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



Dear Ms Sarah Kirby-Young,

I am writing to respectfully ask that you consider the proposal of ending the beluga whale exhibit at the Vancouver Aquarium. I am sure you are aware that beluga whales in captivity have half the average life expectancy of the same species in the wild and the Aquarium having lost two in two weeks just highlights how badly they do in captivity, even with the best intentions and best veterinary care.

I understand that you have suggested opening this decision up to the public of Vancouver and I think that this is strong, conscientious decision. However, I also understand that as the vote might not happen until 2018 the aquarium may well ship in beluga whales currently out on loan and build a new exhibit before it is held and therefore undermine you and the democratic vote. Whilst the beluga whale exhibit is empty and the new one not yet built it seems to me to be the perfect time to hold the vote, would you consider bringing it forward to 2017? That way no whales have to be packed into enclosed boxes and shipped across country only to suffer being shipped back if the vote closes the exhibit. It would also mean that the aquarium doesn't spend money on a new enclosure only to have it empty a few months later, losing them their investment.

To the Members of the Park Board,

I am deeply disappointed in the Park Board's decision to amend the bylaw that allows cetaceans to be displayed at the Vancouver Aquarium.

# Leaders of the City of Vancouver have missed a chance to set themselves apart by supporting the kind of aquarium and research facility that should be the model worldwide. Supporting the operation of an ethically managed aquarium and research centre could be part of the same category of kudos as supporting the goal of being the world's greenest city. Instead, you've missed the mark entirely.

Yes, far too many aquariums have earned the reputation of cruelty to animals and abusive practices of capture and horrific constraint. Yes, too many corporatelymotivated aquariums prioritize maximizing entertainment dollars over the caring well for the creatures in their care. But the Vancouver Aquarium is not one of them.

The City of Vancouver could have come alongside and supported the rescue, research, and education priorities of a model institution. Who did due diligence in the lead-up to this decision? Did anyone actually go to the aquarium and take 30 seconds to see beyond ingrained, politically-popular stereotypes? Everything about the Vancouver Aquarium's public presentation is about education. No animals are captured for display. I've met many of the researchers and the local students and volunteers they've mentored in the hard, hard, hard work of conservation and species protection. Countless students and visitors have been inspired to take critically-necessary action in the work of conservation because of the Vancouver Aquarium. The March 9th decision puts all that at risk.

To All Vancouver Park Board Commissioners:

As a taxpayer, voter and long time Vancouverite, I am extremely disappointed with Vancouver Park's Board's (VPB) recent decision to ban cetaceans in captivity at Vancouver Aquarium. t is a bias, short sighted political decision that lacks clarity, sound judgement and it reflects very poor understanding of Vancouver Aquarium's vision, mission and values. I am particularly disturbed by Sarah Kirby-Yung's statement that 'banning cetaceans at the Aquarium was the will of Vancouver Aquarium's total disregard for the commitment and opinion of 76,000 members of the Vancouver Aquarium and over 1,000 current Vancouver Aquarium volunteers; many of us are voters and taxpayers of Vancouver. The VPB's decision perverse our believes, commitment and devalue the effort of the volunteers of Vancouver Aquarium. As an educated Vancouverite, I am really embarrassed by the arrogance of VPB's commissioners of ignoring all the professional (and evidence based) opinion of many experts in the world who had expressed their support for the Vancouver Aquarium.

What is VPB's definition of 'humane'? Why does the VPB not address the issues of rescues, rehabilitation and research done at the Vancouver Aquarium? Is the VPB endorsing the practice of euthanasia for marine mammals? Where does VPB propose to send injured/sick/abandoned marine mammals to, if Vancouver Aquarium is not allowed to care for them? A current example of our rescue effort is Chester, the False Killer Whale; I was one of the animal observers at the Marine Mammal Rescue Center (MMR) who witnessed first hand, the plight of Chester when he first arrived; to this day, I am totally convinced that if it was not for the care he received from all the staff and volunteers at the MMR, he would have died a very very painful and lonely death. After a lengthy rehabilitation and observing how Chester reacts to human care, I fully agreed with the Department of Ocean and Fisheries decision that Chester is non-releasable because he will never survive out in the wild on his own. As I stated before, freedom with no life is no freedom at all for cetaceans like Chester.

Does VPB not consider how it's decision would (have major) impact on Vancouver Tourism? Last year, Vancouver Aquarium had over 1.2 million visitors; as a volunteer **5.22(1)**I have talked to many many visitors from all over the world and many of them were very appreciative of the belugas and other cetaceans we have in our care. A typical example was early this year, there was a couple from California, USA, who drove all the way up from LA, who wanted to show their friends, another couple with 3 young children, what real belugas look like. When I told the man that our belugas passed away late last year, he was very very disappointed. He told me he was in our aquarium last September and the only thing he could show the children that day was the photos he took on his iphone in September, 2016 !! Education is so important to ensure the future generation carry on the conservation efforts we practice at Vancouver Aquarium; a few photos on an iphone in no way makes as much an impression (and education) on the young as real living belugas. Does VPB not understand the global impact the on-going credible work Vancouver Aquarium does?

Our beautiful and one of the most livable city in the world needs Park's Board Commissioners with common sense, leadership, good listening skills and who have clear, unbias and global vision that can guide our innovative community into the next several decades. 

I'm writing to congratulate you for making the right decision regarding cetacean captivity and I encourage you to stay the course until all captives are freed to seaside sanctuaries -- no further whales or dolphins should suffer the torment of cruel captivity again.

Here are thoughts from leading marine biologists and animal advocates in the world:

"...For me, it's been my dream for decades to make it illegal to capture any whales and dolphins anywhere for any reason. We will do everything we can to assist the decision makers to pass this historical bill, AB2140 and to make sure this paves the way for the freedom of cetaceans all around the world.

Based on my personal experience with whales and dolphins in the wild and my observations of these magnificent animals in captivity, I believe there is no justification for allowing them to be used as performers in theme park shows and that breeding them in captivity to sustain a captive population solely for entertainment and profit is unacceptable. The concept of watching cetaceans perform tricks in theme parks is anti educational and is inhumane. These are animals that live in family pods for their whole lives with life spans similar to our own. Capturing whales and dolphins for entertainment and profit forces them to live in artificial families, in spaces that are insufficient, and rewards them with food for doing tricks they do not do in the wild.

Today, we have the interactive film and video technology to show cetaceans in the wild to audiences around the world. For the amount of money a family spends to go to an animal park, they can have an on the water experience seeing whales in their natural environment. It is long past due for us as a thinking and caring human species to adopt and require practices that respect whales and respect their right to live in their natural wild environment.

Anywhere on the planet we are connected to the ocean. We have the opportunity to do what needs to be done to protect our life support system and improve the quality of life not just of the marine environment – of the marine mammals -- but for ourselves. 



comparison to seeing a real creature, that virtual reality is not the same. Those reasons are why we need to think deeply about ending whale captivity at the Vancouver Aquarium.

I suggest that his statements belong with "Children need to mine coal in British coal mines because they are small and can reach the spots that adults can't." or "Belgian doctors in Belgian Congo (Rwanda) measure the heads of Africans and conclude that their brains are smaller." I suggest that his statements belong to the time when Man considered himself Master of Nature and the Universe.

If we are flying to the moon and beyond, we have the resources and creativity to make different choices now. We have the opportunity now to be part of the incredible Universe that surrounds us and treat everything with respect. We have the opportunity to move magnificent creatures of the water back to their water home instead of keeping them captive in a bathtub home.

When I was travelling in the U.S. in the 1970s, I visited a zoo in a city we were passing through. I still remember seeing a black panther pacing in his cage, clearly not happy to be where he was imprisoned. I felt so upset by this situation that I sent a Letter to the Editor for the local newspaper to protest this crime. I refused to go to a zoo again. I see the Aquarium as nothing more than a zoo of water creatures.

Several years ago, a neighbour treated me to a dinghy tour of Horseshoe Bay through the tour operator at Horseshoe Bay. The guide for our tour had been offering tours for about 10 years. Our tour was the first time that he saw orcas in the water in that area. We counted about four orcas in the water that day. There was delight and excitement from everyone in the dinghy as we watched these creatures playing close by. That is how to experience water animals, not enclosed in bathtubs for our amusement or so called learning. I suggest we learn nothing about how these creatures are because they can't be who or what they are in a bathtub.

Terry O'Reilly highlighted how Sea World has changed since "Blackfish". This company now is a partner in a real learning experience while leaving orcas and sea creatures where they belong. I suggest that is the route that the Vancouver Aquarium needs to take in 2017.

Injured whales and sea creatures need to be

treated and healed. There needs to be further discussion on how to get them back to their real water homes after recovery.

If Vancouver is to be considered a world class city, I suggest that having no whales in captivity is included in that designation in 2017.







To have these existing cetaceans removed from the only home they know, and put through the stress of a move, would be very cruel indeed. Not to mention the educational void this would leave at the

	facility. The future of the cetaceans already kept at the Aquarium must be considered thoroughly in any bylaws that are drafted. The Aquarium does amazing work with Marine Mammal Rescue, and provides a home for cetaceans that are deemed non- releasable. The fate of future rescued cetaceans must also be considered when bylaws are drafted. Regardless of the excellence of the medical care they receive, there will undoubtedly be situations where rescued cetaceans will not be releasable, and will require a home. Being under the care of the amazing staff of the Vancouver Aquarium is the best place for these non- releasable rescues to find themselves. Having non-releasable cetaceans on display is an important educational piece, which will become completely vacant from our province if the parks board decision does not make exception for these animals. Many people in our province will never get the opportunity to see whales and dolphins in their natural habitat- and it is impossible to understand and respect these creatures fully without seeing them in close proximity. Not having any cetaceans on display at the Aquarium would be a disservice to our province and the many visitors that come from abroad to see these creatures. In summary, I believe that the parks board decision was short-sighted, and that serious considerations need to be made in the drafting of bylaws in regards to the full ramifications of this decision.

Furthermore, maintaining healthy breeding populations of wild species in zoos and aquaria are essential to provide emergency back up populations to recover species in the wild. For example, I am involved in the captive breeding/reintroduction program for the Vancouver Island marmot. When their populations crashed in the 1990's due to clear cutting, the remaining animals were brought into captivity to set up a captive breeding/reintroduction program to increase numbers to sustainable levels. However it took several years to optimize captive conditions for consistent breeding to take place and we still have not perfected it. We have lost valuable genetic diversity in the species because we did not already have a successfully breeding captive population when their wild populations crashed beyond natural recovery. Another example is the vaguita, a cetacean. This is the most endangered mammal species in the world and with fewer than 30 individuals left captive breeding is their only hope of avoiding extinction. Yet, like the marmot, they have not been housed in captivity before, largely due to push back from willfully ignorant animal rights activists, so we have no idea if we can do it successfully. If we already had a successful captive breeding program for the vaquita the outlook for avoiding extinction would be much more positive. As it stands, it is likely the vaguita will go extinct like the recently extinct baiji, another cetacean for whom we waited too long to set up a captive breeding population. That extinction will be placed directly on the doorstep of the misguided and uninformed people that voted to amend the regulations. We cannot guarantee the safety of wild populations of cetaceans from humancaused population declines and therefore it is imperative we provide safe-havens for breeding populations as a hedge against extinction. How dare the members of the board prevent dedicated conservationists like myself from saving cetaceans from extinction! You have no right to sentence a

I would like to express my concern for the cetaceans currently housed at the Vancouver Aquarium and what this new bylaw might entail for them.

These are animals that have been deemed non-releasable by the Department of Fisheries and Oceans Canada, meaning they would not be able to survive on their own in the ocean.

Having volunteered with the Vancouver Aquarium for the past three years, as a public educator, a fish husbandry volunteer,

and at their off-site rescue center, I feel privileged to be able to get to know the animals that reside there. To be able to see Chester, the two year old false killer whale learn to play with his food by watching Helen the pacific white-sided dolphin tempt the seagulls. To be able to see Daisy the harbor porpoise play around with guests who take out their cameras or see her face light up when she catches a glimpse of a wristwatch. And especially see the amazing bond that those three cetaceans have with their trainers. Spending the past three years with this aquarium has not only expanded my love for the ocean, but kindled a passion for ocean conservation, a mantra that resides at the very heart of all those who care for the animals.

These animals are ambassadors for their species. Daisy has helped in research dedicated to helping the critically endangered Vaquita porpoise, a close relative to her species and currently one of the most endangered species in the ocean with only thirty or so left. Before the passing of Quila and Aurora, the mother-daughter pair helped with groundbreaking research on classifying beluga calls and how calves learn calls from their mothers, contact calls.

With this, I am deeply saddened that if an exception to be able to house non-releasable cetaceans at the Vancouver Aquarium cannot be made, the lives of these amazing animals will be unjustly cut short. Long-term care facilities such as the Vancouver Aquarium are essential for helping animals that are deemed non-releasable live out their lives in comfort and with love, and for the animals in the ocean such as the Vaquita, through conservation research.



I moved to Vancouver a little over two years ago, and it was one of the best decisions I've ever made in my life. I fell in love with this beautiful city almost instantly, (after adjusting to the weather) and one of the big reasons for that was the level of importance this city places on being "green" and having parks everywhere. Its extremely refreshing to be able to find nature frequently in the middle of the city, and I love that.

I recently learned about your decision to stop the cetacean program at the Vancouver Aquarium. This is a terrible decision. To cease the important work they are doing will lead to negative consequences as far as conservation is concerned. We all know the world is changing rapidly, and the oceans are changing fastest of all, and if no one does the research to discover how the organisms

in the ocean are adapting, and how best to protect them, we will be looking at ourselves in 30 years lamenting the deaths of the world's last belugas, or polar bears, or narwhals, and our children will look at us, and say, "they had the opportunity to do something, but they didn't"

I understand the difficult situation you are put in. I too saw the movie "Blackfish" and to keep any creature in captivity is a tough call. Many animals, especially cetaceans are accustomed having extremely large ranges to roam. However, the uncomfortable truth is that we, as humans, have messed up, and as a result we have to resort to less than ideal measures to ensure many species do not go extinct. The best part about it, is that it works! There are a number of zoos and aquariums that contribute research by keeping animals in captivity to protect them from the dangers that humans pose, as well as the dangers that nature poses. There are a number of species that are no longer considered endangered now, like giant pandas and Siberian tigers, even grizzly bears are once again roaming the Rockys. I have no doubt they would be extinct today if it weren't for the research provided by zoos.

The Vancouver Aquarium is doing everything right as far as ethics are concerned, too. They only house cetaceans that were captured before 1996; cetaceans already being kept in a zoo or aquarium before 1996: cetaceans born in a zoo or aquarium: cetaceans that were rescued from the wild and rehabilitated. but deemed non-releasable. In short, they are only keeping cetaceans that would be sentenced to death if they were to be released back into the wild, and it will be their blood on your hands, plus the blood of numerous other animals in the wild who would've benefited from the research if you hold to this decision.

Quila and Aurora's deaths are definitely regrettable, but it was not from negligence. I'm not alone in suspecting foul play when it comes to that, especially considering the pools at the research facility were drained within days of that incident as well, and it would be a huge mistake



Instead, the aquarium was able to provide a home for them where they could be cared for and used to engage the public in ocean awareness.

It has been said that people help what they care about and care about what they see. Without the cetaceans at the aquarium, knowledge of the complex ocean environment will decline and the problems facing the continued survival of our coral reefs, shark, fish and cetacean populations will continue to increase.

Case in point; prior to the Vancouver Aquarium's first killer whale, Orcas were considered bloodthirsty killers and shot on sight. After people were able to see one up close in the aquarium, people were able to appreciate them and it spawned a whole industry of Orca whale watching.

Concerning the Continued Care of Cetaceans at the Vancouver Aquarium

Coquitlam, British Columbia May, 28, 2014

Honourable Parks Board Chairman and Commissioners:

I am writing you concerning the ongoing debate over the continued care of cetaceans at the Vancouver aquarium. As I am sure you are well aware this is a very complicated issue, and thus should be examined from all sides in order to avoid a hasty and ill thought out decision. This is a process I already understand you are undertaking.

Due to the complicated nature of this situation I implore you to make your decision based on rational facts rather than the emotional and at times misguided beliefs exhibited by both sides in this debate. A reasonable solution involves concessions from both those who wish to continue with the current status quo as well as those who wish for radical change in the Vancouver Aquarium's operations.

There is no denying that the Vancouver Aquarium is a cultural and scientific landmark in the city. The institution's ongoing efforts in the field of conservation have led to a number of key programs' creations, including Oceanwise and The Vancouver Aquarium Conservation Foundation. Nearly one million people make their way through the doors every year, a number that is significantly greater than the number of individuals that currently advocate for drastic change. Moreover, many of these visitors are not from Vancouver city proper but from around the rest of British Columbia and the world; a fact that suggests a vote on the issue with only Vancouver citizens having a voice in the institution's future would be inappropriate.

Keeping cetaceans in captivity is a contentious issue; however, there are a number of merits to the ongoing practice. As an educator I can personally attest to the fact that seeing something with one's own eyes is far more inspiring and mentally stimulating than simply viewing these creatures on a screen. What is more, due to economic or social hardship many of the students in the Metro Vancouver area will never have the opportunity to see many of these animals in the wild. Thus, the complete removal of these creatures from the aquarium

would represent a significant loss in the ability to inspire and educate future generations on the need conserve and care for our oceans. Additionally, many of the species kept in the aquarium were rescued and subsequently deemed unsuitable for release back into the wild by an independent body. In some cases, an example being Harbour Porpoise "Levi", ongoing research and investment led to successful future releases not possible in the past.

A number of protest groups have proposed a variety of "solutions" to the ongoing captivity of cetaceans, however, many of these do not take into account the a variety of difficult circumstances. For example, the wish to completely empty the tanks of cetaceans at the Vancouver aquarium is short sighted in a number of areas. Foremost, is the question of where these creatures will go should it be made illegal to hold them in public displays. An important one, as many of the cetaceans at the aquarium are either non releasable or born in captivity, therefore possessing neither the skills to survive nor any relationship to other whales in the wild. Shipping these creatures to another aquarium does nothing to truly rectify the situation, and though Vancouverites could tout that we are a "green" city in doing so, the fact would remain that we only passed on a "problem" to someone else. Housing cetaceans in another facility is also an impractical solution as the logistical problems and financial burden passed on to the aquarium would be incredible; this also at a time when revenue would certainly decrease with the removal of these creatures. Finally, keeping these creatures in sea pen sanctuaries is also often a proposal. Very little is known though about the environmental impact of a permanent sanctuary for these creatures. The marine ecosystem along the British Columbian coast is a delicate and complicated thing, and the ramifications of roping off an entire bay while denying access to wild specimens are completely unknown. This is not to say of the immense financial and logistical problems that also face the project; as a permanent establishment in a suitable location would be both costly in its operation and maintenance.

The second last radical solution often posed is to phase out cetaceans at the aquarium. This plan calls for the institution to no longer be allowed to replace animals once those already under the aquarium's care pass on. Once again a variety of issues are created with this policy. Foremost is the question of where rescued creatures deemed non releasable would be housed. As previously mentioned, passing these creatures on to other aquariums, housing them permanently in another facility, and keeping them in sea pens are all not viable solutions.

A complicated issue does not deserve a quick and emotional response and I applaud the board's decision to hear both sides of the argument before they rule on this matter. Should a cetacean breeding program continue at the aquarium? In my opinion no. On the other hand, should we disallow the ongoing rescue and care of animals that continue to provide scientific knowledge and inspiration to our province's youth? I believe that a recent emotional response largely brought about by a rather one sided and at times flawed documentary on the subject should not rob us of this.

On behalf of In Defense of Animals, an animal protection organization with over 250,000 supporters, we ask that you end all dolphin and whale captivity at the Vancouver Aquarium.

Earlier this year, the Vancouver Aquarium was featured on In Defense of Animals' Ten Worst Tanks list, earning the #9 spot for its abysmal track record of keeping cetaceans alive. Since 2005, three beluga whales have died within three years of being born. However, this fact does not prevent Vancouver Aquarium from continuing to breed the remaining five beluga whales it "owns." While Vancouver Aquarium operates as a nonprofit, it maintains prominent beluga-breeding partnerships with SeaWorld, a for-profit, commercial business, and Georgia Aquarium, a nonprofit that also has an abysmal record of beluga deaths.

The Vancouver Aquariums' expansion should be halted in its tracks, and its cetacean tanks closed. Any future cetacean needing rescue should always--using careful, scientific, and professional methods--be relocated to seaside sanctuaries offshore in natural habitat suitable to the species of the individual in question. Rescues, rehabilitation, and research do not require permanent beluga captivities at Vancouver Aquarium. Indeed, most research is conducted by institutions that have nothing to do with captivity.

With great interest we welcome your decision on how to move forward with keeping these sensitive marine mammals in captivity at the Vancouver Aquarium in the future. To that end, we respectfully encourage you to insist on the amendment of the bylaw to phase out the keeping of cetaceans for entertainment purposes at the Vancouver Aquarium. Since whales and dolphins were first held in captivity we have learnt a lot about these highly social mammals and it is evident that it is not possible to keep whales and dolphins in concrete tanks without compromising their needs and wellbeing.

For the cetaceans held in captivity at this stage and also for scientific research a sanctuary in more natural waters would be a great alternative to a concrete pool in an aquarium. Dear Vancouver Park Board Commissioners,

On behalf of In Defense of Animals, an animal protection organization with over 250,000 supporters, we ask that you end all dolphin and whale captivity at the Vancouver Aquarium.

Earlier this year, the Vancouver Aquarium was featured on In Defense of Animals' Ten Worst Tanks list, earning the #9 spot for its abysmal track record of keeping cetaceans alive. Since 2005, three beluga whales have died within three years of being born. However, this fact does not prevent Vancouver Aquarium from continuing to breed the remaining five beluga whales it "owns." While Vancouver Aquarium operates as a nonprofit, it maintains prominent beluga-breeding partnerships with SeaWorld, a for-profit, commercial business, and Georgia Aquarium, a nonprofit that also has an abysmal record of beluga deaths.

The Vancouver Aquariums' expansion should be halted in its tracks, and its cetacean tanks closed. Any future cetacean needing rescue should always--using careful, scientific, and professional methods--be relocated to seaside sanctuaries offshore in natural habitat suitable to the species of the individual in question. Rescues, rehabilitation, and research do not require permanent beluga captivities at Vancouver Aquarium. Indeed, most research is conducted by institutions that have nothing to do with captivity.



The Vancouver Aquarium has been an invaluable resource to the conservation and protection of marine mammals. Nearly 2/3 of the beluga whale population resides in Canadian waters, making their preservation incredibly important to the survival of the local ecosystem. Not only this, but seeing how the Vancouver Aquarium is the only Marine Mammal Rescue Centre in Canada, they must be allowed to continue sharing information about their marine mammals to the general public.

Dear Elected Officials,

For the last few weeks, I have the privilege of joining the Vancouver Aquarium volunteer team as an  $\frac{s.22(1)}{s.22(1)}$  As a scientist and a proud marine protector, I fully support the Vancouver Aquarium's mission in conserving the aquatic life through display, communication, education, research, and direct action. Since my first scuba diving trip in my teens, I have been preserving the marine ecosystem by cleaning up the ocean floor with every trip into the water. Now, my role as a  $\frac{s.22(1)}{s.22(1)}$  with the Aquarium has expanded my effort in protecting the ecosystem I love to outside of the water.

As a s.22(1) , it is my duty to educate the public on the importance and urgency of marine conservation. Through my short period of volunteering, I have concluded that the only way for the public to physically invest in marine conservation is to get them emotionally attach to the marine animals they will be helping; and the best way in achieving this emotional status is by spreading our conservation messages through story tellings. All the resident animals in the Vancouver Aquarium have their own unique stories. Many of them started their journey with a tragedy, being helplessly stranded on the beach or distressfully tangled in a fishing net. Fortunately, they were rescued and rehabilitated by the amazing Marine Mammal Rescue team. Now, they are ambassadors of their species at the Vancouver Aquarium. Some of the residents animals are also participants of ground breaking scientific research that will aid the survival of their wild counterparts.

The Vancouver Aquarium is doing extraordinary works in saving marine species in Canadian and global waters. Up to 150 distressed marine mammals per year are rescued, rehabilitated, and released by the Marine Mammal Rescue Centre; and the effort is exponentially advancing through the many research that contribute to the rescue and rehabilitation process of a species. The Aquarium is home to many rescued marine mammals who are deemed non-releasable, giving them a second chance in life. The organization has launched the Ocean Wise program, which gears suppliers and customers to demand sustainable seafoods. Last but certainly not least, the Vancouver Aquarium has teamed up with various established scientific institutes and initiated research programs that will help the survival of many marine species in the wild; this include the multiple research efforts to safe the endangered belugas in the Arctic.

The Board's recent decision in banning all cetaceans in the facility will most certainly devastate many conservation and rescue efforts the Vancouver Aquarium has put forth in saving cetaceans in local and international waters. The ban will halt multiple important research that might provide the only solution to a species' survival. The Marine Mammals Rescue Centre will loss their ability to save a cetacean in distress without the authorization to rescue the animal and the facility to nurse it back to health. Most importantly, the current three resident cetaceans at the Vancouver Aquarium might be forcefully stripped from their home, and the undesired move will distraught their mental and physically health.

Story telling is powerful, and I would like to end my letter with a story of Levi. Levi is an adult male harbour porpoise. On March 26, 2013, he was found stranded and close to death on the beach of Sanich Inlet. The Marine Mammals Rescue team rushed over in time to rescue him. By referring to the

studies done on the previously rescued harbour porpoises Daisy and Jack, the team successfully rehabilitated Levi back to health; and on September 10, 2013, he was released back into the ocean. Levi was the first successful case of releasable harbour porpoise. The knowledge and experience attained through rescuing and rehabilitating Levi will contribute to more successful release of harbour porpoises by the Vancouver Aquarium.

I hope this letter and Levi's story will inspire you to work together with the Vancouver Aquarium, and come out with plans that prioritize the survival of all marine species. Please revaluate the decision you have made and will be making, and please protect marine science.

Hello Commissioners,

When I was a kid I was fascinated with whales. I was the first one in my elementary school to present reports on whales explaining they are sea mammals, how their young are born - tail fin first, how their blow holes work, what is baleen, fins, dorsal fins, eyes, and all those fascinating things that drew me to fall in love with the largest mammals to ever be on earth. By the way they are the only mammals in which their mouth is not connected to their lungs. In other words they can't breathe through their mouths. Interesting.

I learned everything about whales from Dr. Roger Payne and National Geographic - **not** the Vancouver Aquarium.

To catch these mammals is akin to immediately sentencing them to death. The Vancouver Aquarium has got to cease and desist this practice forever. The CEO says they need to continue hunting and catching whales to further their research. Nonsense. The best research comes from the field not from watching a captive Orca or Beluga swim back and forth in a chlorinated tank until they finally die.

With all the knowledge the VA has apparently gathered from their own captive programs and hopefully the observations that may be shared from other facilities, the best they could do was nothing when not one but two Belugas died within weeks of each other. "Aurora had been stricken by an unknown illness since her offspring Qila died suddenly at the aquarium last week." This headline will be repeated again in about 15-20 years if you allow another round of Belugas to be caught, transported, and dumped in the tank at the aquarium where staff try to keep them healthy and happy. It can't and shouldn't be done.

We really don't know anything about these animals. And certainly the phenomenal hubris on display from John Nightingale and the bold stance he's made to continue to bring sea mammals to the aquarium won't get us any closer to understanding them. Catching a whale in open water isn't pretty, it's horrible. You are either catching a very young whale or taking a cow from her herd and she may in fact be the alpha female. I find John Nightingale

repugnant in his intractable policy that the VA will continue to display living whales.

As far as the plebiscite is concerned realistically, this plebiscite should be made available to all citizens of the world, if at all. I would like the Park Board to make decisions on their own without tossing it to the masses. You should have enough information to make sound, logical, empathetic, decisions that keep captive whales away from the Vancouver Aquarium.

Dear Parks Board Commissioners,

In light of the recent news of a ban on the display of cetaceans in Stanley Park, I am writing to personally and privately beg you to reconsider. I understand this decision has been made in the interest of Metro-Vancouver residents, but this is not what we want.

I've been visiting the Vancouver Aquarium since I was a child, and I find the rescue work they have been doing for the past 20+ years to be very admirable. Although I remember watching an orca show there as a little kid, they have moved as far away as you can get from such practices. No one else does it like them - the Vancouver Aquarium is ethical and educational. If you visit them and sit to watch a beluga "show", you'll see the animals showing off only their smarts as they practice vet visits (or get a real checkup)! If you are lucky, the whales will do some splashing. The goal is to keep these animals healthy, not to breed them or use them for entertainment. Please consider visiting the aquarium to see for yourself.

My nieces **s.22(1)** New West residents) value the Vancouver Aquarium as a place of learning and discovery. They know and understand that Chester (who loves to hang out by the habitat windows to say hello to us nose-to-nose), Daisy, and Helen (whose torn fin wouldn't work quite as well in the ocean as Nemo's does) would not be able to survive if released into the wild. It would be a heartbreaking thing to know they were being abandoned into open waters or that they were being euthanized (as releasing them would arguably be the more cruel option).

I am not in any way affiliated with the Vancouver Aquarium or Stanley Park. I am simply a Metro-Vancouver resident who wanted to cry at the thought of these animals being removed from their safe home at the aquarium, where they are loved personally by thousands of people who remember their names and know their rescue stories.

These animals are not better dead than in the Vancouver Aquarium. Many aquariums around the world are unethical, entertainment-driven, and dishonest. Generally and historically, I do not at all support aquariums or zoos, but the Vancouver Aquarium is different; it is a leader in marine rescue efforts and teaching people of all ages about marine biology. It also conducts cutting-edge research which lends itself to the way the aquarium is conducted, and to the truthful experience visitors now have there.

Subject: Attn: Vancouver Park Board Commissioners Re: Captivity ban on cetaceans at the Vancouver Aquarium

Dear Parks Board Commissioners,

I had read about your recent decision to amend the current bylaw allowing the display of cetaceans at the Vancouver Aquarium. To be blunt, I am appalled.

I have lived in Vancouver and the Lower Mainland all of my life and I've seen the Vancouver Aquarium grow into being a foremost facility in marine research and having a key role in learning and helping preserve marine life.

I would like to share this letter written by <sup>s.22(1)</sup> with you as it describes my feelings perfectly:

Dear Commissioners Coupar, Crawford, Evans, Kirby-Young, Mackinnon, Shum and Wiebe:

Admittedly, this will be a difficult letter for me to write. It will be difficult because for over two decades I have bit my tongue and refused to toss back even one insult at the activists who shouted abuses through the front gates of the Aquarium and wrote bullying slander from behind the comfort of their computer screens—even during times of our deepest grief. It will be difficult because only a few days ago, Commissioner Mackinnon called my colleagues—my work family—arrogant and compared us to Nazis. It will be difficult because I have dedicated the last decade of my life to marine conservation and research and in one sweeping statement you have insulted my chosen profession as a scientist and cast the work I do as wrong, meaningless, and harmful to the natural world I love so deeply and seek to protect. It will be difficult because you are relying on alternative facts, propaganda, and hateful rhetoric from a misguided community to form your beliefs and in so doing, you turn a blind eye to rational judgment and truth. Yet, in spite of all of these challenges, I will do my best to remain calm. Because I need to write this letter.

I work as a research analyst for s.22(1) yet I could not attend the meeting in person last week since I am currently living in s.22(1) It's alright though because there is nothing my colleagues said that I could have said better. They are the experts on marine mammal care, I just study tuna. Actually, that's not totally true: I study people. Because s.22(1) has almost nothing to do with fish. Rather, it's about the power struggle between different nations and fishing fleets, and how they contort policies and overlook scientific facts to meet their unique political agendas. So, as painful as it was to listen to your decision last week, it was a shock but not a surprise. I've seen it before in the research I do, time and time again. In a practical sense, politics is the reason that overfishing continues at a global scale and harmful subsidies threaten the recovery of fish stocks. Like the rest of the world, I have also seen the triumph of slanted politics in recent months through the ongoing abuses of power, rejection of science, and reliance on unfounded radical perspectives by the Trump Administration. As I read your statement from Thursday's Park Board meeting and listened to Commissioner Mackinnon's interview on the CBC Early Edition, I could not help but see many parallels.

Activists say our practices are cruel and that we kill whales. I can assure you that neither are true although human activity does kill whales regularly. In the Northwest Atlantic, entanglement in fishing gear was the primary

cause of large whale deaths between 1970-2009. Since 1998, 70 orcas from the endangered BC Southern Resident population have gone missing or died. The infant mortality rate in this group is also incredibly high (13 deaths of juveniles one year old or younger), and the bioaccumulation of toxic chemicals—from human systems —is a key threat to the health and survival of these cetaceans. Similarly, the population of belugas in the St. Lawrence has been declining since 2000; it is now estimated at less than 1,000 individuals and 32 calves have been found dead in the last four years alone. Loss of habitat and human-induced noise are believed to be key contributors to this problem.

The day Chester was moved to the Wild Coast exhibit many of us shed tears of joy. When Qila and Aurora died, our collective heart broke. As I heard Commissioner Mackinnon suggest that our current rescued animals be moved to a different facility, or back to the Marine Mammal Rescue Centre on Main Street, I realized just how little the Park Board understands what we do. I also wondered why— if you are so deeply moved by the plight of these animals—you are comfortable with their captivity away from the public eye and off city property. I wondered why you would be comfortable moving our rescued animals to a site that is designed to be a temporary home and in so doing prevent the public from learning about and being inspired by them. A dolphin who lost her flippers in a drift net instantly teaches about harmful fishing gears. A false killer whale who is the first of his species to survive stranding as an infant conveys the importance of veterinary research and care. I have worked for a whale watching company in Vancouver and yes, seeing whales in the wild is incredibly powerful. But at \$300 a person, a day trip is also unrealistic and inaccessible for most families. The importance of the animals at the Aquarium is second to none. Why do you not understand their value as ambassadors for their species?

Without a shadow of a doubt the reason I became a marine biologist is because my Nana took me to the Aquarium every month when I was young. The belugas captivated my attention from the very beginning and, since then, learning about and protecting the ocean is all I've ever wanted to do. I wonder if you can imagine how hurtful and infuriating it was to hear someone with no formal education in marine biology, no practical experience in veterinary care, and a tainted, erroneous view of our facility attack my colleagues and paint our work as immoral and unethical. Please try to consider what that must have felt like. The decision you have made—all of you—is unfounded in anything but political power and cardboard signs. And due to your desire to make a name for yourselves, it is the marine mammals of the Canadian west coast and the future generations of our society who will suffer from this decision.

Hello to all,

I am writing this email to encourage all of you NOT to ban cetaceans in Stanley park. The Vancouver aquarium only has rescued cetaceans in its facility, refusing to capture from the wild unless the situation is dire, meaning the animals would not survive without their intervention.

Ethically, the Vancouver aquarium is one of the most advanced aquariums I have ever been to. The people who are urging you to get rid of cetaceans are overlooking the fact that those already in captivity will be sent to a less sound facility or even euthanized if this ban goes through. If this ban proceeds, you will knowingly decrease the quality of life of these animals, or worse yet, take away their lives altogether. All of this would be based on the opinions of individuals who quite possibly do not have their facts right or simply overlook the animals' quality of life so they can stand against aquariums in general as a "big picture" idea.

Now, before you begin to view me as biased against the individuals promoting the ban, please read my following argument.

Another major factor you should all consider is the education of our youth. Myself and all of my friends went to the aquarium multiple times in our youth, both on educational field trips and as recreational trips on our own. Each time we went to the aquarium we would leave with new knowledge about our oceans and the role we play in sustaining them. One good friend of mine has developed a passion for marine biology, in part because she had access to marine life in a controlled environment that is focused on the animals' quality of life, and on researching them.

The research that the Vancouver Aquarium conducts is extremely important! By learning about the mammals within our oceans, it allows us to understand how to best help them, knowing that humanity's actions have a large impact on their lives. Also, with global warming becoming more and more of a crisis, the natural habitats of these animals are being effected! This means it is more critical than ever to learn everything we can about these animals so that we can help them in the wild. If you have ever taken a biology course that includes a unit on ecosystems, you know that each individual species has a unique place in the environmental hierarchy, meaning that if one dies out or a new one is introduced, the ecosystem will experience significant damage. Research is VITAL to preventing such a situation, and that is precisely the aim of the Vancouver aquarium.

The Vancouver aquarium is also a site that attracts visitors from FAR more than just the city of Vancouver. If this ban goes through, residents in all of greater Vancouver will be deprived of the opportunity to learn and experience mammals that they know are getting a second chance at life and were NOT captured from the wild to do shows for the public. It's also a tourist destination! Meaning that even people from different countries come to learn about and appreciate the animals at the aquarium. In my own personal experience for example, I took my significant other to the aquarium last year, as he had never been in his four years after moving to Canada from  $\frac{s.22(1)}{s.22(1)}$  The entire time he was asking questions to me as well as any employee he could track down and when we left, he couldn't stop talking about how much he'd learned since going there, and the cetaceans were one of the things he was most interested in.

If this ban goes through, you will knowingly have decreased the quality of, or simply taken away the life of multiple cetaceans vital for the research of our oceans, as well as the education of our youth. Currently, there is no valid reason to remove these animals from the care of the Vancouver aquarium! I strongly urge all of you to please ruminate on the points I've made in this email. You affect many

different important parts of life for residents of Greater Vancouver, this does not just concern the aquarium itself. The cetaceans in the aquarium do not deserve to be pushed aside without even a valid reason for doing so.

I was <sup>8.22(1)</sup> and it was Vancouver Aquarium that was a major influence on our coming to focus on sustainable fisheries. We joined Oceanwise and stopped selling much of our seafood that was unsustainable. They have a Marine Mammal rescue that I was able to see first hand where these mammals would otherwise die in the wild. I saw so many rehabilitated and released it is an incredible program that you have chosen to bring a complete halt to (I believe to appease public outcry with a lack of evidentiary support and due to inflammatory documentaries about other facilities that bear no resemblance to the Vancouver Aquarium). The animals who need somewhere safe and on the cutting edge of marine mammal research and rescue as well as programs such as ocean wise and others to enhance sustainability in fishing and other businesses deserve better than certain death because people think it "looks better". Some animals need sanctuary. Please consider adding exceptions to this new by-law at the very least.

# Dear Senators

I'm writing to give my expert opinion on how Bill S-203 is a very bad idea in terms of the conservation of cetacea species. For the past 3 decades I have focused my research program on studying the physiology of endangered species with the aim of generating data that can help with their conservation. Captive facilities like zoos and aquaria are essential for housing wildlife species so that we can obtain data we could not obtain from a free-ranging individual. And that data is then used to optimize management of the species in the wild. Using an example from my research program, any non-invasive technique for assessing physiological parameters must be developed and validated using captive individuals.

Furthermore, maintaining healthy breeding populations of wild species in zoos and aquaria are essential to provide emergency back up populations to recover species in the wild. For example, I am involved in the captive breeding/reintroduction program for the Vancouver Island marmot. When their populations crashed in the 1990's due to clear cutting, the remaining animals were brought into captivity to set up a captive breeding/reintroduction program to increase numbers to sustainable levels. However it took several years to optimize captive conditions for consistent breeding to take place and we still have not perfected it. We have lost valuable genetic diversity in the species because we did not already have a successfully breeding captive population when their wild populations crashed beyond natural recovery. Another example is the vaguita, a cetacean. This is the most endangered mammal species in the world and with fewer than 50 individuals left captive breeding is their only hope of avoiding extinction. Yet, like the marmot, they have not been housed in captivity before, largely due to push back from willfully ignorant animal rights activists, so we have no idea if we can do it successfully. If we already had a successful captive breeding program for the vaquita the outlook for avoiding extinction would be much more positive. As it stands, it is likely the vaguita will go extinct like the recently extinct baiji, another cetacean for whom we waited too long to set up a captive breeding population. There are many other examples of how this lack of foresight will have doomed a species.

So, in view of the undisputed value of captive populations to the conservation of wildlife species I ask the senate to reject Bill S-203 'An Act to amend the Criminal Code and other Acts (ending the captivity of whales and dolphins)'. We cannot guarantee the safety of wild populations of cetaceans from human-caused population declines and therefore it is imperative we provide safe-havens for breeding populations as a hedge against extinction.

I am from Abbotsford, currently living in Vancouver, and I do not support this ban. I encourage you to overturn it immediately. Please take the time to read the following facts from Shawna Calderwood:

#### "THE FACTS:

- The Aquarium does not capture from the wild or accept animals into the facility other organizations have captured from the wild. We were the first Aquarium in the world to pledge not to capture from the wild 21 years ago, in 1996. If you've been told we capture from the wild (or condone others doing it), that's not an 'alternative fact', that is a blatant lie!

- We aren't breeding cetaceans. In the three years I've been here, I can personally attest there has been no opportunity for mating as there were no mixed gender sexually mature groupings. Just last month, the Aquarium committed that the beluga research program would remain non-breeding (same gender groups) until its completion in 2029. Those that tell you we breed animals for entertainment/profit are lying to you!

- The cetaceans that currently reside at the Aquarium are rescued animals that cannot survive in the wild. Chester (False Killer Whale) & Daisy (Harbour Porpoise) were both stranded in the first two months of their lives. In the simplest of terms: they cannot be released as they'd starve. Helen (Pacific White Sided Dolphin) was fishing by catch in Japan and had her front flippers partially amputated as a result. She is a fighter but her injuries would be a death sentence in the wild. These animals serve as ambassadors for their species, involved in research programs to protect wild populations and inspiring our youth to preserve our oceans while there is still time.

- We run Canada's only marine mammal rescue facility. Our goal when rescuing any animal (cetacean or not) is to release the animal after rehabilitation. We don't decide if an animal is releasable, the federal government (department of fisheries) makes that decision. We share the same opinion as you, that these majestic animals deserve a second chance at life!

- Sea pens as an alternative to Aquariums to home rescued animals that are deemed non-releasable are not an option for numerous reasons: water pollutants, risk of illness, impact on local wild cetaceans, excessive financial burden, risk of entanglement in storms, veterinarian monitoring etc. Sometimes the reasons are more obvious than others: Chester, for example, is a warm water species that could not thrive in our local waters. If this was an option, with our 61 year history of marine research and innovative 'can do' nature, we'd be all over it!

- The Parks Board approved our detailed 3 phase expansion plans. We are about to launch phase 2 this Fall which expands our outside cetacean habitat space. The funds have been raised but come with strings attached as to what they can be used for and when they must be used by – they cannot be redirected off site. So anyone that tells you we should be spending that money on building sea pens or expanding the Marine Mammal Rescue Centre does not have the facts. I'd suggest asking them why the Parks Board would approve the expenditure only to turn around a few years later once we've raised the money and ban cetaceans at the facility.

#### IF THE MOTION GOES AHEAD AS PLANNED:

- The rescued cetaceans currently living at the Aquarium would have to go. They don't care about where to (or if they are euthanized), as long as they aren't on display in Stanley Park. If they cared about animal welfare, they'd make provisions to let these animals remain where they are well cared for. Daisy and Helen are both also reaching the end of their natural life spans.

- The Aquarium would not be able to offer a home for rescued cetaceans. Without a potential long term home for these animals to go to, they could be euthanized rather than rescued. Ask yourself if you believe that animals are better off dead than in an aquarium? If your answer is no, then we need your help! If your answer is yes, please unfriend me because your value system is whacked!

- Our research on the Arctic will be severely impacted at a time when global warming is not a theory, but a reality. Our beluga research program has allowed scientists to develop theories and perfect their methods before working with wild populations. We won't be able to bring older non-breeding belugas (which weren't captured from the wild) from other aquariums to continue the vital work that Aurora and Qila were part of."

You, the Parks Board, are being pressured by a small group of activists that believe animals are better dead than in an aquarium. I am very against this mindset. I believe the Vancouver Aquarium does excellent, ethical work which should be encouraged.

Thank you for taking the time to respond to my email.

Could you clarify what you mean by your comment? My understanding is that the aquarium currently has only female cetaceans, which would preclude their breeding. Further, if your primary concern is breeding, ban breeding.

Banning the care of injured and non-releasable animals doesn't make sense. Where will they be taken for rehabilitation and, ideally, re-release if their care and keeping is banned from the aquarium? What will happen to those that cannot be release due to the severity of their injuries or other factors?

What will happen to the animals currently in care and not releasable? The false killer whale and pacific white-sided dolphins will die in the wild. Is that your goal? How does the proposed bylaw amendment, in its current form, protect these animals?

How does the proposed bylaw amendment protect injured or sick wild animals that need help?

I understand there has been a public and very emotional response to the death of the belugas at the aquarium. We were all shocked and we still don't know the cause of the death of those beautiful, innocent animals. Until we do, taking such drastic action as if the aquarium's care were at fault (which may yet be revealed to be the case, I am not naive enough to think that impossible), is premature and ill-conceived. Demands to end the care and keeping of cetaceans seems an emotional, knee-jerk reaction not based on science.

The responsible thing to do is to wait until the cause of death is known, then act according to facts, not heated emotion. And, as noted above, if you are concerned in any way that the aquarium may breed these animals now or in the future, you have the ability to ban their breeding without endangering injured, sick and currently non-releasable animals.

"THE FACTS:

- The Aquarium does not capture from the wild or accept animals into the facility other organizations have captured from the wild. We were the first Aquarium in the world to pledge not to capture from the wild 21 years ago, in 1996. If you've been told we capture from the wild (or condone others doing it), that's not an 'alternative fact', that is a blatant lie!

- We aren't breeding cetaceans. In the three years I've been here, I can personally attest there has been no opportunity for mating as there were no mixed gender sexually mature groupings. Just last month, the Aquarium committed that the beluga research program would remain non-breeding (same gender groups) until its completion in 2029. Those that tell you we breed animals for entertainment/profit are lying to you!

- The cetaceans that currently reside at the Aquarium are rescued animals that cannot survive in the wild. Chester (False Killer Whale) & Daisy (Harbour Porpoise) were both stranded in the first two months of their lives. In the simplest of terms: they cannot be released as they'd starve. Helen (Pacific White Sided Dolphin) was fishing by catch in Japan and had her front flippers partially amputated as a result. She is a fighter but her injuries would be a death sentence in the wild. These animals serve as ambassadors for their species, involved in research programs to protect wild populations and inspiring our youth to preserve our oceans while there is still time.

- We run Canada's only marine mammal rescue facility. Our goal when rescuing any

animal (cetacean or not) is to release the animal after rehabilitation. We don't decide if an animal is releasable, the federal government (department of fisheries) makes that decision. We share the same opinion as you, that these majestic animals deserve a second chance at life!

- Sea pens as an alternative to Aquariums to home rescued animals that are deemed non-releasable are not an option for numerous reasons: water pollutants, risk of illness, impact on local wild cetaceans, excessive financial burden, risk of entanglement in storms, veterinarian monitoring etc. Sometimes the reasons are more obvious than others: Chester, for example, is a warm water species that could not thrive in our local waters. If this was an option, with our 61 year history of marine research and innovative 'can do' nature, we'd be all over it!

- The Parks Board approved our detailed 3 phase expansion plans. We are about to launch phase 2 this Fall which expands our outside cetacean habitat space. The funds have been raised but come with strings attached as to what they can be used for and when they must be used by – they cannot be redirected off site. So anyone that tells you we should be spending that money on building sea pens or expanding the Marine Mammal Rescue Centre does not have the facts. I'd suggest asking them why the Parks Board would approve the expenditure only to turn around a few years later once we've raised the money and ban cetaceans at the facility.

IF THE MOTION GOES AHEAD AS PLANNED:

- The rescued cetaceans currently living at the Aquarium would have to go. They don't care about where to (or if they are euthanized), as long as they aren't on display in Stanley Park. If they cared about animal welfare, they'd make provisions to let these animals remain where they are well cared for. Daisy and Helen are both also reaching the end of their natural life spans.

- The Aquarium would not be able to offer a home for rescued cetaceans. Without a potential long term home for these animals to go to, they could be euthanized rather than rescued. Ask yourself if you believe that animals are better off dead than in an aquarium? If your answer is no, then we need your help! If your answer is yes, please unfriend me because your value system is whacked!

- Our research on the Arctic will be severely impacted at a time when global warming is not a theory, but a reality. Our beluga research program has allowed scientists to develop theories and perfect their methods before working with wild populations. We won't be able to bring older non-breeding belugas (which weren't captured from the wild) from other aquariums to continue the vital work that Aurora and Qila were part of."

#### Sirs/Mesdames:

I understand that you are considering a motion to ban cetaceans at Stanley Park Aquarium. May I ask what arrangements you have made for the ongoing care of those animals who live there who cannot be released into the wild as they would not be able to survive (I understand the Aquarium houses at least three large marine mammals that fall into that category)? Will you continue to provide funding to support those animals until the time of their natural deaths (without "displaying" them the Aquarium will not be able to raise funds to offset the cost of their care) or will you force their caregivers to euthanize them?

I understand that another facet of the ban on keeping cetaceans at the Aquarium will be that the Marine Mammal Rescue Association will have nowhere to house any rescued animals requiring treatment or ongoing care in order to survive (meaning that animals that might have recovered and been released back into the wild will have to be euthanized instead). Have you an alternative proposal to provide facilities at another site to house rescued animals until they can be rehabilitated or until their natural deaths if it is determined that they would be unable to survive in the wild, or will the member of the rescue association be forced to euthanize animals who might have had a chance at rehabilitation because of a lack of resources to provide that level of care?

These issues should be addressed if you are going to ban the housing of cetaceans at Stanley Park. Stanley Park Aquarium determined many years ago not to capture wild marine mammals for display or to accept the transfer to their facility of animals so captured (although I imagine if it was a humanitarian decision in the animal's best interest they might bend this rule). As such, they have invested in their facility so that they might house those rescued cetaceans that could not survive in the wild, to the benefit of all the rest of us who get to see and be educated in the lives/needs of our neighbours in the water. Don't eradicate a valuable facility that contributes so much to our understanding of the ocean and it's creatures because someone doesn't like the way it "looks," please.

Dear Commissioners with the Vancouver Board of Parks and Recreation,

Tonight you will be debating the issue of cetaceans in captivity at the Vancouver Aquarium, not for the first, and perhaps not for the last time. I have contributed to the previous debates at the Park Board and won't make it in person this time, but I would like to share with you a few thoughts that I would like to see taken into account:

# 1.

Vancouver Aquarium is Canada's national aquarium. Its tens of thousands of members come from all over the province, and indeed the country. You will be making a decision on behalf of all Canadians, not just those that happen to be residents of Vancouver. Please keep that in mind when considering a proposal to ask Vancouver residents to the polls for a referendum.

# 2.

There is no other aspect of this issue I care more about than rescue, rehabilitation, release and housing animals that cannot be released (due to illness, age at rescue etc.).

Whatever you decide or the federal government mandates, it must not impact the Vancouver Aquarium's ability to continue its marine mammal rescue and rehabilitation program. This is Canada's only facility equipped with staff and facilities to rescue, rehabilitate and release a cetacean (whales, porpoises, dolphins). No other such facility exists in close proximity, not even in the United States. The Vancouver Aquarium is unique in that respect as that it can take in animals for long-term rehabilitation if necessary, and even house animals permanently if they cannot be released safely into the wild.

There is already a trend of an increase in live strandings of marine mammals, and thanks to man-made climate change and rapidly changing oceans, that is going to get much worse (as we can already see in other parts of the world, e.g. the North Sea). We will see more whales strand and in need of rescue, and we will need competent professionals with extensive experience caring for these animals regularly in order to make sure they have a chance. Otherwise, animals that cannot be simply re-floated (the majority) will have to be euthanized immediately, as is happening in countries that have no rehabilitation facilities, such as the United Kingdom. That must not be allowed to happen here.

# 3.

Research with captive animals matters. I serve on the board of directors of a conservation non-profit that advocates on behalf of the world's smallest cetaceans, porpoises. The harbour porpoise is a member of this family, and one representative of this species lives at the Aquarium in Vancouver. This species is very abundant; there are 700,000 of them in our world's oceans, and yet they are facing at times severe threats that can easily decimate a population and drive it to the brink of extinction. In the Black Sea and Baltic Sea for instance, the species (or rather these sub species) is actually listed as (critically) endangered by the IUCN. The number one threat for small cetaceans, including the harbour porpoise, is bycatch in fixed fishing nets. 300,000 whales, porpoises and dolphins die annually because of entanglement in fishing nets alone. Many of them are porpoises. And of course, with a threat this dangerous, conservationists have moved to develop mitigation measures. And without exception, all of them have been developed (and are still being developed or improved) with the help of research that happened (and happens) in captive facilities. At Fjord & Baelt in Denmark for instance, rescued and rehabilitated harbour porpoise assisted in the development of deterrent devices that are not widely being used; they also helped determine how these animals perceive and react to ocean noise, how they detect prey (and threats) and how all of that interacts. That knowledge is absolutely vital for species management decisions, and something that scientists worldwide acknowledge.

The harbour porpoise is also a close relative to the critically endangered vaquita porpoise, of which only about 30 remain in the wild. The Vancouver Aquarium's harbour porpoises Jack and Daisy helped developed a passive sonar system that can be used to identify porpoises in the water column based on a kind of acoustic image. This system is now part of the desperate conservation efforts by international experts that are working to conserve this species. It will play a vital role in the conservation effort later this year, and that system could not have been developed without calibration with trained captive animals.

Similar research with captive animals has also happened with other species, including beluga whales. As marine mammal populations are in decline worldwide (including Canada's beluga whale populations), any and all knowledge we can accumulate with research on captive and wild animals is absolutely vital for conservation and species management. Extinction is forever, there is no going back. Whatever decision you make, please bear in mind that it may be irreversible with regards to the gap in knowledge you may create by preventing necessary research from happening, whether directly by removing cetaceans from captive care, or indirectly by depriving the Aquarium from a revenue source which might impact its research on wild animals.

Dear Commissioner of the Park Board,

Following the board's decision to put forward a by-law banning the importation and display of cetaceans in city parks, I urge you to take into consideration what that means for the non-releasable cetaceans already living at the Vancouver Aquarium.

I ask you to include in the by-law an exception for the non-releasable animals, which I would like to remind you are deemed non-releasable by governing bodies independent of the Aquarium and their staff and often as a direct result of harmful human activity in the wild.

I would also like to remind you that the Vancouver Aquarium has made a commitment and stuck to that commitment of not taking marine mammals from the wild for display since 1996. None of the animals in question at the board meetings this past week were taken into captivity, nor would have been the belugas mentioned to return to Vancouver as part of the proposed research and phase out plan.

I urge you to take responsibility for the consequences of your decision. You need to understand that for the non-releasable cetaceans who call the Vancouver Aquarium their home, this decision means either relocation to another facility (which most likely will not have the same high standard for care) or euthanasia. Relocation would mean ripping these animals away from a place that is familiar and a family of care-givers they have known for a long time. I'm sure I don't have to explain to you how this would affect these animals. And I'm sure I don't have to explain to you what euthanasia means either.

Can you honestly say that you have the animals' best interests in mind when that's what your decision means?

You have listened to the anthropomorphized personal feelings of a handful of misinformed yet passionate activists instead of letting your decision be informed by science, experts and actual evidence. The least you can do is ensure that there is a clause in the by-law to guarantee the safety of the animals that need it the most.

I cannot imagine that any of the animal rights 'activists', however misguided they are in their crusade, actually wanted for any of these animals to be harmed.

Do the right thing and take responsibility for your decision.

Include an exception in the by-law for the non-releasable cetaceans.

At this point there are 3 animals that fit this criteria -Helen, the Pacific White Sided Dolphin, Daisy, the Harbour Porpoise, Chester, the False Killer Whale. These animals call the Vancouver Aquarium home. They are well cared for, they are healthy and active and it is a fact that they would not survive in the wild.

Opponents to the Aquarium say that cetaceans in captivity would be better off dead, but Chester in particular is evidence that these animals have a desire to live. Chester, who was found stranded as a baby, showed his strength and willingness to live when he fought to survive with the help of the Marine Mammal rescue Center staff. He chose to fight to survive, he won the battle, and now he continues to thrive in his home at the Aquarium. He will not be the last cetacean to need help, nor the last to need a home. If you ban the the keeping of cetaceans outright, what will happen to these healthy, non-releasable animals? At this point there are no viable options for them. Sea pens do not currently exist so other than living at the Aquarium there are no alternatives for them.

I am a Vancouver resident and I care very much about the State of our Oceans and the animals in them. I care very much about the welfare of the cetaceans at the Aquarium, both now and in the future. Please consider Helen, Daisy and Chester when you draft your amendment. Add an exception so that they, and others like them, have a chance to live.

"Last week the Parks Board voted to ban the display of cetaceans in Stanley Park (and therefore at the Vancouver Aquarium). I am livid at how science can be overshadowed by misinformation. I understand that scientists can come across arrogant (and therefore unlikable) – but that doesn't make what they say any less true!

Hopefully the below will offer my friends some insight into my frustration & encourage them to take the time to write an email in support of an organization I am extremely passionate about.

THE FACTS:

- The Aquarium does not capture from the wild or accept animals into the facility other organizations have captured from the wild. We were the first Aquarium in the world to pledge not to capture from the wild 21 years ago, in 1996. If you've been told we capture from the wild (or condone others doing it), that's not an 'alternative fact', that is a blatant lie!

- We aren't breeding cetaceans. In the three years I've been here, I can personally attest there has been no opportunity for mating as there were no mixed gender sexually mature groupings. Just last month, the Aquarium committed that the beluga research program would remain non-breeding (same gender groups) until its completion in 2029. Those that tell you we breed animals for entertainment/profit are lying to you!

- The cetaceans that currently reside at the Aquarium are rescued animals that cannot survive in the wild. Chester (False Killer Whale) & Daisy (Harbour Porpoise) were both stranded in the first two months of their lives. In the simplest of terms: they cannot be released as they'd starve. Helen (Pacific White Sided Dolphin) was fishing by catch in Japan and had her front flippers partially amputated as a result. She is a fighter but her injuries would be a death sentence in the wild. These animals serve as ambassadors for their species, involved in research programs to protect wild populations and inspiring our youth to preserve our oceans while there is still time.

- We run Canada's only marine mammal rescue facility. Our goal when rescuing any animal (cetacean or not) is to release the animal after rehabilitation. We don't decide if an animal is releasable, the federal government (department of fisheries) makes that decision. We share the same opinion as you, that these majestic animals deserve a second chance at life!

- Sea pens as an alternative to Aquariums to home rescued animals that are deemed non-releasable are not an option for numerous reasons: water pollutants, risk of illness, impact on local wild cetaceans, excessive financial burden, risk of entanglement in storms, veterinarian monitoring etc. Sometimes the reasons are more obvious than others: Chester, for example, is a warm water species that could not thrive in our local waters. If this was an option, with our 61 year history of marine research and innovative 'can do' nature, we'd be all over it!

- The Parks Board approved our detailed 3 phase expansion plans. We are about to launch phase 2 this Fall which expands our outside cetacean habitat space. The funds have been raised but come with strings attached as to what they can be used for and when they must be used by – they cannot be redirected off site. So anyone that tells you we should be spending that money on building sea pens or expanding the Marine Mammal Rescue Centre does not have the facts. I'd suggest asking them why the Parks Board would approve the expenditure only to turn around a few years later once we've raised the money and ban cetaceans at the facility.

# IF THE MOTION GOES AHEAD AS PLANNED:

- The rescued cetaceans currently living at the Aquarium would have to go. They don't care about where to (or if they are euthanized), as long as they aren't on display in Stanley Park. If they cared about animal welfare, they'd make provisions

to let these animals remain where they are well cared for. Daisy and Helen are both also reaching the end of their natural life spans.

- The Aquarium would not be able to offer a home for rescued cetaceans. Without a potential long term home for these animals to go to, they could be euthanized rather than rescued. Ask yourself if you believe that animals are better off dead than in an aquarium? If your answer is no, then we need your help! If your answer is yes, please unfriend me because your value system is whacked!

- Our research on the Arctic will be severely impacted at a time when global warming is not a theory, but a reality. Our beluga research program has allowed scientists to develop theories and perfect their methods before working with wild populations. We won't be able to bring older non-breeding belugas (which weren't captured from the wild) from other aquariums to continue the vital work that Aurora and Qila were part of."

Furthermore, Helen and Chester have managed to develop a relationship with each other, and deserve to live the best quality of life they can in captivity. I truly believe by removing these animals from the care of the Vancouver aquarium would be detrimental to the animals themselves as well as animals that will come after them. We all want what's best for the animals, and we all share the same end goal, but in the process I think it's important to remember that there's special cases everywhere, and we have to do everything in our power to make sure all the animals welfares are taken into account. #### Dear Ms. Evans,

I was very disappointed to learn of the decision to discontinue caring for cetaceans at the Vancouver Aquarium. I'm currently living in Florida, not far from SeaWorld, so I've had the opportunity to see first hand the difference between the reality of animal care and the misinformation spread by those in favor of what they call "animal rights." Those opposed to the housing of cetaceans in zoological facilities rely heavily on what they believe they've "learned" through their movie watching experiences, while those familiar with those parks have learned through experience and personal observation.

Let me tell you a little bit about the animals I'm familiar with here in Florida: SeaWorld currently houses a small group of pilot whales at the Whale and Dolphin Theater. These animals were youngsters when they were brought in, the only surviving members of their pod following a mass stranding. Our government deemed these animals unreleasable, as they had no elder members of their pod with whom they could be released. They have a home now. They have care, affection, social interaction, as steady diet, roomy pools. They are thriving, thanks to the work of the Veterinary, Animal Care, and Animal Training staff at SeaWorld. If there were no facility to take them in, they would have been euthanized. Clearwater Aquarium is a longer drive from home, and I haven't visited recently, but it is home to bottlenose dolphins Winter, Hope, and Nicholas, also unreleasable. Winter's story is a particularly powerful lesson, because her reason for rescue, the fishing gear entanglement that cost her her tail flukes, is a direct result of human impact on the animals' natural environment. Like her companions, she is cared for, she is given enrichment activities, a nutritious, regular diet, and on top of that, periodic therapy with her prosthetics. Her situation looked grim when her tail began to fall to pieces, but she showed a will to survive, and has become one of the most engaging residents at Clearwater.

There are other great examples of the need for cetacean facilities. When an orphaned California gray whale calf stranded back in the 1990s, SeaWorld San Diego was the only facility with the resources to take her in. She was barely responsive at the time of her rescue, yet was a healthy, active youngster who had learned to feed by herself when she was released fifteen months later (timed to coincide with the gray whale migration). Morgan, the killer whale (I believe she's currently at Loro Parque). Rescued as an orphan and determined to be deaf, so that the staff working with her use visuals to communicate with her. The Delphinidae rely heavily on their ability to echolocate, without her hearing, her odds of survival in the wild would be slim. The authorities have chosen for her to remain in human care, where she thrives.

Please don't cater to the vocal extremists at the expense of the animals or your park. People who aren't coming to the park now aren't going to suddenly become pass members because you let your whales go, and be aware that they'll go after your other marine mammals next. Discontinue breeding and importing, if you feel that it's necessary, but don't abandon your animals over the complaints of would-be activists who project their own ideas of "freedom" onto marine mammals whose lives are very different from their own. Listen to the veterinarians, the trainers, the wildlife experts, and the existing fan base you're alienating. Don't make euthanasia the only option for marine mammals with nowhere else to go.

Dear Vancouver Park Board Commissioners,

On behalf of No Whales In Captivity, I would like to thank you for the amazing job you did at the March 8th and 9th Whale Hearings. We were most impressed by how prepared commissioners were and the tough questions you asked. COPE might have had more in-camera meetings, but you certainly were more prepared than they ever were! LOL

As you know, this is the second time in the history of the Park Board that commissioners unanimously vote to restrict cetacean imports into Stanley Park. The first time this happened was 21 years ago, on September 16th, 1996. However, it took the Vancouver Aquarium's lawyers only two months to successfully lobby the commissioners to insert those four clauses into the wording, which rendered the bylaw useless.

Now you are faced, no doubt, with the same pressure coming from the Aquarium. You know the drill, they will want to keep the clause allowing rescue and will want to add research to the loopholes. Please don't do that. We are really hoping that future Park Boards will also not do that... but that's a battle for another day, as contrary to popular belief, the war on whales has not been won yet.

In regards to the Aquarium's latest red herring tossed out to the public, claiming that they will no longer be able to rescue cetaceans - it is so incredibly misleading of them to use the term "marine mammals" in order to add the 100+ rescued pinnipeds (seals and sea lions) to the argument.

Not only does the proposed amendments to the bylaw not affect pinnipeds, but it doesn't restrict the Aquarium from rescuing cetaceans either. The rescue center is not located in a city park and therefore it is not under the Park Board's jurisdiction, nor can it be regulated by park bylaws.

Obviously, the Aquarium is trying to get public sympathy by falsely claiming that they will no longer be able to continue rescuing cetaceans off our coast. That is absurd! All rescued cetaceans always go to the rescue center first. What the Aquarium will not be able to do anymore is to place those unfortunate animals in a show tank to perform for their food, right after being rehabilitated. We hope that the restrictions in Stanley Park will push the rescuers to consider supervised releases instead. However, chances are that any infant cetacean rescued by the Aquarium will end up being sold to the highest bidder abroad. That is the nature of the whale business.

We also wanted to mention that the Canadian Senate recently heard from Fisheries and Oceans Canada (DFO) in regards to Bill S-203 to end whale captivity in Canada - and we were surprised to find out that in the last 10 years, DFO has only issued one (1) permit to rescue one (1) cetacean in Canada, and that was Chester, the false killer whale currently performing at the Vancouver Aquarium.

We were surprised because if the only DFO rescue permit issued in the past decade was for Chester (2014), why did the Aquarium claim that it also had permits to rescue three Harbour porpoises named Levi (2013), Jack (2011) and Daisy (2008)?

Here's an excerpt from the Senate hearings:

SENATOR: How many licenses have been issued for cetacean rescue? DFO: 1 license in the past 10 years issued for a false killer whale captured by the Vancouver Aquarium. SENATOR: That doesn't seem like many. Any live releases? DFO: NO. http://www.cpac.ca/en/digital-archives/?search=S-203

This completely contradicts Vancouver Aquarium claims that DFO was involved in all aspects of these rescues. It also raises questions about the only release that the Aquarium has ever conducted with the porpoise named Levi, as they obviously did not obtain a DFO permit to release him either.

This 10 year old Harbour porpoise was taken into the rescue center in 2013, rehabilitated for 5 months and unceremoniously dumped back into the ocean, not even where he was found stranded. Thankfully, Levi was too old to be of any use in a show tank, so back he went into the ocean, and it turns out, without a permit!

Many more questions should be raised, but this reminds us of the time that the Aquarium spent (according to John Nightingale) \$300,000 (see attached file) to purchase and import a "rescued" Pacific white-sided dolphin named Spinnaker from Japan in 2001. The import was conducted without first obtaining the Park Board's approval, nor CITES Canada's for that matter (see attached Georgia Straight news article).

At that time, the Park Board received a letter from the Aquarium on a Wednesday, stating that they were going to bring a dolphin. The Park Board sent a letter back on Friday saying to hold off until they could figure things out, but by Sunday morning there was a new performing Japanese dolphin swimming in the show tank.

The Aquarium suffered no consequences for breaking the bylaw, which brings us to our next point: the current bylaw has no penalties in place to keep the Aquarium from pulling another fast one. Please consider including in the bylaw's amendments strong penalties against the Aquarium for violating the law.

At the Senate hearings, DFO was also asked about monitoring captive cetaceans. DFO answered that the province is in charge of monitoring animals on land, and that DFO has no role in ensuring cetaceans are kept

humanely.

However, what DFO didn't tell the Senators is that the provincial government has no jurisdiction over marine mammals in captivity either, as cetacean and pinniped species do not live on provincial land and are therefore not listed under the protection of any provincial legislation.

This is the reason why my group has worked on enacting municipal and federal legislation for the past 25 years. We would also like to see wild marine mammals taken away from the DFO's jurisdiction and instead be regulated by Environment Canada, but that concerns you not.

The DFO mentioned one concern that they did have with Bill S-203, and that was the possibility of imposing restrictions on the trade in cetacean parts, as in Narwhal whale ivory tusks (\$400,000 industry), as well as restrictions on research samples taken from dead cetaceans shipped across the border back and forth to research labs. Of course, this Senate bill focuses on banning only the trade in "live" cetaceans, so there should be no problem there.

The Senators asked the DFO whether the bill would impact any ongoing research on captive cetaceans in Canada. DFO explained that all federally-funded research on cetaceans was conducted in the wild, and no studies have been or are currently conducted in the two facilities keeping performing cetaceans in Canada.

In regards to our concerns with amending this bylaw, we don't have to tell you that they include the possibility that the Aquarium will try to get supporters elected as commissioners in 2018 - and if successful, the next board will either amend the bylaw again to suit the Aquarium's plans, or simply discard it altogether.

We are disappointed that a decision to hold a whale referendum was not made at the March 9th meeting and we would like to explain why. However, we want to make it clear that we are not urging you at this time to take any action, per se. We would just like you to keep a cetacean plebiscite in mind, as you have until September 2018 to make such a decision, especially if things go wrong with the bylaw's wording, or if you are threatened with another Aquarium lawsuit.

The main reason why my group continues to believe that a whale referendum would help, and have promoted the idea of holding one for 8 elections in a row now, is because once a majority of Vancouverites get a chance to vote to ban whale captivity, it would make it so much more difficult for any Aquarium apologists elected to the new board to amend or discard the bylaw. It would also make it difficult for the Aquarium to sue the Park Board for just following Vancouverites wishes.

Even if this Park Board manages to plug the loopholes and amend the bylaw to totally ban captive cetaceans from city parks, it is only strong public support that will keep the Aquarium and future Park Boards in check.

The Aquarium understands this very well, and that is why they have always done everything in their power to block the city from holding a whale referendum. After all, according to former Aquarium director Murray Newman's book "Life in a fishbowl" - the Aquarium actually lost the one and only whale referendum ever held (1960's) asking Vancouverites if the city should spend \$100,000 in building whale tanks. According to Newman, the Aquarium lost the vote, but a crooked city clerk decided to count the spoiled ballots in favour of the Aquarium, and that's how it passed.

Do you still wonder if 5 decades later Vancouverites would support banning whale captivity in Stanley Park? We hope not. Public support was evident back then and it is overwhelming today, no matter how much money the Aquarium spends trying to make everyone believe otherwise.

We wish you good luck in your work trying to make the bylaw's amendments Aquarium-proof, and we really hope it sticks this time!

Dear elected officials,

I am a communications advisor at the Vancouver Aquarium Marine Science Centre.

I've been in my role for just one month but have been a regular visitor for the past decade. I have always valued my visits to the Aquarium; each time learning something new, each time being inspired to change my habits to lessen my negative impact on the ocean, like reducing plastic use and buying Ocean Wise-recommended seafood. Since starting work at the Vancouver Aquarium, I have experienced an immersion into the research, education, and conservation programs run by the Aquarium and have met the people that are in the lead. Now, more than ever before, I understand and support the value of their efforts.

To illustrate, just last week I had the opportunity to accompany a team from the Vancouver Aquarium Marine Mammal Rescue Centre to release two rescued and rehabilitated seals back to the ocean. Because of their expert training combined with the opportunity to work with marine mammals, this team was not only able to help two seals; they rescued, rehabilitated, and released 151(!) seals this past year alone. Moreover, as the only facility of its kind in Canada, it is the only real hope for stranded, sick, and injured marine mammals. It is our nation's first response team for emergent marine mammal rescues.

Our oceans are facing unprecedented change and beluga whales are under threat due to a variety of factors contributed by humans, including increases in noise, temperature, and ocean pollution. Continuing the beluga research program at the Vancouver Aquarium will help Canadian scientists better understand the impact of these factors and will keep our marine mammal rescue team trained for future cetacean rescues. This is a time when we need more research, not less. And this is the time to act before it's too late and the already rapidly declining beluga population in the St. Lawrence seaway ceases to exist.

I am a voting resident of Vancouver, a Canadian, and a concerned global citizen who supports the groundbreaking research led by the Aquarium; I oppose efforts by animal rights groups to stop this critical science. I encourage you to review the best practices in animal care, welfare, and rehabilitation. As one of the top five marine science centres in the world, the Vancouver Aquarium is the one setting those high standards of practice. I also encourage you to listen to your constituents who are stepping up and speaking out against the small minority trying to shut down the efforts of the Vancouver Aquarium.

I was listening to the show this morning and glad that you provided the clip from Dr. Lance Barrett-Lennard. I m also glad that you did not include an interview with Annalise Sorg and heard from someone with a bit more balanced view – head of the Vancouver Parks Board.

While she made the point that we have grown up with the

Vancouver Aquarium and seeing the killer whales and belugas there, she did not make a point about the importance of continuing to educate children through life-changing encounters with marine mammals. Although circumstances are changing, as she has mentioned, more and more people must be educated about the marine world. Our children are becoming more and more isolated from the natural world and need places like the aquarium to begin to understand it. Belugas and killer whales are not only ambassadors for their own species in aquaria, they are ambassadors for conservation of marine ecosystems. Educational institutions like the Vancouver Aquarium are essential to get that message out to the public and are an important teaching tool for our school systems.

The Vancouver Aquarium is not like other aquaria. I have been to a number of them. I have also known and respected VanAqua staff my entire professional life. The Aquarium sets the gold standard for aquaria and few measure up. Dedicated and highly educated staff conduct research, provide top-notch education programs and displays and reach out and support many conservation and marine research programs in BC and around the world.

I am hoping that if such a vote was held about marine mammals in captivity, that the majority of Vancouverites would vote yes, that we need a few marine mammals in captivity – that are well-cared-for, loved as much as any family member (sometimes more!) and can provide invaluable information to better understand the species in the wild. Unfortunately, although the intent of a vote would be to put the issue to bed long-term, I don't that would be the result. Instead, it will just polarize and spend a whole lot of money on an issue that affects far more than just Vancouverites. The whole region draws on the world-class facility that is the Vancouver Aquarium and such a vote would need everyone's input.

Since whales and dolphins were first held in captivity we have learnt a lot about these highly social mammals and it is evident that it is not possible to keep whales and dolphins in concrete tanks without compromising their needs and wellbeing.

I write in response to recent news items reporting a decision to end human care for cetaceans at the Vancouver Aquarium.

As a scientist who has studied the human relationship with cetaceans for over 30 years, I must challenge the choice to end the care of the cetaceans at the Aquarium. The Vancouver Aquarium has a long and excellent history of contributing to improvements in human care for rescued marine animals, especially whales, dolphins, and porpoises. It has set high standards for other institutions, has contributed to improved care and greatly improved lives of many other cetaceans in human care.

It is important to consider that those in your care have, quite literally, nowhere else to go. They must, if we are to practice the compassion that comes naturally to humans, be cared for in perpetuity. The plight of injured, disabled, and otherwise unreleasable cetaceans is often the direct result of human actions. We owe them the care we can give.

It is not reasonable to move the cetaceans in your care elsewhere when you have an excellent, standard setting facility in place and working. Your staff is highly trained, experts in their work, mentors to many others. Their expertise and efforts cast a brilliant light on Vancouver, highlighting the caring attitudes of most of your citizens. It would be a great shame to end this, and to further harm the cetaceans in your care.

The social needs of cetaceans, which are complex and ongoing, require social groupings. It would be better to allow importation of other cetaceans in need of social interaction, to be brought to Vancouver, setting another precedent. Allowing them to reproduce is not 'breeding for profit', but meeting a vital need for cetaceans whose culture needs support. Albeit a changed culture due to their changed lives, they deserve to be afforded lives that parallel those of cetaceans in the wild. Doing so, allowing them to reproduce and pass on their knowledge to their offspring, will afford the people of Vancouver the chance to take part in interspecies care of a high order. Young people will learn much from this, seeing how humans can give back to a damaged world, to help other animals regain a measure of health in a world that faces so much damage. As the natural world continues to be changed by humans, diminishing the wildness we all cherish, humans must step up their caring, their research, and their expertise to share with others.

Don't let the demands of poorly educated, emotion driven people take from Vancouver its reputation as a city who cares, who has its priorities right, who set

standards for compassion and excellent work on behalf of the more-than-human world.

Please reconsider the choice to end care for the cetaceans at the Vancouver Aquarium. Return to the admiration and high reputation you, as a city, have held for so long. Support the ongoing care these wonderful animals require.

I am appalled by your blatant use of the cetaceans at the Vancouver aquarium to make a political play for the sake of your popularity without truly considering the welfare of these animals. You are condemning cetaceans that may have been rescued, rehabilitated, and/ or supported in the past to now a certain death by preventing the Vancouver aquarium from housing these cetaceans. Last week the Parks Board voted to ban the display of cetaceans in Stanley Park (and therefore at the Vancouver Aquarium). I am livid at how science can be overshadowed by misinformation. I understand that scientists can come across arrogant (and therefore unlikable) - but that doesn't make what they say any less true!

Hopefully the below will offer my friends some insight into my frustration & encourage them to take the time to write an email in support of an organization I am extremely passionate about.

#### THE FACTS:

- The Aquarium does not capture from the wild or accept animals into the facility other organizations have captured from the wild. We were the first Aquarium in the world to pledge not to capture from the wild 21 years ago, in 1996. If you've been told we capture from the wild (or condone others doing it), that's not an 'alternative fact'. that is a blatant lie!

- We aren't breeding cetaceans. In the three years I've been here, I can personally attest there has been no opportunity for mating as there were no mixed gender sexually mature groupings. Just last month, the Aquarium committed that the beluga research program would remain non-breeding (same gender groups) until its completion in 2029. Those that tell you we breed animals for entertainment/profit are lying to you!

- The cetaceans that currently reside at the Aquarium are rescued animals that cannot survive in the wild. Chester (False Killer Whale) & Daisy (Harbour Porpoise) were both stranded in the first two months of their lives. In the simplest of terms: they cannot be released as they'd starve. Helen (Pacific White Sided Dolphin) was fishing by catch in Japan and had her front flippers partially amputated as a result. She is a fighter but her injuries would be a death sentence in the wild. These animals serve as ambassadors for their species, involved in research programs to protect wild populations and inspiring our youth to preserve our oceans while there is still time.

- We run Canada's only marine mammal rescue facility. Our goal when rescuing any animal (cetacean or not) is to release the animal after rehabilitation. We don't decide if an animal is releasable, the federal government (department of fisheries) makes that decision. We share the same opinion as you, that these majestic animals

#### deserve a second chance at life!

- Sea pens as an alternative to Aquariums to home rescued animals that are deemed non-releasable are not an option for numerous reasons: water pollutants, risk of illness, impact on local wild cetaceans, excessive financial burden, risk of entanglement in storms, veterinarian monitoring etc. Sometimes the reasons are more obvious than others: Chester, for example, is a warm water species that could not thrive in our local waters. If this was an option, with our 61 year history of marine research and innovative 'can do' nature, we'd be all over it!

- The Parks Board approved our detailed 3 phase expansion plans. We are about to launch phase 2 this Fall which expands our outside cetacean habitat space. The funds have been raised but come with strings attached as to what they can be used for and when they must be used by – they cannot be redirected off site. So anyone that tells you we should be spending that money on building sea pens or expanding the Marine Mammal Rescue Centre does not have the facts. I'd suggest asking them why the Parks Board would approve the expenditure only to turn around a few years later once we've raised the money and ban cetaceans at the facility.

#### IF THE MOTION GOES AHEAD AS PLANNED:

- The rescued cetaceans currently living at the Aquarium would have to go. They don't care about where to (or if they are euthanized), as long as they aren't on display in Stanley Park. If they cared about animal welfare, they'd make provisions to let these animals remain where they are well cared for. Daisy and Helen are both also reaching the end of their natural life spans.

- The Aquarium would not be able to offer a home for rescued cetaceans. Without a potential long term home for these animals to go to, they could be euthanized rather than rescued. Ask yourself if you believe that animals are better off dead than in an aquarium? If your answer is no, then we need your help! If your answer is yes, please unfriend me because your value system is whacked!

- Our research on the Arctic will be severely impacted at a time when global warming is not a theory, but a reality. Our beluga research program has allowed scientists to develop theories and perfect their methods before working with wild populations. We won't be able to bring older non-breeding belugas (which weren't captured from the wild) from other aquariums to continue the vital work that Aurora and Qila were part of.

To be able to see Chester, the two year old false killer whale learn to play with his food by watching Helen the pacific white-sided dolphin tempt the seagulls. To be able to see Daisy the harbour porpoise play around with guests who take out their cameras or see her face light up when she catches a glimpse of a wristwatch. And especilly see the amazing bond that those three cetaceans have with their trainers. Spending the past three years with this aquarium has not only expanded my love for the ocean, but kindled a passion for ocean conservation, a subject that resides at the very heart of all those who care for the animals.

These animals are ambasadors for their species. Daisy has helped in research dedicated to helping the critically endagered Vaquita porpoise - a close relative to her species - and currently one of the most endangered species in the ocean with only thirty or so left. Before the passing of Quila and Aurora, the mother-daughter pair helped with groudbreaking research on classifying beluga calls and how calves learn calls from their mothers-contact calls.

### Hello Comissioners!

I am writing today to ask you NOT to ban cetaceans at the Vancouver Aquarium. Misinformation has lead activists to campaign against something that isn't a reality. I have friends who work at/with the Aquarium who have shared the true nature of the animals that are in their captivity (info below).

Thank you for your time and consideration, s.22(1)

THE FACTS:

- The Aquarium does not capture from the wild or accept animals into the facility other organizations have captured from the wild. We were the first Aquarium in the world to pledge not to capture from the wild 21 years ago, in 1996. If you've been told we capture from the wild (or condone others doing it), that's not an 'alternative fact', that is a blatant lie!

- We aren't breeding cetaceans. In the three years I've been here, I can personally attest there has been no opportunity for mating as there were no mixed gender sexually mature groupings. Just last month, the Aquarium committed that the beluga research program would remain non-breeding (same gender groups) until its completion in 2029. Those that tell you we breed animals for entertainment/profit are lying to you!

- The cetaceans that currently reside at the Aquarium are rescued animals that cannot survive in the wild. Chester (False Killer Whale) & Daisy (Harbour Porpoise) were both stranded in the first two months of their lives. In the simplest of terms: they cannot be released as they'd starve. Helen (Pacific White Sided Dolphin) was fishing by catch in Japan and had her front flippers partially amputated as a result. She is a fighter but her injuries would be a death sentence in the wild. These animals serve as ambassadors for their species, involved in research programs to protect wild populations and inspiring our youth to preserve our oceans while there is still time.

- We run Canada's only marine mammal rescue facility. Our goal when rescuing any animal (cetacean or not) is to release the animal after rehabilitation. We don't decide if an animal is releasable, the federal government (department of fisheries) makes that decision. We share the same opinion as you, that these majestic animals deserve a second chance at life!

- Sea pens as an alternative to Aquariums to home rescued animals that are deemed non-releasable are not an option for numerous reasons: water pollutants, risk of illness, impact on local wild cetaceans, excessive financial burden, risk of entanglement in storms, veterinarian monitoring etc. Sometimes the reasons are more obvious than others: Chester, for example, is a warm water species that could not thrive in our local waters. If this was an option, with our 61 year history of marine research and innovative 'can do' nature, we'd be all over it!

- The Parks Board approved our detailed 3 phase expansion plans. We are about to launch phase 2 this Fall which expands our outside cetacean habitat space. The funds have been raised but come with strings attached as to what they can be used for and when they must be used by – they cannot be redirected off site. So anyone that tells you we should be spending that money on building sea pens or expanding the Marine Mammal Rescue Centre does not have the facts. I'd suggest asking them why the Parks Board would approve the expenditure only to turn around a few years later once we've raised the money and ban cetaceans at the facility.

# IF THE MOTION GOES AHEAD AS PLANNED:

- The rescued cetaceans currently living at the Aquarium would have to go. They don't care about where to (or if they are euthanized), as long as they aren't on display in Stanley Park. If they cared about animal welfare, they'd make provisions to let these animals remain where they are well cared for. Daisy and Helen are both also reaching the end of their natural life spans.

- The Aquarium would not be able to offer a home for rescued cetaceans. Without a potential long term home for these animals to go to, they could be euthanized rather than rescued. Ask yourself if you believe that animals are better off dead than in an aquarium? If your answer is no, then we need your help!

- Our research on the Arctic will be severely impacted at a time when global warming is not a theory, but a reality. Our beluga research program has allowed scientists to develop theories and perfect their methods before working with wild populations. We won't be able to bring older non-breeding belugas (which weren't captured from the wild) from other aquariums to continue the vital work that Aurora and Qila were part of.

### WHAT YOU CAN DO:

The Parks Board is doing this in your name! They are saying Vancouver residents do not want us to have cetaceans at the Aquarium. I don't believe that Vancouver residents want us to stop our rescue efforts or to end our valuable research that has the power to preserve these species in the wild.

This issue may seem bigger than you but I promise it is not. The Parks Board is being pressured by a small group of activists that believe animals are better dead than in an aquarium – your voice can make a difference!

I believe that animals that cannot be released into the wild due to their health and/or lack of survival skills deserve to be able to live and be shown at the Vancouver Aquarium. Last week the Parks Board voted to ban the display of cetaceans in Stanley Park (and therefore at the Vancouver Aquarium). I am livid at how science can be overshadowed by misinformation. I understand that scientists can come across arrogant (and therefore unlikable) – but that doesn't make what they say any less true!

Hopefully the below will offer my friends some insight into my frustration & encourage them to take the time to write an email in

support of an organization I am extremely passionate about.

#### THE FACTS:

- The Aquarium does not capture from the wild or accept animals into the facility other organizations have captured from the wild. We were the first Aquarium in the world to pledge not to capture from the wild 21 years ago, in 1996. If you've been told we capture from the wild (or condone others doing it), that's not an 'alternative fact', that is a blatant lie!

- We aren't breeding cetaceans. In the three years I've been here, I can personally attest there has been no opportunity for mating as there were no mixed gender sexually mature groupings. Just last month, the Aquarium committed that the beluga research program would remain non-breeding (same gender groups) until its completion in 2029. Those that tell you we breed animals for entertainment/profit are lying to you!

- The cetaceans that currently reside at the Aquarium are rescued animals that cannot survive in the wild. Chester (False Killer Whale) & Daisy (Harbour Porpoise) were both stranded in the first two months of their lives. In the simplest of terms: they cannot be released as they'd starve. Helen (Pacific White Sided Dolphin) was fishing by catch in Japan and had her front flippers partially amputated as a result. She is a fighter but her injuries would be a death sentence in the wild. These animals serve as ambassadors for their species, involved in research programs to protect wild populations and inspiring our youth to preserve our oceans while there is still time.

- We run Canada's only marine mammal rescue facility. Our goal when rescuing any animal (cetacean or not) is to release the animal after rehabilitation. We don't decide if an animal is releasable, the federal government (department of fisheries) makes that decision. We share the same opinion as you, that these majestic animals deserve a second chance at life!

- Sea pens as an alternative to Aquariums to home rescued animals that are deemed non-releasable are not an option for numerous reasons: water pollutants, risk of illness, impact on local wild cetaceans, excessive financial burden, risk of entanglement in storms, veterinarian monitoring etc. Sometimes the reasons are more obvious than others: Chester, for example, is a warm water species that could not thrive in our local waters. If this was an option, with our 61 year history of marine research and innovative 'can do' nature, we'd be all over it!

- The Parks Board approved our detailed 3 phase expansion plans. We are about to launch phase 2 this Fall which expands our outside cetacean habitat space. The funds have been raised but come with strings attached as to what they can be used for and when they must be used by – they cannot be redirected off site. So anyone that tells you we should be spending that money on building sea pens or expanding the Marine Mammal Rescue Centre does not have the facts. I'd suggest asking them why the Parks Board would approve the expenditure only to turn around a few years later once we've raised the money and ban cetaceans at the facility.

IF THE MOTION GOES AHEAD AS PLANNED:

- The rescued cetaceans currently living at the Aquarium would have to go. They don't care about where to (or if they are euthanized), as long as they aren't on display in Stanley Park. If they cared about animal welfare, they'd make provisions to let these animals remain where they are well cared for. Daisy and Helen are both also reaching the end of their natural life spans.

- The Aquarium would not be able to offer a home for rescued cetaceans. Without a potential long term home for these animals to go to, they could be euthanized rather than rescued. Ask yourself if you believe that animals are better off dead than in an aquarium? If your answer is no, then we need your help! If your answer is yes, please unfriend me because your value system is whacked!

- Our research on the Arctic will be severely impacted at a time when global warming is not a theory, but a reality. Our beluga research program has allowed scientists to develop theories and perfect their methods before working with wild populations. We won't be able to bring older non-breeding belugas (which weren't captured from the wild) from other aquariums to continue the vital work that Aurora and Qila were part of.

#### WHAT YOU CAN DO:

The Parks Board is doing this in your name! They are saying Vancouver residents do not want us to have cetaceans at the Aquarium. I don't believe that Vancouver residents want us to stop our rescue efforts or to end our valuable research that has the power to preserve these species in the wild.

This issue may seem bigger than you but I promise it is not. The Parks Board is being pressured by a small group of activists that believe animals are better dead than in an aquarium – your voice can make a difference!

Their deaths were tragic, and changes need to be made to prevent this from happening again, but I trust that the Aquarium is working in the best interest not only of the animals that live in their facility, but also for the future health of animals in the wild.

I first became involved with the Aquarium about 15 years ago as volunteer and then when my son was born in 2008 became a member and weekly visitor and felt so impassioned by their work that I eventually sought a career with the Vancouver Aquarium because I wanted to work for an organization that aligned with my values. One that worked tirelessly conserving our oceans which in turn will conserve our planet and all living species on it.

I have been an ocean lover since the first time I saw it at age 2 - a painting of that moment hangs in my house - and can never be far from it. I have lifeguarded on the beaches of Nova Scotia, surfed on the shores of Tofino and spent countless hours underwater SCUBA diving around the world. The ocean is my sanctuary and I will continue to fight for its survival until my dying day because I want my child and grandchildren and nephew and nieces, and those of my loved ones, and even yours, to be able to enjoy the beautiful power and magic that the ocean possess.

My son dreams of diving with me one day and I hope from the bottom of my heart that he will be able to experience all I have in our local waters and those around the globe. And if not, I need to be able to look him in the face and tell him I did every thing I could to save it.

We started visiting the aquarium together when he was only a few weeks old and his first connection was with our beautiful belugas. I spent many hours in the underwater arctic viewing gallery with him as he toddled back and forth absolutely memorized by Qila and Aurora. He called them "bugas" back them because he could not say beluga yet and his whole second birthday was beluga themed. That love of aquatic creatures, big or small, has only deepened and become more passionate with every chance he has to experience an interaction at the aquarium. He asks for money for his birthdays instead of gifts so he can donate it to the Marine Mammal Rescue centre. He has watched first hand countless time mammals being rescued, rehabilitated and released. He has even been part of those releases. He has also fallen in love with Chester, our False Killer Whale who was deemed non releasable by DFO and he is so unbelievably happy that our team can care for him and will be able to provide more marine mammals with safe havens if the same fate befalls on them - only made possible by our AMAZING experienced and highly skilled team. The alternative is unfathomable to me and I cannot even imagine how I am going to explain to my 8 year old son that the you have made the choice that the lives of these animals don't matter, the the future survival of ocean species doesn't matter, and that ultimately you made a choice to support a small group of uniformed people holding signs at the cost of those who are doing the actual hard work to save our oceans and ultimately all species on earth.

These words are unspeakable to me and yet I have to tell him this...I wish I could ask you to look him in his sweet little face and tell him these things, maybe then you would see the error of your ways.

Many of my colleagues have written beautiful powerful, evidence based letters of appeal to you about the work we do, the impacts it has around the globe and the impacts your decision will have. My letter is more personal because the weight of this conversation with my son still bears down on me and I am so deeply hopeful that you will see the light and hear the voices and listen to the logic so that I don't have to break his sweet innocent heart like mine is breaking.

As a final word, I plead from the bottom of my heart for my loved ones and yours, to do the right thing. I write to voice my opposition to a bylaw which would prohibit cetacean captivity in the Vancouver Aquarium in Stanley Park.

I believe the bylaw, as proposed, is both cruel and unnecessary. If cetaceans were being captured and brought in for entertainment purposes, then I agree, they shouldn't be in captivity. But in the case of the Vancouver Aquarium, the animals that are brought in are injured or unwell. They are nurtured back to health and released back to nature in every possible circumstance. Only those born at the Aquarium or who would not survive the return remain at the Aquarium. In those cases, I believe that a full life in a smaller habitat, cared for by dedicated professionals and adored by locals and visitors alike, is a far better alternative to euthanasia or a doomed release tantamount to a death sentence. It gives the animal a second chance at life, provides a valuable opportunity for scientific observation in order to better care for animals in future, as well as offering public interaction - particularly with children - which in turn fosters a sense of responsibility and empathy for the wildlife around us.

Not to mention the revenue generated for the city as a result of the Vancouver Aquarium being a tourist destination, which I trust is of concern to City Hall. Ideally, I would like to see every cetacean nursed back to perfect health and released as soon as possible, but unfortunately that's not always the case. # Dear Park Board;

I must take this time to implore you to **reconsider the proposed complete ban** on cetaceans at the Vancouver Aquarium. I strongly think that **exceptions must be made** for this bylaw. Animals that have been deemed non-releasable by the Department of Fisheries and Oceans (DFO) deserve proper treatment and care. I would be remiss to think that you would prefer them to be in the hands of a retched place like Marineland with uncountable animal rights violations. You must remember that the DFO - a government body of **highly trained scientists and specialists** is who decides which animals cannot fend for themselves, not the aquarium. The aquarium isn't trying to sneak illegal cetaceans in through the backdoor - they are trying to provide a life for animals that otherwise would not have life, normally due to human interactions.

While I agree that cetaceans should not be wild caught and kept for human entertainment, I think it would be a **severe injustice to euthanize or subject rescued and non-releasable ones to improper care** just to appease "the masses". The suggestion that Chester and other cetaceans could move to the rescue centre is very indicative of the research put into this decision - or should I say lack there of. There are no pools at the rescue centre that are adequate for long-term care. The rescue centre is just a stepping stone to re-release or a permanent home. It would be cruel to place a cetacean there for the rest of its life. The facility isn't big enough to create a space that would accommodate a permanent resident, let alone multiple.

If you truly care about these animals, I beg you to let **them stay in their current**, **safe**, **loving homes at the aquarium** and not subject them to the possibility of a inhumane life at a different facility. This is not a situation where "one size fits all", this is a situation that each case needs careful deliberation before decisions are made. An outright ban would be a backwards step both from a scientific and conservation point of view.

Not only does the aquarium provide a very high quality of life for these animals that could not survive in the wild, it also provides the opportunity for **public outreach and education**. Both of which are very important to encourage people to protect our natural world as well as inspire the future scientists of the world. People do not protect that which they do not know. Please continue to encourage people to learn about their natural world and to protect these amazing creatures that they grow to love. Nothing brings home the need to keep our oceans clean than to see the

devastation it leaves, first hand. Hiding the mutilated cetaceans from public view does not change the fact that HUMANS are the ones who put them there in the first place. Do not condemn them because of our neglect of our natural world - let them teach the public the dangers that they inflict upon our wild whales so that perhaps there will no longer be a need to rescue them.

**Please include an exception to your bylaw and allow rescued, nonreleasable animals to remain at the aquarium** - you would do both the public and the natural world an injustice to do otherwise. Please don't deprive, not only Canada, but the entire world of valuable conservation research.

Dear Elected Officials,

I believe that the Vancouver Aquarium should not be permitted to put any more whales in the tanks that are now empty following the deaths of the two belugas, Qila and Aurora, last November.

What I want to say to you is not based on scientific research or economics. It is based on ethics, and knowing right from wrong. It is an ability that all healthy human beings are endowed with from birth.

I grew up inland, far from the ocean, in a small town in Ontario. There were no aquariums in my childhood. I don't believe that I am any less educated because I did not see whales, dolphins or porpoises in concrete tanks or glass enclosures during my formative years.

I was over forty years old before I set foot in an aquarium. I remember my first impressions. I saw that these creatures were caged, trapped and restricted in movement, in artificial facsimiles of their natural environments. There was *nothing* to be learned from that experience.

My daughter was taken to SeaWorld in Cleveland, Ohio by her grandparents when she was a young child, in the 1980's. She told me recently that she knew, even at that young age, that the flopped over dorsal fin on the orca that performed there meant that something was wrong with the whale. It hurt her to see that.

Children know and understand such things. They perceive, and they empathize with animals that are suffering. It *hurts* children to see animals suffer. It hurts their hearts, their minds and their souls.

The Vancouver Aquarium says that it is educational and inspiring for children to see animals up close, in captivity.

I say this is wrong. It is just *not* true. If we are trying to teach our children to be respectful and compassionate towards all creatures and to love nature and to care for all beings on our Earth, and yet we show them animals being held prisoner for the amusement of humans, or for so-called education, what are our children to think? It is a mixed message, that says "do as we say, not as we do." Is *that* education? Is it not utter hypocrisy?

I recently saw on the Vancouver Aquarium website a promotion for the facility to be used as a wedding venue. This is what it says:

# Think Of Us As Your "Something Blue"

The Vancouver Aquarium is the most unique wedding venue in the city. Here you can share your first dance among thousands of tropical fishes while your guests are surrounded with stunning aquatic life. From an intimate dinner to a celebration that spreads throughout the galleries, we can host unforgettable weddings of any size. Plus, our stunning marine galleries provide a backdrop for some of the most unique and amazing wedding photos you can imagine

Let our event planners help organize your perfect wedding day including menu selection, décor and memorable event enhancements.

I was appalled to see the Vancouver Aquarium shamelessly exploiting the animals held captive there, offering them to be used as a backdrop and accessories for human events. What the Vancouver Aquarium fails to mention on their website is that when the wedding guests finish up with their celebrations and the last person goes home, those captive animals don't get to go home. They are left behind, swimming in endless circles.

We all have an innate ability to perceive right from wrong. I wonder if there is *anyone* who actually believes that it is moral or good or necessary to keep healthy animals in cages, tanks and pens?

Vancouver is a progressive city, green and beautiful. Why would this city ever want to be seen by the world as dragging its feet on an issue that calls into question its citizens' morals, values and humanity? Why would *anyone* on city government want to go down in Vancouver history as having sat by and allowed the continued captivity of animals that belong in their own natural habitat? Because that is how the history will read.

I ask all of you to consider how you wish to be remembered by your children and your grandchildren, our future generations. Will they be proud, or ashamed of your legacy? Please have the courage to do what is right, just and honourable. Please, don't allow the Vancouver Aquarium to bring any more cetaceans into their tanks and to ban cetacean captivity except for the purpose of rehabilitation and release.

I have known a number of people who work there and would have been a volunteer myself had it not been such an inconvenience with the ferry. Despite being a resident of the Sunshine Coast, my family had an annual membership growing up.

The Vancouver Aquarium has always been a fantastic research facility where they truly care about their residents. Yes, they do have "shows" but it is nothing like Sea World whose reputation is quite likely prompting this ban.

Why would you have approved their detailed 3 phase expansion plans only to turn around when they are preparing to launch into Phase 2: expanding the outside cetacean habitat? The funds raised come with strings attached as to what they can be used for and when they must be used by – they cannot be redirected off site.

Their whales are rescues who could not survive in the wild and they do not breed them. Having them at the aquarium allows us to learn more about their species and therefore protect their kind. The world's climate is changing. The oceans are getting warmer!

Though I have ultimately followed a different career path, I was quite keen to pursue marine biology throughout my teens. This was encouraged by visits to the Vancouver Aquarium.

Please, let the current whales stay to live out their natural lives and a future home to be available to other rescued cetaceans who will inspire other children to care about the natural world. Sincerely.

As a long term resident of Vancouver who takes her 2 children to the Aquarium to learn about marine rescue and research, I am opposed to the bylaw that would ban cetaceans from Stanley Park. I grew up in BC. As a child, I remember the old model with Skana and the Killer Whale shows that featured marine animals caught for the purposes of entertainment. I am against that and would be thrilled if this bylaw were targeting that practice. However, what this bylaw does is put vital rescue and research efforts at risk.

I do understand that public perception is hard to control and doesn't operate on full comprehension of all the complexities. We need to find a way to preserve the rescue, research and related education programs that the Aquarium's marine professionals provide not only to the Vancouver community, but the world. They give us all critical information about climate change, and its impact on the oceans, the marine life in them and how humans can change our behaviours to mitigate the devastation.

In October on a visit to Sea World in San Diego, we met a team from Vancouver who were there to release a sea turtle back into the wild. It was a joint rescue effort between the two organizations. My 8 year old daughter asked the San Diego Marine biologist a lot of really tough questions about their killer whale program (we are not fans) and contrasted their approach to the one here in Vancouver. It was only because we were from Vancouver that she got the opportunity to speak to this biologist in the first place, and we got the tour we did. That she understood the difference between that "park" and what she experiences here at home spoke volumes to me. We need more research and we will see more demand for rescues, please allow the efforts at the Vancouver Aquarium to continue by not passing this bylaw.

I am writing to you in support of keeping cetaceans at Vancouver Aquarium for the following reasons:

- The Aquarium does not capture from the wild or accept animals into the facility other organizations have captured from the wild. They were the first Aquarium in the world to pledge not to capture from the wild 21 years ago, in 1996.
- They do not breed cetaceans. There are no mixed gender sexually mature groupings. Just last month, the Aquarium committed that the beluga research program would remain non-breeding (same gender groups) until its completion in 2029.
- The cetaceans that currently reside at the Aquarium are rescued animals that cannot survive in the wild. These animals serve as ambassadors for their species, involved in research programs to protect wild populations and inspiring our youth to preserve our oceans while there is still time.
- They run Canada's only marine mammal rescue facility. The goal is to release the animal after rehabilitation. The Aquarium doesn't decide if an animal is releasable, the federal government (department of fisheries) makes that decision. These majestic animals deserve a second chance at life!
- Sea pens as an alternative to Aquariums to home rescued animals that are deemed nonreleasable are not an option for numerous reasons: water pollutants, risk of illness, impact on local wild cetaceans, excessive financial burden, risk of entanglement in storms, veterinarian monitoring etc.
- If the motion goes ahead, the rescued cetaceans currently living at the Aquarium would have to go. They would likely end up euthanized instead of making provisions to let these animals remain where they are well cared for until they reach the end of their natural life spans.
- The Aquarium would not be able to offer a home for rescued cetaceans. Without a potential long term home for these animals to go to, they could be euthanized rather than rescued. Ask yourself if you believe that animals are better off dead than in an aquarium?
- Research on the Arctic would be severely impacted at a time when global warming is not a theory, but a reality. The beluga research program has allowed scientists to develop theories and perfect their methods before working with wild populations.

Please reconsider and don't let a small group of loud people determine the fate of an important research and education facility that benefits not just Vancouver residents, but all of the lower mainland.

I ask you to please consider all of the options. Many cetaceans have been saved around Vancouver Island as a result of the hard work of the Aquarium. I live in the Lower Mainland and I wish to express my extreme disappointment in your decisions to restrict and hamper the excellent work that is done through the Vancouver Aquarium. Your bylaw to ban cetaceans in Stanley Park will have more far reaching negative impacts than the perceived good you think you are doing.

As a s.22(1) , I know the importance of teaching our youth about caring for our world, but without real life experiences which the aquarium has been able to provide over the years, the impact of that message will be hugely reduced. Taking away the cetaceans from them is like taking algebra out of math, or the World Wars out of the history books.

I grew up in East Vancouver. My family couldn't afford much other than the food on the table and the clothes on my back. Travel didn't happen for me. And trips to the Aquarium didn't happen EXCEPT through school trips. Although this was MANY years ago, I believe it is still true for a large part of the Vancouver population. Do NOT take this opportunity to learn about some of the world's greatest sea mammals away from the children.

The Vancouver Aquarium has acted in a responsible and environmentally sound fashion for many years. To slap them with a bylaw based on the accusations of a misinformed interest group is wrong. As members of the Board you should be doing your own homework to see that the "facts" are properly represented.

This is the wrong decision. Do not put this bylaw through.

As a person born and raised in Vancouver now residing in West Vancouver I am writing to urge to reconsider your decision of a bylaw to ban cetaceans in Stanley Park. I am extremely distressed by this decision, I really urge you to revisit the facts:

- 1. The Vancouver Aquarium does not capture from the wild nor does it accept animals that have been captured form the wild. It was the first aquarium in the world to pledge not to capture from the wild in 1996.
- 2. It is Canada's only marine mammal rescue facility.
- 3. The cetaceans that currently reside at the Aquarium are rescued animals that can not survive in the wild
- 4. Sea pens are not an alternative to rescued animals that are deemed non releasable for numerous reasons: water pollutants, risk of illness, impact on local wild cetaceans, risk of entanglement in storms, veterinarian monitoring, excessive financial burden
- 5. The Aquarium is not breeding cetaceans. Last month the aquarium committed that the beluga research program would remain non-breeding until its completion in 2029.
- 6. The Beluga research program has allowed scientists to develop theories and perfect methods prior to working with wild populations. At a time when global warming is not a theory but a reality the Aquarium's research on the arctic will be severely impacted and this will have a negative effective on the cetaceans.

The Parks Board approved a detailed 3 phase expansion plans. The aquarium is about to launch phase 2 this fall which expands the outside cetacean habitat space. The funds have been raised but come with strings attached as to what they can be used for and when they must be used by – they cannot be redirected off site. So anyone that tells you the aquarium should be spending that money on building sea pens or expanding the Marine Mammal Rescue Centre does not have the facts. The money is not able to be spent in that way. I am concerned why the Parks Board would approve this expansion and expenditure and then two years later vote to ban the cetaceans?

The impact this decision will have on marine research is immense, please I beg you to reconsider this decision

Firstly I would like to state that I do appreciate your reply. However my concern - and the concern of many others - is not that the animals currently housed at the aquarium will be euthanized (that was not mentioned by me at all), but rather that in the future when nonreleasable cetaceans are found/rescued in the Pacific Northwest, due to the lack of long-term accommodations for these animals during and after rehabilitation, the only course of action left available will be to euthanize these animals. Whereas currently cetaceans like Chester are able to be rehabilitated, housed at VanAgua, and contribute not only to valuable scientific research but conservation and education programs as well. If you were to actually read the articles to which I had linked prior to responding to my email, it would be abundantly obvious that your response answers none of my genuine concerns (which again, are widely shared.) I did not voice concern that the aquarium would be shut down, nor did I voice concern that animals currently housed at VanAgua would be euthanized, although it is comforting that you are not in favour of either of these abhorrent courses of action.

The DFO has stated that the misguided actions of the Vancouver Park Board will result in euthanizations in the future. I wonder if you have an informed response to this?

Commissioner MacKinnon,

Thank you for your kind words about my statement to the board last night, and for your pointed questions.

In the interests of gaining a more complete understanding of the situation tonight, I have made a list of potential lines of questioning (many of which I'm sure you have already touched on or intended to).

Please consider asking questions along these lines if the opportunity presents itself:

1) The Aquarium has stressed the research/conservation/education value of studying cetaceans in captivity.

Are there instances in history in which a study (even those that yielded a great body of knowledge) never happened, or was not repeated due to ethical standards?

Yes. Just in the field of Psychology, I can name one famous example of each:

-The Stanford Prison Experiment, which led to new ethical rules precluding a direct replication of the study, despite the high probability of great results.

-Phineas Gage, whose massive brain injury transformed our understanding of human brains and personality, yet for some reason, we don't recreate similar injuries in healthy people in the name of science and medicine.

The point is that ethical considerations force science to find better ways to learn.

2) VA supporters keep claiming to be inspired by captive cetaceans.

I would ask if one person's inspiration is more important than the freedom of another (and, yes, I think the science supports the notion that cetaceans have a level of personhood, even if it's not recognised legally).

We should be discussing what's best for the animals.

Could we not find different ways to be inspired?

3) The Aquarium claims that keeping captive cetaceans is necessary for staff to be

practiced when a rescue is needed.

Should doctors perform unnecessary surgeries on healthy people to stay sharp for when when it's really needed?

4) The MMRC - How much expansion money is currently slated for the MMRC?

5) Can we get more details of Van Aqua's non-profit status? My side claims that some 12 of their executives are pulling \$200-400k salaries, though I don't believe that information is publicly available.

I'm sorry for the length of this message. No matter what, I'm sure you will continue to do your best to further the cause of truth and justice.

Dear board members,

I am writing to you to ask you not to make a grave mistake. You have voted to ban all captive cetaceans from Vancouver Aquarium. In today's climate, where brainwashed armchair activists are claiming keeping these animals in captivity is cruel, despite scientific evidence to the contrary, I can understand why you may feel this is the only viable option. However, I am writing to implore you to change your minds. I live in the UK, and I am reminded almost daily of the mistake my government made when they banned cetacean captivity years ago. The British Divers Marine Life organisation are called out to attend stranded cetacean strandings on our shores. Any animals that cannot be immediately refloated, for whatever reason, are euthanised. This means that animals that could have survived with some rehabilitation, are killed on the spot. This means that when a mother and calf strand, as happened only recently, that if the mother cannot be refloated then a healthy calf must also be euthanised. Dolphins and porpoises are regularly euthanised due to sunburn, something that could be easily treated if there were any facilities at all that could house and care for injured cetaceans. Without these facilities, hundreds of cetaceans are killed on our shores every year. Some animals are so badly injured that even with rehabilitation they would not be able to survive in the wild. These animals need a home, how can you turn your backs on them after the aquarium has spent years trying to save animals that are suffering so badly in the wild? The aquariums mission is to protect the oceans, your ban would mean turning your backs on it's most vulnerable inhabitants! Please, think about what an outright ban would mean for the animals that desperately need your help. Don't be like the UK, ignoring the animals we are supposed to be protecting, ignoring their suffering because it's inconvenient for a handful of cults who care nothing about animal welfare. Educate people, now more than ever people need education or they will continue to fall for the asinine propaganda and misinformation put out by animal rights terrorists. ## Dear John,

This email is to plead with you to reconsider your actions taken against the rescued cetaceans at the Vancouver Aquarium. Currently residing at the Vancouver Aquarium are three rescued cetaceans that depend on the Vancouver Aquarium for their wellbeing. The Vancouver Aquarium Marine Mammal Rescue Centre is the only hospital of it's kind in Canada that can rescue marine mammals. Every year they rescue and release hundreds of animals from harbour seals to sea turtles. However, some animals get deemed unreleasable and would die in the wild. A good example of this is Chester, the false killer whale. Chester was found beached at only 1 month old and they gave him only a 10% chance of survival. The Vancouver Aquarium painstakingly nursed him back to health over the course of months, but he was deemed unreleasable as he was so young (maternal separation), only knew human contact, and would not be able to learn things necessary to survive in the wild without his mother. After a long process, the federal government gave permission to the Vancouver Aquarium to house and take care of Chester long term. Now, with all cetaceans being banned from Stanley Park, Chester is losing his home. The belugas are a different issue, but I must mimic what has already said been said: these animals were bred in captivity long ago and the Vancouver Aquarium has long since pledged to end captive breeding with these whales, phasing out the exhibit by 2029. The Vancouver Aquarium truly is a different type of aquarium, where the focus is on research, education and conservation. As a concerned Vancouver citizen, I truly believe they are trying to make a difference. You might not even be aware that there is an entire research division of the Vancouver Aquarium called the Coastal Ocean Research Institute that does wildlife research from kelp growth to understanding beluga calls in the wild. They have other amazing programs like the Great Canadian Shoreline Cleanup that is cleaning up our shorelines and Ocean Wise that is changing how people eat sustainable fish. As the Vancouver Aquarium is a nonprofit organization, they rely on admission sales and donations to fund all programs, including the Marine Mammal Rescue Hospital. I honestly believe that banning cetaceans from Stanley Park is only going to disrupt the lives of these rescued animals and prevent the Vancouver Aquarium from doing the amazing work that they do.

Please reconsider your decision. The well-being of these animals depends on you.

To whom it may concern,

My name is s.22(1) I am currently studying towards my B.Ed. at the University of Victoria and have a background of studying sciences at Thompson Rivers University. I can wholeheartedly declare that the decision your board has recently made to ban the display of cetaceans is an insult to future generations and will degrade the education of young citizens on the topic of marine life, conservation, and animal rescue.

The Vancouver Aquarium is not an amusement facility. It is an educational institution that invites the public in to become educated about the animals within its walls. Those which are marine mammals have been rescued and those which are retained within its facilities are those which cannot be safely returned to the environment. You, however, are treating this facility as some form of amusement park, and eliminating an opportunity not paralleled in our country for the future generations.

I grew up visiting the aquarium frequently, living in the Greater Vancouver area. Every time, I was stunned by the beauty of the creatures shown there. As I grew older, I learned to respect conservation efforts made in the name of animals injured by humans. For instance, animals who are caught erroneously by fishing, who would not have met an end if humans were not present in their lives. As such, the Vancouver Aquarium takes the unique responsibility of trying to repair as many lives destroyed by humans as possible.

Many animals remain mythical to children, even ones that live mere kilometres away from our shores: most children will grow up never seeing a real beluga, a real porpoise, or an otter. Animals that would die if it weren't for the help of professionals at the Vancouver Aquarium. These are lives, intelligent lives, lives that were harmed by humans, lives that humans are trying to repair. Lives that will *end* if these animals are released, and the causes of these deaths will be entirely your responsibility.

As response to this email, I would like to request direct and clear answers to the following questions. Failure to answer these questions will be met with as many attempts as are necessary to call your offices for clarification as you will be failing to respond to concerns.

 Are you aware that the Vancouver Aquarium does not display cetaceans as amusement attractions, and displays them only for educational purposes?
 How many marine animals will need to be euthanized as a direct result of your actions?

3. What will act as a stand in for students of the future to connect with these animals are our very real and very present neighbours?

4. Are you aware of policies of the Vancouver Aquarium regarding breeding and that the Vancouver Aquarium does *not* breed animals for financial gain or intentionally unless these practices are being carried out for the resuscitation of a species that is at risk in some way?

As well, I would like you to refute any or all of the following statements. Failure to do so will be interpreted as an inability to provide a reason that your decision was well supported. This information is adapted from another source and is, for the most part, verifiable by the museum's website.

 The Aquarium does not capture from the wild or accept animals into the facility other organizations have captured from the wild. It has not done so since 1996.
 The aquarium is not breeding cetaceans. There has been no opportunity for mating as there were no mixed gender sexually mature groupings.

3. The cetaceans that currently reside at the Aquarium are rescued animals that cannot survive in the wild. Chester (False Killer Whale) & Daisy (Harbour Porpoise) were both stranded in the first two months of their lives. In the simplest of terms: they cannot be released as they'd starve. Helen (Pacific White Sided Dolphin) was fishing by catch in Japan and had her front flippers partially amputated as a result. She is a fighter but her injuries would be a death sentence in the wild. These animals serve as ambassadors for their species, involved in research programs to protect wild populations and inspiring our youth to preserve our oceans while there is still time. 4. VanAqua is Canada's only marine mammal rescue facility. The goal is to release the animal after rehabilitation. They do not decide if an animal is releasable, the federal government (department of fisheries) makes that decision.

5. Sea pens as an alternative to Aquariums to home rescued animals that are deemed non-releasable are not an option for numerous reasons: water pollutants, risk of illness, impact on local wild cetaceans, excessive financial burden, risk of entanglement in storms, veterinarian monitoring etc. Sometimes the reasons are more obvious than others: Chester, for example, is a warm water species that could not thrive in our local waters. If this was an option, the Vancouver Aquarium would have clearly done so many years ago.

6. The Parks Board approved the detailed 3 phase expansion plans. The aquarium will soon launch phase 2 this Fall which expands our outside cetacean habitat space. The funds have been raised but come with strings attached as to what they can be used for and when they must be used by – they cannot be redirected off site. This money cannot be spent on building sea pens or expanding the Marine Mammal Rescue Centre. Why has the Parks Board approved the expenditure only to turn around a few years later once the Vancouver Aquarium has raised the money and ban cetaceans at the facility?

B. Request the City of Vancouver to add such an assent (plebiscite) question to the 2018 Municipal Election ballot per section 130 of the Vancouver Charter; and

C. Write to the Vancouver Aquarium asking it consider not bringing cetaceans into the facility until after the results of the 2018 plebiscite are received.

It was also reported that at the December 12<sup>th</sup> meeting:

#### Lifeforce is urging the Vancouver Park Board to: Amend the Cetacean Bylaw to Phase Out Cetaceans

Do not wait until 2018 for a referendum because the Aquarium plans include more pools and more cetaceans in 2017. Then a referendum would be too late with new prisons perpetuating cetacean captivity for decades. Lifeforce is urging the Parks Board and the City to implement a Cetacean Bylaw that will phase out cetacean captivity now!

We hope that the closed meeting on December 12<sup>th</sup> will discuss any legal threats by the Vancouver Aquarium that addresses the Cetacean Bylaw. As stated under the Vancouver Charter the Board has complete jurisdiction to implement bylaws that restricts animals in parks. The Vancouver Aquarium has also stated on many occasions that they were the first to agree to the bylaw and no more captures from the wild.

## 2. A New Expansion Permit and Public Comment Period

It was a 2006 Vancouver Aquarium expansion plan that was approved for completion in 2010. This plan was not implemented due to lack of funding. That eight part expansion was the largest in history nearly doubling the size. The 10 year old expansion permit should be cancelled and the Vancouver Aquarium should apply for an updated permit that would allow for a public comment period. Since 2006, new species have been acquired, new species may be imported, and there are new business plans such as aquaculture for the sushi market and operating an aquarium in Spain.

We hope that the closed meeting on December 12<sup>th</sup> will discuss the Aquarium facility expansion that was not completed in 2010.

The Vancouver Aquarium suffered a major defeat earlier this month when the Vancouver Park Board, with the support of organizations including the International Marine Mammal Project and thousands of concerned people, voted to ban cetacean captivity and imports. But this major win for belugas is being threatened – and your support at this point is crucial! The aquarium has launched an offensive, asking their members to flood the inboxes of the Park Board commissioners and publishing op-eds that attack the proposed amendment. Because they are the only facility on Canada's Pacific Coast that can currently take in stranded cetaceans, the aquarium claims that these individuals may have to be euthanized. But a seaside sanctuary is an infinitely better option than the concrete tanks at the Aquarium, and the Whale Sanctuary Project will likely see to it that stranded cetaceans will have a sanctuary to go to after all.

The draft amendment will prevent the display or importation of cetaceans within any Vancouver park – and since the Vancouver Aquarium is situated within Stanley Park, the amendment will apply to their facility. However, the amendment will not have any effect on the Vancouver Aquarium's rehab center, which is offsite.

The Aquarium currently has beluga whales out on breeding loans with SeaWorld and other facilities, and there is speculation that they want to bring these whales back to replace the mother and daughter who died late last year. But the amendment is designed to prevent them from doing this, as so far the Aquarium has been unable to determine the cause of the <u>two</u>

# belugas' deaths.

The Park Board commissioners will be holding hearings on the amendment in the middle of May, so the pressure must be kept on so that they hold fast to their anti-captivity commitments.

"In my 35 years on this earth I have been very lucky to have experienced many life changing moments and encounters with some of the most majestic animals and environments on earth.

But when these archaic discussions about the pros of cetaceans in captivity come up, time and time again I think back to that moment as a child where my passion and interest for animals was ignited. That first instance of awe and wonder that you see in a child when they realize the world is full of big and beautiful things just outside their backdoor and in far away places. The image in my memory is of an orca, not at the Vancouver Aquarium, but in the ocean, breaching out of the depths, surrounded by mossy cliffs beyond and blue skies above....and it was narrated by David Attenborough. I distinctly remember sitting cross legged as close as one could get to the television screen in complete and utter amazement of these creatures.

And when I think of that moment I am reminded how technology, however much it can fails us sometimes and keeps us at arm's length from each other, can be a wonderful and inspiring tool to show us things we might never have seen before. It can facilitate a VISCERAL connection between a young child and a majestic ocean inhabitant. It has given us insight into the planet's most beautiful and elusive creatures and in doing so has rendered the **old** ways of Aquariums and Marine Parks completely irrelevant. Technology has allowed us to evolve **BEYOND** captivity. Technology has taught us things about cetaceans we previously did not know. Truths about the **REAL** and **HORRIFYING** consequences of this barbaric entertainment.

We don't need whales and dolphins in captivity to encourage education and wonder in children's hearts. My fondest memories of the Vancouver Aquarium as a child wasn't the Orca show or the underwater Photo Op in front of the beluga whale tank. It was the Eel exhibit that electrified the Charlie Brown Christmas tree and the wondrous world of sea horses!

I want to be very clear....I think the Vancouver Aquarium does GREAT work in animal rehabilitation and with the Oceanwise program and I want to take my future children there to explore and engage with ocean creatures. But I will not do this if the Aquarium is allowed to continue with their current plans. The time for cetaceans in captivity is **OVER**. Technology tells us so, ethics tells us so and the hearts of this

city's citizens are telling us so.

I'm proud to be a Vancouverite. I'm proud to live in a city that aims to be environmentally forward thinking. But make no mistake. This decision would be a HUGE blemish on our city and would tell the world that we are frauds. It would make me profoundly ashamed to live here and ashamed of my community.

We need to be looking forward not back. We need to evolve our thinking beyond what we've previously known to be true to what we now **scientifically** and **ethically** know to be true. That whales and dolphins in captivity is cruel and wrong."

Thank you for taking the forward thinking steps to put an end to cetacean captivity in Vancouver. I am a marine biologist that grew up loving the oceans and animals they house without the need to see cetaceans in captivity. Other forms of education exist.

I am a marine biologist and I strongly believe that keeping cetaceans in captivity, and breeding them is tantamount to torture. To keep such high functioning mammals in small, enclosed for the duration of their lives, is a cruel practice.

Other aquariums have shown that ending cetacean captivity and educating the public in other ways (such as Monterey Bay Aquarium) is a viable business model.

There is a lot of what looks like fear mongering about euthanasia in the media and from the aquarium now. If that is a very last resort, then maybe that is the course of life. We do it with our pets when we believe that their quality of life is poor enough to warrant euthanasia. But that would be rare, and a last resort. There are very few un-releasable cetaceans at the Vancouver Aquarium. This is likely not to have a major impact. A report by the Vancouver Humane Society and Zoocheck, supported by other papers, showed that there is no conservation value from captive cetaceans.

I implore you to please uphold this ban. Vancouver is a green city and now be are becoming more ethical. Please let us keep it this way, especially in light of the animal cruelty we see from around the world on a daily basis.

I feel the small group of activists are acting like closed minded people, who will not look at the whole picture. I agree that marine animals should not be hunted for strictly the display and pleasures of humans but for rescue, that will lead to study and help of the species, is a no brainer. Please review some facts below, as stated in an other article on this subject.

The rescued cetaceans currently living at the Aquarium would have to go. They don't care about where to (or if they are euthanized), as long as they aren't on display in Stanley Park. Instead, you all allowed yourselves to become victims of bullying from the protestors that repeatedly sent emails and organized petitions to get their way. We don't want the rescue, rehabilitation and release of marine animals to stop. Nor do we want the valuable research we have been conducting to come to an end.

The Vancouver Aquarium is an amazing facility dedicated to the conservation of the ocean and its amazing creatures. By removing cetaceans, it can have a negative effect; both on the animals and the visitors that come through our doors.

The decision of the VPB in regard to the Vancouver Aquarium and its cetacean program shares much with the poorly considered efforts of PETA when they lobbied the US government to close what they described as equine "slaughter houses." From being a visitor, to a member, to a volunteer, I do not have enough good things to say about the work the aquarium does. The animal care is BY FAR some one the best in the world and the passion shown by all staff is above and beyond what most people realise.

It is frustrating to me that this issue of the Vancouver Aquarium is even coming forward. How the Parks Board can let itself be bullied into these sorts of debates blows my mind. It also shows a lack of understanding as to what the aquarium actually does, and it saddens me that elected officials have pre-conceived notions and are not listening to leaders in the industry, such as scientists, veterinarians and the DFO.

Let's remember that the Aquarium is a place of science and is a respected leader in the industry. People holding megaphones, that are using the documentary of Blackfish as a basis for their arguments is laughable. Yes, in certain parts of the world, cetacean care is not up to par, but that is not the case here. The aquarium has already said and made a pledge to not do wild capture (which is very important and something that I stand behind) and have said that the planned returning belugas will not breed. I for one, am in complete favour of the belugas being returned to us. The research being done is important for the survival of their species in the St. Lawrence estuary and I would rather see these individual animals here and in our care for them to live out their days. I feel that without there being belugas in Vancouver, no child on the West Coast would actually know or care about them as a species or about the arctic and the waters that they call home. It would be out of sight out of mind.

Having facilities like the aquarium available is important when it comes to the care of Rescue animals as well. If not for the aquarium what would have happened to Chester? Left to die on a beach? He is another example of us having a unique opportunity to learn about a relativity unknown species. If an animal is rescued, the intention is for it to always be returned to the wild, but in some cases that just can not happen. So what will the options be if there is no local facility that can home them? After all the hours spend rescuing and rehabilitating, that animal would have to be euthanized in

front of all of the staff and volunteers that worked so hard to save it and get it healthy? Or would a stranded cetacean be automatically euthanized on a beach, so it would never even have the chance to potentially be released back into the wild should it meet the standards set by the DFO for release?

People can use that arguments that with 3D and 4D it will connect people just as well to these animals. I disagree. When you stand there and witness their power and are able to look into their eyes and connect personally with these smart and dynamic animals, it it completely different than seeing them on a screen.

I know that I could go on and on, but I do know you are getting many, many e-mails.

In closing, I am going to plead with you to do what is right - yes the shift about any animal in captivity is changing, and rightly so, but let's do what's best for the ones that still are living in human care or that have been injured by irresponsible human activity, by giving them the best homes possible (as they no longer possess skills to survive in the wild. And let's continue to let the Scientists and Vetrinarians at the Vancouver Aquarium to continue the important work they do to better the lives of these animals and their wild counterparts by being able to learn what they can from these in human care animals, while we still have them and are able to do so.

There will come a time where there will be no captive animals, but right now there still is and Vancouver is the best home possible for them.

I trust the words of the Scientists, people that have dedicated their lives to their studies and show true passion and care for these animals over anyone that can press play on Netflix and watch Blackfish and then hold a megaphone on a side walk.

Please take a moment to look past the yelling and the screaming of the "activists" and listen to the educated people that have dedicated their lives to these animals. No one enters the field of working with cetaceans with an end goal of working at a circus with animals preforming tricks. Dear Commissioner Coupar,

I am unable to attend the upcoming Park Board Meeting discussing the Vancouver Aquarium's new beluga exhibit, so I am writing this email to express my concerns in lieu of attending. I understand that you are busy so I will keep my comments as brief as possible.

In recent years, the captivity of cetaceans has increasingly become questioned amongst both scientists and the general public, with world-renowned animal researchers such as Jane Goodall speaking out against it. Science and experience tell us that these animals are intelligent, sentient, social beings whose needs cannot be fully met in a tank environment, no matter how dedicated and concerned the team that takes care of them.

Building a new beluga tank for the purpose of 10 years of scientific research is not in the best interest of the animals. Belugas are known to form social bonds and the belugas that the Aquarium currently has on loan will presumably constitute the pool from which belugas will be selected for the new exhibit. This move means that most of these animals, which were already once removed from their companions in Vancouver (and from those caught in the wild, from their native pods), will once again be removed from the social bonds that they have formed and the environment they have become accustomed to. They will be shipped back to Vancouver, by ground or by air, and will have to acclimate to their new tank and companions for a third time, all of which are distressing experiences for the animal.

Additionally, the virus that is assumed to have been responsible for the deaths of belugas Aurora and Qila has not been concretely identified; this issue poses a risk for any future belugas at the aquarium (as well as current cetaceans) as it is not known whether this virus entered the enclosure through the water, food, or came into contact with the belugas by some other means. The recent deaths of belugas Aurora and Qila provide the aquarium the perfect opportunity to phase out their captive cetacean program and adapt their business model to better reflect changing public values. The existing beluga tank can be used to provide a larger environment for some of the other animal residents, such as the harbour porpoise Daisy.

The proposed 20 million dollars that it would cost to build the new beluga exhibit could instead be used for feasible alternatives that could benefit not only wild beluga populations but other sea life. For example, the Aquarium could conduct research on wild beluga populations, partner with aquariums that have belugas on display, or create a new conservation program as they have already done with the successful Ocean Wise Program. Conservation programs such as these are becoming increasingly necessary as we are faced with increasing pollution, overfishing, global warming and, with the recent plans to increase oil exportation, higher risks of oil spills, all of which affect marine life, an example of which is the concerning decline of the already endangered Southern Resident killer whale population.

For the above reasons, I oppose the Vancouver Aquarium's plan to build a new beluga exhibit and bring more belugas to Vancouver.

I am currently a biology student at Simon Fraser University and a future marine biologist, and I am thoroughly disgusted with this planned by-law.

How dare you.

How dare you decide that it would be perfectly acceptable to euthanasia an injured whale or dolphin, simply because there was no place to keep it (there was, but you do seem to be doing your best to change that). How dare you decide that "Dead is better than fed." How does that make sense? When applied to humans, it's morally wrong, and yet now you're saying that it's perfectly acceptable?

I should mention that I don't like the thought of whales in captivity--these are large animals, and need far more room than we can give them--but I realise that there's a reason for it (and it isn't profit). The whales are there to show just how wondrous these creatures are, and to inspire people (like they did for me, and countless others) to want to protect them, to want to study and learn all that we can. The few whales in captivity are there to help the hundreds living out in the wild.

It seems to me that if a whale is found, injured and suffering (more often than not due to humans), and is deemed not releasable (which means that releasing it would be akin to killing it) then perhaps having it live at the aquarium, where it can show how incredible these animals are, seems wise. Ecologically smart. Humane, even.

So ban breeding programs if you must, because growing up in captivity is never ideal. But let the non releasable ones stay. Let them show why we must protect the wild whales.

And finally, if you do go ahead and ban rehabilitated whales from the aquarium, you're going to have to stop pretending that you're reasons for this are anything but political gain.

I can honestly say that my love of the ocean and ocean life is a direct correlation from my Vancouver Aquarium visits as a toddler onwards.

Growing up and after the deaths of my grandparents, my visit to Vancouver became less frequent, but still the Aquarium remained at the top of my "to do" list when I did come to the city. I supported their efforts so much, that even though I did not live in Vancouver and actually still lived 6 hours away, my dad s.22(1) and I both became yearly members in 2008.

Upon moving to the city, I kept my membership renewed and became a proud volunteer at the aquarium and at the Marine Mammal Rescue Centre last year.

The research being done is important for the survival of their species in the St. Lawrence estuary and I would rather see these individual animals here and in our care for them to live out their days.

Having facilities like the aquarium available is important when it comes to the care of Rescue animals as well. If not for the aquarium what would have happened to Chester? Left to die on a beach? He is another example of us having a unique opportunity to learn about a relativity unknown species.

People can use that arguments that with 3D and 4D it will connect people just as well to these animals. I disagree. When you stand there and witness their power and are able to look into their eyes and connect personally with these smart and dynamic animals, it it completely different than seeing them on a screen.

I know that I could go on and on, but I do know you are getting many, many e-mails.

In closing, I am going to plead with you, the commissioners, to do what is right - yes the shift about any animal in captivity is changing, and rightly so, but let's do what's best for the ones that still are by giving them the best homes possible (as they no longer possess skills to survive in the wild), and let's continue the Scientists at the Vancouver Aquarium to continue the important work they do to better the lives of these animals wild counterparts by being able to learn what they have from these captive animals, while we still have them and are able to do so. There will come a time where there will be no captive animals, but right now there still is and Vancouver is the best home possible for them.

I trust the words of the Scientists, people that have dedicated their lives to their studies and show true passion and care for these animals over anyone that can press play on Netflix and watch Blackfish and then hold a megaphone on a side walk. I look forward to responses from you to prove that you are listening to the voices of the residents of the City of Vancouver and aren't just dismissing opinions that may differ from your own.

Hello Vancouver Park Board Member

First of all, thank you very much for your service to the city! We are lucky to have a city that values parks and outdoor activities!

I would like to let you know about my concern and disappointment in the recent decision to remove all cetaceans from the Vancouver Aquarium. I have been reading up on the Vancouver Aquarium and came across this post on social media and it echoes my thoughts exactly. It is well thought out and well written so I am copying it here. Please know that what follows is exactly what I've been thinking and feeling since this decision was made...

## "Here are the facts:

- The Aquarium does not capture from the wild or accept animals into the facility other organizations have captured from the wild. We were the first Aquarium in the world to pledge not to capture from the wild 21 years ago, in 1996. If you've been told we capture from the wild (or condone others doing it), that's not an 'alternative fact', that is a blatant lie!

- We aren't breeding cetaceans. In the three years I've been here, I can personally attest there has been no opportunity for mating as there were no mixed gender sexually mature groupings. Just last month, the Aquarium committed that the beluga research program would remain non-breeding (same gender groups) until its completion in 2029. Those that tell you we breed animals for entertainment/profit are lying to you!

- The cetaceans that currently reside at the Aquarium are rescued animals that cannot survive in the wild. Chester (False Killer Whale) & Daisy (Harbour Porpoise) were both stranded in the first two months of their lives. In the simplest of terms: they cannot be released as they'd starve. Helen (Pacific White Sided Dolphin) was fishing by catch in Japan and had her front flippers partially amputated as a result. She is a fighter but her injuries would be a death sentence in the wild. These animals serve as ambassadors for their species, involved in research programs to protect wild populations and inspiring our youth to preserve our oceans while there is still time.

- We run Canada's only marine mammal rescue facility. Our goal when rescuing any animal (cetacean or not) is to release the animal after rehabilitation. We don't decide if an animal is releasable, the federal government (department of fisheries) makes that decision. We share the same opinion as you, that these majestic animals deserve a second chance at life!

- Sea pens as an alternative to Aquariums to home rescued animals that are deemed non-releasable are not an option for numerous reasons: water pollutants, risk of illness, impact on local wild cetaceans, excessive financial burden, risk of entanglement in storms, veterinarian monitoring etc. Sometimes the reasons are more obvious than others: Chester, for example, is a warm water species that could not thrive in our local waters. If this was an option, with our 61 year history of marine research and innovative 'can do' nature, we'd be all over it!

- The Parks Board approved our detailed 3 phase expansion plans. We are about to launch phase 2 this Fall which expands our outside cetacean habitat space. The funds have been raised but come with strings attached as to what they can be

used for and when they must be used by – they cannot be redirected off site. So anyone that tells you we should be spending that money on building sea pens or expanding the Marine Mammal Rescue Centre does not have the facts. I'd suggest asking them why the Parks Board would approve the expenditure only to turn around a few years later once we've raised the money and ban cetaceans at the facility.

IF THE MOTION GOES AHEAD AS PLANNED:

- The rescued cetaceans currently living at the Aquarium would have to go. Can't we make provisions to let these animals remain where they are well cared for? Daisy and Helen are both also reaching the end of their natural life spans.

- The Aquarium would not be able to offer a home for rescued cetaceans. Without a potential long term home for these animals to go to, they could be euthanized rather than rescued. Ask yourself if you believe that animals are better off dead than in an aquarium?

- Our research on the Arctic will be severely impacted at a time when global warming is not a theory, but a reality. Our beluga research program has allowed scientists to develop theories and perfect their methods before working with wild populations. We won't be able to bring older non-breeding belugas (which weren't captured from the wild) from other aquariums to continue the vital work that Aurora and Qila were part of."

Thank you for taking the time to read my email. I have two questions to wrap up... 1. The first is to ask you to re-consider your decision. Especially given all the good that Vancouver Aquarium does for these rescue animals, their commitment to no breeding and rescued only animals as well as their plan to expand.

2. The second is to answer the public's question about what happens to the cetaceans now. Where will they go? Can you guarantee that they are going to a better home than the one Vancouver Aquarium provides (and will provide once the expansion happens?). My fear is that we aren't thinking about what is truly best for the animals, but only thinking short term (please don't mistake my comment I do care greatly for these animals that is why I truly believe that they are in the best hands at Vancouver Aquarium and am worried about their future).

To whom it may concern,

In regards to banning the display of cetatceans at the Vancouver aquarium I wish to share my opinion as a permanent Vancouver resident.

I was born  $\frac{s.22(1)}{care}$  and have lived in this city all my life. I grew up learning how to care for my local oceans through my father,  $\frac{s.22(1)}{s.22(1)}$  and the Vancouver Aquarium. I am also a sous chef to the  $\frac{s.22(1)}{s.22(1)}$  in West Vancouver, an 'Ocean Wise' participant and we are known for our sustainable seafood. I wish to share with you a few facts below:

- The Aquarium does not capture from the wild or accept animals into the facility other organizations have captured from the wild. We were the first Aquarium in the world to pledge not to capture from the wild 21 years ago, in 1996. If you've been told we capture from the wild (or condone others doing it), that's not an 'alternative fact', that is a blatant lie!

- We aren't breeding cetaceans. In the three years I've been here, I can personally attest there has been no opportunity for mating as there were no mixed gender sexually mature groupings. Just last month, the Aquarium committed that the beluga research program would remain non-breeding (same gender groups) until its completion in 2029. Those that tell you we breed animals for entertainment/profit are lying to you!

- The cetaceans that currently reside at the Aquarium are rescued animals that cannot survive in the wild. Chester (False Killer Whale) & Daisy (Harbour Porpoise) were both stranded in the first two months of their lives. In the simplest of terms: they cannot be released as they'd starve. Helen (Pacific White Sided Dolphin) was fishing by catch in Japan and had her front flippers partially amputated as a result. She is a fighter but her injuries would be a death sentence in the wild. These animals serve as ambassadors for their species, involved in research programs to protect wild populations and inspiring our youth to preserve our oceans while there is still time.

- We run Canada's only marine mammal rescue facility. Our goal when rescuing any animal (cetacean or not) is to release the animal after rehabilitation. We don't decide if an animal is releasable, the federal government (department of fisheries) makes that decision. We share the same opinion as you, that these majestic animals deserve a second chance at life!

- Sea pens as an alternative to Aquariums to home rescued animals that are deemed non-releasable are not an option for numerous reasons: water pollutants, risk of illness, impact on local wild cetaceans, excessive financial burden, risk of entanglement in storms, veterinarian monitoring etc. Sometimes the reasons are more obvious than others: Chester, for example, is a warm water species that could not thrive in our local waters. If this was an option, with our 61 year history of marine research and innovative 'can do' nature, we'd be all over it!

- The Parks Board approved our detailed 3 phase expansion plans. We are about to launch phase 2 this Fall which expands our outside cetacean habitat space. The funds have been raised but come with strings attached as to what they can be used for and when they must be used by – they cannot be redirected off site. So anyone that tells you we should be spending that money on building sea pens or expanding the Marine Mammal Rescue Centre does not have the facts. I'd suggest asking them why the Parks Board would approve the expenditure only to turn around a few years later once we've raised the money and ban cetaceans at the facility.

# IF THE MOTION GOES AHEAD AS PLANNED:

- The rescued cetaceans currently living at the Aquarium would have to go. They don't care about where to (or if they are euthanized), as long as they aren't on display in Stanley Park. If they cared about animal welfare, they'd make provisions to let these animals remain where they are well cared for. Daisy and Helen are both also reaching the end of their natural life spans.

- The Aquarium would not be able to offer a home for rescued cetaceans. Without a potential long term home for these animals to go to, they could be euthanized rather than rescued. Ask yourself if you believe that animals are better off dead than in an aquarium? If your answer is no, then we need your help! If your answer is yes, please unfriend me because your value system is whacked!

- Our research on the Arctic will be severely impacted at a time when global warming is not a theory, but a reality. Our beluga research program has allowed scientists to develop theories and perfect their methods before working with wild populations. We won't be able to bring older non-breeding belugas (which weren't captured from the wild) from other aquariums to continue the vital work that Aurora and Qila were part of.

Thank you very much for taking the time to read this. I hope that my opinion as a long time Vancouverite will help take one small step in the direction of science and furthering our research to product these beautiful creatures.

Dear Vancouver Parks Board,

I write to you as a resident of Vancouver. I am not a member of the Vancouver Aquarium, nor do I believe that zoos and aquariums deserve a free pass in continuing to have animals on public display simply because it is what they have always done. But the Vancouver Aquarium is more than just a tourist attraction. It is an invaluable research facility which uses these animals to help connect visitors with the importance of conservation efforts.

It is easy to be caught up in an emotional response to the death of the two beluga whales this past year. It is harder to quantify the awareness that they brought to the Aquarium's many visitors about the issues facing Canada's Arctic species. Visitors who, for the most part, would never have otherwise had the chance to see a beluga in person.

Those who favor banning all cetaceans in captivity argue that there are plenty of other ways to learn about our oceans and the animals that live in them. But the reality is that many of these do not create the same connection as seeing such an animal in person, while others (such as whale watching tours) are out of financial reach for many, and do not come without their own risks to the greater populations of these species - look no further than the death of the resident killer whale known as J24 late last year, who died of complications due to blunt force trauma.

The reality is that having cetaceans visible to the public and an active part of programming is a large part of what allows the Vancouver Aquarium to continue the important research it conducts to protect these populations. According to their Annual Report, the Museum of Vancouver welcomed 71,612 visitors in 2015. Vancouver Aquarium welcomed more than 15 times that (1,116,075, according to their 2015 Annual Report). People come to the Aquarium to see the animals, and in the process they support research, learn more about these animals, and are provided with a call to action to improve the chances for these species to survive and to thrive.

You do not have to agree with the general concept of animals in captivity. But please recognize that the cetaceans who live at the Vancouver Aquarium are animals who

were rescued, rehabilitated, deemed non-releasable by separate, government organization, and in coming to the Vancouver Aquarium now contribute to muchneeded research and education. These animals cannot be returned to their natural habitat. By removing them from public view, all that you are doing is removing their opportunity to continue to educate and inspire visitors.

Voting to hold a plebiscite may be the option that makes the public happy, but it does so at the risk of endangering the Aquarium's ability to continue its research and public education efforts simply to stifle the loudest (and often least informed) of voices, those who believe whole-heartedly in their cause but who are unable to see the bigger picture as a result. I hope that you will consider this big picture as you move toward making a decision. The City of Vancouver prides itself as a green city, and there is nothing green about reducing opportunities to protect our ocean life.

Dear Mr. Chairman and Park Board Commissioners,

I am writing on behalf of the members and volunteers of No Whales In Captivity, to urge you to vote at tomorrow's board meeting to put strict measures in place to ban cetacean imports immediately.

At your January 23rd board meeting, we were encouraged to witness every one of you showing political will towards ending whale and dolphin suffering in Stanley Park, and we sincerely congratulate you for that.

At that meeting, park board staff reported to have received in the prior week, 447 emails urging commissioners to end cetacean captivity at the aquarium; 117 emails in support of the cetacean plebiscite motion; and a No Whales In Captivity's online petition with 4,521 signatures. FYI the petition now has 5,198 signatures. Here is a link to our petition: https://www.change.org/p/vancouver-park-board

In contrast, the Park Board received 3 e-mails opposed to holding a cetacean plebiscite.

However, No Whales In Captivity was disappointed when commissioners did not agree at that meeting to simply amend the second part of the motion, and instead voted in favour of a staff report that further delayed you making a decision, especially when everybody seemed to be on board.

By delaying this vote, you have given the Vancouver Aquarium the opportunity to announce seriously misleading plans that we fear some of the commissioners may decide to accept as a compromise. Please, we strongly urge you not to do that.

The Aquarium's absurd proposal to continue with its plans to spend \$20 million on expanding the cetacean exhibits for the next two years only to keep performing belugas for 10 more, is something we fear may sink the possibility of the Park Board finally imposing strict restrictions on cetacean importation, if a majority of commissioners decide to trust the Aquarium's claims.

Just the fact that the Aquarium has announced that it has no plans in regards to the future of those proposed expensive new whale show tanks after 2029, should give commissioners enough cause for concern to make you reject the Aquarium's unethical proposal altogether.

At your January 23rd board meeting, a motion was presented to hold a cetacean plebiscite in 2018. The motion also asked that the Park Board "write to the Vancouver Aquarium asking it consider not bringing cetaceans into the facility until after the results of the 2018 plebiscite are received."

We were hoping that commissioners at that meeting would have agreed to simply drop the word "consider" and just told the Aquarium not to bring any more cetaceans, period. If the Aquarium then announced that it refused to abide by your request, commissioners would have been justified to find a way to impose strong legal measures to restrict the Aquarium.

Furthermore, if the commissioners had voted in favour of a motion with strong amendments, we would now at least have the guarantee that the issue of whales in captivity would be placed in the next Vancouver municipal election's ballot so the public would finally have been allowed a say.

Although we are very much hoping that our concerns are unfounded and that this delay and the upcoming staff report, will only serve to strengthen your resolve to ban captivity immediately, we remain confused as to why a cetacean plebiscite, as well as a moratorium on imports, couldn't have been approved at that January 23rd meeting.

With all due respect, we can't help but wonder if Visions Vancouver and Green Party commissioners who voted in favour of the delay, were just not ready to give the lead on this issue back to the NPA, the party who started this ball rolling back in 1995 when NPA Park Board Chairman David Chesman warned the Vancouver Aquarium that any further request for land to expand the whale tanks would be sent for public vote in the form of a cetacean plebiscite in the elections of 1996. In the end, the board unfortunately compromised and enacted a bylaw that never worked, as 4 dolphins have already swam through the bylaw's loopholes and ended up performing at the Aquarium.

Considering that all the municipal political parties that commissioners currently represent on the board (NPA, Visions and Greens), as well as COPE, have taken turns at different times during the last 3 decades to rally behind holding cetacean plebiscites, as well as trying their hand at imposing restrictions on cetacean trade and breeding, it has been disheartening for us to witness the Vancouver Aquarium continuing to import performing cetaceans, while blatantly refusing to recognize the intent of any of the Park Board's restrictions.

At tomorrow's special meeting, you will be presented with a Park Board staff report, which should include options for banning captivity. Tomorrow you will again have the opportunity to erase our concerns and prove that your intentions are honourable and that you will all focus on finding a way to stop cetacean imports. We urge you not to compromise on this issue, to stand strong against powerful Aquarium pressure, and to please vote in favour of restrictions that will stop all cetacean imports.

Many thanks for your attention to our concerns and recommendations. No Whales In Captivity will have representatives speaking on behalf of our group at tomorrow's special meeting. Please contact me if you have any concerns or questions, as I would be more than happy to discuss them with you.

Last week the Parks Board voted to ban the display of cetaceans in Stanley Park (and therefore at the Vancouver Aquarium). I am livid at how science can be overshadowed by misinformation. I understand that scientists can come across arrogant (and therefore unlikable) – but that doesn't make what they say any less true!

Hopefully the below will offer my friends some insight into my frustration & encourage them to take the time to write an email in support of an organization I am extremely passionate about.

# THE FACTS:

- The Aquarium does not capture from the wild or accept animals into the facility other organizations have captured from the wild. We were the first Aquarium in the world to pledge not to capture from the wild 21 years ago, in 1996. If you've been told we capture from the wild (or condone others doing it), that's not an 'alternative fact', that is a blatant lie!

- We aren't breeding cetaceans. In the three years I've been here, I can personally attest there has been no opportunity for mating as there were no mixed gender sexually mature groupings. Just last month, the Aquarium committed that the beluga research program would remain non-breeding (same gender groups) until its completion in 2029. Those that tell you we breed animals for entertainment/profit are lying to you!

- The cetaceans that currently reside at the Aquarium are rescued animals that cannot survive in the wild. Chester (False Killer Whale) & Daisy (Harbour Porpoise) were both stranded in the first two months of their lives. In the simplest of terms: they cannot be released as they'd starve. Helen (Pacific White Sided Dolphin) was fishing by catch in Japan and had her front flippers partially amputated as a result. She is a fighter but her injuries would be a death sentence in the wild. These animals serve as ambassadors for their species, involved in research programs to protect wild populations and inspiring our youth to preserve our oceans while there

### is still time.

- We run Canada's only marine mammal rescue facility. Our goal when rescuing any animal (cetacean or not) is to release the animal after rehabilitation. We don't decide if an animal is releasable, the federal government (department of fisheries) makes that decision. We share the same opinion as you, that these majestic animals deserve a second chance at life!

- Sea pens as an alternative to Aquariums to home rescued animals that are deemed non-releasable are not an option for numerous reasons: water pollutants, risk of illness, impact on local wild cetaceans, excessive financial burden, risk of entanglement in storms, veterinarian monitoring etc. Sometimes the reasons are more obvious than others: Chester, for example, is a warm water species that could not thrive in our local waters. If this was an option, with our 61 year history of marine research and innovative 'can do' nature, we'd be all over it!

- The Parks Board approved our detailed 3 phase expansion plans. We are about to launch phase 2 this Fall which expands our outside cetacean habitat space. The funds have been raised but come with strings attached as to what they can be used for and when they must be used by – they cannot be redirected off site. So anyone that tells you we should be spending that money on building sea pens or expanding the Marine Mammal Rescue Centre does not have the facts. I'd suggest asking them why the Parks Board would approve the expenditure only to turn around a few years later once we've raised the money and ban cetaceans at the facility.

#### IF THE MOTION GOES AHEAD AS PLANNED:

- The rescued cetaceans currently living at the Aquarium would have to go. They don't care about where to (or if they are euthanized), as long as they aren't on display in Stanley Park. If they cared about animal welfare, they'd make provisions to let these animals remain where they are well cared for. Daisy and Helen are both also reaching the end of their natural life spans.

- The Aquarium would not be able to offer a home for rescued cetaceans. Without a potential long term home for these animals to go to, they could be euthanized rather than rescued. Ask yourself if you believe that animals are better off dead than in an aquarium? If your answer is no, then we need your help! If your answer is yes, please unfriend me because your value system is whacked!

- Our research on the Arctic will be severely impacted at a time when global warming is not a theory, but a reality. Our beluga research program has allowed scientists to develop theories and perfect their methods before working with wild populations. We won't be able to bring older non-breeding belugas (which weren't captured from the wild) from other aquariums to continue the vital work that Aurora and Qila were part of.

# WHAT YOU CAN DO:

The Parks Board is doing this in your name! They are saying Vancouver

residents do not want us to have cetaceans at the Aquarium. I don't believe that Vancouver residents want us to stop our rescue efforts or to end our valuable research that has the power to preserve these species in the wild.

This issue may seem bigger than you but I promise it is not. The Parks Board is being pressured by a small group of activists that believe animals are better dead than in an aquarium – your voice can make a difference!

Dear Ms. Calderwood,

I admire the passion you show for marine mammals but strong emotions often make people take black and white positions. I hope you'll allow some disagreement with your points without considering all dissenters as being the enemy. One small example would be your point about choosing captivity over euthanasia. I can assure you there are many people who would choose painless death over a lifetime of captivity. That opinion does not mean their value systems are whacked, it simply means that they differ from you. There are grey areas in ethical dilemmas.

This is an important and unavoidable issue if you take on the difficult task of animal rehabilitation. No matter what species you treat, there are only three outcomes of rehabilitation– survival with release, deatheuthanasia and survival but unreleasable. What do you do with those animals that can't be released? I put a lot of work into animal rehabilitation and frequently have to confront this question myself. Unfortunately, I cannot pretend to have a convenient answer but I do accept that long term care is a supportable proposition for unreleasable animals. That is the one area where I agree with the aquarium's practice (and their possible future role).

I followed the treatment of the false killer whale that was treated at the aquarium and was full of admiration for the care and attention it received. The animal looked so sick that I could hardly believe it when I read that it had survived – a fantastic effort. I quite accept that the animal cannot be released so what do you do next? I think most would accept that any rehab facility should have the ability to house animals who are stable, pain free but are clearly unable to return to the wild. I think it is fair to allow the public to see such animals but not to get them to perform tricks. My preference would be for a system of sea pens but I fully understand the practical and financial problems you touched upon.

Now I come to areas where we differ greatly and I'll start with your claims about the aquarium's research. Biological research is not easy – poorly chosen end points and, above all others, sampling error are at the top of the list of common mistakes. Studies of a small group of whales held in a small tank in Vancouver, apply only to other captive whales held in a temperate climate. That's it. Extrapolating those results to free swimming whales in an arctic climate is pseudo-science. The need for research is not a defendable reason to justify keeping whales captive. If you keep unreleasable animals then study them by all means but don't think those results inform anything other than the care of other rehabilitated whales. That's a fine aim of research but it does not tell you what goes on in the arctic. Finally, I would have more faith in the aquarium's claims that research is their emphasis if their peer-reviewed publication record weren't so sparse.

I am an older person and have had time to see that society constantly changes its attitudes with time. The majority opinion is now against the display of animals. The days when you could hold animals and charge people to gawp at them are coming to an end. If you stick to those old beliefs you will be on the wrong side of history. My advice is that the aquarium does not choose to fight against the inevitable but uses its skills to design a new approach that fits with the current opinion. Please do not waste your abilities trying to justify the unjustifiable.

Invest in modern virtual reality technology so that animals can be displayed without the need for their capture. It is a far better way to teach kids about wildlife. Use your skills to be a world centre for marine mammal rehabilitation and use your goodwill to get people to support a move towards a system of sea pens. Above all, please accept that there are large numbers of completely normal people that feel that keeping intelligent animals in small enclosures is cruel and harms the captive and captor alike.

On March 9, the Vancouver Parks Board made a decisive move and voted unanimously to draft an amendment that will prohibit the Vancouver Aquarium from displaying cetaceans in captivity. The Parks Board commissioners will soon vote on approving the measure that will effectively stop the aquarium from bringing in cetaceans for exhibition and entertainment, while also preventing the import of five beluga whales that it currently has loaned out on abusive "breeding loan" deals with SeaWorld and other commercial facilities. The commissioners deserve your thanks and require encouragement not to change their minds before the final vote, which will be sometime before May 15.

Whale and dolphin advocates have campaigned to end captivity at the Vancouver Aquarium for two decades. The deaths of 21-year-old Qila and her 30-year-old mother Aurora in November 2016 provided the opportunity for anti-captivity advocates to make another appeal to the Parks Board, which oversees the Aquarium's lease on Stanley Park land. In a public hearing held on March 9 and 10 to hear four options from its staff regarding captivity, the board quickly decided to choose one that is designed to see the end of cetacean captivity altogether.

Commissioner Stuart Mackinnon moved that the following amendment to its bylaws be drafted: "The Vancouver Board of Parks and Recreation directs staff to prepare and bring forward for enactment by the Board an amendment to the Parks Control By-law to prohibit the importation and display of live cetaceans in Vancouver parks and report back not later than 15 May 2017."

One-by-one, the commissioners, some of whom have been captivity proponents in the past, voted and gave their own reasons after listening to Mackinnon stating in part, "Commissioners, the time to act is now. The Aquarium has no intention of listening to us or listening to the voters. They have no intention of ending captivity for cetaceans themselves. Therefore, we must do it here and now. ...The fate of these creatures is in our hands."

As active supporters of In Defense of Animals, many of you had contacted the commissioners over the past few months at our request to implore the Parks Board to end cetacean captivity. In concert with other organizations and many other people, your efforts have made a difference. Now it's time to thank the commissioners who may again face a lawsuit from Vancouver Aquarium. Ask them to stay the course and follow through on their vote when they meet again May 15.



## NEWS INFORMATION

Re: Ringling Bros. and Barnum & Bailey Circus recently announced it was closing after 146 years, citing falling ticket sales, high operating costs and changing public tastes in entertainment.

The first bans on wild and domestic animal acts in circuses were in Saanich and Victoria. As a result of Lifeforce investigations of circuses, Saanich and then Victoria were the first cities in the world to ban all animal acts - both domestic and wild animal acts in 1991.

Based on Lifeforce investigations of a circus in Burnaby, these bylaws banned both domestic and wild animal acts in circuses and other types of shows. The Victoria SPCA with a veterinarian confirmed our findings. In addition to lions, tigers, monkeys, and elephants; the horses, dogs, and birds were injured and subjected to abuses.

The SPCA inspected the circus and noted the following: the majority of the horses had lacerations, abrasions or scars from old injuries. There was no food or water available for the tigers. The cages for the monkeys were extraordinarily small, not allowing the monkeys to stand on their hind legs. The inspector was told by the circus that the monkeys and dogs are kept in the cages at all times, except for the show performances. No water was provided for the monkeys and dogs. One dog broke a leg.

The inspector stated in her report, "this circus, where the animals did not have food or water available, where the animals were kept entirely in cages too small to allow the least bit of movement or comfort, and where it was impossible to find anyone to accept basic responsibility for the care of the animals was a prime example of everything that should not be allowed to occur in a circus".

Regretfully, other organizations failed to protect all circus animals when they later lobbied for bans on only "wild" animals in other cities. They failed to protect "domestic" animals.

Now it is time to stop aquatic aquarium circuses! We hope that the Vancouver Park Board will strengthen the 1996 Cetacean Bylaw to phase out the captivity as was intended!

#### Dear Madam Chair,

On behalf of the members and volunteers of No Whales In Captivity, I would like to thank you for proposing that the city hold a plebiscite on whale captivity during Vancouver's 2018 municipal elections. While we still need to discuss the wording of such whale referendum vote, there are more pressing issues at hand.

The empty whale show tank at the Vancouver Aquarium gives the Vancouver Park Board commissioners an immediate opportunity to finally end the importation of more whales. I understand that commissioner Mackinnon asked park board staff at your board meeting last night, whether the Park Board haS the authority to impose a moratorium on the importation of whales until the public can be consulted in 2018. With all due respect, Madam Chair, your staff's negative answer was wrong.

In 1996 the Vancouver Park Board, responding to the ethical principles of the community, enacted a bylaw intended to phase out the further introduction and imprisonment of cetaceans (whales, dolphins and porpoises) in Vancouver parks.

The Parks Control Bylaw section 9(e) was enacted by the Vancouver Park Board on November 4, 1996, under the authority of the Vancouver Charter, section 491 (a), which gives the Park Board the power to pass bylaws for "the exclusion from any of the parks, or any part thereof, of any animal or vehicle". This is section 9(e).

9. (e) No person shall bring into any park or keep or otherwise maintain in any park any aquatic mammal of the Cetacean order including, but not limited to, baleen whales, narwhals, dolphins, porpoises, killer whales and beluga whales, which has been captured or otherwise taken from its natural wild habitat, except that this prohibition shall not apply to:

(i) captive cetaceans caught from the wild prior to September 16, 1996 and cetaceans born into captivity at any time,

(ii) cetaceans which are already being kept or maintained in a park as of September 16, 1996,

(iii) a member of an endangered cetacean species, provided that approval for bringing it into a park has first been obtained from the Park Board, and

(iv) an animal that has been captured or otherwise taken from its natural wild habitat for the purpose of rehabilitating it from injury or preventing its death due to stranding provided that its capture or taking

and subsequent release to natural habitat is done under the jurisdiction and with the approval of the federal agency responsible and provided that the Park Board has been informed in as timely a manner as possible.

We strongly urge you to consider imposing an immediate ban on the importation of more whales, as the Vancouver Charter, section 491 (a) gives the Vancouver Park Board the authority to do just that. It is time for the Park Board to end the international commercial trade in performing beluga whales in Stanley Park.

## Dear Park Board;

I must take this time to implore you to **reconsider the proposed complete ban** on cetaceans at the Vancouver Aquarium. I strongly think that **exceptions must be made** for this bylaw. Animals that have been deemed non-releasable by the Department of Fisheries and Oceans (DFO) deserve proper treatment and care. I would be remiss to think that you would prefer them to be in the hands of a retched place like Marineland with uncountable animal rights violations. You must remember that the DFO - a government body of **highly trained scientists and specialists** is who decides which animals cannot fend for themselves, not the aquarium. The aquarium isn't trying to sneak illegal cetaceans in through the backdoor - they are trying to provide a life for animals that otherwise would not have life, normally due to human interactions.

While I agree that cetaceans should not be wild caught and kept for human entertainment, I think it would be a **severe injustice to euthanize or subject rescued and non-releasable ones to improper care** just to appease "the masses". The suggestion that Chester and other cetaceans could move to the rescue centre is very indicative of the research put into this decision - or should I say lack there of. There are no pools at the rescue centre that are adequate for long-term care. The rescue centre is just a stepping stone to re-release or a permanent home. It would be cruel to place a cetacean there for the rest of its life. The facility isn't big enough to create a space that would accommodate a permanent resident, let alone multiple.

If you truly care about these animals, I beg you to let **them stay in their current**, **safe**, **loving homes at the aquarium** and not subject them to the possibility of a inhumane life at a different facility. This is not a situation where "one size fits all", this is a situation that each case needs careful deliberation before decisions are made. An outright ban would be a backwards step both from a scientific and conservation point of view.

Not only does the aquarium provide a very high quality of life for these animals that could not survive in the wild, it also provides the opportunity for **public outreach and education**. Both of which are very important to encourage people to protect our natural world as well as inspire the future scientists of the world. People do not protect that which they do not know. Please continue to encourage people to learn about their natural world and to protect these amazing creatures that they grow to love. Nothing brings home the need to keep our oceans clean than to see the devastation it leaves, first hand. Hiding the mutilated cetaceans from public view does not change the fact that HUMANS are the ones who put them there in the first place. Do not condemn them because of our neglect of our natural world - let them teach the public the dangers that they inflict upon our wild whales so that perhaps there will no longer be a need to rescue them.

# Please include an exception to your bylaw and allow rescued, nonreleasable animals to remain at the aquarium - you would do both the public

## From Senator Moore's Bill-203:

" Phil Demers, the former Marineland trainer with whom we consulted on this bill, told us that since the United States generally won't allow the import of whales caught in the wild, Marineland purchases wild caught whales from Russia, breeds them in Canada and provides them to American aquariums. I have also learned that at Marineland, beluga whales and dolphins are trained to perform tricks through starvation and are fed Valium."

## From Jane Goodall:

"... the current permission of Vancouver Aquarium cetacean breeding programs on-site, and at SeaWorld with belugas on loan, is no longer defensible by science. This is demonstrated by the high mortality rates evident in these breeding programs and by the ongoing use of these animals in interactive shows as entertainment.... The phasing out of such cetacean programs is the natural progression of human-kind's evolving view of our non-human animal kin."

"Honourable senators, Jane Goodall is correct. Furthermore, I have yet to hear of that aquarium doing any research that has saved a single whale, nor an explanation of why research cannot be satisfactorily accomplished with rescued and currently captive cetaceans. What I have heard about are the concrete, moral harms of captive breeding, the individual suffering and the deaths. On an empathetic level, the practice is quite plainly cruel."

Why does Vancouver want to be known as Canada's premier centre for whale torture? Is servicing the U.S.'s much-despised SeaWorld Vancouver's mission in life?

This is my third email regarding cetaceans at the Vancouver Aquarium. It is discouraging that none of you have answered my two previous emails but I will continue sending you input because it is important that you know the potential outcomes of your decision last Thursday.

I am an employee of Vancouver Aquarium but I am also a resident of Vancouver and therefore one of your constituents as elected officials. I strongly advocate for the creation of an exemption that allows the Vancouver Aquarium to continue to care for rescued and non-releasable animals. Even the senate bill being debated has this exemption written in. If you insist on a total ban on the importation and display of cetaceans at the Vancouver Aquarium, it will have the following outcomes:

1) The ban would not prevent cetaceans from being taken from the ocean and no cetacean will be returning to the ocean from the Vancouver Aquarium. In 1996, The Vancouver Aquarium publicly stated we would no longer collect cetaceans from the ocean and we have never gone back on that promise. All of the cetaceans currently living at VA are rescued animals deemed non-releasable by government authorities because they would not be able to survive in the ocean.

2) In the event that our rescued dolphins and porpoises need to move, it may be difficult to find facilities able to provide the high standard of care they currently receive. We are one of only 4 institutions that have had an independent full review of operations by the American Humane association who have accredited us as having impeccable and humane treatment for all our animals. Moreover, few other facilities care for the dolphin and porpoise species we currently do.

3) The only marine mammal rescue center in Canada may no longer be able to rescue stranded whales, dolphins and porpoises that are sick or injured. On the surface, the Park's Board decision affects only what happens in Vancouver parks, but it actually has broader consequences. The effectiveness of our first-responders depends on the knowledge gained and techniques developed from the hands-on experience they have caring for cetaceans. For example, our veterinarians are on the forefront of developing sedation techniques for marine mammals. This will no doubt increase success rates of future emergency medical procedures. Chester the false killer whale who came through the marine mammal rescue centre in 2014 became the youngest false killer whale to ever survive a stranding. Little is known about the species so what we can learn from his care is especially valuable.

4) Without cetaceans in our care, our ability to conduct important research will be greatly diminished. Our cetacean research program began in the 1970s and has yielded a vast amount of knowledge that we hope will enable better conservation practices out in the ocean. Researchers pair what they learn from animals in our care to observations in the field to understand the bigger

picture. Listening to and analysing beluga vocalisation at the VA informs the observations our scientists make in the arctic and in the St Lawrence River. We are then able to bring solid evidence to policy makers, informing them of the impacts human created noise has on declining engendered beluga populations in the St. Lawrence. In collaboration with UBC researchers, we've been able to learn about Pacific white-sided dolphin energy requirements. Taking metabolic data that could only be collected from dolphins in human care and combining that data with observations of dolphin demographics and activity out in the field, researchers were able to create a model for calculating caloric requirements for Pacific white-sided dolphins that can be applied to any region of the North Pacific. This information can then inform conservation efforts and fisheries management policy. These are just two examples of many. More to be found

### 5) The Vancouver Aquarium will be less effective in spreading the message of awareness that whales, dolphins and porpoises are facing increasing threats from human activity in our world today. Globally, cetaceans face entanglement in fishing gear, difficulty finding food due to human overfishing, bioaccumulation of toxins, boat strikes, and noise pollution just to name a few impacts of human activity. If we didn't have cetaceans at VA, I would of course still talk about all of these issues. We would still create and run programs to empower people to take action to buy sustainable seafood, clean up shorelines, follow whale watching guidelines and generally reduce our impact on our the oceans. But hear me out; my job is to talk to our visitors, get them to care about the issues and ask them to take action. So I know that most visitors don't come through our doors asking for advice on ocean conservation. They are here to find something interesting to look at. When they see Helen the Pacific white-sided dolphin, they see that her flippers have been damaged by fishing gear. They are then open to hearing me tell them about the thousands of dolphins entangled in fishing nets each year and what can be done about it. Every time I tell an animal rescue story, it builds empathy. People are then able to see how human actions can impact wildlife. Opponents of what we do say we are only providing an entertainment experience that exploits the animals. But while protesters were outside shouting insults and misinformation, I was having regular conversations with visitors excited to tell me they learned something from their visit. I was telling children who were excited to become marine biologists that they could already do the work of one now by collecting information and submitting it, just like our scientists do.

Last year, the Vancouver Aquarium welcomed a record breaking 1.18 million visitors. I am not deluded in thinking that every single one of them was moved to change their behavior to conserve aquatic life. But my conversations with visitors and our members tell me that some of them really are. It does happen. I hope you have read the heartfelt message sent to you by my colleague <sup>s.22(1)</sup> I quote her again here saying that the reason she became a marine biologist was because "[her] Nana took [her] to the Aquarium every month when [she] was young. The belugas captivated [her] attention from the very beginning and, since then, learning about and protecting the ocean is all [she has] ever wanted to do."

Dear parks board commissioners, if you are trying to do the right thing, allow Vancouver Aquarium to keep caring for rescued and non-releasable dolphins and porpoises. Do not impede the important work of our marine mammal rescue center and allow the importation of non-releasable animals that are in need of a permanent home. Having them there to receive world-class care while contributing to research and conservation outreach is the best possible outcome for rescued whale, dolphin and porpoises. I do not believe that moving the cetaceans out of Stanley Park serves anyone any good. I worry that in future cetacean strandings, the only option will be euthanasia.

What are your thoughts on what should happen to the non-releasable animals that the Vancouver Aquarium currently cares for?

What is your proposed solution for future strandings?

Dear Parks Board,

It is with great disappointment and concern that my family and I learned of your decision to bring forward an amendment for the importation and display of cetaceans at the Vancouver Aquarium. We have been membership holders and supporters of the Aquarium for 5 years, and plan to continue our support. In the time that we have been able to enjoy this world class facility, a world leader in cetacean research, my children and thousands of others have had an opportunity to see and connect with these incredible creatures first hand, to learn more about them and really understand their importance and value in our world, something that would not otherwise have been possible. We, as adults, have become the guardians of our environment, even as we stress it, but the delicate ecology that supports all cetaceans requires a long term plan, long than the term of a park board commissioner or even our lifetimes. To truly support these vital creatures and protect the environment (of which we often forget we are a part) it's crucial that we take the long view and ensure that our children learn to value them too. When a child learns to value something, it becomes part of their core values to protect and nurture it. Without exposure to the amazing animals featured in the Cetacean program at the Vancouver Aquarium, adults and children both will place far less value on the survival of these creatures. Children who don't care about cetaceans usually grow up to be adults who don't care about cetaceans, and the adults they grow into will be the DFO workers, ministers, Park Board commissioners, MPs and just regular joes whose everyday decisions will impact the survival of all species affected by this ban.

Furthermore, I feel there has been very little weight given to the fact that the cetaceans living in the Aquarium, while they do not have the space they would in the wild (clearly), are only the animals deemed unreleasable by the DFO - not by the Aquarium itself - and that these creatures would die in the wild, often very quickly. My family and I fail to see how leaving a creature (whose species is already feeling the effects of global warming, pollution and other environmental damage and loss) to die is of any advantage to that species or to us. I witnessed the passionate testimony of a lady who declared that while she was previously firmly in favor of the cetacean program, the loss of the belugas affected her to such a degree that she felt the program should be discontinued altogether. While I respect her grief, I would argue that this is not, of itself, valid reason to discontinue a program that continues to save lives of these creatures, most of whom are released back into their natural habitat successfully after being treated gently and effectively using knowledge that was in large part gained from the research and learning afforded by the Aquarium's cetacean program.

In short, I see no benefit to the Park Board's decision other than to show that it will listen to whichever voices are loudest, without the benefit of extensive, considered research and consultation with experts, as well as the public. There is no benefit to future rescues (and usually re-release back into the wild) of cetaceans, there is no benefit to the thousands upon thousands who visit the Aquarium every year and there is no benefit to an institution that for 60 years has shown itself to be a respected leader in research of marine mammals. We are incredibly privileged not

only to have such a facility in our city, but to be able to visit it and taste, just a little, the amazing diversity our oceans and rivers hold. Living in a city, marvellous as Vancouver is for outdoor living, in many ways can cut us off from the natural world. The Aquarium allows a glimpse of something otherwise unaccessible to most people.

I realize that my family and I are not the loud voices you heard shouting at the Park Board meeting on March 8th, but we are part of many, many who do support the Aquarium. Please do not cripple this incredible institution and the dedicated, passionate people who work there and strive to share their passion for the natural world with us. You would be doing us all a great disservice.

Another 2 Vancouver Aquarium Bred Belugas Die

A two-year-old beluga whale, "Stella", died Friday, November 13<sup>th,</sup> at SeaWorld San Antonio. She was being treated for signs of gastrointestinal issues, but her cause of death was not confirmed. This baby beluga was fathered by "Imaq" who was captured by the Vancouver Aquarium from the wild in 1990.

This is not the first Beluga whale to die this year at SeaWorld San Antonio. A beluga whale was born premature on June 20, then died on July 12. This

"Martha" was also fathered by Imaq.

Between 2006 and 2012 there were six baby belugas deaths during the joint breeding of wild caught belugas from the Vancouver Aquarium at US Sea Worlds.

The total number of cetacean deaths resulting from the Vancouver Aquarium pro captivity, entertainment business stands at 49 cetaceans (19 belugas, 14 Pacific white-sided dolphins, 7 narwhals, and 9 orcas).

The Vancouver Aquarium suffered a major defeat earlier this month when the Vancouver Park Board, with the support of organizations including the International Marine Mammal Project and thousands of concerned people, voted to ban cetacean captivity and imports. But this major win for belugas is being threatened – and your support at this point is crucial! The aquarium has launched an offensive, asking their members to flood the inboxes of the Park Board commissioners and publishing op-eds that attack the proposed amendment. Because they are the only facility on Canada's Pacific Coast that can currently take in stranded cetaceans, the aquarium claims that these individuals may have to be euthanized. But a seaside sanctuary is an infinitely better option than the concrete tanks at the Aquarium, and the Whale Sanctuary Project will likely see to it that stranded cetaceans will have a sanctuary to go to after all.

The draft amendment will prevent the display or importation of cetaceans within any Vancouver park – and since the Vancouver Aquarium is situated within Stanley Park, the amendment will apply to their facility. However, the amendment will not have any effect on the Vancouver Aquarium's rehab center, which is offsite.

The Aquarium currently has beluga whales out on breeding loans with SeaWorld and other facilities, and there is speculation that they want to bring these whales back to replace the mother and daughter who died late last year. But the amendment is designed to prevent them from doing this, as so far the Aquarium has been unable to determine the cause of the <u>two</u> belugas' deaths.





Dear Park Board members,

My name is s.22(1) and I am a master's student studying environmental history (specifically historical human-cetacean interactions) at the s.22(1) I am writing on behalf of myself and my partner, s.22(1) who is also a graduate student at the s.22(1) regarding the recent decision to prohibit the importation and display of cetaceans at the Vancouver Aquarium.

We have followed the issue closely since the unfortunate deaths of Qila and Aurora last fall. While we were both saddened by their passings and understand and recognize the frustrations that some Park Board members and many Vancouverites feel toward their deaths and cetacean captivity more broadly, we do not believe that all forms of cetacean captivity should be prohibited at the Vancouver Aquarium.

At issue for us is not the prohibition against the importation of the Aquarium's other belugas but rather the general restriction against the importation of any type of cetacean to the Aquarium. While we do not agree with the exploitative practices of aquaria like Seaworld and Marineland in Niagara (Marineland in particular has had countless complaints and OSPCA investigations against it in recent years), we recognize and truly believe in the value of the Vancouver Aquarium's Marine Mammal Rescue Centre. By prohibiting the importation of all cetaceans to the Aquarium, the Park Board is destroying one of the Aquarium's most valuable initiatives - both from the perspective of the animal and the human audience.

Often, the Vancouver Aquarium is called upon to help rescue distressed cetaceans throughout the Pacific Northwest. Their false killer whale, Chester, was rescued from Vancouver Island as an orphaned calf. Without the Marine Mammal Rescue Centre, Chester would have died in the wild. No one wants to see an animal die or, as a recent DFO statement reports, have to be euthanized, unnecessarily. While some might argue that Chester should have been left to die in the wild (as to avoid a life in captivity), his captivity at the Aquarium saved his life and has helped spark new interest in Aquarium visitors for false killer whales. Perhaps his quality of life is not on par with that of his wild cousins but it is better that he was rescued than left for dead.

At the same time, Chester serves as a valuable symbol for the rest of his species. Through his captivity at the Aquarium, humans, both young and old, are able to learn about the species and become more interested in their conservation and protection in the wild. Indeed, captive cetacean displays have helped to dramatically change people's perspectives toward these animals for the last fifty years. Before the Aquarium first displayed killer whales, they were believed to be ferocious killers - their captivity helped reveal that these animals were in fact more tame than initially thought and possessed unique levels of intelligence. Prior to their display at the Vancouver Aquarium in 1970, very few Canadians knew that narwhals were in fact real animals - their captivity helped to spark new interest in the species and promoted interest in their conservation as a whole. By allowing the Aquarium to continue to house distressed/orphaned animals (either temporarily or permanently), we can help save these animals from near certain death while at the same time educate children and generate new interest in these animals and their broader conservation.

Now, by no means are we saying that the Park Board should reverse its decision - in fact, we both support the idea of prohibiting the display of cetaceans in poor environments for exploitative purposes (this is not to say that the Vancouver Aquarium has poor facilities; from what we've seen in other exhibits, their facilities are comparatively better). That being said, we hate the idea that in the near future animals like Chester will be left to die or have to be euthanized on British Columbia's beaches when they could live out the rest of their days at the Aquarium in a way that educates the public about these animals and generates new scientific research and understandings of these animals.

While some may complain that the Vancouver Aquarium would continue to profit from these animals, we see no issue with this so long as they first and foremost look to rehabilitate these animals for return

to the wild and, if not possible, continue to advance various research, education, and conservation initiatives with these animals. We would ask that the Park Board write their by-laws in a way that allows the Aquarium to continue to save orphaned and distressed cetaceans in the Pacific Northwest and that they be allowed to stay at the Aquarium temporarily or, if necessary, in perpetuity. We think that the captivity of orphaned animals, like Chester, can do more good for the specific animal and the species as a whole than if he was left to die on the beaches of Vancouver Island.

## **OPEN LETTER**

#### To: Vancouver Parks Board and Vancouver City Council

#### Re: Time to Amend the Cetacean Bylaw to Truly Phase Out Cetaceans

On November 25<sup>th</sup> the Vancouver Aquarium said that the last beluga was recovering. However, "Aurora", the mother of "Qila" who died on November 16th, died later that Friday. She is the 21<sup>st</sup> beluga who has died as a result of the Vancouver Aquarium cetacean slave trade.

Lifeforce is deeply saddened at the lifelong captivity and deaths of "Aurora" and "Qila" and many others. We also deeply regret that the capture of "Aurora" and others were permitted and hopefully it will now be banned.

#### **Broken Beluga Promises**

"Aurora" was one of three captured and taken to the Vancouver Aquarium. Another beluga was severely cut by the capture ropes then was quietly released.

In 1988, the Vancouver Aquarium and the Vancouver Park Board stated "Will the Aquarium be collecting new whales for the new facility? No. The new facility is designed for the existing three belugas; 2 females and a male." However, when one died the Aquarium captured three more belugas in 1990. The pool was then overcrowded, aggression occurred, and some belugas were kept in a tiny research pool out of public view.

Lifeforce's court action failed and we went to Churchill, MB to bear witness and hopefully stop the captures. Our boats were rammed and raked with an outboard engine. One beluga hunter was charged when our volunteer was injured. Even after the belugas were captured our boats were riddled with bullets where our volunteer was sleeping. At least our public awareness led to an unofficial ban on any further captures and exports by other countries. No countries have caught belugas since 1990.

**Referendum is a Delay Tactic?** An NPA Park Board Commissioner and a former Vancouver Aquarium VP of Marketing and Communications has proposed a referendum on captivity. For years the "Non Partisan Association" has always opposed any referendum as proposed by other parties.

Lifeforce was instrumental in getting a 1996 Cetacean Bylaw that was supposed to have phased out captivity. Under the Vancouver Charter the Park Board has the

jurisdiction to implement bylaws restricting any animals in city parks. The Commissioners should amend the 1996 Cetacean Bylaw to reinstate the intended purpose to phase out all cetacean captivity. The NPA watered down the bylaw over the years and that has perpetuated the suffering and deaths of many dolphins.

#### Amend the Cetacean Bylaw to Phase Out Cetaceans

Why wait until 2018 when the Aquarium plans include more pools and more belugas in 2017? Then a referendum would be too late with new prisons perpetuating cetacean captivity. A costly earlier referendum would revert back to the bylaw or amendments anyways. If the NPA wants a referendum on the aquarium's future later on then compromise by implementing a Cetacean Bylaw that will phase out cetacean captivity now! Stop the Suffering now!

Any referendum should:

1. Ask if Vancouverites support the Cetacean Bylaw that would be amended to phase out the captivity of cetaceans.

2. Include a moratorium on all expansion plans, such as more beluga pools and belugas, pending the results.

### A New Expansion Permit and Public Comment Period

It was a 2006 expansion plan that was approved for completion in 2010. This plan was not implemented due to lack of funding. That eight part expansion was the largest in history nearly doubling the size. It included river otters (that Vancouverites voted against during a 90s referendum to close the Stanley Park Zoo), beaver (who are found living freely in Stanley Park), and suggested having Arctic Foxes and other new species of wildlife.

The 10 year old expansion permit should be cancelled and the Vancouver Aquarium should apply for an updated permit that would allow for a public comment period. Since 2006, new species have been acquired, new species may be imported, and there are new business plans such as aquaculture for the sushi market and operating an aquarium in Spain. Further, the last Arctic Canada expansion included narwhals. Is this still part of their secret plans?

#### The SADquarium

"Aurora" is the 52nd cetacean who has died as a result of the Vancouver Aquarium cetacean slave trade in the past 52 years. At least 9 orcas, 7 narwhals, 21 belugas, 1 Harbour porpoise, and 14 Pacific white-sided dolphins have died! No orca babies survived and belugas also died at a very young age. Qila had a failed pregnancy in 2001 and her 3 year old died in 2011. Her mom , "Aurora", lost another 3 year old in 2005.

Aurora was one of four captured in 1990 in Manitoba. One was severely cut buy the capture ropes and was quietly released. (Two males and a female captured in 1985 were later sent to Sea Worlds for breeding. In 2015, Nanuq, the father of Qila, died from a fractured jaw during a fight with other belugas.)

History proves that experiments on captives are not necessary. There is a lucrative research industry mainly funded by public taxes under the guise of conservation. For example, beluga pollution/diet studies started in the 70s and communication studies started in 1947. All were done by field studies. It is already known that major threats include the decimation of fish populations, pollution, military weapon tests, and disturbances from boats.

The ongoing inhumane captivity abuses include the causes of illnesses/deaths can be uncertain, the ongoing deaths are premature, the breeding programs are a failure, the abnormal stereotypical and neurotic behaviours are common and the physical and psychological needs cannot be provided for in pool prisons. I am a resident of the City of Vancouver and have ocean kayaked for decades. My kayaking adventures have taken me three times to the east coast of Vancouver Island, and in particular Telegraph Cove and Robson Bight. During those trips, I have seen many orca pods in the wild, and during my trip last August, I was treated to an extraordinary display of breaching humpback whales.

Although one might think this would make me opposed to the retention of whales in captivity at the Aquarium, it has had the opposite effect. That is because I know that the only people who will have the opportunity to see whales in the wild, as I have done, are the well to do who can afford an expensive whale watching expedition, or people like myself who have the outdoorsman skills to undertake this on their own, and the luxury of the time to travel to a remote location to see whales in the wild. I wonder how many of the commissioners have ever done that? The reality is most ordinary folk and their kids will never have those opportunities.

When I voted in the past civic election for parks board, I chose to vote for the NPA slate, knowing that Vision and the Greens were opposed to retaining whales in captivity. I instead voted for allowing that that practice to continue, in the interest of providing city dwellers and their children with the opportunity to educate themselves about these magnificent creatures, perhaps igniting their interests to learn more about marine mammals, and maybe even encouraging them to do as I have done -- to travel to the whales natural habitat to see them in the wild.

I do not have a problem retaining a few in captivity to serve those laudable goals.

I believe the majority of the citizens of Vancouver are with me on this side of the issue. Regrettably majorities often remain silent, and their failure to speak up leaves the loudest voices heard being those of the minority -- here the animal rights activists. Surely the fact that the Aquarium continues to draw record numbers of visitors is evidence of the public support it has for the choices it has made.

As a final word I should add that I am not a fan of governing by referendum. That approach is inconsistent with our grand traditions of parliamentary democracy. We elect representatives to make decisions on our behalf, not to turn back to the electorate at the time of difficult decision making. In my view the latter only represents an abandonment of your responsibility as elected officials.

Dear Park Board Commissioners,

I am writing in favor of the ban on the captivity of whales and dolphins at the Vancouver Aquarium. I am a former volunteer of the Aquarium and would like to share my insight based on that experience.

Many of you have children of your own, or act as children advocates in one way or another. I am writing this message also as a mother, connected to all mothers.

Back in 2009, baby Nala was born to Aurora (already a grand-mother at the time). Along with other volunteers and staff members, I spent very long nights propping my eyes open with pencils, counting Nala's nursing sessions (left? right? was there a milk cloud? how many seconds?), poops (brown? yellow? black?), and breaths at the surface back in 2009. More often than not, I ended up bent into a pretzel shape in the small window of the aquarium food service office. The office has a "view" on the underwater of the medical pool where the whales often hung out at night.

I entered the experience with joy, and exited with deep sadness. Today, as a mother, having tracked my own kids' nursing sessions and dirty diapers, I have a really hard time understanding how other parents, especially moms, can support the captivity of mammals in such ridiculously minuscule enclosures. Obviously, most people believe that animals' lives aren't worth much (other than perhaps their pets, and even then). I am grateful that the Park Board commissioners, including those who have in the past affiliated with the aquarium, are now open to considering other points of view. Let's see things from Aurora's perspective for a moment.

Nala's mom, Aurora, was not a rescue: she was captured from the wild in the late 1980s. Imagine for a moment being born and raised in the open sea, and finding yourself in a concrete pool that you can circumnavigate in about 2 minutes (taking your time). All right, everyone made mistakes, the aquarium now has changed its ways and doesn't capture from the wild. Great. Now imagine being housed with a male beluga for a little while, and then giving birth to a daughter (Qila, born long before Nala) in that same concrete pool. Then seeing her have a child of her own (Tiqa) after another "conjugal visit". Aurora knew that Tiqa would never get to roam the wild sea either. Belugas are smart animals and certainly Aurora would have been aware of the absurdity of her life, and of that of her offspring born in captivity. She may even have been able to communicate about it to her daughter. To say nothing of those who died... wait, they all died in the end. Aurora, the original mom, died last.

One may argue in favour of the the aquarium's Marine Mammal Rescue operations, I personally no longer have a clear mind about it. However, the policy of facilitating breeding in captivity is profoundly inhumane. Of course, it means that within a few years there will no longer be belugas on exhibit at the Vancouver Aquarium, impacting the aquarium's business model, space, and above all marketing. Also, researchers will have to get more creative to continue gaining insight about whales. Mind you, this may be a good thing for science, because there are good chances that the physiology of captive belugas does not so easily transfer to their wild friends. (For comparative purposes, let's remember that our knowledge of a "healthy" human anatomy was really quite off back in the days when only very poor people's bodies were dissected in med schools, up to sometime in the early 20th century. Are we so sure that captive-born belugas behave like their wild counterparts?)

There are aquariums in progressive jurisdictions where captive cetaceans are not allowed. Maui comes to mind. Their facilities are less grandiose, but nevertheless very educational and engaging, and beloved by children of all ages (especially on rainy days!). The Maui one includes excellent interactive displays on whales which are frankly more engaging than watching a depressed beluga eating a bucket of fish and maybe flashing its tail, which was the standard offering at VanAqua until the passing of Qila and Aurora. (For the record, the Maui Ocean Center also releases its bigger specimens - turtles and sharks - back to the wild after a few months. Not great but still better than keeping them forever.)

I have no doubt that this is a difficult issue for the Park Board, and I commend you on doing the right thing as you take steps toward a cetacean ban in Stanley Park. I am confident that you will carefully consider the modalities of the ban so that the Aquarium's more valuable activities, if any, may be preserved.

#### **OPEN LETTER**

Regretfully I am cannot be there because I am on Vancouver Island conducting Ocean Friends work.

In 1996 Lifeforce campaigned for the Cetacean Bylaw that was supposed to have phase out the captivity of cetaceans. However, in later years, the Vancouver Aquarium (VA) and the NPA made amendments that perpetuated captivity.

#### **5** Reasons to End Captivity Now!

#### 1. The Aquarium will build more pools by 2019.

More pools mean more captives. This expansion plan is an 11 year old plan from 2006. The Aquarium should apply for a new building permit and permission with their new captivity plans clearly defined! Any expansion approval does not exclude them from a cetacean ban!

#### 2. The Aquarium will spend \$20 million dollars on the whale pools.

Most of the money for ongoing expansions has been from Federal and Provincial governments. Private donors include a mining company that has been fined for several environmental pollution violations.

They will seek more government funding for experiments on the captives. That will take time and funding away from important field studies that truly help save wildlife!

**3.** The Aquarium will import up to 5 belugas in spite of not knowing why the last 2 belugas died. In addition, 52 cetaceans have died as a result of their pro captivity business in the 52 years since they started cetacean imprisonment.

#### 4. The Aquarium may end beluga captivity by 2029.

However, the Aquarium would fill the pools with various species as "rescues" from "Canadian shores" that will perpetuate the cetacean captivity. For decades the claims "not suited for release" have been free sources for aquariums and zoos worldwide.

Organizations worldwide do not need to practice on captives for rescue work. And there are many examples of the "untrained" concerned citizens saving cetaceans. Saving human lives on the mountains do not require human prisoners.

# 5. The Aquarium will rebrand themselves as a "wildlife rescue centre" to continue their entertainment and research business.

**First,** a noisy public tourist attraction with year round parties is not the proper secluded hospital environment that is necessary for medical recovery in a wildlife centre. The space requirements also cannot be met. The Aquarium can use their offsite non-public locations that could include sea pens and DFO locations.

In the rare event of large cetaceans in need of help there are government agencies, organizations, and others that would lead.

The BC Provincial Lab does the necropsies. The Animal Health Centre provides world class veterinary diagnostic services that protect the health of all animals in B.C. to support disease prevention, control and eradication. They have determined all captive deaths for decades too.

The Aquarium would continue in their other locations such as the Main Street centre, Popham Island research centre (if still available), and the many DFO stations on Vancouver Island and in West Vancouver (<u>http://www.pac.dfo-mpo.gc.ca/locations-bureaux-eng.html</u>).

The Vancouver Aquarium site is not needed.

**Secondly,** the Aquarium plans are to combine entertainment with experiments on the captives and "rescues" as "untapped resources and tools" for lucrative jobs under the guise of conservation. Experiments could include implanting tracking and medical devices that has caused major infections during other experiments.

They are presently doing beluga bioacoustics studies in the wild in addition to many other organizations. The Vancouver Aquarium also has belugas in experiments at the Spanish Oceanographic aquarium that is under the management of the Vancouver Aquarium.

Belugas communication started in 1947 and beluga diet/pollution 1970s lead to a sanctuary in the St. Lawrence. Since the 90s the population has increased from 500 to 800.

In 2007 a meeting was held at the VA to look at ways to get use captives and "rescues" as untapped resources. Their report was titled "Marine Mammals in the Lab: Tools for Conservation and Science". It was hosted by UBC Marine Mammal Research Unit, Vancouver Aquarium, Alliance of Marine Mammal Parks and Aquariums. The US Navy also attended.

The report actually revealed the industry's own concerns over the many problems with experiments on captives. They stated that in many ways it does not represent life in the wild. The report included photos of some experimental procedures but is only a glimpse behind the closed doors of animal research laboratories. There was also a photo of an Aquarium employee lying in the sea lion restraint device while 2 sea lions are made to stand posing on each side. Are they joking about their "tools for conservation and science."?

They also discussed how to deal with animal protection groups. <u>https://www.researchgate.net/publication/230705227 Marine Mammals in the Lab Tools for Conservation</u> <u>Science</u>

Studies would continue but not on captives at the Vancouver Aquarium. The Parks Board would not be hampering any so call "conservation" studies.

### The Facts of Wildlife:

1. There are countless wildlife deaths in their natural homes. That is far more humane than them dying in transport, not recovering after months in an alien prison, being subjected to experiments, and/or kept as part of the aquarium/zoo international animal trade.

2. Euthanasia is part of the operating policies of wildlife rescue organizations. There are worldwide accepted procedures to euthanize stranded, injured and other cetaceans. There are not enough pools and cages in the for all the wildlife cases.

As I said re: my Open Letter today and my earlier Crux of the Matter is that the Aquarium will claim that they need the Aquarium for "rescue" and research. They are running a radio ad confirming this.

The response is that both is being done by many organizations worldwide. The expanded aquarium with a lot more cetaceans is what they want but is not needed. If allowed it will perpetuate captivity. The Board would not be blamed for standing in the way of "conservation"

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### The End?

The aquarium and zoo circuses are part of the problems not the solutions. They cannot provide the physical and psychological necessities of cetacean life and will never teach people about their lives in the wild.

Since 1981, Lifeforce has fought for cetacean freedom through all of the Vancouver Aquarium expansions that has always meant more pools and more captives. Now after 52 cetacean deaths in 52 years of cetacean captivity it is time to end the suffering!

This is a crucial time as the Aquarium has only 3 cetaceans left – a False killer whale, a Pacific white-sided dolphin, and a Harbour porpoise. Five cetaceans died between 2015 and 2016. The plan to built more pools and get more cetaceans must be stopped!.

It cannot show all the history of all the suffering but it shows the callous harpooning of an endangered orca that started the orca slave trade, the beluga cut by capture ropes in 1990 and dumped, the first belugas inhumanely kept in the tiny shark tank, the orca Skana who went head first into a broken viewing window requiring 100 stitches, and the forced circus tricks.

As Canada looks at a nationwide cetacean ban the Vancouver Parks Board decision could be a historic breakthrough for dolphin freedom. Get the truth from those without vested interests.

If people are against capturing and imprisoning wild cetaceans then they should also be against capturing frightened, sick, and injured wild cetaceans for any life sentence in a pool prison.

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
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

Lets get the facts straight about the referendum risks:

1. Any delay tactic would be the 2018 referendum proposed by Kirby-Young who was formerly a Vancouver Aquarium public relations employee. That 2-year delay would jeopardize the phase out of cetaceans.

Referendum results would be passed on to a newly elected Board. The majority of anti captivity Commissioners may not be elected and then no phase out/ban action.
 Referendum issue would also involve the City Councillors.

4. The Aquarium has plans to build more pools in 2017. Aquariums expansions and other operations are funded by governments. That's our tax monies! And More Pools Means More Dolphins!

5. Why is the pro Aquarium/captivity NPA party now pushing for a referendum? That is the true delay tactic because the Aquarium does not want a more immediate, enforceable Cetacean Bylaw.

6. Some people supported a referendum unaware that a stronger Cetacean Bylaw would lead to a more immediate end to captivity. During the last election, there was a consensus among many Vancouver organizations (Lifeforce, Sea Shepherd, Whale Friends, No Whales In Captivity, BC Animal Liberation,...) We had agreed to support the Cetacean Bylaw that the ruling Vision Vancouver supported. But at a public meeting one organization broke the agreement by supporting a referendum that they even wanted instead of a bylaw back in 1996. They, alone, have continued to oppose any kind of bylaw. At that time that could have lost the support by Vision Vancouver that wanted a bylaw change to end captivity.

7. The Motion for a referendum does not allow for any public and Aquarium Speakers at the

Parks Board meeting. So the Aquarium did not confirm or denied if they would agree to no more cetaceans and no more pools until any referendum results are obtained. So why would you pass a risky referendum with no Aquarium agreement?

Requesting a Staff Board report that comes back to Parks Board meeting permits such questioning.

8. Any nonbinding referendum win would go back to the bylaw anyways.

The Vancouver Park Board will get a Staff Report that would look at the most effective ways to quickly phase out cetacean captivity at the Vancouver Aquarium. That could help whales and dolphins by phasing out captivity with a stronger Cetacean Bylaw! End of story then!

Dear Members of the Council -

I write to urge you to support the Vancouver Aquarium and its new plans for research on Canada's arctic and beluga whales.

The Aquarium is among Vancouver's oldest and most cherished institutions, not only as a tourist attraction and educational centre but also as a highly respected research centre focused increasingly on the Arctic and the new pressures on that region's vulnerable environment. It is also Canada's only marine mammal rescue centre, able to rescue stranded, sick and injured whales, dolphins and porpoises.

My interest in the Aquarium developed from an investigation of fisheries management (having conducted a Royal Commission on the Pacific fisheries some years ago) which left me with a highly favourable impression of the quality and relevance of research done by the Aquarium's scientists.

The current need of support for the Aquarium arises from the planned expansion of its Arctic exhibit (as approved by the city of Vancouver and Park Board) and its beluga conservation research program. I'm sure you know that the latter is being criticized by some groups who disagree with research on whales. Some of this criticism seems to be based on a misunderstanding insofar as the Aquarium is one of the top five marine science centres in the world, with exceptional standards of animal care and welfare. Moreover it plans to discontinue its on-site beluga research program in 2029. But the criticism is nevertheless vocal and a continuing threat to the Aquarium's contributions to Vancouver and to Canada.

Dear Commissioner Kirby-Yung,

I am writing to express my sincere disappointment and sadness at the short-sighted, ill informed decision taken on March 9 regarding cetaceans in captivity. I am writing as a citizen of Vancouver, a parent, a scientist, and visitor to the Vancouver Aquarium for many years.

I don't support animals in captivity in most cases. Nature is of course the best place for these animals, but when well cared for and presented in the right context, they inspire generations of people to care, conserve and learn. The cetaceans currently in the care of the Vancouver Aquarium cannot be released to the wild; you suggest that these animals be transferred to other facilities or to the Marine Mammal Rescue Centre run by the aquarium. One reason I am so upset by this decision is that I believe the Vancouver Aquarium is the best place for these animals since they will remain in captivity here or elsewhere. They are world leaders in ethical and humane marine mammal care. They are not a for-profit, unaccountable show aquarium like many others. The rescue centre is best likened to a hospital. It is not a 'home', lacking the space or facilities for long-term care. If you care about the well-being of these animals, suggesting they live at the rescue centre is very un-informed.

I grew up visiting the Vancouver Aquarium, and was inspired by my experiences there to study science. Now I see the interest and joy on my daughter's face when she visits. She asks about dolphins, cares about them and wants to know more She does this because she has seen them there, in person, not on a TV show, or a computer screen. She is too young to go whalewatching, and only then would see the animals at a distance, quite likely underwhelming to a young mind. It saddens me that my younger daughter (just a baby now) may not get the same experience. There is nothing quite the same as seeing eye-to-eye with a whale, when it singles you out for a closer look. One million visitors get this experience each year at the Vancouver Aquarium, along with a strong dose of education and conservation. Most of these people will never see a whale or dolphin anywhere else. Whale watching cannot and should not support this volume of guests, regardless of cost and accessibility. People care about what they know, and caring about cetaceans means caring about our oceans, and everything in them. If we are to help our oceans and wild cetaceans, we need people who care.

Your decision to end display of cetaceans in the City of Vancouver does nothing to improve the lives of these animals. Through visitors to the aquarium, the valuable research conducted there (that cannot be done elsewhere) and conservation education, this decision extends well beyond the City of Vancouver. It will harm the lives of these animals, eliminate rescue capabilities on Canada's Pacific Coast (by removing long-term options for non-releasable injured and orphaned animals) and harm wild populations by removing a prime opportunity to inspire and educate. If you care about cetaceans, I urge you to re-consider this decision in light of a more balanced view of the facts that extend well beyond the border of our city.

This was unbelievable to me, as the Vancouver Aquarium is known for it's education and research with these aquatic animals, as well as it's widely known practices in rescue and rehabilitation, via the Vancouver Aquarium's Marine Mammal Rescue Centre.

The absolutely beloved cetaceans, Helen, Chester and Daisy, who are currently housed at the Aquarium, are the very finest examples of rescue and rehabilitation, as well as educational ambassadors, of the importance of non-healthy and/or safe oceans. These ambassadors can do more by their mere presence to educate the visiting public, than human educators can do in days. 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
## THE CETACEAN BRAIN AND INTELLIGENCE


The popular media have often portrayed cetaceans as being capable of understanding and speaking human language, and even having human intelligence. In aquarium presentations dolphins are remarkably responsive to their trainers. Stories abound of wild cetaceans coming to the rescue of injured mates and humans in distress. We know that whales, dolphins, and porpoises have large, complex brains, but . . . are they as intelligent as they seem?

Perhaps the best answer to this question would be "yes" - and "no." Intelligence is a very difficult concept to define. Whether or not cetaceans are intelligent, largely depends on what is meant by "intelligence." In people, it involves the ability to use symbols and solve complex problems. We measure human "intelligence" through "intelligence quotient" (IQ) tests. These tests can provide an accurate measure of a person's mental performance under prescribed circumstances. Although they have a certain predictive value, they don't really seem to tell us how intelligent a person is in the practical sense. This is no surprise, for human brain functions are still relatively poorly understood.

In any event, no non-human animal, not even large brained cetaceans, can ever pos-

sess "human" intelligence. This is because only humans can have it. Human intelligence is an adaptation developed over millions of years of human and pre-human evolution. If other animals are intelligent, they have their own kind of intelligence, which is the result of a totally different evolutionary history.

Intelligence is certainly not a uniquely human adaptation. In fact, it is evident that many species possess intelligence. The problem is that animal intelligence is hard for us to define, understand and interpret, because the only evidence we can get is from brain anatomy and overt behaviour. We can't give animals meaningful IQ tests. Moreover, our perspective of the world is unique to humans, and it is difficult for us to understand a brain that has a different evolutionary history and a different context. Because we cannot view the world exactly as another animal does, our understanding of what is relevant in the lives of other species is limited.


Although we have learned much from animal behaviour studies, some scientists have focussed their attention on the brain itself and its potential capacity to perform the complex mental processes required for intelligence. They view brain size and complexity as indicators of the presence of an adaptation of the brain, i.e. "intelligence." This approach is almost like looking at the circuitry of different computers to determine the information processing capabilities of each. Such studies consider gross brain size, complexity of the different types of brain cells, and the Both dolphins and humans have a large, convoluted (wrinkled) neocortex. This is the part of the brain related to intelligence. Among mammals, the brains of humans and some cetaceans have the greatest amounts of neocortex relative to brain size.

complexity of their cellular interconnections.

Cetaceans are animals with very large. complex brains. However, they are also very large animals. Big animals generally have bigger brains than small animals, because there's more bulk for the brain to take care of. Thus, big brains alone don't necessarily indicate increased intelligence. A more meaningful indicator is the ratio of brain size to body size. Through evolution, birds and mammals have evolved bigger brains relative to body size than have other classes of animals like reptiles and fish.

Brain size can be considered in two separate parts: (1) the amount of the brain that is required to "run" the body, and (2) the "extra" that is left over for information processing. The latter is called the "encephalization factor" by neuroscientists, and some believe it provides a reference number for estimating the potential for intelligence. In these terms, some species of cetaceans have brains which display a degree of encephalization comparable to that in human brains.

Scientists have also been examining the detailed anatomy of the cetacean "neocortex." This is the outer portion of the brain that in both humans and cetaceans is highly

through visual displays and "jousting" with their horns. The song of the humpbacks may be a form of "acoustic jousting." Whatever the situation, biologists generally agree that male humpback whales are "polygynous" that is, that they have more than one female mate at a time.

## Comparisons with land mammals

Many biologists currently studying the social organization and behaviour of cetaceans gain insights by making comparisons with land mammals. Some feel that because cetaceans are descended from land mammals,

their behaviour patterns may be similar to those of their closest land relatives, the "artiodactyls." The latter are the even-toed ungulates, such as cattle, deer, and sheep. The example of the humpback song being likened to the behaviour of male bighorn sheep takes this approach.

Other scientists, however, feel that since whales split from their land ancestors so long ago, similarities in behaviour are not due to a common ancestry. These researchers think that the similar patterns of social organization and behaviour might be similar solutions to common problems of survival. Because these patterns are generally better known for land mammals, comparisons with land mammals may help cetacean biologists interpret their observations.

## Discussion

Once the basic social organization of any given population is pieced together to give a reasonably clear picture, researchers can then look at the social ecology of the population. This means looking at the environment in terms of how it relates to the lifestyles exhibited by the animals living there. Incorporating knowledge of the lives and habits

of animals with information on various features of their habitat, biologists can begin to develop and test ideas on what factors in the habitat affect social behaviour - and why. Why, for instance, do different species of cetaceans and sometimes different populations within a species display such different social behaviours? What determines group sizes and what causes some cetaceans to assume different group formations according to what they happen to be doing?

Looking at the accumulated knowledge on some 24 different species of inshore whales, dolphins, and porpoises, one group of biologists has found some correlations between group sizes among these species and their respective habitats. They found that among the smaller toothed whales, those species living in more restrictive habitats, like rivers, lakes, and estuaries, live alone or in small groups of up to ten individuals. Those species living in more open habitats, like river estuaries and coastal areas, tend to form groups of intermediate size, of up to 50 members, and those cetaceans living in the open ocean form the largest groups, sometimes composed of thousands of members.

Biologists have found similar patterns in certain herding land mammals. Studies on antelopes have revealed that the smaller species spread out in "less open" habitats, and that the larger species (that live in open grasslands) tend to form larger, more complex groups. In various land ungulates, social behaviour is strongly affected by such things as the availability of food, presence of predators, and the physical characteristics of the habitat.

Basically, changes in antelope social groups are affected by their respective dietary needs. These determine where they feed, which, in turn, affects their social groupings in terms of defending against predators. Using this kind of information, biologists making comparisons between closely related species can consider whether or not similar types of social groupings observed between different kinds of animals are due to similar responses to the same environmental pres- 8. 
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Studies on the social behaviour of mammals have shown that different factors in the interplay between the biological needs of a species and the characteristics of their habitat are either "attractive," causing individuals to group together, or "dispersive," causing individuals to pursue more solitary lives. The balance between these factors is what some scientists believe is reflected in the social behaviour and ecology of different mammal species.


Whales, dolphins, and porpoises are mammals that have evolved incredible physiological and anatomical adaptations for an aquatic lifestyle. Now, thanks to research into their social lives, we are also beginning to understand the behavioural adaptations these mammals have acquired in response to this environment. Besides the inherent interest in understanding the secrets of cetaceans, biologists believe such knowledge may be important for ongoing and future conservation efforts.

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This "family tree" shows the resident killer whale pods of B.C. arranged according to the sounds they have in common. Pods that share sounds are grouped by biologists into "clans," and may have evolved from a common ancestral pod. The relationships shown here indicate how new pods might be formed by the splitting of older pods. Information supplied by John Ford B.C. killer whales have a unique social structure. They travel in pods, which are kinship groups based on a mother whale and her offspring. This social structure was revealed through long-term studies involving photo identification and acoustic work. rest of the pod may break off and form a new pod.

While resident pods are usually made up of two or more cow sub-groups, the "transient pods" are much smaller. They consist of a single cow sub-group, or else lone males. Pods of one to three individuals are not uncommon. These killer whales look and behave differently from "resident" whales. First of all, transient whales do not form communities. They travel in and out of areas normally inhabited by resident pods, and they also go into areas where residents never go. Second, the transient killer whales eat marine mammals, while resident animals eat mostly fish.

## Sperm whales

The basic social organization of sperm whales was noticed by early whalers. However, more complete modern observations show that these whales live in different types of groups. Adult females live together along with their calves and juveniles of both sexes. This is called a "mixed" or "breeding" school and numbers between 20 and 40 individuals. The bonds among females in these groups are suspected to be long term.

Male sperm whales form different groupings, called "bachelor schools." The size of these schools generally depends on the age and size of the members. Smaller, immature males seem to form larger bachelor schools of up to 50 members. Larger, sub-adult males form smaller groups of up to around 15 members. The largest males are sometimes solitary or form small groups; most members are sexually mature. During the breeding season, the mixed schools are joined by a small number of mature males, called "schoolmaster bulls." Not all sexually mature male sperm whales breed — only the schoolmaster bulls.

Curiously the social organization of sperm whales is quite similar to that of elephants. Mature, female elephants also lead relatively stable groups, and sexually mature males are separated into breeding and non-breeding groups.

## Bottlenosed dolphins

Bottlenosed dolphins also form complex social groups. Mostly, they are seen in small assemblages of two to 15 animals. Researchers have noticed that some individuals form ties that last for weeks. They call these groups "primary groups," with the members seemingly involved in similar activities. Primary groups sometimes join together to form larger "secondary groups." Secondary groups only

seem to stay together for a few minutes or hours.

Different biologists studying different populations of bottlenosed dolphins have also noted that the dolphins tend to form larger groups in the deeper offshore areas. Larger groups may be more efficient for finding food and guarding against predation in open waters.

Research on a particularly well studied population of these animals off Florida's west coast has revealed that, here, groupings are based on age and sex. Adult males were observed to form small bands that travelled with the different female groups within a part of their range. Younger males form "bachelor" groups and do not generally associate with mature males, or with the female groups. Mothers and young usually stay together for three to six years. Within a given range, different groupings are seen to live in relatively identifiable "home ranges."


## Humpback whales

In the past few years, one type of cetacean social behaviour has become so famous that it is now a tourist attraction in Hawaii. During the winter humpback whales gather at their breeding and calving grounds in Hawaii. Here, male humpbacks sing complex songs composed of a variety of discrete themes. These songs change over time, and all of the singers in a population sing the same basic song. Biologists think these songs are associated with courtship or mating, but they are still unsure of the songs' function.

Some researchers suspect that the songs may be a way to attract females, in much the same way the males of some bird species attract females with their songs. However, other researchers suspect that the songs are one way males compete with each other to form dominance hierarchies. In such a system, the songs may serve a similar purpose to antlers on a male bighorn sheep. In these ungulates males compete with each other

To Whom it May Concern

My name is Andreas Fahlman and I am a comparative eco-physiologist, I guess that is just a fancy name for a scientist that is trying to understand the relationship between what animals can do and survive in different environments. I have worked on a wide variety of projects studying a number of different animals around the world, from the Arctic to the Sub Antarctic for the last 20 years and what we are currently facing will require the collaborative effort to prevent mass extinction of entire species.

Increasing environmental change caused by humans pose a real and imminent threat to many marine animals. Still we know very little about most of the species in the ocean. Marine mammals, and especially cetaceans, are top predators and therefore important sentinel species. What that means is that when their health changes it may provide important clues to changes in the environment or eco system. Our current understanding about the welfare, physiology and veterinary medicine of cetaceans comes from animals under human care. However, we still have a lot to learn and animals under managed care provide an invaluable resource to understand what normal and healthy animals look like. It is true that cetaceans under managed care may not always behave like their wild cousins, but studies that look at behavior and cognition suggest that there are no noticeable differences. Physiologically there may be differences, but without studies on animals in a controlled setting and that participate voluntarily it will be very difficult to understand the physiological limitations that these animals face with an environment that is changing at an alarming pace.

For example, respiratory disease is a major cause of morbidity and mortality in cetaceans both in wild and managed populations. Still, our understanding of the respiratory system in marine mammals in general and in ceteaceans in particular is rudimentary at best. It was recently shown that dolphins that live in close proximity to the Deep Water Horizon oil spill have a high prevalence of lung disease. However, as we had no historical data on the health of these populations before the accident, we cannot prove that it was the oil spill that caused the lung issues. We therefore need to be better prepared before the next disaster will happen.

In recent years, we have developed tools to study respiratory physiology in ceteaceans. The device consists of a flow meter that measures the amount of air they inhale and exhale, and also measures the concentration of oxygen when they exhale. Together, the flow and gas concentration are used to determine the metabolic rate. In addition to metabolic rate, these measurements can be used to look at other things, like lung health. Human doctors use similar equipment and measurements, in a process called pulmonary function testing, to look at lung health in people. With this device we could study the normal values in different populations of ceteaceans to assess what is normal, and thereby assess if there is problem in the ecosystem.

By comparing respiratory health in different populations of cetaceans, we can learn more about the health of those populations, and the marine environment they live in.

We are also using this equipment to study how cetaceans dive to extreme depths and hold their breath for such a long time. This information is crucial to understand how changes in the environment may impact the ability to survive or rear a young. In short, the studies that we are able to do on managed populations provide vital information that will help wild populations and it is with the support of well managed aquariums, like Vancouver Aquarium, that prioritize animal welfare, research and education that these studies can be done. I have worked around the world in a number of facilities and in my opinion, VanAqua stands out as among the best. I sincerely hope that you take great pride in the amazing staff, animals and resource that you have in Stanley Park as their passion and work will help make the wild a better place.

#### Dear Elected Officials of Vancouver,

Vancouver Aquarium is Canada's leading marine science centre and is recognized worldwide for its high standards of animal care. As a veterinary scientist, I can tell you that it would be very embarrassing for Canadian science if the cetacean research program there were diminished or shut down for political reasons due to pressure from an uninformed minority. It would also be sadly ironic that "saving" a small number of whales from captivity will ultimately harm many thousands of cetaceans by effectively ending the training of experts in cetacean rescue, rehabilitation, and research.

It is perhaps a romantic notion that cetaceans should remain mysterious and doomed to die as humans encroach on their habitat, but it is only through understanding cetaceans better that we will intimately be able to help them. Scientists are frequently criticized for not engaging with the public about their research. The Vancouver Aquarium is actively and effectively engaging the public, yet faces criticism about doing it. Their arctic research is more important than ever and is specifically focused on Belugas and protecting wild populations. Ending the cetacean program would end this research as well.

Vancouver Aquarium is the only marine mammal rescue centre in Canada and the only real hope for stranded, sick and injured marine mammals, including endangered killer whales. They're able to undertake this due to skills gained from on-site cetacean care. If cetaceans are phased out, all future skill development will also cease.

I urge you to support the Vancouver Aquarium and their cetacean research program for the future training of experts in this field and the health of all cetaceans in captivity and in the wild.

Dear Vancouver's Elected Officials,

We are a group of researchers that are writing this letter in support of the Vancouver Aquarium and their collection of cetaceans (whales, dolphins, and porpoises). Members of our group conduct respiratory and hearing anatomy and physiology research on wild belugas in the Western Arctic. Our research conducted on cetaceans at the Vancouver Aquarium provides us an essential comparative framework for these wild populations.

Vancouver Aquarium is not only a leading marine science centre in Canada but it is also recognized internationally for its high standards of animal care and important research that has direct conservation consequences for wild marine mammals. Our group of scientists are involved with them to study the respiratory physiology and to develop tools to perform lung function testing in captive and stranded cetaceans. Respiratory disease is a major cause of disease and mortality in both wild animals and those held under human care. The studies we are performing with the Vancouver Aquarium and their rehabilitation centre allows us access to determine what is normal versus diseased. These data can then be used to diagnose and determine the efficacy of clinical treatment for specific respiratory diseases. In addition, the tools can be used by stranding networks to triage animals on a beach to increase the success of release.

Moreover, part of our research also focuses on the effects of man-made underwater noise on cetaceans. We analyze the inner ear of stranded and harvested individuals to diagnose whether the animals have suffered present or past acoustic trauma. The hearing measurements that the Vancouver Aquarium is performing on their cetaceans are critical to build normal cochlear frequency maps of several cetacean species. This information is necessary so that when acoustic trauma is found in cetaceans they can then be overlaid onto the map and then the acoustic source(s) can then be extrapolated based on sound frequency level. Without the Vancouver Aquarium's research on hearing ability and cochlear mapping, we would not be able to track the source causing acoustic trauma in wild populations.

For the beluga whale, our research with the Vancouver Aquarium is vitally important as Canada's Arctic is facing increasing pressure and impacts due to human presence. Consequently, without marine science centres like the Vancouver Aquarium, this vital research cannot be performed and we will lose the ability to assess how man-made change affects their ecosystem and ability to survive. Thus, belugas at the Vancouver Aquarium provide critical research opportunities to protect wild populations. If the cetacean program is phased out, so will this vital research.

In addition, the marine mammal rehabilitation center at the Vancouver Aquarium is unique as they are among few places that have successfully rescued, treated and released harbor porpoises. This is a testament to the dedication and expertise that exist among their veterinary and care taker staff. If this facility is closed, not only will the ability to care for stranded, sick and injured marine mammals, including endangered killer whales, be lost entirely, but also the knowledge of how to care for, treat and rehabilitate these animals.

We understand you are reviewing best practices and this is an important process to assure that these animals are given the best care that is possible. As one of the top five marine science centres in the world, Vancouver Aquarium is the one setting those high standards of best practice and they are continuously striving to improve.

I am writing to you today in strong support of the Vancouver Aquarium and our position relating to belugas.

The need for a few well cared for belugas in facilities that have a proven track record in supporting conservation research in the field and in the controlled setting of an aquarium is much greater now than it was when I joined the Vancouver Aquarium back in 1990.

You will already have heard from many of the world's top research scientists the value that these animals provide in relation to scientific inquiry, lab testing of scientific principles and equipment prior to application in the field and to studies that have direct conservation application to wild populations at a time when these very populations are facing unprecedented changes to their environment from human impacts and climate change that effect food availability, contaminant burden, noise and other anthropogenic stressors. I have been working in the field of marine mammal conservation, animal care and management for close to thirty five years, the Aquarium's vision for the next twelve if partnered and supported by Vancouver's Park Board can lay the ground work for a tremendous leap forward in research and a significant conservation impact led by renowned marine mammal scientists. Twelve years might seem like a long time but it will pass in the blink of an eye and in the same period could mark a catastrophic loss of belugas in Canada's St Lawrence Estuary that are already severely compromised and now numbering little more than 800 animals.

There is an assertion that there is an erosion of support for the Aquarium and the animals it cares for yet the attendance has never been stronger and continues to grow annually with over 1.18 million people visiting in 2016 alone, another record attendance year.

The public of course want to be assured that the animals are well cared for, particularly in light of tragic events such as the recent loss of Qila and Aurora. In regards to that case exhaustive testing and evaluation by medical experts worldwide has eradicated disease and illness as a probable cause and through a series of elimination is pointing

toward a toxic event. As we continue to examine the forensic evidence our veterinary team is confident that the additional operational precautions and security measures put in place provide safety to our animal collection going forward.

In terms of public attitudes little has truly changed since I started in this field 37 years ago. There are still some people that would prefer not to see any animals in zoos and aquariums, just as there are others that go further and would prefer not to use animals in any way – in medicine, as food, for clothing, even as companion animals. However the majority of people in Canada still support zoos and aquariums, eat animal products, wear animal sourced clothing and accessories and seek the companionship of family pets.

When it comes to our relationship with animals we each have a line in the sand, for some it is clearly defined and for others it is a transient boundary that can be washed away by the tides of influence. As we develop our own moral compass and personal beliefs there is a tendency to pull in information to support our position – to bolster our decision with rationalization; that is normal. However it is critical for credibility and decision making that such rationalization is based in truth and not tainted with phobias. All too often I hear protests about cetaceans in human care based upon erroneous and corrupted information whipped up into a fanatical frenzy of intolerance and misunderstandings.

The public is naturally fascinated by and concerned about animals, both in the wild and in human care. We are all assaulted on a daily basis of tales of poaching, animal mistreatment, disappearing or poisoned habitats, over-harvesting and extinctions. In a world where human actions are having the greatest negative impact the public turn to the internet and other media for much of their information to determine what is the right thing to do.

The internet unfortunately for all its immediacy and connectivity is a hotbed of distortion and none more evident than when it comes to sites vilifying zoos and aquariums with a toxic brew of pseudoscience and misinformation. The agenda of many hard line anti-zoo and aquarium critics is to spread this misinformation, to "win" at any cost claiming their position as "science" to get the general public on side.

No wonder then that good people with good intentions fall foul of the plethora of blogs, tweets, and pages filled with non-scientific fear-mongering that is relentlessly regurgitated and reverberates uncontested and unsubstantiated.

I am concerned that some Park Board commissioners have already taken a constrained morally motivated choice where their personal belief disregards outcomes entirely. Although in some cases it is clearly stated that caring for the cetaceans is a priority the apparent inability to think of future consequences to these same animals both at the Aquarium and in the wild is restrictive and not in the best interests of animal welfare. I hope that this is not the case.

In regards to our ability to care for cetaceans and the appropriateness of the facilities we not only engage the world's leading animal care experts and scientists on our team we also voluntarily enlist the help of the experts from around the world to inspect us on a regular basis. Professional accreditation standards cover animal husbandry, safety and the principle that accredited aquariums and zoos have a vital role to play in supporting species conservation. Less than 2% of zoos and parks worldwide are accredited.

Aquariums and zoos play a critical role in our society by the unique way that they contribute to education, research and conservation. No other organization or institution can spark affective relations between humans and nature like zoos and aquariums.

The Vancouver Aquarium is accredited by not one but four accreditation bodies: Canada's Accredited Zoos and Aquariums (CAZA); the Association of Zoos and Aquariums (AZA); the international Alliance of Marine Mammal Parks and Aquariums (AMMPA); and most recently from the American Humane Association (AHA) a global, third party certification that upholds rigorous, evidence-based standards for humane animal care. The multi day comprehensive audit verified the many facets of animal welfare including health, housing, positive social interaction etc. These accreditation inspections and the certification audit evaluate and verify compliance during a rigorous multi-day process against internationally recognized best practices. Yet even today we see unfounded stories going to print in the Vancouver Sun with headlines insinuating a cruelty argument.

In 2014 and specifically in relation to marine mammals CAZA incorporated the *Canadian Council on Animal Care Recommendations for the Care and Maintenance of Marine Mammals as part of its rigorous routine inspection and accreditation program* as these recommendations promote best practices in the care and welfare of marine mammals maintained in Canadian facilities. These recommendations were developed at the request of the Federal Department of Fisheries and Oceans Canada (DFO). An intensive 10 year collaboration of marine mammal experts and scientists from across Canada and North America examined best practices in Canada and around the world and developed recommendations based upon an interdisciplinary approach, grounded in science that addresses the many needs of marine mammals in human care. These were prepared under oversight of the CCAC, the national peer review agency responsible for setting and maintaining standards for the ethical use and care of animals in science throughout Canada.

The Aquarium as a member of CAZA works closely with all orders of government to promote the development and implementation of the highest standards of animal care and safety, as well as effective conservation and education programming in zoological facilities. Further recognizing this expertise the government of British Columbia has adopted CAZA accreditation as a condition of licensing for the keeping and exhibition of certain classes of animals.

Finally the value of having the animals on site cannot be understated. The Vancouver Aquarium will have the only purpose built facilities capable of conducting science on

cetaceans in a controlled setting. Universities and research centres simply to not have the resources and skills to maintain a large body of water for cetacean research. Similarly the skills and expertise of the animal care staff and veterinarians means that the animals are healthy and can cooperate with researchers in a collaborative setting. Those same skills developed in aquariums are then applied to wild rescues and research activities.

Without those opportunities many marine mammals would not be alive today and we would not have been able to:

- Rescue and release close to 150 stranded and suffering marine mammals every year
- Conduct the first and only successful relocation of an orphaned killer whale calf back into its family. The return of *Springer* has had a direct conservation impact as she has now had her own calf and contributed to the dwindling wild population of killer whales along our coast
- Successfully rescue, rehabilitate and reintroduce the harbour porpoise *Levi* to the waters off Vancouver Island
- Provide husbandry support for hands-on beluga research in the Arctic
- Provide husbandry support for hands-on narwhal research in the Arctic
- Save many sea lions through pioneering work resulting in their disentanglements
- Provide long term homes to cetaceans like *Chester* and *Daisy* and *Helen* that simply could not survive in the wild.

The Vancouver Aquarium is currently involved in a project to try and save the Vaquita, a small porpoise found in the Gulf of California. Our experience with rescuing small porpoises and access to animals like *Daisy* provides critical scientific information might just contribute in some small way to saving a species The Vaquita is drowning in illegal gill nets and there are now just 30 to 40 of them left in the world. A multi-country collaborative effort spearheaded by the marine mammal community is now underway to try and save the last few remaining. There is a real chance that we might be too late and the Vaquita will go the way of the recently lost Baiji river dolphin in China.

When the Vancouver Aquarium opened in 1956, the planet was losing one or two species a year. Today, largely as a result of human activities – habitat encroachment and degradation, climate change, poaching, and overfishing -- the world loses two to three species each day. This insidious loss of species is part of what is being termed the sixth extinction.

What we do know is that if people don't care about the accelerating loss of biodiversity, they and the governments that represent them won't take action to reverse this dramatic trend. That is why the Vancouver Aquarium has proposed its ambitious 12 year plan to greatly facilitate scientific research with this endangered group of animals. We are proud to have played our part in helping to influence three generations of British Columbians as ocean champions and we plan to continue fostering emotional connections between people and nature and inspiring the next generation of

conservationists who will do more research, rehabilitate more habitats, reintroduce more species and educate more people.

You have a difficult decision before you. I understand that personally some of you will have beliefs that might place you at odds with what is presented here. I urge the Park Board to fully consider the options before them. To set personal beliefs aside and take into account the bigger picture to accept a locally driven initiative that will impact globally. The time line is already incredibly short – just 12 years to make a significant and important impact on the science, research and conservation of these animals – it is a sensible rationale to a complex management and science based initiative. With a deadline fast approaching we can aggressively establish a framework that will move off site and out of Stanley Park on or before 2029.

The Vancouver Parks Board is being watched internationally, this is a chance to show leadership and sober political positioning – immediately ending the display does nothing to help the individual animals and may actually be very detrimental to the wild populations. Out of sight out of mind has never been a good idiom to live by, please embrace the change suggested by the Aquarium knowing that an orderly phase out will more than anything keep the Aquarium and Vancouver at the forefront of best practices and a leading example of what a great City aquarium can be.

No-one can truly say what the future will hold – the easy thing to do would be to walk away and to hope that everything will turn out ok; the right thing is to do is step up and be counted and to take affirmative action.

Now is not the time to turn our back on our animals, on Canadians and on our wild populations.

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## Message from the President and CEO and Chair of the Board of Directors

As we approach six decades of marine science, conservation and education, we have connected more than 40 million visitors to the wonders of aquatic life. That's an astonishing number. Each one of those connections serves as a spark that lights our imagination, unveils what is beneath the ocean's surface and reminds us we are all a part of something bigger.

Just as every aquatic species has a role to play in the ecosystem of our oceans, so does each one of us. It's the reason we encourage Canadians to participate in our direct action programs, such as our nationwide Great Canadian Shoreline Cleanup and Ocean Wise. Our collective actions can make a big difference on the future of our blue planet.

As a conservation organization, we celebrated several important milestones this year. A decade ago, we started the Ocean Wise program with 16 local partners. This year, we celebrated its 10<sup>th</sup> anniversary as a nationally recognized program with more than 650 partners across Canada. We also held our first Seafood Symposium to bring together fisheries experts, scientists and chefs to help plan for a sustainable seafood industry.

Meanwhile our Marine Mammal Rescue Centre team continued their pioneering work in cetacean rescue and recovery. After receiving more than 11,500 hours of intensive care, Chester, the false killer whale calf rescued in 2014, is now thriving at the Vancouver Aquarium where he engages with visitors young and old and contributes to vital cetacean research and conservation efforts.

On the research side, we took a deep dive into the world of microplastics and extended our photogrammetry research to collect groundbreaking data on the endangered Southern Resident killer whale population. We also cast an eye north toward Canada's changing Arctic, where we continued to study how noise pollution impacts beluga whale mothers and calves.

Canada's North is warming at twice the rate of the global average, leading to potentially drastic consequences for this iconic region and the rest of the world. This is a key concern for us now and going forward. This year we launched an awareness campaign to draw attention to the complex changes taking place in the Arctic. From disrupted food webs to extreme weather and ocean currents, to an increase of invasive species and disease migration, what happens in the Arctic affects us all. The Vancouver Aquarium is in a unique position to advocate for this fragile territory.

Our long history in Canada's Arctic began about 45 years ago when our team first began exploring the North. During this time we have become intimately familiar with the issues affecting this region, its culture and its inhabitants. Our continued focus on the Arctic extends to the next phase of our expansion and revitalization which will bring a new Canada's Arctic Gallery to the Aquarium. This engaging space will foster scientific research and conservation efforts to help protect beluga whales in the wild and provide even larger habitats for those in our professional care. It will also connect millions of visitors to the plight of Canada's North and empower individuals to make conservation-minded choices and help them understand that when it comes to the future of our oceans – and our planet – we are all in this together.












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






















# The Vancouver Aquarium Marine Science Centre Covenant for Marine Mammal Protection

The Vancouver Aquarium is dedicated to providing a living bridge to our global ocean heritage for current and future generations of British Columbians. The one-thousand plus scientists, veterinarians, staff and volunteers who work at the Aquarium are ever-mindful of this commitment to our community. At the heart of this commitment are both our dedication to ocean conservation and education, and the covenant we hold for the marine mammals in our care.

- We do not and will not capture whales and dolphins from the wild: In 1996, we became the first aquarium in the world to make the commitment to no longer capture cetaceans from the wild for display.
- 2. We only host marine mammals in our care that are unable to live in the wild: This includes animals born in human care or rescued animals. For a rescued animal to remain at the Aquarium, it must be deemed non-releasable by an independent, third party scientific body or panel. All marine mammals in our care at the Aquarium have either sustained injuries that would put them at a great disadvantage in the wild or lack the life skills to survive on their own.
- 3. We are committed to marine mammal rescue: Our efforts are guided by our own 3Rs - Rescue, Rehabilitate and Release: The Vancouver Aquarium operates the only rescue facility in Canada with the skills and expertise to conduct cetacean rescues in the wild. This work includes ongoing disentanglement efforts with sea lions and other marine mammals on B.C.'s coast. With every rescue, our team works around the clock to rehabilitate the animal with the goal of reintroducing it to the wild. Each year, we succeed in rescuing, rehabilitating and releasing up to 100 marine mammals back into their natural environment.
- 4. We provide the best care possible for all our animals: The Aquarium is known globally for very high standards of care for all animals including the cetaceans. This means the best care practices and the best facilities possible. Because care practices change with new discoveries, many made by others, the Aquarium is equally committed to continuous improvement in its care of cetaceans.

I write this letter to support the important work that the Vancouver Aquarium is doing with respect to its scientific outreach and collaboration with northern and indigenous communities.

Unlike other aquariums or zoos, Vancouver Aquarium recognizes the value and need to expand its work beyond the aquarium itself. When the Vancouver Aquarium renovated its arctic exhibit, it ensured that the information provided to the public included northern and indigenous perspectives. The majority of other zoos or aquariums make little or no effort to incorporate our local knowledge. Additional information is not only more respectful but it is also more balanced and accurate.

In addition, the Vancouver Aquarium has committed to working with our northern communities in expanding its scientific research - something that Marineland or Marine World absolutely do not do. Ikaarvik: Barriers to Bridges is a very successful - award winning - program that ensures there is a mutually respectful and beneficial exchange of western science to Inuit and that scientists also learn from our extensive Inuit knowledge. This approach ensures that science is not done in isolation from the environment and indigenous people, of where arctic species come from, such as the belugas.

The research being done with respect to beluga hearing is particularly important, given the changes that are happening in our region, including the proposed seismic testing, increased shipping and other resource exploration and exploitation. Inuit are extremely worried that these activities will have significant negative impacts on marine life: whales, seals, fish, etc. and that the lack of scientific data has permitted the approval to proceed with potentially harmful activities, that will not only affect wildlife but our people and our ability to feed our families.

The Vancouver Aquarium scientific work clearly is of national importance and a necessary component in conservation, especially with respect to responsible management and use of the arctic ecosystem. This includes ensuring that resource development proceeds with the least damage or not at all, if scientific evidence shows that the harm cannot be adequately mitigated. This is why, I support the Vancouver Aquarium's work and trust that the Park Board will similarly recognize that this work should continue for our mutual benefit.

Your Honor, Counsel and Commissioners,

As a youth in the early 1970s, I had an opportunity to visit the Vancouver Aquarium and this experience sparked an interest in marine mammals and fish that has culminated in a career in comparative veterinary pathology. During my first year at the aquarium, I was a volunteer and, subsequently, was hired as a part time weekend and summer aquarist assistant through my high school and undergraduate university studies. Interactions with the aquarium biologists, research scientists and veterinarians spurred an interest in veterinary medicine and pathology. The commitment and passion of these individuals for the care and welfare of the display animals is exceptional and truly inspirational.

The staff, scientist, veterinarian and senior management are not only concerned about the care and welfare of those marine mammals at the aquarium, but are very much stewards of local and remote marine habitats. There are ongoing efforts to respond to, recover, rehabilitate, and ultimate release those animals that respond to medical intervention and supportive care with successes dealing with neonatal harbour seals, harbour porpoise and, more recently, efforts with a false killer whale. Although rare, opportunities to rescue and rehabilitate stranded cetaceans provide unique insights into the nature history of these animals and help with management, treatment and potential mitigation of future strandings, particularly those precipitated by human activities or catastrophic environmental events.

The Vancouver Aquarium has been at the forefront of care for display of marine mammals and, in 1996, self imposed a moratorium on future collection of wild cetaceans for display. The trainers, management and veterinarian team are committed to animal care, applied ocean research and public education, particularly related to conservation and science.

Dear Committee Members,

I am a biologist that has been studying marine mammals for the past 33 years. I am currently on expedition heading north to Greenland to study the most iconic of Canada's animals, the narwhal. Because of this, I will not be able to attend the open hearing on July 25. But I wanted you to know about the critical role of the Vancouver Aquarium in marine mammal conservation.

We are part of a team studying how oceanic noise from shipping traffic to military sonars and oil exploration may affect wild dolphins and whales. This conservation research has been made possible by foundation work we have been conducting with the beluga whales (a cetacean cousin of narwhals) at the Vancouver Aquarium. Without the Aquarium's help in determining the basic physiology of whales and in developing our instrumentation we could never have moved forward with this field work.

I've worked with zoos and aquariums across the world – you have a jewel in what is sadly a very small network of forward-thinking, conservation-minded zoological facilities. It is unimaginable that anyone would consider the Vancouver Aquarium team, a non-profit organization, as anything less than heroic. Here are just a few my observations about their contributions over the years:

- 1. Cetaceans. As mentioned above the Vancouver Aquarium and its cetaceans including the beluga whales have been integral to our field research that is directly related to the mitigation of human impacts on wild whales. The application of our cooperative research program concerning heart rates in whales is far-reaching, not just for Canada's narwhals but for potentially safeguarding millions of marine mammals across the globe. That is how important the work is at the Vancouver Aquarium. Their dolphins and whales work in concert with trainers and researchers as voluntary partners in which the animals teach us about their biology; this has proven to be a powerful research approach.
- 2. Sea otters. In 1989 the Vancouver Aquarium was one of the first responders that sent volunteer Animal Care personnel to the site of the Exxon Valdez oil spill. As Director of the Valdez Sea Otter Rescue Center, I relied on their expertise regarding the care of injured sea otters in Valdez. The aquarium staff helped to establish the rehab facility, husbandry protocols and veterinary procedures where none existed in this remote part of the world. When our Valdez facility became inundated with oiled animals, the Aquarium opened their doors to sick and dying sea otters. Not only did they alleviate the suffering of the animals, they provided invaluable

feedback to our Alaskan team on oiled otter care and veterinary treatment that led to the survival and release of hundreds of sea otters back to the wild.

3. Pinnipeds. For the past two decades the Vancouver Aquarium has remained the premier facility for the study of Steller sea lion nutrition. This marine mammal is endangered in many parts of the North Pacific and the work conducted at the aquarium has formed a critical part of the US National Marine Fisheries Service Steller sea lion Recovery Plan. Researchers from the Aquarium worked with many of us for over six years to develop the conservation plan for Steller sea lions, the largest of all otariids. It remains the template for conservation and management for this unique species.

Ultimately, the people involved in this debate on both sides have the same goal, to save the dolphins and whales of the world. But we can no longer stand on the beach and hope that the animals will survive on their own in this rapidly changing world- the demise of many of the marine mammals of the North Pacific and now the Arctic have demonstrated that we must act quickly and with intelligence. Three decades of experience has demonstrated to me that such conservation can only take place with knowledge gained though science, and that the critical foundational science can only take place in facilities like the Vancouver Aquarium. They have the infrastructure and expertise to provide superb care for marine mammals while maintaining an unwavering dedication to marine mammal conservation research.

Facilities like the Vancouver Aquarium are a critical instrument in our marine mammal conservation toolbox. This link of marine mammal "facility-to-field" research was first recognized by the founder of the International Society for Marine Mammalogy and father of marine mammal conservation, Dr. Ken Norris, who developed several cetacean research facilities expressly for this purpose. Clearly, without the ability of researchers to work in such facilities, wild dolphins and whales will continue to decline in numbers and eventually go extinct through our ignorance about human impacts on them. A review of the IUCN Red List of Endangered Species (http://www.iucnredlist.org) demonstrates how critical the situation is for dolphins and whales; we know so little about this group of mammals that most cannot even be ranked on an endangered list- rather they are relegated to "DD" (Data Deficient) with no conservation plan. We need more facilities like the Vancouver Aquarium to expand and help solve this problem.

We are in a desperate race to save wild marine mammals, and it is unfortunate that valuable time has been lost in arguments. Instead, I hope that the public and politicians will recognize the tremendous good for marine mammals that is done by the working partnership between humans and marine mammals in facilities such as the Vancouver Aquarium. Their Director and staff are committed to marine mammal welfare and are deserving of our support.

Dear Elected Officials of Vancouver,

Vancouver Aquarium is Canada's leading marine science centre and is recognized worldwide for its high standards of animal care. As a veterinary scientist, I can tell you that it would be very embarrassing for Canadian science if the cetacean research program there were diminished or shut down for political reasons due to pressure from an uninformed minority. It would also be sadly ironic that "saving" a small number of whales from captivity will ultimately harm many thousands of cetaceans by effectively ending the training of experts in cetacean rescue, rehabilitation, and research.

It is perhaps a romantic notion that cetaceans should remain mysterious and doomed to die as humans encroach on their habitat, but it is only through understanding cetaceans better that we will intimately be able to help them. Scientists are frequently criticized for not engaging with the public about their research. The Vancouver Aquarium is actively and effectively engaging the public, yet faces criticism about doing it. Their arctic research is more important than ever and is specifically focused on Belugas and protecting wild populations. Ending the cetacean program would end this research as well.

Vancouver Aquarium is the only marine mammal rescue centre in Canada and the only real hope for stranded, sick and injured marine mammals, including endangered killer whales. They're able to undertake this due to skills gained from on-site cetacean care. If cetaceans are phased out, all future skill development will also cease.

I urge you to support the Vancouver Aquarium and their cetacean research program for the future training of experts in this field and the health of all cetaceans in captivity and in the wild.

My name is Dr. Shawn Noren, and I am a Research Scientist at the University of California, Santa Cruz. For the past 2 decades, I have studied the bioenergetics and physiology of marine mammals. I use the data that I collect to model the ability of marine mammals to respond to environmental perturbations, such as fishery interactions and global climate change. Most of my studies have been reliant on collaborations with aquaria and zoos to obtain access to marine mammals to collect scientific data.

Indeed, throughout my twenty year career, I have collaborated with nearly 20 zoological facilities that house marine mammals in the United States as well as internationally. By working within these facilities, I had the opportunity to have a controlled scientific approach because I could minimize the variables that the animals were experiencing throughout the duration of the study. The types of data that I have collected at aquaria could not have been collected from free-ranging animals. For example, for bioenergetics modeling I required access to long-term records of daily food consumption and body mass. For diving physiology research, I required longitudinal records of hemataology. For other studies I needed assess to marine mammals that were trained to were scientific equipment and to follow the experimental protocol. As an aside, while I was on site at these facilities I routinely witnessed exceptional care of the animals by

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deeply committed staff with the expectation of maintaining the highest standards. I never witnessed poor treatment of the animals, and the health care that these animals receive is better than my own health care!

Although some argue that marine mammals in captivity are justified when deemed necessary for research purposes, it is physically and financially impossible for a research organization to maintain such a facility. The costs associated with building a facility large enough to house marine mammals, and providing for daily maintenance and care of the facility and animals are extreme and beyond the budget of any grant. Only aquaria, through ticket sales to the public, have the financial support to sustain these costs. Research at aquaria makes scientific research on marine mammals possible within the confines of limited grant money. Vancouver Aquarium, as well as other aquarium, have a long history of being involved in research and they have several ongoing research projects.

The data that I have collected using marine mammals in aquaria as models have influenced policies that have aided in the conservation of free-ranging marine mammals. For example a study that I conducted on mother-calf dolphin pair swimming effort and performance helped sway the United States federal government's 2013 decision to expand the scope of the dolphin safe certification requirements. Data that I have collected on walruses in aquaria will be used in population models that will be the cornerstone of the pending 2016 decision to determine if the Pacific walrus should be listed as endangered under the United States endangered species act. These are only two examples of many that demonstrate that marine mammals in aquaria are a valuable assets for scientific inquiry.

We cannot predict what issues marine mammals will face in the future. With each new issue we will need to ask novel questions and collect data to address these questions. Long-term management of marine mammals in aquaria plays a vital role by providing the infrastructure in which to conduct these studies, that will aid in the future conservation and management of wild marine mammal populations as their existence in the wild continues to be challenged by human impacts.

But being involved in external research is only one role of aquariums. Our generation is concerned about the future of our planet and the animals that live on it because during our childhood we played outside and observed nature first hand. The children of today spend less time outside and more time using electronics and viewing the world through the internet. Seeing

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a picture of a marine mammal is not the same as seeing the dolphin or seal up close and personal. The later connects people to the animals, and this connection is the first step in making future generations care about wanting to conserve the animals that reside on this planet. It is this connection that will be the seed for the future generation of wildlife biologists and veterinarians It is this future generation that will have the most dire conservation issues to mitigate as the human activities that marine mammals must encounter continue to escalate.

The arguments of the animal rights activists are often emotionally charged and quit often lack scientific evidence for the accusations made against the aquaria industry. It is my hopes that this letter demonstrates to you just a few of the benefits of aquariums, and their role in conservation and education. I encourage you to contact me if you would like to discuss this further.

#### Re: Cetaceans in Human Care

To Whom It May Concern:

I have always been fascinated with the ocean and the health and welfare of marine mammals living in our coastal waters. Like many people, I want to know why changes are occurring in their numbers and distributions, and whether human activities are negatively affecting them. I am also concerned about their future, and whether some species may disappear from Canada as sea levels rise and ocean temperatures increase.

There are no simple answers to any of these questions. However, they are all answerable through coordinated research of marine mammals in the field and in the lab. Unfortunately, many questions about marine mammals cannot be addressed by only observing them in the field. Answering them also requires studying marine mammals that are in human care.

Since 1992, I have been undertaking field and laboratory-based research with other scientists from the University of British Columbia (UBC). Our research has focused on both cetaceans and pinnipeds, and includes studies at the Vancouver Aquarium.

UBC has collaborated with the Vancouver Aquarium since 1992 to resolve why Steller sea lions are endangered in Alaska. We have also worked with the Aquarium to explain the decline of northern fur seals (which are threatened in Canada), and have addressed questions about the food requirements of Pacific white-sided dolphins and beluga whales. To date, we have published over 100 scientific publications (see www.marinemammal.org/MMRU2) and have trained a number of graduate students.

The research we conduct at the Vancouver Aquarium resolves hypothesis proposed to explain increases and decreases in marine mammal numbers. Data are collected to determine food requirements of wild animals, and are also used to assess the health of wild populations. In addition, the animals cared for by the Vancouver Aquarium allow researchers to develop and test novel technologies for field use (ranging from microelectronics to DNA dietary barcoding) — technologies that can then be used in the field without endangering wildlife.

Researchers can only undertake this complement of studies by working closely with animal trainers, health-care staff, and marine mammals. This collaborative work between UBC and the Vancouver Aquarium is unparalleled. There is no other facility in Canada or elsewhere in the world conducting this level of research.

The success of our research program reflects the commitment of the Aquarium to research, the high quality of their facilities and staff, and the calm and relaxed demeanor of the animals in their care that ensures the data collected are useable and can be applied with confidence to guide conservation and management decisions about wild animals.

Most of our research to date at the Vancouver Aquarium has focused on the seals and sea lions they house. However, much remains to be learned about the whales, dolphins and porpoises because so little is known about the nutritional needs of cetaceans by time of year, their habitat requirements, and their abilities to tolerate a rapidly changing ocean. No one knows, for instance, why Pacific white-sided dolphins have recently recolonized in the Strait of Georgia after an absence of almost 100 years—and whether they will stay—or whether the harbour porpoises that are being seen less regularly are in trouble. Equally perplexing is whether the continued existence of beluga whales further north is threatened by ice-free summers and the influx of species from southern waters. The whales, dolphins and porpoises housed at the Vancouver Aquarium can contribute significantly to resolving these uncertainties and providing the public with scientific data that contributes to conserving cetaceans in the wild.

UBC scientists have published many articles based on data collected at the Vancouver Aquarium that have changed scientific and public understanding about seals, sea lions and cetaceans. Our data are highly cited by other scientists as well as in conservation and management documents. We have made ground-breaking discoveries that would have never happened had the Vancouver Aquarium not stepped up to work with academic researchers and provide their expertise working with marine mammals in human care. The thought that Canada might no-longer have a facility to care for and study marine mammals is unimaginable, and would be a significant step backwards in efforts to make sound conservation and management decisions based on science.

Much remains to be learned about cetaceans to secure their future in B.C. and the Arctic. Working with the Aquarium and their captive mammals is providing knowledge needed to save marine mammals. Without these animals, scientists would be forced to make many incorrect guesses about what they observe in the field. Some of these incorrect guesses could result in management decisions that are ultimately detrimental to wild populations.

There is no other facility in Canada with the husbandry expertise and knowledge of both cetaceans and pinnipeds needed to fill this critical role. Losing it would be a loss to marine mammal science and would do a great disservice to the species we all want to see thrive in the wild.

I fully support the Vancouver Aquarium's commitment to keeping marine mammals for research and public education — and look forward to UBC continuing to provide research expertise in our joint effort to resolve the pressing questions that have significant repercussions for people, marine mammals and the health of our marine ecosystems.

Ladies and Gentlemen:

I am writing to express my strong support for the Vancouver Aquarium. The Aquarium is the City's major tourist destination, largest cultural institution and a globally recognized research and conservation centre. Further, the Aquarium operates without government subsidies from any level, including the City.

Like many others, I am concerned by recent comments indicating that the City of Vancouver, through the Board of Parks and Recreation, is seriously considering changing policy regarding the holding of marine mammals at the Aquarium. This would without question negatively affect the Aquarium's reputation as a world class educational, research, and conservation institution.

The Vancouver Aquarium is recognized internationally for its high standards of animal care, the important research it conducts, its Marine Mammal Rescue Centre, and its focus on public engagement. Eighteen years ago the Aquarium took a principled stand as the first institution in the world to pledge to never capture cetaceans from the wild. That pledge means the Aquarium houses only mammals that cannot live in the wild. While the animals are certainly in captivity, they are secure, receive full veterinary care, and are maintained in a carefully monitored environment.

Vancouver has a tremendous asset in the Aquarium. Locals and visitors from around the world come away changed by the experience of seeing animals up close – animals they are unlikely to ever see in the wild. They leave more curious about and interested in current ocean issues ranging from basic coastal ecology to the impact of climate change. International author Richard Louv's has written two acclaimed books on the topic of 'nature deficit disorder' in modern (and largely urban) civilizations. The term refers to the isolation of most of our populations from natural settings and animals. In

Vancouver, we are blessed with the Aquarium and the opportunity to present to our children some of the incredible animals we share our environment with. Please do not undervalue this opportunity. I have spent a 40 year career in the conservation of Pacific salmons and can say without hesitation that people value and will protect what they appreciate ... most people that visit the Aquarium are drawn to see animals that they will likely never see or appreciate without that opportunity!

Further, as a scientist, the Aquarium also provides the opportunity to study these animals and provide important knowledge about their needs. This information could prove critical these species as their natural environments change through time. The Aquarium will play an increasingly important role in monitoring these changes through their recently announced Coastal Oceanography Research Institute (CORI).

As a professional biologist, I am certainly sensitive to peoples' concern about retaining animals in captivity. But as a parent and a conservationist, I can't over-state the educational importance of people being able to observe and appreciate the animals cared for by the Aquarium. The Aquarium is a world leader in conservation, research, and education. The City of Vancouver should be proud of their support and of the accomplishments of the Aquarium. If the Aquarium was prohibited from retaining marine mammals, it would be a significant loose to the Aquarium, the people of Vancouver, and our visitors.

I appreciate this is a difficult issue to address, but please consider the greatest interests of these species, a world class institution, and the vast majority of your people.

Research and access to credible information enables thoughtful conversation and informed decisionmaking. When this information is brought to people in ways that cause them to focus on conservation and excite future generations towards sustainable behaviours, it is powerful and something to be celebrated.

The Vancouver Aquarium Marine Science Centre has been doing exactly that for generations in this province and city and we are the richer for it. It has been a catalyst for thought leaders, lawmakers and citizens to understand our environment and take action to it.

We support the Vancouver Aquarium, its mission, and the important role that it plays in our community. Specifically its place as a tourism attraction, economic generator, research leader, and educator whose contributions inform and engage citizens across generations, here and globally.

I am disappointed with the current level of debate and often uninformed or distorted commentary related to issues of expansion, cetaceans in captivity or the contribution of the Aquarium in general. While there is a legitimate place for a values discussion related to issues such as cetaceans in captivity or the value of an organization and its approach, they cannot come at the expense of the facts, or neglect consideration of the benefits.

So when there are calls to "empty the tanks," the real implication is that it is a demand to euthanize those mammals in current captivity, or to turn away those animals that have been injured or stranded. The reality is that neither the belugas in the care of the Vancouver Aquarium, nor injured marine mammals could survive in the wild if released today.

As collective values change over time with new knowledge, so to have those of the Aquarium, while also being a force to shape that understanding in the area of marine mammals for decades. As a forward thinking organization, 20 years ago they were the first aquarium to publically declare that they would not capture wild cetaceans for display. The result is that their current resident cetaceans are those born in captivity or already held by a zoo or aquarium before 1996.

While the continuation of breeding in captivity is a legitimate debate, the value of the research gained with the past and current belugas has been invaluable. As quoted in a recent Vancouver Sun article, noted DFO researcher and cetacean's expert John Ford stated:

"A lot of what we know about the physiology of cetaceans and a lot of what we know about their hearing abilities, their sound production, functional anatomy, is from studies in captivity...If we didn't have the information we've learned from captivity, we would be even worse off than we are today. There is some research that is really difficult to do on a free-ranging animal. You can ask lots of scientific questions of them in the wild but you just can't get answers."

This research, observation and public access to these animals is even more important in light of changing climate in the Arctic and the implications it has on these wild animals and their habitat.

As you are undoubtedly aware, the Aquarium is a self-supporting tourism, educational and community economic asset that is often taken for granted, let alone understood. Its activities are funded in large measure through its attractions, including cetaceans, that allow the Aquarium to pay rent to the city, rather than receiving public grants from them.

The work of the Aquarium requires 450 direct employees, 1,000 volunteers, has launched countless first jobs and long term careers and generates over \$200 million in economic benefit to the region each year.

In welcoming over one million visitors annually, as the city's largest attraction, fully 85 percent of the gate revenues generated support the broad array of research work that is done to understand our environment and engage this and future generations in protecting it.

My son was one of the 80,000 school children that have been profoundly impacted by the educational programs offered by the Aquarium each year. His experience had a profound effect on his awareness and passion for marine life, has caused him to focus his studies in part on biology, and to volunteer for causes related to habitat and marine mammal preservation.

And then there are the many research and direct-action conservation programs led by the Aquarlum. A few of the many examples include: the Great Canadian Shoreline Cleanup, the national sustainable seafood program Ocean Wise, the newly launched Coastal Ocean Research Institute (which also includes the Aquarium's Ocean Pollution Research Program), the cetacean research program, and the Marine Mammal Rescue Centre.



Lastly, regarding criticism of the expansion of the facility - the fact that it has attracted public and private sector capital with overwhelming public support is recognition of the fine work and valuable role the facility and its researchers play in our society. It also speaks to the popularity of the attraction among the 77,000 individuals that are members, the local visitors and international guests alike.

I thank you for your consideration of these facts and ask that you incorporate them into your thinking as you support the future of learning, research, tourism, and economic and societal growth through the Aquarium for many years to come. Dear Vancouver Park Board Commissioners:

As a marine mammal scientist at the University of British Columbia, I feel compelled to write to you to emphasize the scientific value and provide insight into the well being of the cetaceans held at the Vancouver Aquarium.

As you are well aware, the issue of keeping animals in zoos and aquariums is complicated, with considerations relating to economy, politics, scientific value, and animal welfare. I feel that my experience and credentials permit me to speak on the latter two topics.

#### Is the welfare of cetaceans at the Vancouver Aquarium compromised?

It is imperative that the welfare of all animals in human care is properly protected. There are no federally mandated animal care requirements for marine mammals in Canada, so it is left to each institution or jurisdiction to implement a set of standards. This is why the Government of Ontario recently commissioned a report on "*Developing Standards of Care for Marine Mammals in Captivity and Recommendations Regarding How Best to Ensure the Most Humane Treatment of Captive Cetaceans*". As Chair of that report, I feel that I can provide context and an informed opinion on how the Vancouver Aquarium ensures the welfare of its cetaceans and how it compares to other institutions.

The United States has the most comprehensive, internationally recognized set of holding requirements for cetaceans. These obligations have been vetted and endorsed by members of the scientific, veterinary, and public communities and represent a high level of Standards of Care for this group of mammals. The Vancouver Aquarium, through its voluntary membership in the Association of Zoos and Aquariums, is obligated to meet these standards, as verified through regular inspections. In addition, its membership in the Alliance of Marine Mammal Parks and Aquariums requires the Vancouver Aquarium to meet a set of even higher standards of care, including larger minimum space requirements, which are recognized internationally as representing Best Practices in the care of cetaceans.

While there are always challenges in keeping any large animal in a display facility, there is no scientific reason to believe that the welfare of cetaceans at the Vancouver Aquarium is compromised. In fact, this institution goes beyond any reasonable expectations to ensure their welfare.

Are the whales displayed at the Vancouver Aquarium a valuable scientific resource? As a scientist that has been working with marine mammals in the wild - in University labs and in aquariums around the world for almost 30 years - I feel that I am qualified to comment on the scientific value of the cetaceans held at the Vancouver Aquarium.

Many zoos and aquariums say they support scientific research at their institutions, but the extent of the value and encouragement of that research varies tremendously. The Vancouver Aquarium is known throughout the international scientific community for its willingness to facilitate outside researchers to conduct valuable science with the marine mammals in its collection. This research goes far beyond aspects of husbandry, and relates directly to the conservation of cetacean populations in the wild.

There are two often-cited arguments against the value of research on whales in aquariums in general; that almost no real research is conducted on these animals, and that the results of these studies are irrelevant to animals in the wild. Both of these assertions are patently false.

Those who suggest that there is little (further) scientific value to be gained from studying cetaceans in aquariums often cite an unreviewed study by Naomi Rose *et al.* who calculated that only 5% of scientific studies concerning cetaceans derived from work conducted with captive individuals. However, a more comprehensive, peer-reviewed examination estimated 30% of all scientific studies relied on research conducted with cetaceans held in display facilities. Several other published reviews have highlighted the scientific information pertaining to animal care and conservation that have been obtained from managed cetacean populations, including additional reviews encompassing two issues of the *International Journal of Comparative Psychology*.

Those who contend that research in "artificial environments" has no scientific value clearly have no real understanding of how science works. Empirical studies under controlled conditions are the foundation of scientific investigations. They allow for testing of specific hypotheses and fine-scale measurements without extraneous variation. These studies can then be applied to observations of animals in the wild.

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The Vancouver Aquarium is unique in its active support of research with animals in its collection, including its cetaceans. They do far more than provide lip service that conservation research is part of their mandate. Their outstanding level of care and training, and their institutional philosophy of encouraging external scientists to conduct conservation-focussed studies, is unparalleled among North American aquariums. I have personally had the opportunity to conduct studies with the Aquarium cetaceans that have resulted in peer-reviewed papers in the scientific literature that have been directly used to address species management in the wild. It would be a substantial blow to the goal of conservation science if Canada's premier Aquarium were no longer able to provide such a valuable resource to the international scientific community.

As a biologist, I am naturally concerned with the well being of both wild animal populations as well as individual animals under human care. I appreciate that, given the vocal public opinion of a minority of residents, the Vancouver Park Board requires assurance that the cetaceans held within its jurisdiction are not suffering mentally or physically. However, it is my professional opinion that these animals are well cared for and provide a very important role in contributing to the conservation of their wild counterparts.

The Vancouver Aquarium is a model for other Canadian and international aquariums that hold cetaceans for research and public display. I encourage the Park Board not to consider any actions that would jeopardize this position.
