Hello!

I'd hoped to attend some of the public workshops this week but alas I left it too late to sign up and am languishing on a wait list instead. In lieu of attendance, I figured I would email just to express my support of the asphalt surface for the temporary path while the ultimate design of the greenway is planned.

I currently rent in Fairview (postal code V5Z 3H6) and as a student in 2009 I used to rent in Kerrisdale; having walked both the Kitsilano and Kerrisdale-Marpole ends of the tracks, I have always appreciated the gardens and country feel of the disused railway, but I think it holds even more promise as a greenway. While the planning is happening, asphalt seems like the most sensible surface for better access for all. As a commuter cyclist who uses a bicycle as my primary mode of transport, I am admittedly biased towards pavement. But having ridden the path from 16th to 41st this weekend, it's clear that a paved route would actually make a commute by bike between downtown and even Marpole a relative breeze. With Marpole as one of the last truly affordable rental areas, this could be an accessibility game changer for people otherwise limited to bus transfers. Asphalt also seems a better surface for more unsteady seniors, people in wheelchairs and children. I have more faith in its ability to weather the weather over winter months. Rain aside, some kids were already creating grooves in the gravel track by practicing hard braking and skidding on their mountain bikes.

I know residents are concerned about losing the rural feeling they'd previously enjoyed, but paving a greenway through a treed railway with bird songs and mountain views intact is hardly 'paving paradise.' No one's razing the hillside or putting trees in tree museums here.

That went on a bit long, but thanks for your work on this project!

The section from 33rd to 37th which cointinues uphill and which is covered with loose gravel slurry is difficult to to cycle, having pedalled uphill from 7th. The slurry adds friction, is slippery, and unsafe. In the long term, for the success of this transportation corridor, a paved bike path should be incorporated from start to finish, to be accessible to people of all ages and abilities. I could not fathom having young kids bike uphill on the slurry of gravel. As a commuter route, I would not use it to travel to work, if it meant my clothing would get dusty in dry weather, or muddy in wet weather from a gravel path. If done properly, this commuter route could replace the Cypress bike route. It would be nice to see a meandering path for interest, with a lot of trees.

Why on earth is there a concrete barrier on Burrard Street and new bike lane, when there is an existing bike route on Cypress? This makes no sense, and some of the decisions the City is making about bike lanes is beyond overkill. It is choking the movement of goods and services. I was not able to attend any of the recent Public Workshops.

However, I would like to make some comments about the Greenway construction and pathway materials.

First, I have noticed that there are frequently a greater number of walkers and strollers on the pathway than cyclists. That leads me to believe that there are far more local residents continuing to use the pathway. I would suggest that you perhaps put greater weight to their requests and desires for the pathway...it is after all our neighborhood.

Second, I would like to request, as displayed in your illustration of the greenway, that you construct separate pathways for cyclists and walkers. Just recently as I was crossing Arbutus in a crosswalk with the walk sign, a cyclist crossed my path not pausing or stopping for me. I had to quickly move to avoid being hit by him. Despite signs or painting separating lines, I would prefer to 'stroll' down the pathway and not have to worry about cyclists running me over or pushing me into the gutter.

Third, although asphalt is considered the ideal material for a pathway, after walking on it for a while, I do notice a tiring effect on my feet and joints from the hard surface. Something that does not seem to happen when walking on regular sidewalk. I would like to request a material is 'softer' and easier to walk than asphalt appears to be.

Again, I think the aim of the pathway should be to make it a pleasant strollable experience focusing less on making it bikeway and more on making it an enjoyable safe green space.

I walked the arbutus corridor rail tracks prior to their purchase by the city, from Kitsilano to Kerrisdale several times a week for many years when i lived at 41st and Dunbar.

Unfortunately I will not be able to attend the open house discussions planned in September. I would however, like to register my thoughts.

I think the temporary use of asphalt or concrete turns the temporary route into a bicycle race track and actually increases safety concerns on the route. Children playing would be at risk from the fast moving bikes. The temporary path is narrow and segregation between fast and slow moving people and vehicles can't be achieved. Dog leads, children on bikes and scooters do not mix well with cycling peletons.

I believe a better temporary surface is the use of crushed gravel similar to that used for the walking and bike paths along Jericho and Spanish banks. It allows cyclists, but racing bikes choose not to use it.

Long term, with proper segregation, smother surfaces to allow roller blades, skate boards and long boards should be included.

On a separate note, as a pedestrian that tried to use south west marine drive, i am disappointed that the "upgrade" has only catered for cyclists and not for other users of the route. There are no sidewalks, resident parking is further restricted and anyone making a left turn will cause further delays to cars and trucks. So much for a green city when pedestrians are not catered for!

Dear Friends:

I had the privilege of attending Thursday night's greenway meeting in Kerrisdale and was pleasantly surprised by the large turnout and participation. We were encouraged to continue our contact with you and to forward ideas and thoughts on the future the project. My principal interest is in seeing the Arbutus corridor as a substantial building block toward eventually acquiring access across Marine Drive Golf Course, to knit the existing trail network from Southlands and beyond into a trail that will eventually encompass all of Point Grey. With the creation of the Arbutus corridor greenway, the missing link that prevents that now is merely the few hundred meters across Marine Drive Golf Course.

My other interest in planning the corridor is to work towards inclusion of an equestrian bridleway at least along a portion of the greenway, probably from 49th ave. to the southern terminus. The long existence of horses on the trails of Southlands and Pacific Spirit Park demonstrate that horses can safely integrate with all other trail users, including dogs and cyclists.

Until we get direct access to the corridor from Southlands, there is no need to be concerned that the corridor will be inundated with horses. There will only be occasional horse use simply because riders will have to trailer in from Southlands to park adjacent to Fraser River Park.

However, since we were assured several times Thursday that inclusion is the hallmark of the greenway planning, I hope that will include horses.



I'll be as brief as possible...

A bit of background...

- I lived at Arbutus and 33rd from 1975 to 1983. My parents continued to live there until 2013. I remember the trains on the railway.
- I cycled extensively in Vancouver in those years including riding with the Vancouver Bicycle Club.
- I commuted to downtown Vancouver by bicycle most days first from Marpole from 1983 to 1985 (22 kms return), then from North Richmond 1984 to 1990 (26 kms return) and subsequently from North Delta from 1991 to 2000 (72 kms return). I moved out of town in 2001. I returned to cycling 2 years ago with a 12 km commute to downtown.

In short, I've seen the evolution of cycling in Vancouver for over 40 years. But I am NOT a cycling fanatic. I am NOT a rabid cycling advocate. I do it for purely selfish reasons...I enjoy it and it keeps me fit.

I rode the corridor from 37th to 12th a couple of evenings ago. The paved sections were a gem!

I hadn't really thought about the whole route much. I ride everywhere with no real regard to established bike route. But on being able to ride just that section alone made me realize what potential the corridor has to collect cyclists from Richmond, the Westside and Kitsilano and get them through town unlike anything else in the city. The lack of street crossing on that sections makes it incredibly effective as would be the southern section.

The controversy about paving or not paving the corridor and the consultation with neighbors is ridiculous. This right of way does not belong to the neighbors but belongs to everyone in the city. And stopping the project to argue about pavement vs cement is just plain juvenile. The gravel sections are only marginally rideable and largely defeat one of the main functions of the corridor.

As a Vancouver cyclist who has seen this city go from 0 interest in accommodating bicycles to where we are now and where we are going, I support the paving of the rest of the corridor while plans develop for the long term. Stand up to these "I use it so I own it" locals and get it done. This is a case where dialogue is not needed.

Arbutus corridor. I live near Arbutus (around Nanton) and have a couple suggestions for the resurfacing. The hard asphalt surface from 16th Ave to 33rd is great for cycling but it doesn't have to be 14 feet wide. It leaves no room for jogging on a softer surface. Also, the loose gravel from 33rd Ave to 41st is nearly unrideable. Here's a couple suggestions: 1. Pave the centre 6 - 8 feet for riding, leave the rest gravel or cover with chip track for running. 2. Don't pave at all, but use gravel and roll or coat it with something to make a cyclable surface. A material called "Molex" can be used to bond the gravel and make a good hard surface.

Although we plan to attend one of the public events in the next few weeks and look forward to learning more about the project and participating in giving suggestions and feedback, we realize hat many people will want to give their input and time at these mee ings will be limited.

Thus, just to get our ini ial thoughts into he mix, below are some comments and suggestions in point form. Our paramount recommendation is that the Greenway be paved, not gravelled, and hat there be a separa ion between pedestrians and bicyclists (and even more assuming that electric bicycles and electric scooters may become part of the mix of users on the trail.

There are some parts of the Greenway that are quite isolated from nearby streets and residences. For example, the section stretching sou h from King Edward behind the Sperling Sub-Station is very sheltered and the bushes are sometimes used by homeless people for overnight shelter. These sections should be made safe for users.

Hello!

As walkers, pushers of strollers and cyclists, my wife and I are looking forward to the completion of the Arbutus Greenway: it will be a great addition to Vancouver's multi-use trail system and a very significant contributor to Vancouver's "green" image.

We are aware of the controversy concerning the surface of the trail, and would like to suggest that the current mix of asphalt in some sections and uncrushed gravel in others is not appropriate from either a recreational or an aesthetic viewpoint. The asphalt is unsightly and likely to encourage fast cycling, unless clearly marked wheeled- and non-wheeled zones are defined; the present uncrushed gravel is uncomfortable for walkers, unnavigable for strollers, and dangerous for cyclists.

May we suggest that the trail be surfaced throughout by finely crushed gravel, such as is the case in some sections of trails such as Lochside and South Langley, thereby making it safe for all users and also aesthetically pleasing.



Subject: cycled the Arbutus Greenway today

Dear Project Team,

I cycled the Arbutus Greenway this morning to 37th. I can't make it to any of the upcoming consultations, so want to provide you with some feedback on my experience. S.22(1) waiting for my second knee replacement surgery and only able to walk short distances (with a cane).

I rode both the paved and gravel sections of the greenway and in retrospect this was a mistake. The uphill gravel sections were very hard to cycle at the low speeds I do. It's hard to get traction on such a surface and the back wheel constantly dug in or skewed as I rode. I noted that the few walkers I saw on the gravel section were all single-file, using the very edges of the path (which are almost gravel-free, hard packed dirt). By contrast the hard top section was easy for me to bike up and had good traction.

I wish I hadn't persevered uphill on the gravel section, because when I turned round at 37th, I found it was even more difficult biking downhill. At my slow speeds, the front wheel kept being skewed by the deep loose gravel areas and braking caused the back wheel to skew out under me. After losing my balance a second time, I gave up and tried to walk. I was unable to walk on the gravel either - too uneven a surface for me to manage. I got back on the bike and tried to cycle only on the ungravelled, packed-dirt edges of the path. It wasn't easy as these are so narrow and there's a ditch or thorn bushes next to them and I had to keep stopping to avoid pedestrians walking the same dirt edge.

I understand all surfaces on this greenway are temporary. I was looking forward to using it, but won't be able to until the gravel has been replaced with something more suitable for an older, less able person.

I feel strongly that the temporary surfacing should allow for as many modes of transportation as possible (exclusing motorized of course). I have just finished reading the "Arbutus Railway Line Purchase Agreement" and noted that many references to the City agreeing to "purchase the Railway Line for continued operation on the terms and conditions set forth in this Agreement." This Agreement was prepared following the "Guidelines Respecting Net Salvage Value Determination Applications" published by the Canadian Transportation Agency. This land, which is a 60 foot strip of land from False Creek to the Fraser River, is the core of the Arbutus Corridor, and in many places is surrounded by verges, owned by the City, and streets, also owned by the City. Why is it that the City is now building an asphalt path for walking and cycling when the City signed the Agreement which clearly states articles 13.1(d) "The City hereby represents and warrants to CPR...{that}...the City intends to operate light rail passenger transit on the Lands consistent with the Transportation 2040 Plan adopted by the City's Council on October 31, 2012."

I have attended the recent consulting meeting about this 'temporary path' and find it quite foolish to spend such money on a temporary path when much of the Corridor does not have a sidewalk beside it on the lands previously owed by the City. Some of these streets do not have a curb and sidewalk. I found this consulting process a guided facilitation to justify continuing the expenditure on a temporary path. Although we did decide not to paint the path green and that it should have a crown.

I understand that the General Manager of Engineering was tasked with this process during a period of transition to a new Director of Planning, is it not time that planning process, as defined by the Agreement Article 9-City Plans, be returned to the Planning Department? There are time constraints written into the Agreement.

In this regard, I don't know if you're aware of the by the US National Center on Accessibility, Indiana University-Bloomington "National Trails Surface Study" but it might be worthwhile for your department to consider it prior to the workshops. It addresses issues of accessibility and stability.

"The impetus for the National Trails Surface study was to investigate alternatives to the typical firm and stable surface materials of asphalt, concrete, or boardwalk. It is a common misconception that in order to make a trail surface firm and stable, it needs to be paved. Professionals have found that using soil stabilizers, or natural aggregates, can be effective alternatives to creating a trail surface that meets accessibility guidelines (Boone, 2008).

An individual's mental, physical, and emotional well-being is positively affected by the action of hiking on trails. Factors such as being in nature, participating in a physical challenge, socializing with others in an inclusive recreational environment all contribute to an increased well-being. The desire to enjoy this type of outdoor recreational experience is equal amongst individuals with and without disabilities. Research shows that recreating is a necessary action when looking at increasing an individual's overall well-being. The technical provisions of the Draft Final Accessibility Guidelines for Outdoor Developed Areas (U.S. Access Board, 2009) for trails requires a trail surface that is firm and stable. The guidelines are currently being applied as a best practice set of guidelines for Federal, State, Local and Private entities. In an attempt to preserve the natural trail experience (i.e. not concrete, asphalt and boardwalk surface materials), recreation professionals have identified a need to find alternative firm and stable trail surfaces."

As you are no doubt aware, there are many unpaved crushed limestone paths around the world used by cyclists, walkers, joggers, strollers, wheelchairs etc without any issues. For instance, at Vanier Park and Jericho and Spanish Banks in Vancouver. These paths are much more aesthetically pleasing and force cyclists to go slower. (I posted a few photos here of the gravel paths at Vanier Park and Crescent beach 5.22(1)

And check out this accessible trail on the Sunshine Coast! The Inland Trail near Powell River — "The 12 kilometer wheelchair accessible circuit includes 8 picnic /rest areas, 4 overnight camping areas and 6 fishing piers. The trail is a crushed limestone covered pathway with minimal grades." http://www.sunshinecoastcanada.com /accessibility

I recently walked on the gravel bed section with my s.22(1) son. We had wanted to jog, but the surface was too difficult, even walking we kept turning on our ankles. We met an elderly woman tending her garden and she told us how difficult it was for her to access her garden and how important having pavement surfacing is for her.

Smooth surfacing will provide greater access to a wider diversity of users: those using mobility devices (wheelchairs, walker, scooters etc), those with young children and pushing strollers, those on bikes seeking a safe and quiet route, especially for families with young children on bikes, etc.

Smooth = Accessible Bumpy = Discriminatory access

I most recently experienced the newly paved section of the Arbutus Greenway during HUB Cycling's Bike the Night event.

Having a smooth paved surface is extremely important to a comfortable ride. Gravel surfaces are less accessible, more dangerous during turning manoeuvres, and overall are less attractive routes for any wheeled vehicle.

A quick story: I volunteered at TransLink's grand opening event for the Central Valley Greenway (CVG) at the Winston overpass in Burnaby. The overpass is fed by long sections of gravel paths. I remember hearing so many complaints from people that tried in-line skating but couldn't, and from parents whose children could not scooter because of the gravel surface. What was meant to be a celebratory event was spoiled by the poor surface treatment on this section of the Greenway.

I strongly support using a surface treatment like asphalt over the entire Arbutus Greenway to ensure a consistently smooth corridor that supports travel by bicycle, in-line skates, skateboards, scooters, and wheelchairs.

Dear Mayor Robertson and Council,

I am writing to give my feedback on the development to the Arbutus Greenway.

As a regular cycle commuter, the surfaces I cycle on important to me: Not only does a smooth surface make my ride more comfortable, it make it safer as well. Lumps, bumps, and potholes create obstacles I must ride around or bounce over. Both of these scenarios can create a situation where loss of control is possible, especially in poor weather conditions.

I also am writing to express my concern over shared pathways, with cyclists, pedestrians (especially those with dogs!), skateboarders, etc, all using the same space. If you are truly committed to creating a Green City, then supporting people to commute by bike is one of the best ways to do so. However, not considering a bike as a vehicle is a major problem. Similar to the idea that one would never have pedestrians sharing the roadways with cars, one should not have pedestrians sharing a cycle roadway with bikes, as on shared pathways. If one is trading in their car for a bike, it is not necessarily because they want to begin having a leisurely ride in to work. On the contrary: I still want to get to work in the least amount of time I can, albeit in a safe manner. When I am forced to share the pathway with pedestrians, I must slow down my commute (because to ride at a speed that is safe for me, would not be safe on a shared route) and this does not encourage me to use the shared pathways we currently have.

I encourage you to divide the Arbutus Greenway with an actual physical barrier so that one side is for pedestrians, skaters, etc, and the other is side for bikes only. In this way those who regularly commute by bike, and those who wish to begin cycle commuting, will have a safe (from cars, pollution, and pedestrians and their dogs) route with which to transverse the west side of the city.

And while I am on the topic, it would be most beneficial if this same idea could be made to all current shared pathways. I am not opposed to all citizens of the city having access to car-free routes. I am only opposed to the notion that some people seen to hold that bikes are not vehicles, and need a roadway that is separate from pedestrians in the same way as cars do.

With the rails gone the ROW is tolerable for walkers and bikers and the graded parts are deluxe. No more is needed for now except for removing any remaining rails from intersections. The ROW is designated for transit so parts should be used to improve

the #16 bus route ASAP.

Diverting West Boulevard on to the ROW from W47Av to W52Av would bypass the nasty dogleg corner at W51Av. Using the ROW from W61Av to Milton St (perhaps only for buses and bikes) graded to let buses continue to the Hudson St loop would make the #16 route more useful, comfortable and faster. Bikers and walkers would be accomodated but forget about streetcars in Vancouver. There may be room in Surrey but Vancouver is full of intense crosstraffic. I hope this helps.

I am writing this letter today as my family traverses Vancouver on the Arbutus Greenway. We have now reached the intersection of west 33rd. I can't tell you how disappointed I am to see that the paving has stopped across west 33rd. There is now only gravel grading.

My daughter has had to take off her rollerblades and we are now walking this section of the track.

It is quite alarming that this portion of the track is not paved. It is the section that connects the historic and bustling business neighbourhood of Kerrisdale to the greenway.

I could name at least 50 colleagues, friends, acquaintances and family members who cannot use this portion of the Greenway, although they too are Vancouver residents and taxpayers, simply because there is no paving from 33rd to Kerrisdale.

This Greenway belongs to all of Vancouver, including those who have mobility issues and need Walkers, wheelchairs, and scooters. It belongs to families with small children who need strollers and children on bicycles etc. The smiles and joy I saw on

kids using the paved section of the Greenway confirms for me that paving is the best way to make sure that the Greenway stays green and available for all of us.

In addition, whether you are walking, scooting or rolling on the pavement, I noticed that sound is absorbed by the asphalt and it is almost silent. Just today, we had twos cyclists come up behind us who calling out "on your left". We barely heard their approach. Enjoying the quiet paved surface is an unexpected bonus and highlightsthe calls of local birds away from traffic. The paved surface makes the Greenway a more quiet way to enjoy nature.

On the unpaved and the graded section of Greenway there are areas that have already collected broken glass and debris. These obstacles are not as easily washed off, swept off or removed from the trail as they would be from a paved surface, making the trail hazardous for all users but especially children.

I urge the city to address the rights of all it's citizens to safe and mobility friendly access to this Green City asset and complete the paving of this former industrial transport line. The sooner the entire line is paved, the sooner ALL Vancouverites can travel, self-propelled and safely, through the city.

I will be out of town for your sessions but I'm sure attendees will address issues of lighting, benches, shade trees, drought-tolerant plantings etc.

After my dog walk this morning there are some issues that came to mind.

- 1. Please put some garbage bins at regular intervals. There is nowhere to deposit a poop bag.
- 2. The intersection at Nanton is a potentially lethal spot. Motorists on Nanton totally ignore the Stop signs either side of the Greenway crossing. Now that there is a clearly marked crossing, you would think they would be a little more alert, but they are not. This morning I was almost hit by an eastbound motorist, probably texting, who failed to notice the Stop sign, the crossing markings or me and my large dog right in front of her bumper. On the way home a car barrelling downhill on Nanton had to squeeze against the kerb to avoid hitting me. Maybe we need larger Stop signs or a blitz by the traffic police.
- 3. The Greenway hedge on the 4000, 4100 block of Maple Crescent is out of control. It used to be trimmed regularly by Hydro and/or CPR. It has been left to its own devices for several years now and it is now gigantic both in height and width.


Subject: Japanese Knotweed - Arbutus Greenway


Dear Sirs,

I would like to bring your attention again to the fact Japanese Knotweed is growing unchecked along the Arbutus Grenway just north of 35th Avenue and is now encroaching on to the pathway itself. The first photo was taken late August/early September after which heavy trucks laid more gravel surface, temporarily covering the Knotweed. The second photo was taken today, showing it is has returned.

As you will see from the attached McLeans article, the roots of Japanese Knotweed grow past a depth of 3 meters, spread voraciously and will grow through concrete. This Knotweed currently on the greenway will vanish during the winter then grow back to heights of 6-8' next spring.

If this infestation continues unaddressed the pathway may become impassable.

My main concern is paving. Hardening surfaces with asphalt goes completely against Vancouver's Greenest City goal. Way back at least as far as 1980 we knew that paving is contrary to good management of the urban ecosystem. (And it's closely related to our over-stretched storm runoff management – using sewers!) See the City's report, Greenways, Public Ways - http://searcharchives.vancouver.ca/greenways-public-ways-final-report This report is probably the origin of the term "greenway" for Vancouver. Note that it's not "blackway."

Responding to this email brings up a wrong email missing "r" at end of Vancouver. You'll need to correct that.

The current issue residents had with the greenway is due to paving without due care - you put a road-work crew in a park - they have no clue. The track should not be in the middle hogging all the space. No safe area for people to walk, nor separation.

In the Fir to Arbutus stretch it is solely pedestrian and dog walking due to profuse gardens - heavily used by all and the elderly as spaces to walk without getting hit by a bike are rare. Dog walking space is needed as in our area condos don't allow dogs to pee on grass next to sidewalks. So the greenway is a huge dog walking park. We are under-served by parks due to many condos (and many dogs). Larger units with families

If done thoughtfully, with proper planning, here is space to lay down a fully separated bike path, and separate gravel path for walkers adjacent to garden side. Currently hydro poles block greenway space that would be where bike path should go - well away from gardens/sun side. Walker path should be garden adjacent as many toddlers drift back/forth on pa h while Mom gardens. It is heavily used as a park space.

Already, we are getting bikes riding down thru our section on the dirt. Even with massive separation at False Creek where pedestrians have a clearly segregated narrow boardwalk section, a pedestrian was seriously hurt by a speeding bike. I can't emphasize enough the need for separa ion. Highline NY is a walking only trail - that's it's charm. I have 3 bikes myself, but there are lots of areas for bikes and NO linear garden parks. The greenway is downhill all the way - you'll need speed gates as well as a clear paved vs gravel path. The gates should also be on gravel path, otherwise they'll speed on packed gravel to avoid the gates. I bike - I know what they do.

I took the time to walk the entire greenway. Much of it was under-used & suitable for bikes currently, if you put the paving off to far side as it should be, and make a broad walking area.

So message is: lay down gravel pedestrian area first in prime spot. Make sure any garden areas are to sun-side. Separate off bike path in least desirable, far side away from gardens /pedestrians. Add gates to block speed on either pathway - they can get up to 70kph on Seymour pa h. Fir to Arbutus should probably be full-on Highline pedestrian only unless you squeeze in bike way where the hydro poles are. The Greenway deserves to be special, and not just another bike plain old bike path.

I was disappointed to learn that the construction of the asphalt pathway has ceased beyond 33rd Avenue. I live on \$.22(1) and s.22(1) and not a week ago my husband and I walked our dog along the gravel path from our home down to the Fraser River. I was quite disappointed with the state of the path. There were shards of glass the entire length of the gravel path, a significant concern for children and animals using the corridor. I went to the sold out Kerrisdale meeting, along with about 30 or more other people who had the same idea. They opened up a second room for us "waitlisters" and did a second presentation. There was no discussion but we were able to put our thoughts on sticky notes on wall posters if desired. I decided to come home and think about what I'd heard and am sending this email instead

My preference for the Arbutus corridor from 41st on through to 70th short term would be for a wide, shared packed fine gravel trail, exactly as the section between 33rd and 41st avenues. I walked it ton the weekend, along with others walking, cycling, - even a Vancouver city rental bike. t would accommodate wheel chairs, carts, strollers and would be in keeping with the more natural setting and the community gardens found along the southern part of the corridor.

I would mostly be walking, and there are many people who walk in this area. It may be a bit difficult for some pets but I did see people walking with dogs on both sections

I know it wouldn't be good for skateboarders and roller bladders but they will be able to use the section between King Edward and 33rd.

As an alternative, if enough really want asphalt, perhaps you could do a shared trail with one half gravel and the other half asphalt.

Asphalt is easy to ride and walk on, but I feel it would encourage cyclists who might speed through the area, and make it difficult for those who walk

In the winter, I think it would be less safe because it can be quite slippery when it's frosty or wet

If a salt is spread on the trail, Magnesium chloride for instance, it would be less slippery, but would it be hard on the feet of animals and possibly be absorbed through their paws. Not sure if it's toxic or not. Asphalt also has less "give" - it's harder on the joints and limbs than a fine gravel trail.

I don't like the look of the asphalt. It seems out of character for the area somehow

I have walked and ridden the full length of the corridor from Fir to the southern end over the last 20 or more years, parts of it many times. I frequent the part between 41st and 57th as I walk it to get my groceries. I even had a community garden there for a time.

I will probably continue to walk on the boulevard dirt trails if asphalt is put in.

I had asked you to take a look at an area of limbs that are blocking our view (which was once out to Point Atkinson) There are a number of dead branches caught in the limbs of these trees which have broken off in storms or been cut by BC Hydro in maintaining the line We would like permission at our expense to tidy up this area

The trees have been topped over the years (last in the early 1980's) and now have huge secondary re-growth from the previously topped sites There is some question as to the status of the topping sites from which the re-growth has occurred They have been heavily pruned by Hydro along the east side of the trees rendering them heavily weighted on the west towards the houses below The family who live directly below on the west side of the trees at \$\frac{1}{5}.22(1)\$ have petitioned the city in the past to remove them, however their request was denied

Please see the attached photo The trees that stick up the highest are not others in the background - they are the re-growth from the previous topping site

I also attach the report of a consulting arborist from Mountain Maple Tree Services that includes information concerning this area of trees

We are not asking that the trees be removed. Due to concerns regarding the conditions of trees located adjacent to the address named above, an assessment was requested. This site was inspected on July 22, 2016. Eleven trees were assessed; they have been numbered 1-11 for the purpose of this report. Seven photographs have been included as part of this report. An aerial image has been copied from the VanMap website to aid in tree location details only.

It was reported that these trees originally belonged to the Canadian National Railway Company, but now belong to the City. They were located adjacent to the CN railway tracks; these tracks have recently been removed to enable a bike path, which is currently under construction. These trees have not been maintained. They are surrounded by invasive species such as Blackberry, Morning Glory and Japanese knotweed. The owner of the property immediately adjacent to the west side of these trees had requested to have them removed in the past; this request was denied. The owner of the address mentioned above is inquiring to have these trees pruned by an ISA Certified Arborist, and is willing to pay for the expenses.

There is a dead Cherry tree located to the south of Tree #1. An inspection by the Parks Board is requested by the owner of the addressed named above; this tree is at high risk for failure. The immediate target zone of this tree includes the neighboring house, which is frequently occupied, and the future bike path, which is located along the Arbutus corridor.

Limitations: This report is based on a visual assessment, from the ground only. No core or tissue samples were taken; no root crown excavations were performed. This report provides no undertakings regarding the future condition or behavior of the trees reviewed in it. Tree hazards and conditions do change over time, and the evaluation period for this report is valid for the day on which it was performed only. Trees should always be re-assessed if changes are noted, or after any major weather events. Recommendations are to serve only as a guideline for the retention and protection of the tree(s), and are made according to commonly accepted arboricultural practices, and do not guarantee the survival and/or safety of the specimen(s). The path also has the smallest change in altitude from north to south in that part of the city. If the city is serious about converting car drivers/passengers to urban cyclists, paving this route from end to end will help walk the talk. I often ride the old railway line in Richmond to get to Steveston, and it's fully paved from where I join it at Westminster Highway right to Moncton. Did Richmond council experiment with different materials before finally settling on asphalt? I somehow don't think so.
						I can see two parties that would prefer that the route not be paved. The first, joggers, might appreciate a more giving surface. Except jogging isn't usually an alternative form of transportation. Did the city purchase the track just to provide another recreation site? And then, there are the residents between W. 33rd and W. 37th who no doubt are the most vocal opponents to paving the lane. Would they prefer that the city didn't purchase the route, and have CP restore the train service? I once lived 3 houses away from the active line, and remember the noise and the shaking. I'd say having to put up with the much quieter cyclists is a reasonable trade-off.

I am unable to attend the open houses regarding the temporary Arbutus greenway, but was hoping to have my opinions heard.

I do suggest that asphalt be placed in the greenway. My reasoning follows. First, the pros of asphalt are numerous:

- -More accessible to wheelchairs / walkers (small wheels) / individuals with unsteady ambulation (smooth vs uneven surface) as compared to crushed stone or soil.
- -Less dusty/dirty as compared to stone/soil/gravel
- -Dividing lines can be painted on asphalt with minimal cost in order to divide the path into halves, separating traffic moving in opposite directions
- -Minimal cost

The cons of asphalt include less aesthetically pleasing than asphalt or soil. My rebuttal to this is that the aesthetics of any green space are dictated by the surrounding greenery / trees far more than they are by the path. We should focus on the former, not the latter.

As a tax-paying Vancouver resident I would like to go on record that I fully support the paying of the entire arbutus-green-way. My living room window actually directly overlooks the arbutus-greenway at 46th and East Boulevard so I'm someone who will be significantly impacted on many levels.

I have lived on the west side since the 1980's and have been eagerly envisioning the green-way for years. When I finally heard that the city had purchased this property as a legacy for all residents. I was ecstatic and have been waiting (not so patiently) for the removal of the ties and paving. I am both a recreational cyclist and runner and eagerly look forward to using the path daily. Finally a safer green alternative to running, walking and cycling on the streets.

Recently however, I noticed that the paving seemed somewhat delayed. Then I heard that a very small group of vocal people are opposed to the full paving. This is absolutely not acceptable.

This very expensive property purchased as a legacy for the city of Vancouver MUST be made <u>fully</u> accessible to all residents ranging from cyclists to runners and walkers to those in wheelchairs or pushing a baby stroller. The City of Vancouver must surely already have accessibility policies that would apply. If the path is not fully paved portions of it will be sterilized for a few who want it to be retained as "park-like" or "country lane" for their own benefit. Nimbyism at its best.

This past weekend I took my bike and explored the path heading north through Kerrisdale down from 37th to where the paving starts at 33rd to 16th Ave. I could not ride most of the gravel path on my hybrid bike (a mountain style bike with thinner tires and very commonly used on city streets for commuting) and almost wiped out When I reached the paved portion it was truly amazing and I was very excited to see it already being enthusiastically used by runners/walkers/families/cyclists. In contrast few people were using the gravelled portions and of course almost no one uses the portion outside my house along East Boulevard that is still sadly in very rough shape.

Mr. Dobrovolny, I understand that you have personally met with a vocal minority who are opposed to the green-way being fully paved. Unfortunately I am not retired and not easily available during a work day. I do however look very forward to attending as many of the public consultation sessions in September (and onwards) as possible in order to ensure an alternative voice is heard. To make sure that you hear from everyone I am assuming that these sessions will be held in the evenings. I have already signed up for your list serve and been advised by your (very polite and extremely helpful) arbutus-greenway office that I will be kept apprised of any meetings. I will check back with them shortly on dates.

Short reply- we should pave it with asphalt for the following reasons:

1. It's safer for every user. There's no guesswork of where to put your wheels, you can see if there is glass on the surface and provides a smooth surface for all users.

- 2. It's quieter- for vast portions of the route, there is almost no traffic on neighboring streets, a paved path makes for quiet place to listen for birds with the added benefit that you don't have to raise your voice to talk to a friend while walking.
- 3. EVERY user can equality use the route- Gravel or any other non-paved surface just doesn't work for Rollerbladers or skateboarders.
- 4. A paved path is universal in what it means- it almost guarantees accessibility provided there is access from the sidewalk network, a Gravel or non-paved path can be accessible, but that can quickly mean many things- for instance a lot of trails in Pacific Spirit Park are Gravel and are advertised as being accessible, but they aren't really.
- 5. In any event it's CRAZY that the route hasn't been extended from 41st to 70th yet. Marpole would love to use this route.

I wish I could attend the in person consultations, but unfortunately all of them are scheduled during prior work and volunteering commitments in the area. For the record, I live in Marpole and would use this route every day to commute downtown if it was paved, because the route has significantly less elevation gain than the closest north/south bike route- 20 metres worth!




When considering tipping material for the arbutus greenway consider that crushed gravel will allow pooling and puddles that will block many people from using it.


