# City of Vancouver Vancouver Emergency Management Agency Incident Update Coronavirus disease 2019 [COVID-19] HUMAN DISEASE OUTBREAK Vancouver EM-2020-0034 | 2020/02/25 22:20 Logged by: DANIEL STEVENS Incident Update SITUATION UPDATE (as of Feb 25, 2020) Cases continue to grow globally in number and spread, most recently to a number of additional countries in the Middle East. However, the WHO has not declared pandemic, but has stated that it has the potential to become one. The City of Vancouver is focusing efforts on business continuity planning under the assumption of reduced staffing due to illness, the need for additional staff to work from home caring for family or in isolation because of potential exposure; and response planning in support of the health-sector response to the community. We also continue to support Health's messaging. PHAC and Health continue to assess the current risk as low to Canadians and British Columbians. Social stigma is an increasing concern. WHO Situation Report 35 [who.int] has a focus section on social stigma associated with COVID-19. It recommends the following WHO/UNICEF/IFRC guide to preventing and addressing social stigma associated with COVID-19 [click.cacomms.net] which may be useful to guide our internal and external communication (see Words Matter section).

- The Numbers
  - o Global: 80,239 confirmed cases; 2,700 deaths.
  - o Canada: 11 cases (including 7 the in BC referenced below). See PHAC [click.cacomms.net]website.
  - o BC: 6 (5 confirmed cases, 1 presumptive confirmed case).
    - New case is closely related to a previous case.
- PHAC Travel Health Notice remains at Level 3 of 4: recommendation to avoid non-essential travel to China. Additional of: Hubei Province - Avoid all travel to the province of Hubei due to the imposition of very strict travel and movement restrictions in order to limit the spread of COVID-19.
- In BC, health continues to assess the risk as low to residents.
- The BCCDC is now officially authorized for COVID-19 testing by the National Microbiology Laboratory (NML) and therefore samples no longer require further confirmation by the NML in Winnipeg.
- All people with COVID-19 locally have a mild illness and have self-isolated. Contacts also being monitored. There is no concern of transmission from these individuals. Key information sources:

### HEALTH MESSAGING (for internal use only)

- Numbers continue to increase globally.
- Transmission: Public Health officials confirm person-to-person transmission of the virus through droplets (coughing, sneezing) and is more probable when in close contact with someone who is sick. How easily it is transmitted is still not clear.
- Severity of virus: COVID-19 causes a mild illness in over 80% of individuals, 15% have more severe illness, 3% experience critical illness. The virus is acting in a similar way to influenza, though maybe a bit more severe. It is certainly nothing like SARS.
  - In comparison: Influenza causes approx 3500 deaths per year in Canada. Case fatality rate from influenza, about 0.1 % (moderated as we have a vaccine).
  - o SARS caused 8,000 cases in Canada. 700 deaths reported. Case fatality rate closer to 10%.
- · Preventative measures are the same as for seasonal cold and fluit practice frequent hand -yashing couple

- and sneeze etiquette, and stay home when sick.
- Newly arrived travellers are now being advised to closely monitor themselves for symptoms and to avoid contact with others for 14 days after leaving Hubei province. This includes remaining home from school or work and avoiding crowded public places.
- Incubation period looks to be averaging around 3-6 days with a maximum incubation period of 14 days before symptoms appear.
- In China where community transmissions are occurring, expect far more cases than are lab-confirmed. Fortunately most people are suffering from mild illness and are recovering without significant medical care. Those that are severely ill or dying generally have pre-existing medical conditions or are elderly.
- Public Health Officials are saying that while the risk to public in BC remains low, stakeholders should start reviewing Pandemic plans.

However, language used by health agencies in Canada and by the WHO indicate an increased urgency to prepared to limit the spread of the disease and start planning for possible transmission in our communities. It is important to note that the majority of people becoming sick with COVID-19 are recovering. There have been no deaths in Canada. . BC has significant capacity to test for the virus that causes COVID-19 with an approximate turn around time of 4 days. Planning vEMA and Risk Management are aiming to release the City's updated disease outbreak response plan by the end of this coming week. The plan will continue to be updated based on continued planning with Health. o Local health agencies and WHO have released a number of planning support documents included in the RESOURCES section below. These include guidelines on PPE use by WHO (note, these have not been endorsed by local health agencies), two documents to support COVID-19 planning at the local level, and workplace guidelines from WHO. These documents are a validation to the type of planning that the City of Vancouver is undertaking but many questions remain which we have highlighted to our local health partners on numerous occasions. In particular, we are requesting information on what types of social isolation measures could we anticipate here, how we can prepare to assist the health sector, and guidelines for the use of personal protective equipment. We're continuing to work with colleagues in Health as they ramp-up their internal infectious disease outbreak planning and will incorporate their guidelines into our planning documents when available. Travel o PHAC is expanding COVID-19-related travel advisories to countries beyond China. All staff should check the PHAC travel advisories website [click.cacomms.net] before planning work-related or personal travel abroad. Cost recovery o Disease outbreaks are not emergencies covered by the provincial/federal Disaster Financial Assistance program. As such, the City of Vancouver should not assume we can recover costs associated with response and recovery to COVID-19 from senior governments (unless confirmed otherwise). - The plan covers the following topics:
  - o Background on outbreaks and pandemics

    - Business Continuity and Internal Measures (including identification of critical services and expected impact and general actions such as enhanced environmental cleaning)
    - Support to health sector (including use of City facilities as care centres)
    - Consequence management (including managing economic impacts, social stigma
  - o Support tools
- 2. Status of Business Continuity Planning
  - Approx 80% of departments have completed the recent business continuity planning work pushed out by RM.
  - Focus is now on ensuring departments have identified their critical services, have identified potential impacts and are developing contingencies.
- 3. Illness Reporting and Environmental Cleaning
  - Discussion on process to identify workstations that may require cleaning following illness of a staff member.

  - Discussion on a soft increase to public messaging related to coronavirus, both through the City website and via posters at sites such as libraries and community centres where many clients are less likely to be informed by on-line material. Transmission: Public Health officials confirm person-to-person transmission of the virus through droplets (coughing, sneezing) and is more probable when in close contact with someone who is sick. How easily it is transmitted is still not clear. Severity of virus: COVID-19 causes a mild illness in over 80% of individuals, 15% have more severe illness, 3% experience critical illness. The virus is acting in a similar way to influenza, though maybe a bit more severe. It is certainly nothing like SARS. o In comparison: Influenza causes approx 3500 deaths per year in Canada. Case fatality rate from influenza, about 0.1 % (moderated as we have a vaccine). SARS caused 8,000 cases in Canada. 700 deaths reported. Case fatality rate closer to 10%. · Preventative measures are the same as for seasonal cold and flu - practice frequent hand-washing, cough and sneeze etiquette, and stay home when sick. . Newly arrived travellers are now being advised to closely monitor themselves for symptoms and to avoid contact with others for 14 days after leaving Hubei province. This includes remaining home from school or work and avoiding crowded public places. Incubation period looks to be averaging around 3-6 days with a maximum incubation period of 14 days before symptoms appear. In China where community transmissions are occurring, expect far more cases than are lab-confirmed. Fortunately most people are suffering from mild illness and are recovering without significant medical care. Those that are severely ill or dying generally have pre-existing medical conditions or are elderly.

 Public Health Officials are saying that while the risk to public in BC remains low, stakeholders should start reviewing Pandemic plans.

Ideally the message would formally come from Health and we could help refer to it,
  - o recommendations on personal protective equipment for various classes of staff, or indication that Health would not recommend PPE in any scenario for local government staff.

# Summary

Majority of coverage in all news outlets continue to revolve around COVID-19 (almost 2,000 print and web hits on March 10 as of 4 pm).

Yesterday afternoon and this morning saw coverage around the first COVID-19 death of the resident in the care home, with a number of stories following around care homes and the safety of senior citizens. Developing this afternoon are the seven new cases announced by the province during the daily media briefing.

Most other stories revolve around how different organizations are responding, with a particular focus on events cancelled due to coronavirus concerns, or events which are changing their messaging even if they go ahead (such as <u>Vancouver's 4/20 event still on for now, but discourage joint-sharing amid</u> <u>COVID-19 risk</u>, CKNW Simi Sara Show).

There are also a number of stories around cancelled or suspended flights, and cruise ships, particularly the Grand Princess which is due to arrive in Vancouver (with <u>CityNews</u> picking up that Port of Vancouver reached out to Public Health Canada for direction).

A story on VPD, Vancouver Fire, TransLink, RCMP, and other first responders' precautions has also been published on <u>CityNews</u>.

- Cruise ships continue to be high-risk environments for transmission. The federal government continues to recommend <u>Canadians</u>
   <u>avoid all cruise ship travel</u> due to the ongoing COVID-19 outbreak.
- PHAC is expanding <u>COVID-19-related travel advisories</u>. All staff should check the before planning personal travel abroad.

# Key Messages for Staff:

- The City is working with VCH. VCH continues to advise the City that staff risk remains low.
- All staff should practice good hygiene, including washing hands thoroughly, covering nose and mouth when sneezing or coughing, staying home if sick, and regularly cleaning surfaces.
- The City has created resources for staff including dedicated CityWire pages, a downloadable poster, and FAQ.
- The City is exploring enhanced cleaning at City facilities.
- The City is preparing guidance around working from home.
- Currently, public engagement plans are continuing with modifications to reduce risk.
- If staff have questions they are encouraged to email s. 15(1)(I) or speak to their manager.

# Key Messages for Public:

Our key messages to the public are echoing VCH's messages:

- The health and safety of the public and City staff is our top priority.
- We are in close contact with public health officials and are following their advice. At this time, Vancouver Coastal Health indicates that the risk in our City is still low.
- At this time, the City is not cancelling public gatherings or closing public facilities or programs. However, we are implementing enhanced cleaning protocols in our facilities and adjusting our approach to public meetings to minimize the risk to members of the public and staff.
- We are also concerned regarding the impact of this outbreak on businesses in Vancouver and their employees. Through the Vancouver Economic Commission, we are in contact with representatives of impacted sectors and will be working with them to identify supports the City may be able to provide for the response and recovery of our local economy.
- The situation globally and in BC is changing very rapidly though, so City staff are actively planning to deal with potential future changes in how we provide services.

Three Metro Vancouver schools are now closed (Coast Meridian Elementary in Surrey, St. Francis of Assisi in Vancouver, Notre Dame Regional Secondary School).

Locally, there is a significant focus on closures and cancelled events, or articles around organizations who are planning to continue to keep their events open (for now). BCGEU is also <u>calling for employers to waive the requirement for employees to produce a sick note to access sick leave</u>.

Vancouver councillor <u>Pete Fry expressed concern</u> yesterday about 4/20's plans to go ahead, with the organizer saying that they had reached out to VCH with the suggestion that  $\frac{4}{20}$  may reassess depending on what advice they receive.

At the daily provincial news conference at 15:30 p.m., the province announced it is recommending that British Columbians <u>avoid all non-</u><u>essential travel outside Canada</u> (including to the United States). Individuals who choose to travel must self-isolate for 14 days upon return. The province is also limiting the size of public gathering to 250 participants. However, the province is <u>not recommending</u> the closure of schools at this time but are monitoring closely. Employers are asked to increase social distancing in the work place and to encourage working from home where possible.

The province is experiencing some issues with 811 due to call volumes and has increased staffing.

Based on this update, the City has cancelled all business-related travel outside the region (no air travel). The City also cancelled events tonight at Vancouver Civic Theatres and is implementing measures to limit mass gatherings over 250 people in City spaces.

B.C. has confirmed 7 new COVID-19 cases today, for a total of 53. There is 1 fatality and 6 recoveries. 1 new case was from a large dental conference and a second care facility in West Vancouver reported 2 confirmed cases. Manitoba and Saskatchewan each announced their first presumptive cases.

The EOC increased the EOC activation to level 2 (coordination) in recognition of the increased coordination effort taking place.

## Summary

There are over 2,800 print and web hits around COVID-19 today.

Mayors from Vancouver, Surrey and Burnaby went on CBC Radio One's Early Edition show this morning to share how their cities are responding to COVID-19. Overall, mayors emphasized cities are monitoring and planning, and that risk remains low (detailed analysis at bottom). This segment was followed by mixed criticism and defence of how municipalities are responding.

The City of Vancouver issued an official response at around 2 pm today and will be getting more media coverage on this in the coming hours.

Following the recommendation for more 'social distancing', coverage revolves strongly around cancellations and suspensions, with Princess Cruises suspending for 60 days, sports leagues suspending for 30 days or more, and one TV production suspending filming in Vancouver. The cancellation of Surrey Vaisakhi Parade is likely to raise more questions about Vancouver's Vaisakhi event.

Discussion continues around economic impact to the cruise industry, and also businesses at large, including small businesses that are discussing whether they can survive (CKNW Lynda Steele, "Noticing any changes").

Social chatter in general has increased since the WHO announcement about the pandemic, and comments directed at the City have significantly increased since external messaging has been sent out.

Criticism/concerns include DTES/vulnerable populations, public gatherings being cancelled or not being cancelled, and school closures. A running theme is that BC and the City of Vancouver are not being proactive in testing and canceling schools and public events, with concerns that the outbreak will spread, especially through public transit.

Some people are starting to consider the economic impact and some critical voices have been engaging in the online conversation.

## Summary

Coverage and response focused on <u>BC's health advice on March 12 on self-isolation for</u> <u>14 days after international travel</u>, and cancelling events larger than 250 people. Reports are mixed whether self-isolation is recommended or required for the public.

The City's announcement on evening of March 12 about cancelling events over 250 people and other actions was widely covered by English outlets and one Chinese outlet (<u>Canadian Press</u>, <u>Vancouver Courier</u>, <u>The Star</u>, <u>Daily Hive</u>, <u>The Voice</u>, <u>Sing Tao Daily</u>).

An emerging issue beginning yesterday was the City's apparent absence in providing details about its homelessness response during COVID-19. Conversation was driven by Union Gospel Mission (CityNews), with particular criticism about Oppenheimer Park conditions from a homelessness advocate (Global News).

This morning (March 13) CUPE Local 1004 president representing the City's outdoor workers interviewed on CBC Early Edition about workers' concerns about contracting COVID-19, and hopes workers will not be financially penalized if they are sick at home (details below).

This afternoon's coverage following the media event so far focuses on whether recreational programs at the Park Board's facilities are still running.

More widely, stories also revolve around growing spread: <u>confirmed positive test for</u> <u>dental conference attendee at Vancouver Convention Centre</u>, North Vancouver's <u>Lions</u> <u>Gate staff testing positive</u>, and cruise ships of more than 500 being banned by the federal government. Public responses are being reported: <u>panic buying</u>, <u>811</u> <u>overwhelmed with calls</u>, fear of losing pay, and concerns around childcare if schools close (if BC follows Ontario's lead in extending spring break).

# Overview of conversation

There is a significant increase in social discussion around social distancing and public events. General opinion is to be overly cautious and avoid public events, gyms, restaurants and community gatherings.

People are increasingly concerned with the spread of the virus in BC, with particular concerns about spread coming through asymptomatic individuals.

Criticism towards the City remains consistent for the last 24 hours. Comments show that people want to see the City taking a proactive approach in order to get ahead of any outbreak, rather than a reactive one (as it is perceived).
