SUBJECT: 2018 Report of Activities

#### **PURPOSE**

To provide Vancouver City Council with a report on the activities of the Vancouver City Planning Commission for 2018.

#### **BACKGROUND**

The Vancouver City Planning Commission (the Commission) was established by Council under <u>By-Law No. 5064</u> to assist Council in an advisory capacity by considering and submitting reports to City Council on matters relating to the planning and development of the City, including:

- (a) representing ideas and opinions about the future of the city, as citizens of the City of Vancouver, and
- (b) considering and reporting to Council on any proposal likely to have a significant effect on the future of the City.

#### **SUMMARY**

During 2018, the Vancouver City Planning Commission (VCPC) carried out its work plan comprising dialogues and public events on themes relevant to the future of the city, and engaged on selected current planning topics and initiatives.

Under part A of our mandate, the VCPC hosted (or co-hosted) public events on milestones in Vancouver's planning and development (Chronology Project) and a series of events culminating in a full day Summit on a "City for All" exploring how we can better plan for a more resilient city and more sustainable communities based on reconciliation, meaningful



inclusiveness and equity. The VCPC also hosted a roundtable with other advisory bodies on parking issues.

Under part B of our mandate, the VCPC provided input to Council on current planning initiatives, with particular attention focused on the VanPlay planning process, the future of Langara Golf Course, the Heather Street lands development, and the Regulation Redesign process.

### **EVENTS, DIALOGUES AND PROJECTS**

The Vancouver City Planning Commission (VCPC) worked with a number of community partners on several events and projects designed to foster informed dialogue on themes important to the future of the city.

## A. Chronology of Vancouver Planning and Development Milestones

B. The VCPC convened *Milestones 2017*, our third annual 'year-in-review' forum on February 5, 2018 at the SFU Goldcorp Centre for the Arts, hosted in partnership with SFU's Vancity Office of Community Engagement. Panel members were Paul Kershaw, UBC professor and founder of Generation Squeeze; Melody Ma, Chinatown organizer and activist; Gordon Price, former city councillor and director of the SFU City Program; and Ouri Scott, award-winning Tlicho Dene architect specializing in indigenous design and sustainable infrastructure. Sandra Singh, then the Chief Librarian of the Vancouver Public Library, moderated the discussion. The list of potential 2017 milestones was previously reviewed at a workshop on November 16, 2017 attended by leading architects, urban planners, developers, city historians, journalists and academics.

Following the panel, the Chronology Committee identified a list of fourteen emerging milestones of 2017 based on the perspectives shared in a public survey, the workshop and during the panel. The public profile of the online chronology continues to increase. The 2017 emerging milestones have been reposted on blog posts and sparked a number of tweets and Facebook posts.

#### C. A City for All Summit

On December 4, 2018, Vancouver City Planning Commission (VCPC), hosted its second day-long summit on the theme of "A City for All" exploring how we can better plan for a more resilient city and more sustainable communities based on reconciliation, meaningful inclusiveness and equity. The summit aimed to encourage dialogue among thought leaders, experts and influencers from the public, private, non-profit, community, and academic sectors. It was financially sponsored by the Vancouver Foundation, the City of Vancouver, MODUS Planning Design & Engagement, WSP, Real Estate Foundation of BC, and Jorden Cook Associates.

The Summit agenda and participation list had been designed with the involvement of many of the City's Advisory Committees under the leadership of a steering committee, of which half of the members were from the community and half from VCPC. The Summit was oversubscribed and successfully engaged participants who identified as indigenous, black, people of colour, or LGBTQ+2, as well as women, seniors and youth. A report/workbook on the proceedings will be circulated in the spring of 2019.

### **CURRENT INITIATIVES AND TOPICS**

In addition to considering items on Council's agenda and current planning initiatives, Commissioners also participated actively in discussion of urban issues relevant to the future of the city.

#### A. Research and Comment

# i. VanPlay Deep Dive

The VCPC submitted a memorandum to Mayor and Council and the Vancouver Board of Parks and Recreation on the outcomes of a <u>VanPlay Deep Dive</u> conducted for Commissioners. With the importance of changing demographics on the future planning of the city, Planning Commissioners focused on the subject area 'Programs and services for changing demographics'. The three values that were agreed upon as guiding planning and needs for parks and facilities are: equity and inclusion; accessibility; and empowerment. Each of these was outlined in the memo.

#### ii. Future of Langara Golf Course

The VCPC submitted a memorandum to Mayor and Council and the Vancouver Board of Parks and Recreation on the <a href="Future of Langara Golf Course">Future of Langara Golf Course</a>. Commissioners believe that Langara Golf Course plays an important civic and community role as a centrally located green space in the City of Vancouver. As such, Planning Commissioners feel that the future of the golf course will have a significant impact on the future of Vancouver more generally, particularly with regard to planning for parks and other public green and open spaces. The memo requested that the VPCC be kept informed through regular updates at Commission meetings by our Council and Park Board liaison.

# iii. Heather Streets Land Development

The VCPC submitted a memorandum to Mayor and Council regarding the <a href="Heather Streets Land Development">Heather Streets Land Development</a>. The memo notes our desire to be part of the deliberations as the City moves into the next stage in its unprecedented approach to planning for a parcel of land in Vancouver with citywide significance. Three aspects of the Heather Lands Policy Statement are of particular interest to VCPC: (i) integration of Indigenous reconciliation into the City's planning process; (ii) the development of a City policy on privately-owned publicly accessible space; and, (iii) integrating a new community within an established neighborhood, specifically construction of a sizeable development with a variety of building forms ranging from townhouses to towers and a new commercial district in the midst of a long-established single-family neighborhood.

# iv. Regulation Redesign Input and Feedback

The VCPC submitted a memorandum to the General Manager, Planning, Urban Design, and Sustainability and Mayor and Council on the <u>Regulation Redesign Review</u> process. The memo outlines Planning Commissioner's support of key objectives, highlights key principles to uphold, and outlines future considerations. The VCPC looks forward to further opportunities to provide input as this initiative proceeds, specifically on the role and position of VCPC within the context of the review.

# **B.** Engagement in City Processes

# i. Other Advisory Bodies

VCPC representatives participated in the following on-going processes: the Urban Design Panel, and the Transportation 2040 Stakeholders Advisory Group. The perspective of the VCPC were communicated by the Commissioners and relevant new concerns and issues brought back from the advisory committees.
