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A. GENERAL

This Operational Plan is to be used as a template by the Operational Planning Unit to allow for consistent Operational Plans relevant to large or disruptive protests associated with or during the 2010 Olympics.

In the lead up to 2010, we have seen a diverse protest environment from small minor protests to larger Anti-Olympic Protests that have involved arrests for Assault, Mischief, and Assaulting a Police Officer. These protests have taken place almost since the initial designation of Vancouver as a Host City.

The purpose of this Operational Plan is to address those protests that may occur that could turn violent, are criminal in nature, or are in breach of a court injunction and may involve arrests of significant numbers of people.

The Heart Attack March is organized by the Olympic Resistance Network and other groups to try to block traffic on the first day of the Olympics.¹⁵⁽¹⁾

As preparations began for the 2010 Olympics there were considerable protests at most events related to the games. Throughout the lead up to the games a theme emerged known as “Convergence” or “Convergence 2010” in the Anti-Olympic activist/anarchist community. In more recent events such as the opening of the 2009 World and Police Fire Games, police have observed the presence of banners and graffiti saying simply “Riot 2010.”

While there have been incidents of violence and property crime at various Anti-2010 protests the number of arrests has yet to be considered beyond the capabilities of the Police officers present.

As in most international events, the 2010 Olympics promises a platform for protest and it is expected that there will be far larger protests during games time than what the police have observed to date.¹⁵⁽¹⁾

The Vancouver Police Department is ¹⁵⁽¹⁾ people to attend this march. This will be a similar group to the January 22 Anti-Police repression March that went from the Downtown Eastside to Thornton Park. At the

conclusion of that march, someone gave a speech asking for people to come out to the Heart Attack March on February 13th. The ultimate goal of the protest is to clog the streets of Vancouver and disrupt the first full day of the Olympics.

D. OBJECTIVES

The objectives will be:

- To provide an environment conducive to lawful protest;
- To provide a visible police presence in the area in the area of significant protests;
- To protect lives and reduce potential for injuries to the public and our members;
- To expedite the movement of pedestrians and vehicles in a safe manner ;
- To maintain the public peace, and restore the public peace as expeditiously as possible should it be lost to violence or criminal activity;
- To protect property.

E. ENFORCEMENT POLICY

While we are committed to providing an environment conducive to lawful protest, the Vancouver Police Department will not accommodate persons who intend to engage in criminal activities. This would include occupation of businesses for the purpose of disruption or the blockading of roadways beyond a march.

Enforcement action will be directed to all Criminal Code, Motor Vehicle Act, Liquor Act, and City Bylaw offences. It is not the intention of the Department to unnecessarily hinder the movements of any law-abiding person.

Throughout a Protest that has turned or has the potential to turn unlawful due to criminality, the Public Order Commander and Incident Commander must continually communicate and formulate tactical plans that designate courses of action to be taken. The Public Order Commander and Incident Commander must decide if the ultimate goal is dispersal of the unlawful assembly or the arrest and subsequent prosecution of offenders. While dispersal at an early phase may be desirable, the prosecution of criminal acts may have a longer lasting benefit and act as a deterrent to others who may consider criminal direct action as a feasible alternative.

G. COV OPERATIONS CENTRE ACTIVATION –

The City of Vancouver Operations Centre (VOC) will be activated during the 2010 Olympics. The Vancouver Police Department will have a liaison officer at the VOC during the activation.

H. DEPARTMENT OPERATIONS CENTRE – VPD Command Structure

The VPD Department Operations Centre (DOC) will be activated and operational during the 2010 Olympics on a 24/7 basis. The VPD Public Order Commander will remain in the DOC and maintain the command of public order events from this location. ¹⁵⁽¹⁾ [REDACTED] ¹⁵⁽¹⁾ [REDACTED]

The Public Order Commander will decide whether or not to immediately escalate the Police response. The first consideration given must be to calling out resources that will be in the City of Vancouver during the 2010 Olympics. These include enhanced VPD resources that are assigned to the 2010 Olympics. If the Public Order Commander requires access to resources maintained by the Vancouver Integrated Security Unit (VISU) they may be requested via Silver Command at the Vancouver Area Command at ISU Headquarters in Richmond, BC. The Public Order Commander will further decide the need to activate Patrol Response Squads or to initiate a Department wide fan-out. If a Department wide fan-out is to be initiated the Public Order Commander will have the Chief Constable or his designate notified.

The Public Order Commander, in consultation with Operational Planning Unit Coordinators and/or the Field NCO(s) will further assess the situation. If it appears likely there is a need to escalate the response to a level beyond the Departments capability, the Public Order Commander will immediately notify the COV Operations Centre and callout necessary personnel to respond.

The Public Order Commander will remain responsible for the deployment of assigned personnel as well as additional called-out members and will ensure that these resources are deployed as required.

If a Department wide fanout is required refer to the Regulations and Procedure manual for the procedure to follow.

In the event that a large protest occurs that leads to police action due to criminality the ranking officer on scene shall become the Incident Commander. It is anticipated that this may be the relevant Crowd Control Unit (CCU) Commander for larger events but it could by necessity be an Operations Division NCO or an NCO specifically assigned

to be present at an event. The Incident Commander is ultimately responsible to and takes direction from the Public Order Commander.

N. FILE SUPPORT

In the event that a mass arrest is anticipated or there is likelihood that evidence will require collection or some follow up investigation will become necessary, it is imperative that the Public Order Commander or Incident Commander establish a File Support Team.

This team will be responsible for the initial processing of prisoners and capturing of personal identifiers that will allow for the input of the arrestees or other subjects into PRIME. This team will also conduct the investigation; complete the corresponding General Occurrence Report and complete any other investigative tasks designated to them by the Public Order Commander or Incident Commander.

The Public Order Commander can activate the use of investigators to form the file support team through the DCC.

O. ARREST TEAMS

The Incident Commander may require the services of one or several arrest teams to conduct a mass arrest. The Incident Commander shall determine if they have enough resources to adequately staff arrest teams with the members on scene. Considering that CCU will be the initial resources tasked with a large disturbance, they will arrest

the parties using the tactics they have trained for. The arrest teams will be handed the arrestees by a CCU member for removal and processing.

The Incident Commander should establish arrest teams in suitable numbers to the task at hand. Despite the fluid nature of these incidents the following is a suggested deployment for arrest teams that the Incident Commander can use as a guide:

If the Incident Commander requires more resources than they have available at the scene or at any functioning staging areas, the request for more resources is made through the Public Order Commander at the DOC.

**In the event of Mass Arrests, the Vancouver ISU has purchased two digital cameras and accompanying photo printers for the use of the VISU wagons within the City of Vancouver. When available, this equipment will be used by members at the scene and the wagon driver will ensure that a photo of each arrestee accompanies the Jail form and is provided to jail staff to ensure ease of processing. This process is in effect for the 2010 Olympic Period and members are encouraged to provide feedback on the ease of use of this system to the Sergeant i/c of the Operational Planning Section as the Vancouver Police Department considers use of the cameras post-Olympics.

Following an anti Olympics protest in downtown Vancouver during which windows were broken, buses and buildings spray painted (graffiti) and post boxes and garbage cans overturned, a number of the protesters were arrested by the members of the Vancouver Police. The 4 accused named in this report were apprehended for "Breach of the Peace" and they were transported to Vancouver Jail. Some others arrestees were charged with more substantive offences such as assault, possession of a dangerous weapon and carrying a concealed weapon.

The following excerpt was authored by Constable Gough in relation to VPD file number ~~22(3)(b)~~. Constable Gough has excellent background knowledge about today's incident.

***** BACKGROUND OF EVENTS

The 2010 Olympic Winter Games have attracted enormous attention to Vancouver. There have, however, been many people who are passionately against the games including but not limited to those who call themselves "The Olympic Resistance Movement". This movement has openly called for any and all who wish to resist the Olympics by "by whatever means necessary" according to published broadcasts.

On 10-02-13 at about 0830 hours a group of protesters started collecting in Thorton Park, Northeast corner of Main St and Terminal Avenue. The event had been promoted through flyers posted around and was dubbed 'heart attack'. It was designed to be a 'divide (the police) and conquer' demonstration and would play out as such.

The crowd started to move about 0900 hours and from the beginning was clearly not a normal (peaceful) protest which PC 1918 GOUGH has seen so many times before. The front of the crowd were all masked and several others who were not were old faces from the APC. PC 1918 GOUGH and the other bicycle police officers were tasked with escorting the group (which was a mob, by definition) through the streets on whatever route they took. The group went north towards E Hastings street and the Vancouver Police Station. While en route, a couple of newspaper boxes were pushed over and dragged into the street. The group did not stay to the usual two lanes of traffic, but instead took over all lanes and the sidewalk too; several of them would link arms to prevent police officers from getting past them on the sidewalk.

Amongst the group were "legal observers" as there had been the day before, who were of course not observing the illegality of those they walked with, but noting police officer badge numbers, video taping officers and so forth.

The group changed direction near the police station and went west down E Hastings street all the way to Cambie Street. It was there that the damage started happening. There was a public transit bus which was spray painted on two sides with an "A" with a circle around it (anarchy). Two garbage cans were overturned and left in the street, a private truck was spray painted and newspaper boxes were overturned. Such was the case along the whole route which turned west from Cambie to E Pender, then left on Richards (where a large dumpster was overturned in the street), then right on Georgia Street.

Growing more unruly and violent as they progress, damaging everything they could along the way including pushing a news reporter and apparently threatening him with a hammer, the protest mob approached the Hudson Bay at

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Georgia and Seymour Street. PC 1918 GOUGH commented that the Hudson Bay is a sponsor of the Olympics and believed it would be a target. This prediction soon came true when protesters hit the windows (at least three large ones were damaged) with rocks, organic material, and hard objects (possibly rocks). Several of the mob also stole a 12 foot ladder from a nearby site and carried into the crowd for reasons unknown at the time.

The mob progressed down W Georgia Street while police resources were mustered. The mob progressed eight blocks down the street from W Georgia and Granville St, where they were the most violent (on the window at the Bay), to where Pender and Cordova intersect with W Georgia Street. At this intersection Crowd Control Unit (CCU) police officers from both the Vancouver Police and Royal Canadian Mounted Police formed a line and held the march from proceeding; the mob had clearly demonstrated long ago that they were not engaged in a lawful assembly.

Synopsis/ Occurrence Report

On 10-02-13 at approximately 1100 hrs., I was wearing full police uniform and driving an unmarked police vehicle in company of PSD Ace. I was following an anti-Olympic protesters that had turned violent, with the protesters starting to smash windows, paint buses, throw mail boxes and smith-rites into the middle of the street and damage parked vehicles.

Our CCU units had stopped the protesters at W.Georgia and Cardero. Some of the protesters got into confrontations with CCU units in the intersection. Four or five police bike handlers had made an arrest in the intersection and were starting to walk their prisoner towards a wagon locates just east of the intersection on W.Georgia..I observed 2 females trying to get passed PC 1502 Rutter in an attempt to interfere with the arresting bike handlers movement with their prisoner.

EVIDENCE OF PC 1502 RUTTER:

On January 13, 2010 at approximately 1100 hrs, the u/s was working in uniform and driving an unmarked police SUV. The u/s was deployed in a support role for police members that were monitoring a demonstration. that was travelling from Main and Terminal towards Stanley Park. During the course of the demonstration, the protester continued to escalate their aggressive and destructive behaviour. The protester were knocking over mail boxes, throwing mailboxes into the middle of the street, spray painting cars and buses, tipping over dumpsters, kicking parked vehicles, smashing windows and assaulting members of the public.

The protesters came to a halt at W.Georgia and Cardero. The CCU units were deployed into the intersection and had made arrests with a number of violent protesters. The u/s was deployed in a support role to help members to hold the intersection. The duties were to guard the CCU and prevent any further criminal acts by the protester. It was at this time that the u/s observed two females that were pushing against CCU members on the southwest corner of the intersection. The two females were dressed in paper suits and pushing directly against the CCU members, in an attempt to try and force their way back into the intersection. The u/s had no involvement with the two females at this point.

Several minutes later, the CCU units made an arrest of a protester on the north side of the intersection. The protester was being escorted towards the police wagon which was parked near the southeast corner of the intersection.

I took custody of [redacted] and [redacted] at this location. [redacted] attempted to kick me but the contact was minor. I photographed [redacted] and [redacted] at this time. [redacted]

At the request of Insp. NELMES we relocated the wagon further out of the area. At this point, I took custody of 3 individuals from the District 2 wagon driver, PC 2612 WEEKS. I [redacted]

I then re-located to Jervis St. between Robson and Cardero St. Here I took custody of [redacted]. I then transported all 7 individuals to the Vancouver Jail. I then photographed the personal effects of [redacted] and [redacted]

I printed hardcopies of these photographs which I turned over to investigators at the Jail. I downloaded copies of all photographs taken [redacted] and advised Det. Jim HAMADE of their presence on my investigative directory on the M-Drive for followup investigators.

This concludes my involvement in this incident.
