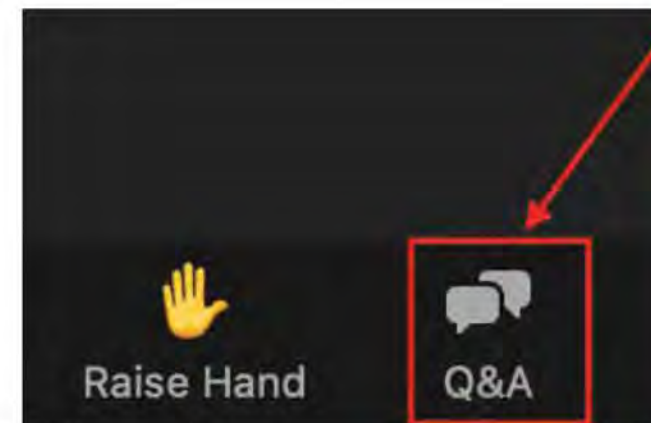

Good afternoon, and welcome to this open public forum on public safety in Vancouver.

I'm Ria Renouf, and it's my pleasure to be your moderator this afternoon.

Before we get started I would like to acknowledge that this forum is taking place on the traditional and unceded lands of the Squamish, Musqueam and Tsleil-Waututh First Nations.

This afternoon's public forum is the first in series called SPEAKING OF VANCOUVER, and public safety seemed a very good place to start.

The series is a chance for Vancouverites to speak up and speak out about issues that are important to them and their city.

SPEAKING OF VANCOUVER was created by Councillors Rebecca Bligh ... Lisa Dominato ... and Sarah Kirby-Yung. You're going to hear from them in a moment, but before we get underway, there are a couple of important housekeeping items.

I want to encourage your active participation this afternoon, we really want to hear from as many of you as possible.

And I know there will be some very different perspectives, but I want to make sure our questions and answers and conversations are always respectful and polite.

Aggressive or abusive language has no place here this afternoon and will not be tolerated.

When we get to your questions there are two ways for you to participate.

You can type in your question by clicking on the **Q&A** button located in your Zoom toolbar.

Or, if you want to be seen and heard this afternoon, simply click the **Raise Your Hand** icon from the Zoom toolbar. When it is your turn to ask your question, I will prompt you to unmute your mic.

In order to take as many questions as possible, we're giving everyone one minute to make a brief comment and ask a question. So please be mindful of this time limit.

There will also be a handful of polling questions that you can participate in, and when those appear on your screen we'll provide direction on how to participate.

We are also recording this event so that it can be posted on the Speaking of Vancouver website, where it be will be available to those who couldn't join us today.

Right now, I want to introduce the three city councillors who created the Speaking of Vancouver series, and who are your hosts this afternoon.

And I'm going to ask them to share their perspectives right now, starting with COUNCILLOR REBECCA BLIGH.
