# Purpose of this memo

This memo highlights the monthly Labour Force Survey (LFS) data published by Statistics Canada released on December 4<sup>th</sup>, 2020 for the reference period of November 8th to November 14th. The LFS provides estimates for the unemployment rate and employment totals by industry and occupation on a monthly basis. The information presented in this memo provides a snapshot of the impact COVID-19 has had on Vancouver's labour force and economy in the period of time since the Pandemic began. Staff in Planning, Urban Design and Sustainability will provide an updated monthly memo as new data is released. This information is meant to be viewed in conjunction with other socio-economic and community statistics to form a cohesive



picture of the City's current state and assist with recovery and resilience planning. This information will be posted to the City website and shared with the business community.


#### Important notes about the data


The statistics presented in this memo are for the Metro Vancouver region as the Census Metropolitan Area (CMA) is the smallest geography level available for LFS data tables published by Statistics Canada. LFS data for the city of Vancouver proper is not available. Throughout this memo, the term "Vancouver" refers to the Vancouver CMA. The LFS data used to create the statistics presented in this report are not seasonally adjusted<sup>1</sup>.

#### Changes in employment totals and unemployment rate

Employment in Vancouver increased from 1,413,600 in October to 1,431,300 in November for a gain of 17,700 (1.3%) jobs. Since October, the unemployment rate decreased by -0.2 percentage points to 7.3% in Metro Vancouver. In November, the region had -30,100 (-2.1%) less employed workers than in February 2020. This is a significant improvement in job losses, which peaked in April where a total loss of 251,200 (-17.2%) employed workers was recorded since February. Nationally, the unemployment rate decreased by 0.4 percentage points between October and November and is now 8.5%.

The overall increase in employed workers from May to November reflects the gradual easing of public health restrictions and other measures, including allowing non-essential businesses to reopen. A number of major orders related to the COVID-19 pandemic issued by various levels of government were active during this reference week (November 8th to November 14th). Please see Figure 7 for a full list of announcements and orders made since the previous reference period. Appendix A shows all prior announcements and orders starting on March 12, 2020. The next labour force survey release will be on January 8, 2021 (for the reference week of December 13, 2020 to December 19, 2020).







Changes in employment totals and unemployment rate – three-month moving average The following sections highlight statistics related to employment change by industry and occupation that are published as a three-month moving average for the Vancouver CMA;

therefore, data published for November is an average of September, October and November. Using this three-month moving average data, employment in November was 1,400,300 and the unemployment rate was 7.9%. The following chart shows the monthly change of employment and the unemployment rate using three-month moving average employment data.


Figure 2 – Unemployment rate and total employment change in Metro Vancouver, three-month moving average



### Industry overview

Employment in construction experienced the largest month to month loss over the three-month moving average in Metro Vancouver, declining by 4,800 workers (-4.6%). The second largest sector employment decline was in the utilities sector, which lost 1,600 workers (-11.6%). The third largest employment loss was in agriculture, which declined by 900 jobs (-17.0%). Between October and November, employment in the educational services sector grew by 11,600 people, an increase of 12.4% to its workforce. The second most gains were seen in the information, culture and recreation sector, which increased by 7,300 workers (+10.2%). Finance, insurance, real estate, rental and leasing grew by 5,300 workers (+4.8%) over the three-month moving average.



# **Occupation overview**

Occupation employment data for the Vancouver CMA is published as a three-month moving average; therefore, data published for November is an average of September, October and November. Employment in health occupations experienced the largest month to month loss in Metro Vancouver, declining by 4,800 jobs (-4.6%) between October and November. The second largest decline was occupations in art, culture, recreation and sport, which lost 3,400 workers (-5.5%). The third largest employment losses were in occupations in manufacturing and utilities, which declined by 400 jobs (-0.9%). Between October and November, employment in sales and service occupations had the largest gains with an additional 16,000 workers (+5.0%). The second largest gains were in occupations, law and social, community and government services, which experienced an increase of 13,200 jobs (+9.7%). Natural and applied sciences occupations grew the third most, with an increase of 10,200 (+6.6%) new workers.




# Figure 4 – Employment change by occupations in Metro Vancouver, October to November

The largest decrease in employment by detailed occupations was for technical occupations in art, culture, recreation and sport workers, which lost 4,200 (-9.9%) workers since the previous month. Other occupations with significant employment losses include:

- Professional occupations in nursing (-3,000; -15.0%)
- Professional occupations in business and finance (-2,800; -2.8%)
- Sales representatives and salespersons wholesale and retail trade (-2,200; -3.7%)
- Professional occupations in health (-2,200; -6.8%)

# Figure 5 – Most employment loses by detailed occupation, October to November



The largest increase in employment by detailed occupations was for retail sales supervisors and specialized sales occupations, which increased by 7,200 (+15.7%) workers since the previous month. Other occupations with employment gains from August to October include:

- Professional occupations in natural and applied sciences (+6,900; +7.1%)
- Professional occupations in education services (+5,700; +13.3%)
- Paraprofessional occupations in legal, social, community and education services (+4,700; +14.5%)
- Service supervisors and specialized service occupations (+4,100; +8.2%)
