1. Introduction

Initial Response Guidelines (IRGs) provide guidelines for responding to emergencies during the early stages of an event. IRGs outline the functions that City of Vancouver business units and key external partners agree to perform. NOTE: IRGs <u>do not</u> replace the duties that City departments or external partners already perform and are extensions to the City of Vancouver Emergency Response & Recovery Plan.

1.1 Risk & vulnerability assessment

The focus of this document is on extreme heat, however, as air quality impacts from wildfire smoke often occur simultaneously with Heat, additional preparedness and response activities for air quality have been added. (Note: references to Air Quality in this document refer to Air Quality impacts from wildfire smoke only).

In 2009, the Lower Mainland extreme heat event led to approximately 120 excess deaths. North American heat waves are already responsible for more deaths annually compared to flooding, hurricanes and tornadoes. Longer lasting extreme heat events are forecasted globally.

Extreme heat effects are exacerbated by social isolation and lower incomes. Individuals at higher risk include homeless populations; seniors (particularly those homebound); small children; people who work or exercise outdoors; and those with health problems (addiction problems, breathing difficulties, heart conditions, and/or mental illness). The occurrence of high levels of humidity, reduced air quality levels, and/or extended durations of heat events are all potentially aggravating factors that can negatively affect health and put people at increased risk.

Based on recommendations from Vancouver Coastal Health, the following is the order of priority based on health impacts if these hazards are compounding:

- 1) Heat
- 2) Air quality from wildfire smoke
- 3) COVID-19

1.2 Heat Triggers for the southwest region

Extreme heat events are periods of time when the temperature is high enough that we can expect to see adverse health effects.

There are <u>two levels of extreme heat</u> outlined in this IRG. These levels have been developed by Environment Canada and local health authorities based on data showing correlation between predicted temperatures and adverse health effects.

Level 1: Heat Warning

Issued by Environment Canada when temperatures are forecast to be Tmax \geq 29°C and Tmin \geq 16°C in the Coastal Region <u>for two or more consecutive days</u> (or Tmax \geq 33°C and Tmin \geq 17°C in the Inland Region)

Level 2: Extreme Heat Alert

Issued by Health via HEMBC and EMBC when temperatures are predicted to hit Tmax \geq 31°C at YVR or \geq 36°C at Abbotsford <u>for 2 or more consecutive days.</u>

See section 6.1 for the current *Heat Alert Response System* (HARS) algorithm for the Southwest region, developed jointly by Environment Canada and the BC Centre for Disease Control.

1.3 Assumptions

- COV business units identified as Function Leads in this IRG will have specific plans and procedures to implement their identified functions, where required. Business units can implement sections of this plan independently if localized conditions warrant it and resources are available.
- Organizations sheltering vulnerable populations such as those providing assisted living services for the elderly and those looking after children (e.g., child care providers, schools, summer youth camps) will take appropriate actions to ensure the safety of the people in their care.
- Employers will take appropriate actions to mitigate extreme heat adverse impacts on their workforce.
- Costs related to the implementation of this IRG will be borne by responding departments and agencies.

1.4 Pre-authorized public messaging


Pre-authorized messaging to be used by any staff if approached directly by the media.

- Environment Canada [or] Vancouver Coastal Health has issued a [heat warning] or [extreme heat alert] for the Southwest Region.
- COV is implementing its extreme heat plan to counteract adverse health impacts related to heat.
- The City is encouraging everyone to look out for others, especially those more vulnerable to heat such as the elderly, very young, homeless, and persons with underlying health conditions.

1.5 Vancouver Emergency Management Agency (VEMA) Duty Officer

- When the first heat event of the season occurs in the region, whether it be a Special Weather Statement, Environment Canada Heads Up or Heat warning, the VEMA Duty Officer will send a message to remind the IRG department leads of IRG triggers and their roles within the IRG in preparation for the season.
- The VEMA Duty Officer will be responsible for organizing an IRG Extreme Heat Coordination Call with the IRG Function Leads and stakeholders once a trigger (refer to page 4) has been reached, and after confirming with the VEMA Director or Manager. This VEMA Duty Officer, who is on call 24/7 serves as the first point of contact for VEMA and can be reached at any time at s.15(1)(l) or s.15(1)(l)
- The EM Duty Officer will also notify the City Leadership Team (CLT) and the Emergency Management Committee members that an event has occurred, that the Extreme Heat IRG trigger has been reached, and that the Extreme Heat IRG Function Leads will be convening to discuss next steps. Function leads will be copied on this email notification, following which they will receive a calendar invite for the meeting.

This event process outlines IRG activation, notification, coordination and/or escalation activities which take place when Special Weather Statements or Heat Warnings have been issued or are impending.



3. Heat Preparedness Activities

The responsibilities outlined in this section take place April to June. City departments and partnering agencies will be accountable for their own actions.

5.1 Air Quality Response Triggers

Air quality advisories are issued by Metro Vancouver for fine particulate matter related to wildfire smoke. Metro Vancouver issues an advisory when:

- Air quality exceeds or is expected to exceed 25µg/m3 for the 24-hour rolling average at 2 or more stations
- Air quality is expected to deteriorate into the "high health risk" category (7 or greater) of the AQHI (Air Quality Health Index) for at least two consecutive hours.

6.4 Briefing Note for Staff – Extreme Heat Response

When Environment Canada issues a Heat Warning, the City of Vancouver implements its extreme heat plan to counteract the adverse health impacts. This plan can include the opening of cooling centres, increasing access to drinking water, monitoring outdoor spaces for people suffering from heat-related illness and monitoring populations at risk of heat-related illness.

A heat warning is issued when temperatures reach over 29 degrees Celsius in the daytime and 16 degrees for two consecutive nights.

During periods of extreme heat, the City encourages people to prepare by staying hydrated, keeping cool, check on others and staying informed by checking for weather updates and using the information on the City website.

What is the City's response to a heat warning?

As part of our Extreme Heat response the City is taking action to help protect residents susceptible to the adverse effects of heat and is sharing heat-related safety information to our partners and the public. A number of actions are being taken by the City, including:

- Our 10 air-conditioned community centres and the air conditioned library branches become cooling centres. In addition, Carnegie Community Centre, the Gathering Place, Evelyne Saller Centre and Mount Pleasant Community Centre all have high efficiency particulate air filtering rooms which create cleaner air and anyone struggling with respiratory issues is encouraged to go there.
- Park Rangers, VPD and VFRS keep an extra eye out for citizens who are suffering from, or are at risk of, heat exposure and direct them to fountains and cooling centres
- The City's Non-Market Housing Operations implement a hot weather support plan for tenants including increased wellness checks, particularly for the most vulnerable, and provision of water.
- The City has already installed 12 temporary water fountains in areas of high need across Vancouver and we are currently rolling out misting stations to parks and high foot-traffic locations. These are in addition to the 234 permanent fountains across the City. We will also be installing a number of misting stations at locations around the City to help people cool down.
- The City also increases the amount of information it provides to the general public about how to beat the heat by issuing guidance via social media and the website. When a heat warning is issued, the City will also put a banner on the Vancouver.ca website to increase awareness.
- If water quality declines then beaches and lakes in the City may be closed to dogs and swimmers. If this occurs, the City will issue social media messaging and post a banner on the City website.

What advice should I give to someone struggling with the heat?

- Dress for heat: Wear a wide-brimmed hat; lightweight, long-sleeved clothing; and sunscreen.
- **Take it easy**: Avoid strenuous activity and exercise. If you are struggling with respiratory issues, visit one of the City's cleaner air rooms at Carnegie, the Gathering Place, Evelyne Saller or Mount Pleasant Community Centre
- Stay hydrated: Fill up your water bottle at one of our drinking fountains, including the temporary fountains that are set up across the City. Locations of fountains can be found at https://vancouver.ca/home-property-development/water-fountains.aspx
- **Protect your loved ones**: Never leave a child or pet in a closed car or in the direct sun.
- **Cool off**: Visit an air-conditioned community centre or library, or enjoy a wading pool, outdoor pool, misting station, water park, or spray park.
- **Care for your pets**: Animals with fur coats are particularly susceptible to the heat so leave them at home or take them to an off-leash dog park which has access to water. If you see an animal in a hot car report it to BC SPCA immediately.







As you know, Environment Canada issue a Heat Warning earlier this week which initiated Vancouver's extreme heat response measures. Due to the increased temperatures, Vancouver Coastal Health has issued an Extreme Heat Alert, which signals more extreme temperatures and initiates the second stage of our response. This is the first time an Extreme Heat Alert has been issued in the region since the creation of the lower mainland's Heat Alert Response System. The Information Bulletin from VCH and FVHA is attached.

VEMA and our City departments have already begun implementing level 2 response measures. These additional measures include:

- 1. Extending hours at our cooling centres in the Downtown Eastside
- Opening two wading pools, starting tomorrow Park Board regularly opens wading pools in early July, but was able to open two wading pools in high-need starting tomorrow (12-5) for the duration of the heat wave
- 3. Distributing bottled water through Downtown Eastside community centres and community partners, and through Park Board cooling centres where needed

VCH has also clarified that COVID-related occupancy restrictions, physical distancing, and wearing of masks at cooling centres is not required in Vancouver. People coming to the centres should be encourage to follow these practices where possible and staff will adjust plans to provide as much space to people attending cooling centres as feasible.

VEMA is holding a coordination call daily with departments involved in the response and will continue to assess needs, monitor the situation, and provide updates as the situation changes.

In follow up to the information I shared yesterday regarding the City's heat response plans, I can confirm that Environment Canada has now issued a <u>Heat Warning</u> for Vancouver and area, indicating the hottest temperatures are expected between Friday and Tuesday. The <u>forecast</u> indicates highs of 30 C on Saturday, Sunday, and Monday, and Iows of 20 C on all three days.

The Heat Warning triggers level 1 of our extreme heat response plan, which includes:

- Cooling Centres residents are invited to cool off in any of the City s 10 air-conditioned community centres and library locations with air-conditioning (see <u>vancouver.ca/hot-</u> <u>weather</u> for locations). These centres are open during regular opening hours and everyone is welcome to go to these facilities, cool down and rehydrate.
- Shade members of the public are also welcome to seek shade at any of the City s other community centres.
- Water Fountains and Misters the City has deployed nine temporary water fountains throughout the City to augment <u>over 200 drinking fountains</u>. Starting on Friday, temporary misting stations will also be installed at 9 locations throughout Vancouver.
- Patrols by Park Rangers and VPD Neighbourhood Policing Officers in parks and commercial areas to look out for people suffering from heat-related illnesses
- Support to non-market housing residents, including cooling rooms and fans, extreme heat information, and resident monitoring
- Increased communication related to extreme heat and promotion of the City's response plans on vancouver.ca and social media. An IB is planned to be issued tomorrow.

The City s extreme heat response plans were developed in consultation with Vancouver Costal Health, Environment Canada, and informed by research conducted by BC Centre for Disease Control and Health Canada s Heat Alert Response System Best Practices Guide.

Extreme Heat Alert

LOWER MAINLAND, B.C. – As heat continues to build in the Lower Mainland, the Heat Warning issued by Environment Canada has now been escalated to an Extreme Heat Alert. Record-high temperatures expected in the Lower Mainland tomorrow will continue until at least Tuesday, June 29, 2021, with daytime highs ranging from 29 to 39 degrees celsius combined with overnight lows of 18 to 21 degrees celsius. Humidex values during this period will reach the high 30s to possibly the low 40s. High temperatures are historically associated with an increase in deaths among Lower Mainland residents.

While everyone is at risk of heat related illness, hot temperatures can be especially dangerous for the young, the elderly, those working or exercising in the heat, persons with chronic heart and lung conditions, persons with mental illness, people living alone and people experiencing homelessness. If you are taking medication, particularly for mental illness, ask your doctor or pharmacist if it increases your health risk in the heat and follow their recommendations.

The Lower Mainland Medical Health Officers for Fraser Health and Vancouver Coastal Health advise at this time that risks from extreme heat exceed risks from COVID-19. While the Extreme Heat Alert is in place:

- Cooling centres will be open, and no one should be denied access to these centres because of concerns about crowding or physical distancing.
- If people are wearing a mask and have difficulty breathing, they should remove the mask, whether they are indoors or outside, as wearing a mask may impact thermal regulation during heat events.

Coping with the heat

There are a variety of mild to severe symptoms linked with heat-related illness, including thirst, dizziness, confusion, weakness and fainting or collapsing. Medical Health Officers remind Lower Mainland residents to take precautions to protect themselves from the heat, including:

Stay hydrated

- Drink cool non-alcoholic beverages (preferably water) irrespective of your activity intake. Don't
 wait until you are thirsty.
- If your doctor generally limits the amount of fluid you drink or has you on water pills, ask about increasing the amount of water you can drink while the weather is hot.

Keep cool

 NEVER leave children or pets alone in a parked car. Temperatures can rise to 52°C (125°F) within 20 minutes in an enclosed vehicle when the outside temperature is 34°C (93°F). Leaving the car windows slightly open or "cracked" will not keep the inside of the vehicle at a safe temperature.

- Seek out an air-conditioned facility (such as a shopping centre, library, community centre or restaurant).
- Use public splash pools, water parks or pools or take a cool bath or shower.
- At current temperatures, fans alone are not effective. Applying cool water mist or wet towels
 prior to sitting in front of a fan is a quick way to cool off.
- Dress for the weather by wearing loose, light-weight clothing. Protect yourself from the sun by wearing a wide-brimmed hat and sunglasses.
- Keep your home cool. Open windows, close shades, use an air conditioner (if you have one) and prepare meals that do not require an oven.
- Avoid sunburn, stay in the shade or use sunscreen with SPF 15 or more.
- Avoid tiring work or exercise in the heat. If you must exercise, drink two to four glasses of nonalcoholic fluids each hour. Limit day time outdoor activity to early morning and evening.

Check in on others

- People living alone are at high risk of severe heat related illness. Check regularly on older people, and those who are unable to leave their homes, for signs of heat-related illness.
- Ask whether people know how to prevent heat-related illness and are doing the same.
- If others are unwell, move them to a cool shady spot, help them get hydrated and call for medical assistance if appropriate.

Get informed.

- Listen to local news and weather channels.
- For more information on heat-related illness, call HealthLink BC at 811.

For your awareness, we have heard from VCH and Environment Canada that they are likely to continue the extreme heat alert through Thursday or Friday due to the cumulative effects of heat and length of time that temperatures have been at extreme levels. The newly agreed to criteria to rescind the alert is to do so on the day following a nighttime low of 16 C or lower following an extreme heat event. Based on the current forecast, this would mean the warning and alert would be rescinded effective Saturday.

We will maintain our extreme heat response operations, adjusting as needed given the changing forecast and alert levels. It is likely that some support through our Community Centres in the DTES may continue for a limited time following the lifting of the alert.

The weekend ahead is looking to be warm, with temperatures forecasted to be 28 C on Saturday and Sunday. These temperatures approach (but aren't expected to meet) the level where Environment Canada would issue a heat warning, which triggers a level 1 response of the City's extreme heat response plan. This plan outlines enhanced measures that the City takes to support the public.

While we aren't expecting to reach heat warning levels this weekend, many of our extreme heat measures are in place throughout the summer. These include:

- Cooling Centres residents are invited to cool off in any of the City 10 air-conditioned community centres and library locations with air-conditioning (see <u>vancouver.ca/hot-</u> <u>weather</u> for locations). These operate as cooling centres during regular opening hours, and anyone is welcome to go to these facilities, cool down and rehydrate.
- □ Shade members of the public are also welcome to seek shade at any of the City's other community centres.
- □ Water Fountains and Misters the City has deployed nine temporary water fountains misters throughout the City to augment <u>over 200 drinking fountains</u>. People can use these to hydrate and cool off during periods of high heat.

Additional measures that are implemented when a Heat Warning is issued include:

- Increased promotion of cooling centres and extreme heat safety
- Patrols by Park Rangers and VPD Neighbourhood Policing Officers in parks and commercial areas to look out for people suffering from heat-related illnesses
- Support to non-market housing residents, including cooling rooms and fans, extreme heat information, and resident monitoring

Level 2 response measures are implemented when Vancouver Costal Health declares an

Extreme Heat Alert. This triggers additional measures, including:

- Increasing the hours of cooling centres and pools
- Pop-up spray parks using fire apparatus

The City's extreme heat response plans were developed in consultation with Vancouver Costal Health, Environment and Climate Change Canada, and informed by research conducted by BC Centre for Disease Control and Health Canada's Heat Alert Response System Best Practices Guide.

Vancouver Emergency Management Agency staff monitor the forecast daily and coordinate the response actions across departments when heat warnings or extreme heat alerts are expected to be issued.

Extreme Heat Alert

LOWER MAINLAND, B.C. – As heat continues to build in the Lower Mainland, the Heat Warning issued by Environment Canada has now been escalated to an Extreme Heat Alert. Record-high temperatures expected in the Lower Mainland tomorrow will continue until at least Tuesday, June 29, 2021, with daytime highs ranging from 29 to 39 degrees celsius combined with overnight lows of 18 to 21 degrees celsius. Humidex values during this period will reach the high 30s to possibly the low 40s. High temperatures are historically associated with an increase in deaths among Lower Mainland residents.

While everyone is at risk of heat related illness, hot temperatures can be especially dangerous for the young, the elderly, those working or exercising in the heat, persons with chronic heart and lung conditions, persons with mental illness, people living alone and people experiencing homelessness. If you are taking medication, particularly for mental illness, ask your doctor or pharmacist if it increases your health risk in the heat and follow their recommendations.

The Lower Mainland Medical Health Officers for Fraser Health and Vancouver Coastal Health advise at this time that risks from extreme heat exceed risks from COVID-19. While the Extreme Heat Alert is in place:

- Cooling centres will be open, and no one should be denied access to these centres because of concerns about crowding or physical distancing.
- If people are wearing a mask and have difficulty breathing, they should remove the mask, whether they are indoors or outside, as wearing a mask may impact thermal regulation during heat events.

Coping with the heat

There are a variety of mild to severe symptoms linked with heat-related illness, including thirst, dizziness, confusion, weakness and fainting or collapsing. Medical Health Officers remind Lower Mainland residents to take precautions to protect themselves from the heat, including:

Stay hydrated

- Drink cool non-alcoholic beverages (preferably water) irrespective of your activity intake. Don't
 wait until you are thirsty.
- If your doctor generally limits the amount of fluid you drink or has you on water pills, ask about increasing the amount of water you can drink while the weather is hot.

Keep cool

 NEVER leave children or pets alone in a parked car. Temperatures can rise to 52°C (125°F) within 20 minutes in an enclosed vehicle when the outside temperature is 34°C (93°F). Leaving the car windows slightly open or "cracked" will not keep the inside of the vehicle at a safe temperature.

- Seek out an air-conditioned facility (such as a shopping centre, library, community centre or restaurant).
- Use public splash pools, water parks or pools or take a cool bath or shower.
- At current temperatures, fans alone are not effective. Applying cool water mist or wet towels
 prior to sitting in front of a fan is a quick way to cool off.
- Dress for the weather by wearing loose, light-weight clothing. Protect yourself from the sun by wearing a wide-brimmed hat and sunglasses.
- Keep your home cool. Open windows, close shades, use an air conditioner (if you have one) and prepare meals that do not require an oven.
- Avoid sunburn, stay in the shade or use sunscreen with SPF 15 or more.
- Avoid tiring work or exercise in the heat. If you must exercise, drink two to four glasses of nonalcoholic fluids each hour. Limit day time outdoor activity to early morning and evening.

Check in on others

- People living alone are at high risk of severe heat related illness. Check regularly on older people, and those who are unable to leave their homes, for signs of heat-related illness.
- Ask whether people know how to prevent heat-related illness and are doing the same.
- If others are unwell, move them to a cool shady spot, help them get hydrated and call for medical assistance if appropriate.

Get informed.

- Listen to local news and weather channels.

Subject:	Heat Warning issued by Environment Canada	

CLT and Emergency Management Committee,

Environment Canada has issued a <u>Heat Warning</u> for Vancouver and area, indicating the hottest temperatures are expected between Friday and Tuesday. The <u>forecast</u> indicates highs of 30 C on Saturday, Sunday, and Monday, and lows of 20 C on all three days.

The Heat Warning triggers level 1 of our extreme heat response plan, which includes:

- Cooling Centres residents are invited to cool off in any of the City's 10 air-conditioned community centres and library locations with air-conditioning (see <u>vancouver.ca/hot-</u> <u>weather</u> for locations). These centres are open during regular opening hours and everyone is welcome to go to these facilities, cool down and rehydrate.
- Shade members of the public are also welcome to seek shade at any of the City's other community centres.
- Water Fountains and Misters the City has deployed nine temporary water fountains throughout the City to augment over 200 drinking fountains. Starting on Friday, temporary misting stations will also be installed at 9 locations throughout Vancouver.
- Patrols by Park Rangers and VPD Neighbourhood Policing Officers in parks and commercial areas to look out for people suffering from heat-related illnesses
- Support to non-market housing residents, including cooling rooms and fans, extreme heat information, and resident monitoring
- Increased communication related to extreme heat and promotion of the City's response plans on vancouver.ca and social media. An IB is planned to be issued tomorrow.

Further details on our public-facing response actions are on vancouver.ca/hot-weather

The City's extreme heat response plans were developed in consultation with Vancouver Costal Health, Environment Canada, and informed by research conducted by BC Centre for Disease Control and Health Canada's Heat Alert Response System Best Practices Guide.

Vancouver Emergency Management Agency staff will continue to monitor the situation and will provide updates if necessary.



In addition to the initiatives listed in the link above, we can confirm these additional measures:

- Cooling centres are open at multiple locations
- 2 wading pools are open at Grey's and Woodland park
- Misting and water fountains have been deployed
- ACCS community centres have implemented extended hours
- Water bottles and sunblock will be distributed through ACCS community centres
- Water bottles have been delivered to Atira to be distributed through partner organizations to community members

This is an ongoing and evolving response. We are anticipating an extreme heat alert will be issued tomorrow, however these measures are foundational to our readiness. Any additional risks or measures can be discussed during our daily meetings.
