- Use an uncluttered background that is not brighter than the Councillor in view
- · Ensure the lens is focused
- Keep your video message to 5 seconds. Videos that are longer may be edited down for timing purposes.
- Record message in landscape orientation

One liner's for Councillors: (Please ask your Council Assistant to avoid duplication – we would like the 3 highlighted suggestions to be included amongst the messages. Thank you.)

- 1. We must all commit to lifelong learning about Reconciliation and the profound ways Indigenous residents have shaped Vancouver's rich culture and vibrant communities.
- 2. We have a responsibility to examine our role of occupying these lands, and we recognize we're on a long journey to repair and make right our relations with Indigenous nations and peoples.
- 3. We strive to be a City of Reconciliation, creating long-term, systemic change and new relations based on mutual understanding and respect.
- 4. I am grateful to all Indigenous Peoples for their vital contributions to advancing arts, culture, equity, safety and community wellbeing throughout Vancouver.
- 5. We are committed to truth-telling and lasting Reconciliation with Indigenous peoples and the prevention of racism, violence and discrimination
- 6. Every child matters.
- 7. Residential schools should have never happened. They were racist, violent, and caused ongoing intergenerational trauma.
- 8. We are committed to advancing 27 of the 94 Truth and Reconciliation calls to action identified as actionable by the City of Vancouver
- 9. Our commitments to Reconciliation are ongoing, evolving, and essential to our path forward.

- 10. We are deeply grateful to the Musqueam, Squamish, and Tsleil-Waututh Nations, who have stewarded these lands and waterways since time immemorial.
- 11. We are committed to developing strong relationships with diverse urban Indigenous communities in Vancouver.
- 12. Reconciliation is critical to reducing the recurring impacts of colonization on Indigenous communities, and we acknowledge we have a long way to go to achieve appropriate Reconciliation
- 13. Thank you to all Indigenous staff at the City of Vancouver for the invaluable work they do every day.
- 14. Today is Orange Shirt Day, created by Phyllis Webstad, and I wear an orange shirt to honour the children who survived the Indian Residential Schools and to remember those who didn't.
