Dear Commissioners,

The purpose of this memo is to provide an update on the work currently underway by staff in response to direction provided in the Board motion titled Alcohol Consumption at Vancouver Parks & Beaches that was approved in December 2018, as well as to clarify some jurisdictional questions raised regarding a few related Council Members' motions that are on the Council agenda for May 26, 2020.

The 2018 Board motion directed staff to "conduct a feasibility study for a pilot project that would allow the public to consume their own alcoholic beverages on select parks and beaches". Additionally, staff were to identify potential sites for the pilot, and report back with feedback from the 2019 Concession Strategy alcohol pilot, along with any potential legal, logistical, societal, enforcement, and financial considerations. In order to address the complexities and possible opportunities that could be presented, a staff working group was convened with representation from Business Development, Commercial Operations, Park Operations, Recreation Services, Planning, Policy & Environment, & the GM's Office.

As part of the initial process, staff investigated the Park Board's legal authority to designate areas for the public consumption of alcohol. During this review, a jurisdictional gap in the Provincial legislation was identified that requires resolution in order to proceed with the proposed pilot.

The possession and consumption of alcohol is governed by the BC Liquor Control and Licensing Act. Section 73 allows for a municipality or regional district to pass a bylaw designating a public place within its jurisdiction where liquor may be consumed, and Section 197 of the Liquor Control and Licensing Regulation outlines the bylaw requirements related to signage, boundaries, and hours. Based on the current language in the Act, Vancouver City Council does not have the legal authority to pass a bylaw for any public places that full within the Park Board's jurisdiction. However, due to the Park Board's unique governing role, as it is neither a municipality nor a regional district it also does not have the authority to pass a bylaw per the Act. While a recent email from the BC Attorney General confirmed that the intent of the Act was for the Park Board to have this bylaw making ability, City of Vancouver Legal has advised that any bylaw passed could be challenged unless the language in the Act is expanded to explicitly reference the Park Board. As such, in collaboration with Legal and the City's Intergovernmental Relations Office, a request has been submitted for the Province to amend the Act accordingly.

In anticipation of a positive outcome, the staff working group is continuing to focus on developing plans for the feasibility study, which includes identifying sites for the pilot. Data collected during the pilot will help inform the subsequent report back to the Board. Once the Park Board's authority under the Act is clarified, the next steps will involve staff preparing a bylaw for the Board's consideration in order to proceed with the Alcohol Consumption at Parks & Beaches pilot. Subject to the required approvals and bylaw enactment, staff would plan to launch this pilot in 2020.

## Dear Commissioners,

I am writing to provide you an update on the tentative order for the reopening of Park Board facilities and services. Staff are incorporating new guidance, arriving daily, from various government and non-government agencies, such as WorkSafe BC, BC Recreation and Parks Association (BCRPA), and Provincial and local Health Authorities to develop a thoughtful and thorough plan that will continue to be refined as we move through the next few weeks.

With the successful launch of BC's phase two starting on May 19, we will be reopening most parking lots this weekend (details included in the attached Info Bulletin for release this morning), and then will begin reopening outdoor recreational facilities for casual use only the following week. This is anticipated to include synthetic turf fields, skate parks, bike tracks, disc golf, basketball and multi-court sports, lacrosse, roller hockey, and volleyball courts. The specific timing of these re-openings is still being determined and should be confirmed by mid-week. As this remains a dynamic plan, public messaging will continue to be coordinated by the Park Board Communications Team and I would ask that you continue to forward any related media requests to PB.Communications@vancouver.ca.

BC's phase three is anticipated to start on June 1, at which time we will begin the phased reopening of more complex operations, the timing of which is expected to occur over several weeks (possibly months) as we align with new requirements and guidelines. This phase includes the recall of employees and more extensive safety plans, training, approvals and coordination with third parties and partners. The facilities and services that will be reviewed in this phase will include playgrounds, day camps, concessions, beaches, outdoor pools, and community centres. Staff have already begun the planning work and collaboration with key stakeholders, such as the Community Centre Associations (CCAs), to address the revised requirements for reopening these services safely.

As we progress through the pandemic and continue to receive guidance and feedback, the reopening of other assets and service areas will continue to be reviewed to determine how best to align with BC's phase three & four reopening plans. Staff will continue to update the Board as new information becomes available, and will also present more detailed updates at the Regular Board meetings, with the next presentation planned for May 25. If there are any particular areas of guestion or concern, please let me know.

## Parking to reopen at Vancouver beaches and parks starting today

Starting this morning, Vancouver Park Board staff will begin reopening the majority of parking lots at parks and beaches, with the aim of having lots open by Sunday, May 24.

Parking lots were closed in mid-March as part of the Park Board's overall effort to support physical distancing, reduce crowding at destination parks and beaches, and encourage use of neighbourhood parks.

The reopening over the next two days of public parking includes 7,000 stalls at beaches and parks across the city, including the roadways at Queen Elizabeth Park. The reopening follows careful planning and consideration by the Park Board and is in alignment with the BC Restart Plan. Parking at beaches and parks is also vital to ensure there is equity of access to these spaces, particularly for residents with mobility challenges.

Pay parking and enforcement will be in effect at the pay lots and visitors are urged to keep a safe distance from others of at least two metres while exiting their vehicles and visiting beaches and parks.

Parking will remain temporarily closed at lots in Stanley Park and English Bay due to the continued vehicle closures in the park and along Beach Avenue. A small number of lots will remain temporarily closed at certain community centres and park sites for operational reasons.

The Park Board is taking a thoughtful and phased approach to reopening its facilities and services. Fraserview and McCleery golf courses and VanDusen Botanical Garden reopened May 1, tennis and pickleball courts May 9, and Langara Golf Course May 15.

The Park Board continues to review the feasibility of reopening other facilities and services and will make adjustments to its operations based on the latest information provided by Vancouver Coastal Health, the Provincial Health Officer, and industry partners.

Dear Commissioners,

The purpose of this memo is to inform you about the upcoming replacement of a FortisBC gas main near Riverfront Park on East Kent Avenue. The objective of the project is to protect this critical transmission line in the event of an earthquake. The work will be completed in phases and will involve excavation, new pipe installation, and land restoration. The project is expected to start in July 2020 and targeted for completion by end of December 2020.

The City of Vancouver Engineering Utilities Management Branch has been working closely with staff to minimize the impact of this project on both park land and park users. However, the project will require the closure of the pedestrian and cycling path linking Riverfront and Gladstone parks during construction from July to October 2020. A comprehensive traffic management plan will be implemented during this period to provide safe detour routes for both pedestrians and cyclists (see Appendix A for site detour plan). A temporary driveway will also be constructed at the east end of East Kent Avenue and on park land to allow access to the shipping facility during the project. Park users and adjacent residents will be informed of construction activities, timing, and detours through locally posted information signage, mall-outs, and a project webpage.

Some of the construction activities will result in temporary removal of lighting and other park features, as well as removal of a number of trees. Impacted trees have been reviewed by the Urban Forestry team and a plan for replanting is being developed for the project area. All other areas within the park and streets will be restored to the satisfaction of the Park Development group prior to completion of the project.



- Mayor gave a TV interview on <u>CBC</u> re budget shortfall: waiting to hear if federal financial support, concerned re. property tax defaults and the future of downtown.

- VPD's announcement that a total of 29 anti-Asian hate crimes has been reported in March, April and May (an almost eightfold increase compared to the same period last year) was reported on by <u>CBC</u>, <u>Global</u>, <u>CTV</u>, <u>Vancouver Sun</u>, The Province, Daily Hive and CityNews1130.

#### Patio permits

• The Province's announcement, permitting "fast-track" expansion of patios, was reported on by <u>Global</u>, <u>CityNews1130</u>, <u>Daily Hive</u>, <u>Business In Vancouver</u> and <u>The Voice</u>. Ian Tostenson, President of BC Restaurant and Food Association, spoke positively on <u>CKNW Jill Bennett</u> on the Province's announcement, but did express concern that municipalities, including City, may act too slow on allowing businesses to secure their permits. Councillor Pete Fry spoke on the CKNW Lynda Steele on patio permits and the flexibility the motion will bring.

Situation Report Summary

- The EOC is actively monitoring peak flows on the Fraser River. The next 1-3 weeks are critical for snowmelt and a risk
  of heavy rainfall. Short-term rises are expected due to warming and increased snow melt, both from local tributary
  inflow and headwaters. Transition to rain following heat over the weekend will be monitored by EOC as could lead to
  fairly rapid rises next week.
- Correction from yesterday regarding the Vancouver Public Library (VPL): the computer lab opened to the public May 25, curbside service starts next week, in person services, i.e. access to locations for assistance, are forecast to start in July, and in person programs (e.g. story times for children, cultural events for adults) are not likely to start before the fall. -VPL's Central Library celebrated it's 25th anniversary yesterday. The computer lab had a successful first day open, and VPL has added "mobile device charging lockers" for people using computers.
- The City laid out the Restart Smart Vancouver plan for recovery, restart and rebuilding. The plan is a carefully
  considered and phased approach to reopening and reinvigorating the city that emphasizes safe access to community
  activities and services for residents, and support for local businesses.
- Vancouver City Council approved a series of cultural grants that will bring local artist-led projects to a wider audience, generate new economic and cultural activity, and provide opportunities for the public to come together through art.
- The City transforms development and permit processes resulting in a digital transformation to support businesses and homeowners. The move is from a paper-based system with in-person meetings and review, to a digital ecosystem where people can apply, meet and participate from anywhere.





Relocation of the Air Force Garden of Remembrance.

You will recall you invited me to a meeting on 3 August 2018 regarding the proposed relocation of the Air Force Garden of Remembrance. You led off with Parks Board concerns about the present site of the Air Force Garden of Remembrance, including congestion resulting from the new bus loop of 2000, the lack of disability access, the lack of visibility resulting from vegetation growth since construction, lack of space for additional plaques, and relocation because of the Truth and Reconciliation process. You closed with the assurance that relocation would be "*To the highest point in Vancouver, Queen Elizabeth Park.*" It should be noted that there is disability access via the path to the of north of the Garden, and there is ample room for adding plaques.

On 4 August 2018, a Special General Meeting of the Battle of Britain Memorial Fund was convened to discuss your proposal. Following discussion, the following resolution was approved:

"Moved by Richard Dunn, seconded by Cam Cathcart, that the Secretary-Treasurer is authorized to inform Parks Board Management that we have discussed and accepted their offer to relocate the Air Force Garden of Remembrance to Queen Elizabeth Park, with the provisos that the location includes a flagpole in a proximate position to an open area suitable for holding a commemorative parade; and that the plaques currently installed at Stanley Park to be moved at Parks Board expense under an agreed-upon landscape architectural plan."

A Park Board Commissioner had earlier suggested the ideal location would be the wooded area just to the southeast of the Bloedel Conservatory. Members of our Committee inspected the proposed site and agreed.

On 27 January 2019, the Bark Board passed the following resolution:

"A. THAT the Vancouver Park Board approve the relocation of the Air Force Garden of Remembrance in Stanley Park to Queen Elizabeth Park; and

B. THAT the Vancouver Park Board direct staff to work with the Battle of Britain Memorial Fund to develop options for a new garden plan in Queen Elizabeth Park, as outlined in this report."

Following a lengthy delay with no apparent progress, an email dated 14 November 2019 from your staff, informed me that in October they had sent a Request for Proposals (RFP) to a select list of design consultants. Opportunity to close on 18 November 2019.

On 29 January 2020, your staff reported that Lee Associates-Landscape Architects, had been selected through a competitive process.

Representatives of our Committee met with your staff and those of Lee Associates at QE Park on 14 February 2020. Park Board staff then informed us that the selected location would not be available because of the Metro Vancouver water reservoir lease. We were then guided through the alternate QE Park site chosen by your staff to the north of 33rd Avenue off Cambie Street.

Immediately following this meeting I replied with an e-mail to all those who attended. It included a Google map overlain with our parade ground, spectator, and VIP seating requirements, replicating the dimensions of the present location in Stanley Park. I noted the lack of road access for the placement of bleachers.

I spoke with the aforementioned Commissioner on 29 February 2020, during which he stated he was unaware of the Metro Vancouver rejection of the proposed site. He said that there were elements in "our toolbox" that were not available to

park staff, and that he would contact you with the view to have Metro Vancouver reconsider their rejection.

Our Committee received an invitation to attend a meeting Tuesday, March 24, 2020 at the Park Board office. The meeting was subsequently cancelled because of COVID-19 concerns, and that Mr. Dave Hutch, Director, Planning and Park Development would call me later that week. Mr. Hutch called me the following week, Wednesday, 1 April 2020. I was expecting an update on the approval of our site by Metro Vancouver. Instead, he congratulated our Committee for selecting the secondary site, exclaiming that Lee Associates was a first-class firm. I interjected that we had neither selected nor approved the site. He lacked knowledge of our concerns summarized in my email of 14 February 2020, which I later forwarded to Mr. Hutch.

The following day, Thursday, 2 April 2020, the Annual General Meeting of The Battle of Britain Memorial Fund convened via Zoom conference. I reported on the proceedings to date. Discussion followed with a consensus to do nothing at this stage because of complications relating to the COVID-19 Virus.

During the lengthy process of this project, I came to conclude that the primary motivation for the relocation is the removal of vestiges of "European" or "Colonial" influence, artifacts or monuments in Stanley Park - regardless of their historical significance, as a means of complying with recommendations of the Truth and Reconciliation initiative.

As historical data tell us, the original Indigenous inhabitants of the B.C. coast were people who derived most of their sustenance from the sea, or riparian sources. Since the Air Force Garden of Remembrance is well within what would have been a dense forest at the time of their habitation, it is a mystery why our memorial, dedicated to over 17,000 Canadian aircrew killed during WWII, has been targeted for relocation, when compared to the recent installation of the Air India memorial in 2007. This memorial is sited at Second Beach, a location also known by its original Indigenous name of Staitwouk, and is perhaps sited on land where original dwellings of that village existed.

We have received support from Indigenous groups to remain in Stanley Park, including a request to install a plaque in memory of Indigenous Veterans in the Air Force Garden of Remembrance.

At a Special General Meeting of the Battle of Britain Memorial Fund of 10 May 2020, the following motion was unanimously approved:

"Whereas the Vancouver Parks Board has been unable to implement the provisos as set out in our letter of 4 August 2018, therefore be it Resolved that our acceptance of the relocation is withdrawn as null and void."

We would appreciate a response to confirm that the QE relocation project is cancelled. If we do not receive a response by 12.01 p.m., Monday, 18 May 2020, we will assume the QE relocation project is cancelled.

I hope you are well. We are proposing two new community gardens in the Hastings Sunrise neighbourhood. One at Callister Park and the other at Hastings Community Park. We are asking for these gardens to be fast-tracked in order to meet the urgent need for food security and safe social-distancing activities during the Covid-19 era.

We have received a fair amount of support from individual Park Board Commissioners however we realize that operations and logistics are the purview of the GM and Park Board Staff. That is why we are laying out some of the concrete steps we would like to take over the coming month or so to see these projects take root.

Given our connections within the community we hope to take on most of this work including helping to create a public process for engagement including community consultation.

We currently have networks in place engaging with people and a long list of volunteers interested in the project.

Here are some main points outlining our plan:

- Communal garden space as opposed to conventional separated community garden plots

- Callister Park and Hastings Community Park as sites of choice

- Long list of volunteers who are willing to help contribute to the construction and implementation of the new gardens, many of whom have been unable to get plots in the existing Community Gardens in the area.

- Strong group of community organizations and committed participants

- Liability coverage as yet unknown. Perhaps it can tie in with

existing community organizations

- Volunteer/learning opportunities for adults and youth in time of major shut-downs

- Access to water can be provided by the community if unavailable from parks

- Individual tools will be provided in compliance with physical

distancing regulations

- One or two garden facilitators will help coordinate volunteers at both sites

- Financial contributions to the project are in place through

community grants & institutional sponsors

- Storage can be provided by the construction of a shed or with community partners

- Soil supply available from multiple avenues if city compost is inaccessible

- Community consultation process expedited through pre-existing

community organizations involvement



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

Dear Commissioners,

The purpose of this memo is to inform you about the upcoming replacement of a FortisBC gas main near Riverfront Park on East Kent Avenue. The objective of the project is to protect this critical transmission line in the event of an earthquake. The work will be completed in phases and will involve excavation, new pipe installation, and land restoration. The project is expected to start in July 2020 and targeted for completion by end of December 2020.

The City of Vancouver Engineering Utilities Management Branch has been working closely with staff to minimize the impact of this project on both park land and park users. However, the project will require the closure of the pedestrian and cycling path linking Riverfront and Gladstone parks during construction from July to October 2020. A comprehensive traffic management plan will be implemented during this period to provide safe detour routes for both pedestrians and cyclists (see Appendix A for site detour plan). A temporary driveway will also be constructed at the east end of East Kent Avenue and on park land to allow access to the shipping facility during the project. Park users and adjacent residents will be informed of construction activities, timing, and detours through locally posted information signage, mail-outs, and a project webpage.

Some of the construction activities will result in temporary removal of lighting and other park features, as well as removal of a number of trees. Impacted trees have been reviewed by the Urban Forestry team and a plan for replanting is being developed for the project area. All other areas within the park and streets will be restored to the satisfaction of the Park Development group prior to completion of the project.





- There is insufficient cultural competency within PUDS planning staff on indigenous matters, based on what PB staff have seen in meetings on Heather Lands and Jericho Lands projects.
- This generally puts these major projects at risk, by potentially alienating MST representatives and/or members of the MST who are involved in the projects.
- Example: In an Heather Lands meeting in early May, with cultural liaisons from MST present, planning staff insisted on discussing project acknowledgement of the RCMP/Fairmont Building, despite being asked by others in meeting to leave it for an offline, internal discussion. This potentially caused harm to those liaisons and to indigenous PB staff, due to the building contentious history and symbolism.
- □ We urge PUDS to do the following:
  - improve the cultural competency of planning staff, most importantly those working on projects with indigenous rightsholders/issues;
  - make cultural competency a core requirement of staff assigned to projects that involve MST or urban Indigenous groups;
  - o carry through on intentions to hire indigenous planning staff.

I am incredibly grateful to know that we can count on one another and certainly have many of you to thank. I am sure that you do too.

#### Dear colleagues,

Today is an important day in the City of Vancouver. Mayor Kennedy Stewart has proclaimed May 29 as a Day of Action Against Racism - a significant day for us all to reflect on how we can take a stand against racism and hate, while also recognizing that racism has long been part of Vancouver's history and we need to learn from mistakes of the past. Watch a short video of staff acknowledging this important day.

I am sure that many of you have heard of the increase in anti-Asian racist and xenophobic incidents since the COVID-19 pandemic started. I want to reiterate that these incidents are completely unacceptable. Hate and racism is not tolerated here. Everyone is entitled to feel safe and welcome in Vancouver, and it's important that we voice our support for victims of hate crimes.

The City takes these incidents very seriously. Our Equity and Inclusion team within the EOC is working hard to support groups that have been historically discriminated against and marginalized through community resilience; lowering barriers to access timely, critical information; and ensuring historically underrepresented groups disproportionately impacted by the pandemic are part of emergency response.

If you are eager to voice your stance against racism in Vancouver, please feel free to post the available social media graphics to your account. And if you have been a victim of, or a witness to, a hate crime, I encourage you to report it to police.

#### **COVID-19 Safety Plan**

As an organization, our priority continues to be everyone's health and safety. We have created a COVID-19 Safety Plan that outlines essential safety protocols to ensure the health and safety of staff and citizens as we maintain, expand and/or restart some operations during the COVID-19 pandemic. It is a living document that will evolve as we move forward, and is based on direction and advice from the Provincial Health Officer, the provincial government and WorkSafeBC. This core safety plan will be supplemented by operation-specific addendums where additional measures are required to support our diverse operations.

Collectively, we are all responsible for workplace safety. I'd like to encourage everyone to speak up if you see something unsafe, and to not take shortcuts. Now more than ever, it is essential that we look out for each other and renew our ongoing commitment to safety, both physical and psychological.

#### **Restart Smart Vancouver**

As I've shared before, we are taking a careful, phased approach to opening some facilities and restarting some City services safely. Our program and timing are aligned with the Government of B.C.'s Restart Plan and considers public health direction.

As we look to the future with cautious optimism, we have developed an approach and framework with three distinct areas of focus for the City:

- Recovery supporting Vancouver's economic and community recovery from the COVID-19 crisis.
- Restart implementing a phased approach to resuming services in nine key areas of operations: libraries; parks and recreation; theatres; non-market housing and social operations; parking; Council operations; City Hall and other offices; service counters, and City tenants. We'll be sharing more details on this as reopening plans are approved.

 Rebuild - fast-tracking changes to deliver services faster and more efficiently as we adapt to "the new normal."

I read the story in the media today of parents continued frustration that the Vancouver Parks board has not opened any facilities, particularly skate and bike parks, for older children and teens. This despite the fact that every other jurisdiction (West Vancouver, Burnaby, Port Coquitlam and more) have opened up outdoor recreation facilities for older children and young teens. A colleague of mine at Council reached out to express concerns about 'deteriorating conditions' at Emery Barnes, as per email exert here below. Do we have any update on the situation there?

I've been fielding a number of calls and concerns about the newly opened low barrier housing in Downtown South (for folks presumably moved out of Oppenheimer) and a general increase of street disorder, fears of crime and personal safety in the area of Downtown South.

Many of the concerns are specifically around the situation at Emery Barnes Park. As you know it's an urban park and well used by a variety of patrons. However, people are reporting a shift in dynamic lately – open drug use, violence, intimidation, taking over of spaces – people fear it may become 'another Oppenheimer Park.' There are a lot of concerns around the mis-use and drug use in the playground specifically. The feel police and rangers are ineffectual because there are no rules.

The impetus for this letter is that I recently became aware that the city plans to demolish the obstacles that were recently built/installed on Earl Finning Way in East Vancouver. Of course I am not surprised that this is happening since I can only assume this was done without permits or permission, but it caught my attention when I was told that this was due to complaints from neighbours. Just figured if the squeaky wheel gets the grease I am taking it upon myself to be a squeaky wheel.

It is my understanding that skateparks in other municipalities such as West Vancouver, North Vancouver, Burnaby and New Westminster are opening back up so I am wondering why skateparks remain closed in Vancouver when other sports facilities are starting to open up again. One of the first lessons we learn and teach, as skateboarders and parents of skateboarders, is skate etiquette- stay out of each others way so there's should be no question of physical distancing. Unlike tennis or baseball where I'm not sure how you'd play without at least touching the same ball, skateboarders never need to touch each other's boards.

It is my opinion that the city of Vancouver would prefer if there were no places for skateboarders to go. This opinion is based on several factors that include the delays and/or cancellation of skatepark facilities in Vancouver's Robson, John Rogers, Sunset Parks and the vacant space under the Cambie street bridge as well as previous plans to demolish existing well used facilities in China Creek and Mount Pleasant. If I am wrong, which I truly hope I am, know that you are not only affecting skateboarders. If the All Aboard Skateboard Festival on Granville Island last year taught us anything it is that Vancouver's skateboarding community is large as well as diverse. And that ramp was limited to skateboarding. The city skateparks are used not only by skateboarders of all ages but also by bikers, rollerbladers, and scooters as well.

Again just my opinion but I don't believe there's any reason to keep skateparks closed as long as, like city parks and beaches, we follow the same rules set out for other sports facilities. While I'm offering my opinion I also don't see why the city doesn't allocate some unused space, such as the previously mentioned area under the south end of the Cambie Street bridge that was already being considered, for skateboarders to build their own obstacles. Since they are going to do this anyway it seems, why not save us all some time, trouble, resources and money and work with them on these projects instead of against them?

This week we asked a few fun questions digging into the conspiracy theories/fake news stories that have percolated around the pandemic. The results were surprising/interesting– esp. when you look between regions as well as in comparisons to our friends to the South. This poll also digs a little deeper into Canadians views toward wearing a protective face covering.

- Here are a few highlights:
  - We asked whether *governments were deliberately withholding information about the pandemic*. 50% of Canadians said YES. In PQ this number was 60%. In the US this number was 65% of the population. This is somewhat surprising given satisfaction levels with government have been and remain generally high in relation to the pandemic (see points below).
  - Two conspiracy theories were agreed with by over a third of Canadians: *Covid-19 was created in a lab* (37% agree) and *Covid-19 was created by the Chinese Govt.* (34% agree). 19% of Canadians agree the *number of deaths due to covid-19 has been exaggerated.* See slide 7 in the full report for the full list of conspiracy theories tested as well as how strongly Americans agree with some of the theories.
  - Usage of protective face coverings is mixed among Canadians. 45% say they are wearing a mask while out in public. Higher in QC and ON (~50%) and lower in MB/SK and AB (32%)
  - Main reasons for not wearing a mask:
    - I am not sick (16% of responses)
    - Its uncomfortable (15%)
    - I don't trust the directive (14%)
    - I can't find/get a mask (13%)
  - A slim majority of Canadians (51%) support protective face coverings being mandatory—highest in QC (59%) and ON (57%)
  - In terms of lifting protective measures: 56% of Canadians trust their provincial government most; followed by the Federal government (30%)
  - The pace of lifting social distance orders may be reaching the point where the public is starting to become uncomfortable. 53% of Canadians feel the current pace in their province should be maintained (down 7 points from last week. 34% say it should slow down (up 7 points from last week). The 13% who say the pace should be accelerated is unchanged this week.
    - The view things should slow down is highest in ON (39%)
  - 51% of Canadians say they find it stressful (very or somewhat) to be out of the house unchanged from last week
  - New question this week asked Canadians how they felt their financial situation was compared to others. 9% said they thought they were *worse off* compared to other Canadian families; 31% felt they were *about the same* and 53% said they felt they were *better off*. Perhaps a good omen for economic recovery down the road.
  - 51% said they were personally afraid of getting the virus- down two points from last week. 28% of Canadians feel the *worst is behind us* (up 2 pts) while 33% feel the *worst is still to come* (down 2 points)
  - Overall, satisfaction with governments' response to the pandemic remains strong: Federal satisfaction (74% down 3pts from last week); Provincial satisfaction (78% down 2 pts). Satisfaction with Municipal government up a point this week (68%).
  - Regionally, satisfaction is starting to level out and cluster together. ON; BC and PQ near the top at 79%-80%. MB and SK in the middle at 70%-74% and AB at 67%. Biggest satisfaction gains this week were in AB and BC, each up 5 points. ON had the biggest drop at 6 points this week from last.

• The Liberals continue to lead in our Federal ballot question with 41% of decided voters. CPC is at 27% and the NDP 15% and the Green at 6%.





Web survey using computer-assisted Web interviewing (CAWI) technology.

From May 22<sup>nd</sup> to May 25<sup>th</sup> , 2020

1,510 Canadians and 1,005 Americans, 18 years of age or older, randomly recruited from LEO's online panel.

Using data from the 2016 Census, results were weighted according to gender, age, mother tongue, region, education level and presence of children in the household in order to ensure a representative sample of the population.

No margin of error can be associated with a non-probability sample (Web panel in this case). However for comparative purposes, a probability sample of 1,510 respondents would have a margin of error of  $\pm 2.52\%$ , 19 times out of 20, while a probability sample of 1,005 would have a margin of error of  $\pm 3.1\%$ , 19 times out of 20.

The research results presented here are in full compliance with the CRIC Public Opinion Research Standards and Disclosure Requirements.





New question CTC88. Do you believe that governments are telling you the whole truth about COVID-19 or are they deliberately withholding information? Base: All respondents (n=1,510)


































## EVOLUTION OF THE COVID-19 PANDEMIC (CANADA VS UNITED STATES)



CTC20: What statement best describes your personal opinion of the COVID-19 crisis for Canada/United States? Base: All respondents









Participants were randomly selected from LEO's online panel.

Leger owns and manages an Internet panel that includes more than 400,000 Canadians coast to coast. An online panel consists of Web users profiled according to different demographic variables. The majority of Leger's panel members (60%) were randomly recruited over the phone in the past ten years, which makes this panel very similar to the current Canadian population on a number of demographic characteristics. Moreover, 35% of panellists were recruited through affiliate programs and 5% through partner campaigns and programs.

Currently we are exploring options for moving Fraser Riverkeeper's very small laboratory for July 1. We are facing some challenges with our current space and would love to explore other options. Perhaps Fasle Creek Community Center or some other location (Science World?) that is on or close to Granville Island? I thought you would be the best person for us to speak with!

We only require a cupboard to store our monitoring supplies (approximately two regular office sized boxes), as well as a table to run our tests, process our samples, and store our 3 monitoring appliances. Is there a space available in any of your facilities that could be rented (or donated to our charity) to house our work? We would only need to access them twice a week, on Thursdays and Fridays to process and analyze our samples. Our budget would be around \$300/month (or charitable tax receipt).

As a fellow institution that provides recreational, educational, and social activities and services to residents and visitors of the False Creek Community, we believe that our organization would be the perfect fit for your facility. Hi Paul Dapologies for the delay in response.

To-date Park Bd Sr Landscape Architect @Alex Man-Bourdon been working closely with Gilles Assier, Director of Container Terminal Construction at the Port of Vancouver, to finalize the terms of funding agreement (\$1M). We have received recent communication from Gilles that additional time is required by the Port prior to concluding the agreement, in order to address the recent encampment adjacent to Crab Park. From your note below it sounds like Peter Xotta perhaps needs to connect with Gilles for an update.

Once the agreement with the Port is finalized and funding is in place with PB, we will retain a facilitation and engagement consultant that will support a team of in-house designers with conversation with the community. This team will work with stakeholders and community to discuss how best to utilize the \$1M contribution for CRAB Park. We will be involving the Port at all stages of the project, especially as we begin to understand the community  $\mathbb{B}$  priorities for the renewal. Once priorities are determined a proposed option(s) will be presented to the Board for approval - and just for context \$1M does will not go far in a park of this scale  $\mathbb{B}$ so improvement will be modest.

I am writing in follow up to a recent conversation with Peter Xotta at the Port regarding the \$1M contribution that they provided for CRAB park under the auspices of the Centerm expansion project. I am hoping the appropriate member of your team can provide an update on the status of work to decide on the allocation of those funds.

Although it was a short discussion and I don have much in the way of detail, Peter indicated some concern that the Port was not in the loop regarding the plans for the park. Under the terms of the lease for CRAB park, and notwithstanding Council decision to delegate authority for governance of CRAB Park to the Park Board, the City has an obligation to consult the Port on any planned construction in the park. While the lease does not give the Port a veto, it is not in our interest long-term to get offside with the Port in relation to these leased lands. In this case, the fact that the funding is coming from the Port is also material.

It is entirely possible that there isn really a live issue here. In any event, it would be helpful to understand where we are at on this file. If it is more efficient to discuss directly, please feel free to give me a call.

Dear Councillor Boyle:

During our recent phone call, you asked me to look into the matter of jurisdiction for allowing liquor consumption in Vancouver parks.

Section 73 of the *Liquor Control and Licensing Act* gives the authority to local governments to, via bylaw, designate a public place that is within their jurisdiction as a place where liquor may be consumed (http://www.bclaws.ca/civix/document/id/complete/statreg/15019 [bclaws.ca]).

The Vancouver Charter (http://www.bclaws.ca/civix/document/id/complete/statreg/vanch\_00 [bclaws.ca]) then gives that authority to the Vancouver Board of Parks and Recreation under Sections 488 and 489. However, to date, the Park Board has chosen not to use that power.

Consequently, the authority for designating liquor consumption in Vancouver parks falls to the Vancouver Board of Parks and Recreation.

Thank you for inquiring. If you have further questions, please do not hesitate to contact my office or that of my colleague the Honourable Selina Robinson, Minister of Housing and Municipal Affairs.

Dear Mayor and Council,

In regard to City of Vancouver Council motions:

"Allowing responsible alcohol consumption in Vancouver parks and beaches" (Clr Boyle)

"Designating public space for responsible consumption of alcohol" (Clrs Fry and Wiebe)

"Enhancing COVID-19 Revenue Streams for Smaller Unlicensed Restaurants and Cafes via Temporary Liquor Licensing" (Clr. Bligh)

Vancouver Coastal Health (VCH) has worked closely with the City of Vancouver on a number of liquor related motions as successive councils have instructed staff to explore changes to policies and bylaws. Notably this has included the 2017 Liquor Policy Review, which emphasized the need to protect the health of the public, and updates to bylaws needed to reflect changes made by the Province to expand the sale of liquor in grocery stores and other locations.

In both clinical and population health contexts the understanding of how alcohol impacts individual drinkers and those around them remains consistent today with VCH Medical Health Officers' previous recommendations to the City, which in 2017 noted a long-term, significant increase in alcohol-related hospitalizations in Vancouver. This increase is consistent with long-term trends in alcohol consumption overall in the Province of BC through the expanded privatization of liquor sales and expanded access in Vancouver and other communities.<sup>1</sup> The evidence from BC and jurisdictions around the world clearly indicates that alcohol-related harms, from both binge drinking and long term consumption, are highly correlated with alcohol availability and the density of retail outlets.

Unfortunately the long-term policy trajectory in British Columbia since 2003 has included expanded access to liquor in communities through alcohol liberalization policies, which has been reflected in an increase in hospitalizations and other data that demonstrate negative alcohol-related health impacts on Vancouverites. Research by VCH's Public Health Surveillance Unit, shared with Council in 2017 and appended with this letter, demonstrated that patterns of unsafe drinking in Vancouver were consistent with evidence from other jurisdictions where higher liquor outlet density is associated with increasing harm from alcohol.<sup>II</sup>

For these reasons we strongly recommend that Council consider the negative health and social consequences of Clr. Bligh's motion instructing staff to explore allowing presently unlicensed restaurants and cafes, which currently fall under the City's Limited Food Service designation, to sell

liquor. This change would greatly increase outlet density and alcohol access across the City, and almost certainly result in increased alcohol-related harms in the Vancouver population.

As we have noted previously in regards to debates surrounding liquor policy reform, both heavy and moderate drinking brings elevated risks to individual health and to the public at large. Alcohol is a leading risk factor for premature death and disability worldwide and a casual factor in more than 200 disease and injury conditions.<sup>III</sup> Risks and harms from alcohol are not limited to individual drinkers themselves. Alcohol addiction and problematic drinking can place serious strain on professional and personal relationships and negatively impact public health.

With this in mind, we do recognize that the current circumstances regarding use of public space, responsible socialization, social isolation, and liquor consumption among Canadians have changed due to the COVID-19 pandemic, and as such it is reasonable to re-examine these things in the public interest.

Reiterating our previous advice to past councils, VCH Medical Health Officers wish to emphasize the following assumptions based on public health data detailed in VCH's 2017 Key Messaging on Liquor Policy, also appended with this letter regarding changes in Liquor Policy:

- 1. Any net increase in access to and availability of alcohol will negatively affect both the short and long term health of our residents.
- 2. The most effective and proven ways to decrease alcohol consumption are to reduce the number, density and operating hours of establishments selling alcohol on site and off site and increase the price per unit of alcohol.
- 3. A "culture of moderation" in alcohol consumption cannot be imported easily.
- 4. Enforcement only works if there is real risk of being caught in violation.
- 5. Local governments and regional health authorities bear an undue burden of the negative health effects of problematic drinking.

In addition, recent evidence shows that 25% of Canadians aged 35-54 are drinking more due to the COVID-19 pandemic, citing reasons such as a lack of regular schedule, stress, and boredom.<sup>iv</sup> At the same time polling shows that a majority of Canadians (54%) feel COVID-19 related physical distancing measures have increased their feelings of loneliness and isolation.<sup>v</sup>

Given the recent data demonstrating increased social isolation, loneliness, and alcohol consumption due to COVID-19 social distancing measures, we strongly support increasing access to parks and public spaces to promote mental and physical health. Expanding patio service for restaurants and cafes, with the explicit aim of spacing out seating for table service overall is also supported. But taking into consideration the long-term trend towards liberalization of liquor access in the province, and the well-

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known risks associated with this increased access, we caution the mayor and council not to consider alcohol a necessary requirement to facilitate social connection and enjoyment of public spaces in communities.

With respect to issues of equity and treatment of park users identified in Clr. Boyle's motion, we are unaware of any evidence suggesting universally allowing consumption of liquor in public spaces results in more equitable applications of bylaw enforcement. Experiences of park-users and their interactions with bylaw officers or police is an important issue, particularly in the context of racial and gender equity. However, relaxing liquor laws may be a less direct path to improving issues of equity than other policies, such as cultural safety and humility training and increased awareness of equity related considerations.

Regarding parks and beaches, instructions to Parks Board staff to "conduct a feasibility study for a pilot project that would allow the public to consume their own alcoholic beverages on select parks and beaches" were approved in a motion put forward by Commissioner Dave Demers in December 2018. Before further changes are made to liquor policy in the City of Vancouver, particularly as they pertain to parks and beaches, we recommend that this work be completed to inform next steps.

We acknowledge that there are a number of perspectives to consider regarding alcohol policy, with many members of the public and business community in favor of increased liberalization. If, in spite of our significant public health concerns, the City moves forward with plans to increase access or allow consumption of alcohol in public spaces, we strongly recommend that this be done only on a pilot basis and coupled with a health impact assessment and evaluation of potentially negative unintended consequences.
