bars and cap stations with lidded, step-pedal receptacles. Researched with Brandy Afoon, who comped us a few options to test. Rejected by bartenders. Subsequently advised cleaning staff to switch from cardboard liners to plastic in small green organics totes.
- Offered to provide wheeled totes in the bottles rooms for the storage of empty pop / beer cans and water bottles. Your specific bags for pricing would fit the totes. Researched with Brandy Afoon to provide appropriate totes. Rejected because the cans and bottles apparently would be too heavy to lift. If you opted to go in this direction, you may want to discuss budget with Ric.
- Trap options at the bars, cap stations and bottle rooms. Opted for natural solution (vinegar) in small containers at food prep areas such as bars and cap stations. Went with over-the-counter traps that Diane provided in the bottle rooms. Most of these containers have since disappeared.
- Recommended sinks and drains be thoroughly rinsed and that no food waste such as lime rinds be left in the sinks. It was my understanding that only clean water was supposed to be going down the sinks??? (see attached picture, which is how I found the sink in the salon on Friday morning).
- Altered show coverage duties to include as much of a post-show clean in the auditoriums as the staff can manage before having to leave for the night, with the focus on food waste and drink containers.
- I would add a further recommendation that the garbage containers in the dressing rooms be removed. They are open containers, and they do not comply with the City's Zero Waste initiatives.

Hi Jason,

The first step is to report the rodent / moth sightings in a way that it is going to get back to the Orkin reps. We have a rodent log book for QET/Playhouse at stage door. I can put a similar log book at the Orpheum stage door. They can include it in a FOH report. They can email Elizabeth or myself directly.

For the cloth moths, I will have to a follow up with Chad at Orkin. Orkin's suggestion was to install monitor traps to help monitor activity. Chad has not been on sight as of yet, but I haven't had any sightings reported in two weeks.

Rodents. This will never be more than a control program. Given the age of the buildings, we are likely to always have a mice population. According to our Orkin reps, from a maintenance point of view, we can spend a million dollars sealing the buildings and drilling holes in the walls to place traps and eradicate nests, and still the buildings would not remain mice free. So far we are averaging 2 to 4 sightings per month in the QET/PH and I have received one reported sighting in the Orpheum in the last 6 months. From a Pest Control point of view, this is well under control.

Now, this doesn't mean we ignore the sightings. The reported sightings seem to be concentrated around the Sales Office atop the Salon. Chad has saturated the area with traps and we have cleaned the area according to Chad's recommendations. There is also no sign of food being left out to attract the mice. Unless we can identify a source of attraction to the area, the next step might be drilling into the drywall to see if we can identify where they are nesting.

Orkin reps Chad and Jason do have standing recommendations on specific exterior doors and entrances where they feel sealing the gaps under the doors would help to improve control efforts. In the past, this has been visited from a budgetary view and, to date, there has been no movement.

And please, continue to encourage staff to log their sightings. This information is a vital piece of our control efforts.

From a cleaning approach, the only concerns I have are any food that is left in the auditorium floors after a show, as we do sometimes encounter candy, chocolate or spilled pop that has been left overnight, and any food being left in the dressing room areas post show.

Fruit flies. To be blunt, this is a user issue. Yesterday morning we mustered in our staff room at the QET and found that there were four glass mugs left on the counter that had been used for coffee and were not rinsed out, let alone cleaned

properly. So, our room had fruit flies. Drains not thoroughly rinsed, unsealed beverage containers that haven't been rinsed or food waste that is left in waste containers without properly sealed lids; soiled reusable beverage containers like coffee cups left throughout the lobbies, the leakage from beverage containers that sit all over the bottle room floors and soak into the cardboard thrown down. These are all user issues that are causing the fruit flies and that continue to be unaddressed.

Again, I'm going to painfully blunt. I am happy to assist with this as I can, but as previously indicated I spent a lot of time and effort on this issue for Diane and it proved to be a waste of my time. There is little more the cleaning staff can do about the fruit flies without the co-operation of the users of the buildings.

Many of the booster seats are stored on the floor. Mouse traps are always placed on ground level, so I will be instructing the tech not to place traps in any of the coat checks unless the seats are stored off the ground.

As Ric mentioned, the last Orkin tech didn't have any traps in the PH coat check area. The trap could have been place by a previous tech and missed by the new tech, or someone took it upon themselves to move the trap. I know that we have been told to put all issues on the FOH Report, but I thought this particular issue warranted a private email.

After handing out a booster seat at the Playhouse today, I noticed a strange material on the shelf that I had just taken the booster seat from. Upon closer inspection of the material (little white, blue, and black bits the size of rice grains), I realized it was coming from little black boxes that were labeled as Rodenticide and had a pest control number on them. What appears to be mouse poison was scattered on the booster seats in the shelves in the Playhouse Coat Check! At least 3 of these seats went out to small children today at the Arts Umbrella show. I tried to get the seats back but the show was starting and I could not find the patrons. The BSWs cleaned the substance and disposed of that particular box, but I don't know how many more there are throughout the theatres.

Needless to say, it would be great if staff could be made aware of where poison is in the various houses, and perhaps it could not be put in places where it can get onto things that staff and patrons touch. I also think that the booster seats in the Playhouse should be cleaned.

Hi Jason,

I'm not sure what you are thinking of in terms of a dispenser? Where would you be looking to have them installed? They would need to be tied in to a sink. Were you looking to have them tied into the bar sinks?

We have chemical dispensers in the janitor rooms with Quat Plus and Azure glass cleaner in them, which are the Dustbane products that the City is contractually tied to through Grand & Toy. The City also has environmental and OH&S standards that all chemicals on site must meet, so when it comes to the chemicals, we pretty much have to stick to getting them through the City's procurement staff.

We do clean certain F&B areas as part of our base and event cleaning already, but I can certainly make some spray bottles available to your staff. We have always had a certain amount of concern to just opening up our janitor rooms to all staff due to the varying levels of diligence when it comes to equipment being returned etc, but as far as I know at the

VCT, all jani closets with chemical dispensers are on the various generations of master keys, which means that the majority staff do have access to them.

I would be happy to provide a quick info session for your staff on the dispensers and the chemicals if you thought that might help, and I'd be happy to can discuss any ways that we can help improve the level of cleanliness in any of the F&B areas.

In addition, I'll just provide a bit of background to some of the pest control issues I've been involved with since coming on site...

We had a cockroach problem in both sites that, to the best of my knowledge, has been dealt with sufficiently. I've had no word of a sighting in at least 8 or 9 months.

We have an ongoing mice issue, which is not out of the ordinary for older buildings in dense population centers. I work with the two Orkin techs, Jason at the Orpheum and Chad at the QET/Playhouse, who attend the sites on a monthly basis. We are down to one or three sightings per building per month, and we log this info so that the techs can address them upon their next visit. In fact, Chad is due at the QET this Saturday and will be here between 8am and 10am if you were interested in meeting with him.

There are a series of ongoing site recommendations common to both sites that involve food storage, sealing exterior access points and sealing and cleaning interior runs.

Fruit flies. Always an issue, and I made a series of recommendations to the previous AS manager that included putting lids on the garbage cans at food service stations, leaving out small bowls of vinegar at the stations and getting storage totes in the bottle rooms that keep the floors from getting covered in beer and pop drippings. The bartenders refused to have lids put on the garbage cans, the small trays of vinegar have mostly disappeared and they refused any changes to the empty pop and beer can storage options in the bottles rooms. We did put fruit fly traps in both rooms. Perhaps putting them at the bar and coffee stations would be a better option than the vinegar?

I'd be happy to revisit the tote option in the bottle rooms. It wouldn't change the weight or capacity of the existing bags; as long as the beer and wine bottles continue to be stored separately on the shelves, the bags could quite easily be lifted out of the totes.

I hope this helps. Just let me know how I can be of help in the future.

The pest control tech has placed 3 monitor stations on top of the coat racks in the QET coat check to monitor cloth moth activity in the area. These are checked on a regular basis by Ric Bedry, myself and the tech. They are there to gauge presence and activity so that the tech can then take the necessary steps to efficiently eliminate the moths.

More stations will be added in the coming weeks to areas where costumes are stored at the QET (stage, backstage basement and chorus rooms, wardrobe room) in an effort to protect both the Theatre and the user groups from further infestations.
