Today, Lieutenant Governor Janet Austin delivered the Speech from the Throne on behalf of the Government of British Columbia – two weeks ahead of the Provincial 2022 Budget to be unveiled on February 22nd.

There were notes of optimism as the provincial bunds and the latest COVID-19 wave subsides.
