- 1. Restricted means of egress from various buildings
- 2. Accumulation of combustible materials against buildings
- 3. Restricted access to fire department connections for various buildings
- 4. Unsafe storage and use of propane and other fuel sources
- 5. Open flames and fire hazards

Based upon the above, it is the opinion of the <i>Fire Chief</i> a condition exists at	Unit block W Hastings to 200 block E Hastings
Vancouver, B.C., which endangers life and poses a risk of injury or loss by fire	. (Street Address)

THEREFORE, pursuant to the authority vested in me in accordance with Vancouver Fire By-Law 12472, Division C, Sentence 1.4.3.1.(1), you are HEREBY ORDERED TO:

- 1. Remove any tents or other materials obstruct the means of egress from the buildings on the above noted blocks.
- 2. Remove any combustible materials stored adjacent to any building that create a fire hazard to the building or its occupant, Vancouver Fire By-Law Section 2.4.1(4) Combustible Materials.
- 3. Ensure unobstructed access by firefighters to all fire department connections for sprinkler or standpipe systems. British Columbia Building Code Section 2.5.1.4(1) Fire Department Access to Buildings.



This violates so many humanitarian laws. Please do the right thing. I urge you. I beg you. This is absolutely not okay.\~





I am hoping that you are still meeting regularly with the cross ministry encampment team. In the past couple of weeks, the area known as the downtown eastside, primarily Hastings St resembles an encampment on the sidewalks.

This has escalated to the point of 2 solid blocks of tents/structures and tarps against buildings and blocking doors.

While I appreciate that there are advocates for many of these vulnerable people. I am extremely concerned with the safety in this area. The BC Fire Code is strict on combustibles materials against buildings 'risk of fire' and under the BCBC Division B: Part 2, Section 2.4 Fire Hazards. Whether a building is sprinklered or not, a fire starting on the outside may quickly travel up the side of the building, under the sheaths and into the roof structure. We quickly saw this last week in this exact neighbourhood. We have had over 770 structure and outdoor fires in our downtown area (Halls 8,2,1) this year already. Fortunately, the response of our fire department and those buildings with sprinklers have reduced the impact from many of those fires.

Apart from the risk to the buildings, and what can potentially happen to the hundreds of housing units located in the DTES, those living in these tents, structures are at a grave risk from being able to escape in the event of an emergency. Access to the buildings is also an issue for our firefighters and other responders.

I am hoping that the ministries, especially BC Housing, the OFC and mental health and addictions can come together ASAP to step up and assist in assisting with either housing options, removal of the structures/hazards and/or treatment. I would be more than happy to speak to the committee, but also recognize that immediate action needs to occur. I do not have all of the answers but we need a team approach and all hands on deck for this one. As you know, removing tents, propane, belongings can be very traumatic and challenging.

I am available most of this week (except Friday morning) if there is something that may help in addressing this. I would like to recommend that your cross ministry team come and understand firsthand what we are concerned about.





I am writing with an update our efforts to support individuals currently camping along E Hastings St and manage the impact of the large numbers of people and structures present along the street.\~ Further to the note we shared on July 15, our crews are continuing to attend daily to clean the streets and sidewalks as far as possible and deployment of the block stewardship model involving peers and Engineering staff is proceeding.\~ We are also continuing efforts to address the fire and life safety risks associated with propane, structures and accumulations of combustible materials.\~ Community members have been supported with training and fire extinguishers to monitor for fires and our staff are removing fuels from the street.\~

Notwithstanding the above preventative measures, Chief Fry and her team have identified that the current circumstances along Hastings St represent an immediate and substantial risk of injury and loss of life.\~ The collection of structures and combustible materials in close proximity to buildings is impeding access to those properties and the volume of material, along with the widespread use of propane, candles and other ignition sources , presents a serious hazard to people on the street as well as the adjacent buildings.\~ Of note, building fire suppression systems are not effective in the case of fires starting on the exterior of the structure. \~Given the volume of fire calls that VFRS has been managing this summer, as well as the number of housing units located along E Hastings St, we are concerned by the prospect of even more people losing their homes due to fires.\~

Given the foregoing, the Chief has indicated that she will be taking action to order the removal of structures and combustible materials from sidewalks.\~ We expect to receive that order early next week and staff are presently developing an operations and communications plan regarding the implementation of the order.\~ We anticipate it will take a sustained effort with campers over several days in order to have the sidewalks clear.\~

In recent days, the Carnegie Outreach team has been engaging with people staying on E Hastings.\~ The team has indicated that there are approximately 400 people currently staying outdoors in this area and approximately 200 of those individuals do not have any housing or shelter option.\~ Of course, an order to pack up their tent and belongings from E Hastings does not change the fact that there is no housing available for these residents.\~ While we continue to work toward a sustainable solution for people to store belongings during the day time, Engineering will assist individuals with storage of materials that they are not able to move. \~We are also working with Park Board staff in planning for the potential increase in numbers of people who are sheltering overnight in parks.\~

VFRS staff have been communicating with community representatives regarding the public safety risks and there is a general appreciation for the fact that the status quo is not tenable. We will continue to work closely with community agencies and peers in the DTES as we work to address this very difficult situation.\~

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

Media Q&A

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CBC - Susana da Silva - How many structures have been removed? And how many people are housed at this point? And how many spaces are needed?

Paul Mochrie: It is very difficult to quantify the number of structures removed. It's a fluid situation. There are also structures emerging every day as well, so it's hard to give a precise number. We are prioritizing the locations identified by the fire department. There were 10 of the most critical fire safety risks. Now there is a reduction. In mid-July, we estimated there are about 200 people on Hastings Street who are unhoused but that number is shifting as well.

Dale McMann: 40 people are deemed highest priority because they are from that stretch of Hastings Street, who have accepted housing. We are quickly looking for housing, storage and other facilities. The rough count shows there are about 200 unhoused but that number changes all the time.

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CityNews/1130 - Martin MacMahon - The Fire Chief used the word "incremental" to describe the situation at Hastings. Are you satisfied with what's happened so far?

Mayor Stewart: This is an extremely complex situation. This is the most vulnerable community impacted in the worst possible way. I am satisfied with the progress we made at the City and Province level. BC Housing is helping to house the individuals. Seven out of the 10 fire risks are cleared, also cleared tons of garbage from the street. In the Oppenheimer and Strathcona encampments, it was also a slower process because this is a compassionate approach. There's no way to do it in a hurry in respect of the traumatic situation people are facing on the street. I am extremely proud of the work.

DailyHive - Amir Ali - You refer to the MOU. What do you say to the advocates who claim that the fire order is a violation of the MOU?

Mayor Stewart: The MOU helped dealing with the Strathcona situation in the least traumatic way. The MOU is still in place and this is the only way to move forward. But the fire risks intensifies the need to move this as quickly as possible. I am extremely proud of how the City and BC Housing have been moving. At the end of the day, the person who is traumatized enough to be end up on Hastings Street should be the focus and that is the core of the MOU.

Follow-up question - There is some involvement of VPD in removing the encampment. Any concern on how VPD handles the situation?

Paul Mochrie: VPD members are not directly involved in this operation. Our objective shared by the VPD and everyone involved is an approach not to use police enforcement.

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Globe and Mail - Frances Bula - Everyone is a bit puzzled by why the City needed to take so long to respond.

Mayor Stewart: We are proceeding based on the MOU signed in the Strathcona situation. Housing takes time to come on line. In the end, the only way to fully meet the Fire Chief's order and to help people on Hastings the most is to provide long-term housing. If that's not possible, shelter is the next option. We are not caught

unaware, it's just the housing supply does not meet the demand. The compassion approach we are taking demands that response.

Follow-up question - \~How did the City allow the situation to get to the point where the Fire Chief needs to put out an order?

Mayor Stewart: The lack of housing is the core problem here. You just don't want to move people on to another bad situation.

Paul Mochrie: We see seasonal increase of people sheltering outdoors in summer months, that's the historical pattern observed in Vancouver. In fact, people sheltering on Hastings Street is not new. This is the issue we have been working with community for years and crew has been cleaning the street daily which involved people needing to move their structure. What we have been seeing beginning in July, is a significant number of structures on Hastings. We have seen large encampment in the past but a large encampment on a major arterial is new. Concurrent to that, is the decrease in willingness to move to allow cleaning.

Black Press - Jane Skrypnek - Some unhoused people prefer to camp somewhere instead of staying at SROs. How are you going to improve the shelter conditions to make people actually want to stay in those places?

Dale McMann: We recognize that SROs is less than an ideal solution. There are SROs that are owned by the City or the Province and operated by non-profits. There are also SROs that are own and operated privately which we have no control over. Having said that, many SROs were built 90 to 100 years ago; they are not equipped to deal with today's climate. We are working with partners to provide air-conditioning, fans, etc. to mitigate heat issues.

Follow-up question - \~Have you talked to the private SRO owners about the situation? Chief Fry: We meet with SRO owners and operators regularly. 181 are identified by the fire department. We inspect each of those once at least six months.

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Radio Canada - Wildinette Paul - Is there any kind of deadline to clear everything?
 Mayor Stewart: The progress is satisfying. 40 people are housed indoor so far. I understand it is not fast enough for some people but it is done in a compassionate manner. We have dealt with 7 out of 10 fire hazards and cleared tons of garbage.
 Paul Mochrie: This is a process that we are reassessing every day. We are optimistic to make progress. We are not working towards a fixed deadline at this point.

Question: Some advocates think that the focus should be on SROs and the fire hazards should be dealt with.

Chief Fry: There are 181 SROs in the City right now. We conducted 447 inspections. There are 72 locations we found violations this year alone. Violations can be anything from fire separations, holes in walls, people that are hoarding, fire alarms that need to be reset, etc. We have had 4,910 incidents in SROs alone. That's not just fire but also overdose. That makes up 10 per cent of our calls. We are continuing to work with SROs to ensure compliance.

Radio Canada - William Burr - You are asking people to leave without a place to go. BC Human Rights Commissioner has suggested using parking lots or some places that are

safer. Why not do something like that?

Paul Mochrie: There are homeless people across the city and where to go is a question that's asked every day. The focus is to provide indoor options and to house them ASAP. Concurrent with that, we are looking at providing water, sanitary and storage spaces for people who are sheltering. There are not enough space to house the 500 homeless people in Vancouver. That means it's contemplating moving people to another community, which is also traumatic. Providing a City encampment is not a long-term solution. The only solution is to provide the support as best as we can.

Mayor Stewart: It is important to recognize the effort that is made. Over the last four years, there were billions of dollars invested in providing affordable and supportive housing for the people who are living in a rough situation but we still don't meet the demand. The impact of COVID-19 is affecting people worse. Poisoned drug supply is also inflicting trauma.

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CTV - Maria Weisgarber - How optimistic are you we can ever catch up on the situation? Mayor Stewart: No one is on the street forever. It is going to take a long time to catch up. We have been undermining the investment for so long and housing needs time to build.

Dale McMann: We look at the DTES holistically and Crab Park is part of it. When we factor in the high priority individuals who need to be housed, those at Crab Park are part of the discussion.

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

Bernie Pauly and Marilou Gagnon, Professors in the School of Nursing at the University of Victoria, and Aaron Bailey, a graduate researcher in Health Promotion at Queen's University and community organizer with the Vancouver Area Network of Drug Users. Drawing from our experience as community-based public health researchers, we call on the City of Vancouver and VFRS to reverse course on the decampment of Hastings Street.

Homelessness is a health and safety risk: Why we need a public health approach in tent cities

August 12th, 2022

Yet again, fire officials are calling for displacement of those without housing based on a selective assessment of fire risk while ignoring other health and safety risks. On July 25th, Vancouver Fire and Rescue Services (VFRS) issued a Fire Order to the City of Vancouver calling for the removal of tents and improvised structures along East Hastings Street between Main and Gore. When block residents pushed for their reasoning, a VFRS spokesperson, at a July 27th press conference,\~ reiterated that the intent of the order was not to displace people living on Hastings Street. We, as public health researchers who have worked alongside residents of tent cities throughout so-called British Columbia and the lower mainland, recognize that the execution of this Fire Order by the City of Vancouver will materially result in the decampment of the Hastings Tent City placing the health and safety of residents at serious risk including ongoing risk of fire. We call for a public health approach to tent cities.\~

The issuance of the July 25th fire order follows on the heels of successful calls by residents and community advocates to end the violent practice of "street sweeps." ~ A daily practice which allowed the City of Vancouver and Vancouver Police Department to destroy unhoused residents' belongings as a means of enforcing the Street and Traffic Bylaw 2849. Street sweeps came to a brief end on July 1st, 2022, and residents were granted a brief reprieve from cyclical displacement. The eventual July 25th Fire Order was issued without warning or consultation with community members, who were not and have not been provided with anywhere else to go or basic necessities for health and safety. As of August 9th, the first day of supposed enforcement of the VFRS' order, the City of Vancouver had ceased garbage collection throughout the Hastings Tent City, failed to provide adequate water, sanitation, and hygiene facilities, and maintained a limited presence on the block, creating confusion and panic amongst those who live there. In the absence of compassionate leadership from the City of Vancouver, block stewards and their peers have risen to the challenge of keeping their community safe, passable, and clean. The undoing of this progress to end street sweeps was accelerated by a large police presence on the morning of August 9th that continued throughout the day. Despite calls from residents and advocates for a minimal police presence, as residents struggled to pack up their belongings in plastic trash bins provided by the City of Vancouver. While police did not assist with decampment, their presence resulted in a violent response to an individual experiencing a mental health crisis at the intersection of Main and Hastings. When residents, advocates, and supporters appeared on the scene, they were brutalized and arrested. This response is in the face of no housing options being made available for residents of the Hastings Tent City.

Tent city residents across BC have historically faced the same threats of displacement due to fire risk during the summer months. This same rationale for displacement was true for residents of Discontent City in Nanaimo, Anita Place in Maple Ridge, and Camp Namegans in Saanich. Persistent homelessness, visible in the presence of tent cities throughout Canada and particularly in BC, highlights the failure of society to ensure basic human rights and access to the basic determinants of health such as housing, food, water, social supports, self-determination, and freedom from violence and discrimination enshrined in international agreements including the International Covenant on Economic, Social and Cultural Rights [1]. In 2019, Canada passed the National Housing Strategy Act [laws-lois.justice.gc.ca] which enshrined in legislation the right to adequate housing for all Canadians.\~\~

People residing along East Hastings Street as well as those in earlier tent cities including

Oppenheimer Park and Crab Park, have repeatedly claimed that living in tent cities, in the absence of other acceptable options including safe and decent short-term housing options, improves psychological and physical health including community belonging, autonomy and selfdetermination. We call on all governments to shift from using public health as a rationale to displace tent cities to adopting a public health approach that includes fire safety as one factor among others to reduce public health and safety concerns associated with homelessness.

Overemphasizing fire safety can obscure and exacerbate harms

A frequent and recurring issue related to tent cities is that of safety with increasing concerns related to fire safety, public order and public health hazards. The most recent concern about fire safety and threats of displacement come amidst recent incidents and reports of attacks on homeless persons [Cbc.ca] involving fire. Recently, the Canadian Human Rights Commission called for an end to violence against homeless persons [Chrc-ccdp.gc.ca] and BC Office of the Human Rights Commissioner [bchumanrights.ca] called for respect of human rights of unhoused person in encampments. When we talk of public safety, it is often homeless people who are at most risk due to attacks and lack of resources. In summer, fire hazards are elevated across the province. The risk of fire exists whether people live in unsheltered settings alone or in tent cities. The risk of fire also exists in unsafe housing.\~

The "solutions" to these fire risks in tent cities across the province has been legal injunctions\~ and fire orders often with conditions that can exacerbate the harms of homelessness. In some prior tent cities, the use of tarps was banned. This actually increases heat within tents and poses a significant health and safety risk for people sheltering in exposed tents. While it is in the interests of everyone to manage fire risks, banning tarps is something we would never dream of doing in a BC Parks campsite.

The July 25th Fire Order does little to address fire safety conditions in Single Room Occupancy Hotels (SROs) in the Downtown Eastside, which represent a significant fire-related risk to the health and safety of residents. The devastating April 9th fire at the Winters Hotel, a Gastown SRO operated by a non-profit housing provider, led to the death of two people and complex, lingering health problems for other tenants. SRO fire safety is a longstanding concern in the Downtown Eastside, where neighbourhood activists have attempted to enforce Fire Bylaw regulations and ensure that buildings are equipped with functioning sprinkler systems since the 1970s [google.ca]. At present, decades of civic inaction on bylaw enforcement in SROs, unaccountable management, failure uphold governmental to tenants rights [onlinelibrary.wiley.com], and federal divestment from evidence-based SRO upgrading programs [journals.sagepub.com] have created urgent safety concerns throughout the neighborhood housing stock. A recent analysis of publicly available data by neighbourhood advocates found that 40% of existing SRO's designated under the Single Room Accommodation (SRA) Bylaw have outstanding Fire Bylaw violations, with the most common infractions relating to fire alarm systems and sprinklers. While concerns about fire safety in encampments are serious and real, they pale in comparison to those experienced by SRO tenants in the neighbourhood, many of whom stay outside as a result of the dangerous conditions in their buildings. Tenant leadership and concerted investment from federal and provincial governments remain the best solutions to SRO fire safety.

Homelessness is not a consequence of bad choices but a consequence of bad policies including

withdrawal of funding from social housing, privatization of the housing market, erosion of the social safety net, and colonization that has stripped Indigenous people of opportunities, land and resources. As well, there are systemic gaps when people exit corrections, health care, and foster care and gaps between health and social systems. The risks of fire and public disorder are often powerful narratives that fail to recognize the reality of the situation in which tent cities emerge and the conditions in which people are forced to live without access to safe, acceptable and affordable housing. The public health hazards are a lack of adequate shelter, safe drinking water, sanitation, food, and food storage as well as adequate structures to protect people from the elements and environmental hazards. All of which threaten the health of camp residents.

The Ottawa Charter: Five Principles of a Public Health Approach

International rights to housing and health including the International Covenant on Economic, Social and Cultural Rights [ohchr.org] that uphold access to adequate physical structures with safe drinking water, heating and lighting, sanitation, food storage, site drainage, energy for cooking and access to emergency services, security of tenure, affordability, and habitability (liveable in terms of protection from weather and potential threats to well-being, accommodate special physical needs with accessibility to services and built with respect to cultural identity and diversity). In addition to this, the International Covenant on Civil and Political Rights [ohchr.org] lays out the importance of self-determination and being able to obtain an adequate standard of living without discrimination.

Public health aims to improve conditions in which people can be healthy through health promotion, health protection, and disease and illness prevention. Canada is a world leader in population health and public health. The Ottawa Charter for Health Promotion [Canada.ca] is an internationally recognized public health framework consisting of five principles meant to guide action to promote the population's health and well-being. In the absence of affordable and appropriate housing. We call on the provincial government to adopt a public health approach to tent cities in BC by adopting the following five principles:

1. Build Healthy Public Policy - Healthy public policy means ensuring that all citizens have access to decent housing that is acceptable, culturally appropriate and at a cost that they can afford given minimum wage earnings and/or social assistance rates. In the absence of implementing evidencebased responses to homelessness, municipal governments should not construct bylaws that unfairly restrict the ability of homeless people, including those living in tent cities, to erect permanent shelter to protect themselves from the elements and provide a measure of safety and stability.

2. Create environments which support healthy living - Recognizing that people who are homeless do not have access to the basic determinants of health, environments should be organized in a way that does not create or contribute to poor health, and instead, improves it. Health protection measures include ensuring access to a safe quality and quantity of water, waste removal, food (including food storage, cooking areas, and refrigeration), hygiene, prevention of communicable disease, pest control, and measures to protect against exposure to cold and heat, electricity, and fire prevention- in other words, just what we all want and need. Health promotion measures include immediate housing placement offered with options, income and disability assistance as needed, and employment assistance if requested. Governments and all organizations should be working with and assisting all homeless people, including maximizing the opportunities for increased health protections possible in tent cities as well as working towards permanent solutions.

3. Strengthen community action on health - Communities themselves must determine what their

needs are and how best to meet them. We must ensure that tent city residents maintain autonomy and self-determination over their homes and lives while also gaining access to health, social and public safety services. Governments and all organizations should work with tent city residents to meet their health and safety needs as well as to develop long-term solutions.

4. Invest in building capacity and supporting people with lived experience - Governments and all organizations involved in making decisions about tent cities should work with tent city residents to comply with various safety requirements including safety orders. Opportunities should be provided to encourage and support the development of peer-led work in the provision of health, promotion of safety, and access to other services (e.g., harm reduction).

5. Reorient health systems - to promote a better balance between health promotion and curative services. Governments and all organizations should ensure that health services for tent cities focus on promotion, prevention and restorative services and include an emphasis on the inclusion of peer workers. Basic health services available to camp residents should include primary care (management of acute and chronic health conditions, wound management, immunizations, screening and assessments); mental health and harm reduction training and support (overdose management and prevention; sterile supplies); and first aid training.

These five principles of health promotion align with the National Protocol for Homeless Encampments in Canada [make-the-shift.org] which outlines a clear set of principles for operationalizing a public health approach to tent cities:

A public health approach means working with tent city residents to implement evidence-based approaches to ending homelessness rather than punitive bylaw enforcement strategies which are not evidence-based, diverting resources and energy from public health solutions and even increasing harms.

Dear Representatives of the City of Vancouver,

RE: Storage being offered to residents of Hastings Tent City (July 25 Order Issued by Vancouver Fire Rescue Services)

We write seeking clarity regarding the storage being offered to those sheltering on Hastings Street.

We have seen municipalities use storage options in the past in order to facilitate a more humane looking decampment, then inevitably close these (already inadequate) services shortly after eviction is complete. The end result is that people have no more options to safeguard their possessions than before decampment, and they face having all their stored possessions either thrown away, or simply put back out on the street.

We have also seen storage solutions which are effectively inaccessible to the people needing to use them: for example, because of an unsuitable location, or limited opening hours.

We are concerned that these issues are reflected in the City's current storage plan. We gather that short-term storage is only available for drop-in access Wednesdays and Fridays for 2 hours each day, and that there is no drop-in access at all for long-term storage. Can you please clarify the following:

Short-term storage (390 Main St)

- 1. How much storage space will each person be provided with?
- 2. How long will the City be providing these storage services? Namely, what is the minimum amount of time the City guarantees they will be providing this service?
- 3. Will the City commit to storing a person's belongings until that person is securely housed and has had adequate time to transfer their possessions into housing?
- 4. How does a person identify themselves in order to access their stored possessions?

5. Is this storage only being provided as part of the eviction process or will it be available to other unhoused people surviving on and near Hastings?

Long-term storage (987 East Cordova St)

6. In additional to the above questions, how long will possessions be stored at the Long-Term location before being transferred to the Short-Term location?

The May 2022 report *#StoptheSweeps: Ending Cyclical Displacement & Criminalized Poverty in Vancouver*¹ outlined several recommendations concerning storage options (at p. 7):

4. Provide funding to storage facilities in an easily-accessible area.

- a. Any confiscated belongings must be stored at a facility located within the Downtown Eastside.
- b. Storage facilities must be secure, easily accessible, of an adequate size, and informed by best practices and cultural safety for people who rely on public space.
- c. Retrieval process must respect the limited access unhoused people have to identifying documentation.
- d. Storage facilities must provide long-term, low-barrier storage space (i.e. 3-6 months).

The City's storage plan as we understand it does not appear to address the majority of these points. We ask that you explain why storage services are not being provided in the manner requested.

Finally, and critically, while storage should definitely be provided to those who are sheltering outside, and while such storage can support the City's goal of limiting personal possessions on sidewalks, storage is not housing and should never be used as justification for eviction. Unhoused and inadequately housed people need access to their possessions 24/7 just like everyone else.

OVERALL KEY MESSAGES

- The City is working across departments and in partnership with many community organizations, as well as in close alignment with BC Housing, Vancouver Fire Rescue Services, the Vancouver Police Department and Vancouver Coastal Health, with thoughtfulness and care for residents and their circumstances.
- The concerns expressed by the community, which include an increase in crime and fire and life safety risk in conjunction with a decrease in sanitary conditions, safety, accessibility on sidewalks and to buildings, are serious issues. City staff share many of those same concerns and are continuing to make concerted efforts to respond and manage the situation in collaboration with BC Housing and Vancouver Coastal Health.
- We are approaching this in a manner that respects the rights and challenges faced by individuals experiencing homelessness, while remaining committed to maintaining the safety, cleanliness and accessibility of City streets in the Downtown Eastside (DTES).

OVERARCHING Q&A

Why is the City removing the tents and structures on East Hastings Street?

- Since the Fire Chief's Order was issued on July 25, 2022, the City has increased staffing and resources to encourage and assist people to voluntarily remove their structures, store their personal belongings and move from the area.
- These efforts were under way prior to the issuance of the Chief's Fire Order and are continuing with the aim of addressing the serious life safety risks, as well as to ensure that sidewalks remain accessible and sanitary and to ensure continued access to adjacent buildings.
- In the past, when conducting this work along East Hastings Street, these crews have been accompanied by members of the Vancouver Police Department (VPD), but this ended in early July.
- Since July, the number of people, tents and structures has since grown significantly.
- Planning to remove structures was underway to increase street safety, passage for sidewalks and roadways, increase access to buildings, and reduce fire hazards when the City received the Fire Chief's Order.

How many people are sheltering outdoors on East Hastings Street? (Share only if pressed)

- We know several hundred people sheltering outdoors on Hastings Street but do not have exact numbers we can share at this time.
- This situation on East Hastings Street is one symptom of a greater, systemic problem.

What is being done to clean and maintain East Hastings Street?

• Our crews continue to attend daily to clean the streets and sidewalks as much as possible. Our collaboration with community partners has been integral as we work to address the life safety risks as identified in the Fire Chief's Order.

Why is the removal of tents and structures taking so long?

- The City of Vancouver is carrying out a phased plan to remove structures on East Hastings Street that began on August 9, 2022.
- This current phase has involved daily efforts by approximately 20 City staff, outreach workers and Fire Prevention Officers working with the people sheltering on East Hastings Street to achieve voluntary compliance of the Fire Order and the City's streets bylaw. It's a process that requires time.



• Sanitation crews were initially joined by police on August 9, but due to concerns from the community, the clean-up and outreach efforts have been measured and do not currently include police.

When will stronger enforcement of the City's bylaw and the Fire Order begin?

- Our City crews are continuing to focus their efforts on compliance with the Fire Chief's Order and Fire By-law 12472 through voluntary compliance and cooperation.
- We have increased staffing and resources to encourage and assist people to voluntarily remove their structures, store their personal belongings, and ensure they minimize the amount of space they require to shelter overnight.
- As this is a complex and dynamic situation, we are continually evaluating the situation to determine if stronger enforcement of the Fire Chief's Order is required.
- What this stronger enforcement looks like will be determined by the City in collaboration with VFRS and may include assistance from the VPD.

What does the City consider to be a success? When will you feel you're in compliance with the Fire Order?

- Steady progress has been made removing structures from high priority areas, such as building entryways and exits, and removing highrisk flammable materials. Engineering staff have also been removing more than 2000 kgs of material a day.
- We are regularly evaluating compliance with the Fire Order and we're seeing progress.

Tensions in the neighbourhood are running high. How is the City approaching this work and the people?

- We recognize that this work is having an emotional impact on the community, and everyone involved.
- City staff are conducting the work with thoughtfulness and care for the residents and their circumstances.

The City has been criticized for not communicating enough with the community. How has the City been informing people impacted?

- City staff have been meeting with a community-based working group at least once a week since May 2022, and more frequently with service providers, including the Overdose Prevention Society (OPS) and the Vancouver Area Network of Drug Users (VANDU).
- In addition, staff have been distributing information flyers to the community on a regular basis. There have been several rounds of distribution to up to 165 individuals each time. Information has also been posted in the area.
- The City also regularly updates and meets with local business improvement associations (BIAs).

Is the City working with provincial and regional partners to address the situation on East Hastings Street?

- The City is actively working with provincial, regional and community partners.
- The current situation is devastating for those living outside, as well as the broader community. Poverty, homelessness, mental health
 and substance use are a result of systemic drivers which a municipality is least able to address. This issue is not unique to the DTES and
 we are connecting with senior government who have the mandate and funding to address these underlying issues, to work with us to
 resolve these issues.



STORAGE

Are you offering people storage for their belongings?

- The City is working with several non-profit partners for people to store and access belongings and on expanding short, medium and longer-term storage options.
- Daily storage programs have been set up and include:
 - Partnering with Aboriginal Front Door (AFD) to provide daily storage access at 390 Main Street. This is part of a drop-in program with cultural and well-being supports, meeting space, and food programs. This week, the AFD Drop-In will be open for four (4) hours (10 am to 2 pm), increasing to eight (8) hours next week and 16 hours until end of October 2022. AFD will be sharing information about their program at community events and at the drop-in location during open hours.
 - Partnering with Atira Women's Resource Society and the SheROes Outreach team to provide access to storage for women and gender diverse people at 101 Cordova Street. The program receives drop-offs from Monday to Friday from 8:30am-10:30am, with access 7 days a week from 4-6pm. For more information contact: alex_hawes@atira.ca or call 604.331.1407.
- The City has identified a long-term storage option at 987 Cordova Street for belongings people don't need to access on a daily basis.
- Additional daily storage sites are needed for the immediate and long-term. The City will be working to activate additional sites in the coming weeks.
- CleanStart BC, a social enterprise program, has also partnered with the City and other non-profit partners to provide support for people to gather, label, track and move belongings to storage sites.
- Information on how people can access storage locations as well as updates on hours, length of time, partners and new locations will be shared by community flyer distribution and posted in the area.

SUPPORTS FOR INDIVIDUALS SHELTERING OUTDOORS

What other resources, aside from storage solutions, are in place to provide support to those on East Hastings Street?

- Getting important resources and supports in place on East Hastings Street for those who are sheltering outdoors is a priority for the City.
- Establishing these supports is multi-faceted and can be complicated. We are working with a number of vendors, suppliers and community and government partners to finalize these essential contract agreements.
- Currently, supports the City is providing and working on include:
 - The **City's Homelessness Services Outreach Team** continues to engage regularly with individuals experiencing homelessness or at risk of homelessness, to support their needs as related to accessing income, housing and other supports. The Outreach Team works collaboratively with BC Housing's Coordinated Access and Assessment team, bringing forward individuals to be considered for housing. In addition, the Outreach Team also works with individuals to provide rent supplements to support individuals renting in the private sector.
 - **Counselling/Mental Health & Healing and Wellness Supports** for Indigenous peoples: The City continues to connect with Vancouver Coastal Health and request further assistance. Currently, the City is working with community organizations to provide counselling and access to healing circles for Indigenous peoples who are living unsheltered. The City will include



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information in communications/flyers to people along East Hastings Street going forward, so those living unsheltered will know how to access this service.

- **Food Services:** City is providing funding for food services for hundreds of daily meals. Meals are being provided through A Better Life Foundation.
- Women's Safety: Due to the increase in violence along the blocks, the City has been and will continue to fund Mission Possible to provide security 13 hours/day, 7 days/week to support safe access to the DTES Women's Centre and to the Olivia Skye residence at 41 East Hastings Street. PACE is now providing outreach to sex workers who are living unsheltered along East Hastings Street.
- Access to Washrooms: Washroom hours across the area have been increased, including ongoing Comfort Station hours accessible nearly 24 hours/day at Main and Hastings, the reactivation of a washroom at Pigeon Park and a new mobile washroom trailer program near Gore Avenue. The Pigeon Park washroom will be operational in the coming days and the new mobile washroom trailer program will be fully operational within the next week or two, both to be monitored by the Overdose Prevention Society.
- **Drop-In Spaces:** The City has identified start-up funding for a new drop in space that will be operated by an Urban Indigenous service provider. The space will be opened at 390 Main Street (City-owned space) on August 22. This space will also have washroom access and improved access hours to the storage facility.

COMMUNITY COLLABORATION

How is the City working with local community groups and non-profit organizations?

- The removal of structures on East Hastings Street is a complex undertaking. We appreciate the work of the many community organizations and social enterprises who have been contributing expertise and effort as well as the support of BC Housing and Vancouver Coastal Health.
- The City has engaged in a number of ongoing community partnerships that collectively seek a reasonable balance to addressing the needs of diverse community members who are differentially impacted by the current situation.
- A Working Group on Alternatives to Street Cleaning practices was established in May 2022 and continues to engage and operate. The Working Group consists of a number of NGOs working directly with people living on the street, including people with lived experience and low-income residents. Participants include Elders, several residents with lived experience of homelessness, VANDU, Pivot Legal Society, WAHRS (Western Aboriginal Harm Reduction Society), Coalition of Peers and Stop the Sweeps.
- Partnering with Aboriginal Front Door (AFD) to provide daily storage access at 390 Main Street. This is part of a drop-in program with cultural and well-being supports, meeting space and food programs.
- Partnering with Atira Women's Resource Society and the SheROes Outreach team to provide access to storage for women and gender diverse people at 101 Cordova Street.
- Other organizations have joined meetings, including the Overdose Prevention Society and Mission Possible.
- By the end of June, the Working Group identified an alternative model to street cleaning based on a peer approach. Working group participants recommended various types of social infrastructure that would need to be in place to ensure the success of such a program, including storage, washrooms, showers, drop in spaces, and fundamentally, the need for safe, affordable housing options.
- More structures were erected, however, despite the ongoing work to remove them.



HOUSING

Where are the people sheltering on East Hastings Street supposed to go?

- The City acknowledges that many people do not have other options for housing or shelter—and we are working closely with BC Housing to urgently find places for people who are sheltering outdoors.
- The significant fire and public safety risks present on East Hastings Street necessitate the removal of tents, structures, and relocating personal belongings

Are any short-term housing or shelter solutions in the works?

- BC Housing has opened 20 new shelter beds this week, and an additional 50 SRO and leased hotels spaces will be made available in the coming days.
- BC Housing is also working on remediating dozens more SRO units, which will be available in September, and they continue to look at leasing or purchasing new shelter or hotel spaces.
- The City is also working with BC Housing to identify potential new sites for modular supportive housing. The site selection and construction will take some time, so this type of solution wouldn't be available for another 6 months.
- Pending availability of housing or shelter options, the City will continue working to provide a number of additional supports to people who are sheltering outdoors in the DTES.
- These supports include access to food, laundry services, washrooms and storage for their belongings, and this is based on feedback we heard from community groups on what their immediate needs are.
- As we continue to work with our housing partners to find solutions, the City understands that some people moving off East Hastings Street may need to shelter overnight in public spaces.
- DURING THE DAY
 - o Legally, people can shelter outdoors in public spaces overnight.
 - o Structures and tents MUST be removed during the day.
- OVERNIGHT
 - Materials for overnight sheltering must be easily moved and not introduce fire risk. Locations for sheltering overnight that support this and the needs of those sheltering outdoors are those:
 - that do not impact transportation, including pedestrian, bike and motor vehicles routes
 - that are a minimum of two (2) metres away from buildings and leave free and clear access for egress and firefighting purposes
 - that are open and visible to maintain security and safety for everyone in the area
 - that reduce grouping of structures with a minimum of two (2) metres between to manage barriers to pedestrian movement, access and potential fire hazards and emergency evacuations.
- The City will continue to provide what we can in terms of supports and services, as well as actively working with our housing partners to find more indoor spaces and housing for people who are sheltering outdoors
- However, the City cannot solve the housing situation in the area alone. We continue to support and work with our housing partners and senior government partners who have a housing mandate that investment and rapid deployment of housing options is critical.
- Critical investment in health, mental health and addictions, and other social supports, including improved income and employer supports from senior government partners, are also urgently needed.

- Please contact our Homelessness Services Outreach Team who engage regularly with individuals experiencing homelessness or at risk of homelessness, to support their needs as related to accessing income, housing and other supports.
- The Outreach Team works collaboratively with BC Housing's Coordinated Access and Assessment team, bringing forward individuals to be considered for housing. In addition, the Outreach Team also works with individuals to provide rent supplements to support individuals renting in the private sector.

How is BC Housing involved?

• BC Housing is working with the City of Vancouver, our ministry partners, non-profit housing providers, outreach workers and other community stakeholders, to provide housing and shelter options, as well as fire prevention supports in existing SROs in the DTES, in response to the Fire Chief's Order.

What is BC Housing doing to provide shelter spaces and housing?

- BC Housing has opened 20 new shelter spaces this week. An additional 50 indoor spaces in recently renovated SRO units and new leased hotel spaces will be made available in the next day or so.
- BC Housing is also working on remediating dozens more SRO units, which will be available in September, and they continue to look at leasing or purchasing new shelter or hotel spaces.
- BC Housing's coordinated assessment team are working with outreach partners to ensure people on East Hastings are aware of new spaces as they come online.
- Outreach workers have developed a list of people who are among the most vulnerable on East Hastings and who are willing to move indoors. These folks will be prioritized for the new spaces as they become available.
- The City is also working with BC Housing to identify potential new sites for modular supportive housing. The site selection and construction will take some time, so this type of solution if it were approved- wouldn't be available for another 6 months.
- Since 2018, BC Housing has opened more than 1,400 new supportive homes in Vancouver for people experiencing homelessness, which includes providing spaces for 300 people during the decampment of Strathcona Park last year. Over the long-term, we have approximately 700 new supportive homes for people experiencing homelessness that are underway in Vancouver that will be opening in the next few years.
- BC Housing is also committed to supporting the City and other partners to strengthen cultural- and- trauma-informed practices as work continues toward providing safe, indoor spaces to those in need.
- We are building upon lessons learned from the Strathcona encampment and reaching out to advocates and Indigenous support organizations that work in the DTES.
- Our intention is to ground our work in an approach that is culturally appropriate for everyone.

HEALTH SERVICES

What health supports are available to those sheltering outdoors on East Hastings Street?

 Vancouver Coastal Health (VCH) is aware of the work underway in the DTES community led by City of Vancouver to remove structures, including tents, which pose a risk for sidewalk access and fire safety.

- VCH appreciates this will be a challenging time for those impacted and we are committed to ensuring continuity of care for all of patients and clients in this community.
- VCH is working closely with the City of Vancouver, VPD, BC Housing and others, to provide safe access to health-care services throughout this process.

FIRE SAFETY

When did the Vancouver Fire Chief issue the Order?

• Chief Karen Fry issued a Fire Chief's Order on July 25 to the City of Vancouver to address the serious life safety concerns with the tents and combustibles from the north and south side of West and East Hastings Street and Main Street to the 200 block of East Hastings Street, as well as the surrounding vicinity.

Why was a Fire Order issued?

- Due to the significant number of tents blocking entrance ways and that have open flame and cooking going on inside, there remains a concern for the well-being of the individuals sheltering outdoors in the area as well as for the safety of businesses and structures.
- VFRS have recently seen the devastating impact that an exterior fire can have on a building as was seen on the church fire at 169 East Hastings Street and the more recent one at Powell Street and Princess Avenue.
- The Fire Chief's Order identifies serious risks from these structures and provides corrective measures to reduce the risk to the people and buildings in the area.
- Specific areas of concern are blocking exits and entrances to buildings, blocking fire department connections, blocking firefighting activities, large amounts of propane cylinders and storage of combustibles against buildings.
- The order was a step in ensure that risk factors that are known to cause significant death, damage and injury are reduced as much as possible.
- So far this year, in the area, we have had more than 860 outdoor and structure fires with damage, a 103% increase from 2018.

PUBLIC SAFETY

Can you describe in what respect public safety is deteriorating on East Hastings Street as a result of the decampment and generally? [VPD to provide more data information]

- The VPD are best suited to comment on public safety issues on East Hastings Street.
- However, the City acknowledges the situation along East Hastings Street is increasingly unsafe, with continued fire hazards and large structures, and an overall decline in cleanliness and accessibility. There is also overall an increase in public safety risks with all individuals experiencing an increase in criminality and violence.

Will police be involved in stronger enforcement?

• We are continually evaluating the situation to determine when to move into stronger enforcement of the Fire Chief's Order. What this stronger enforcement looks like is to be determined by the City in collaboration with VFRS and may include the assistance of the VPD.

How have police been involved so far in the removal of tents and structures?

- At the City's request, members of the VPD were previously present to support public and staff safety while staff worked to support removal of structures.
- The VPD members are not involved in dismantling structures or in accompanying our Engineering crews in their current efforts to clear the street of structures.

Social media posts and media reported a disruption broke out and that the police made arrests on August 9. Was that because of the start of the removal of tents?

- On August 9, 2022, VPD was called just before 3 pm by Carnegie Centre staff who reported that a man was throwing computers and behaving erratically. As officers were taking him into custody, the man resisted arrest and fought with police. A large crowd gathered and became hostile and combative with the officers.
- Several police officers were assaulted, and multiple arrests were made.
- The incident occurred Tuesday afternoon, at the same time and place as City of Vancouver staff were making rounds near Main Street and East Hastings Street to inform people of a Vancouver Fire Rescue Services Order to remove tents that line the sidewalks in the area.
- The City of Vancouver had asked VPD to have officers nearby, however, VPD had no role in the removing of tents, structures, debris or personal items.

Was there a threat to burn down the tents on East Hastings Street?

- VPD are urging occupants of the East Hastings Street encampment to be vigilant and report suspicious activity, after someone began distributed threatening flyers throughout the DTES earlier this month (weekend of August 13).
- VPD has launched an investigation to identify who is responsible for the flyers, which threaten to burn tents with gasoline and propane if people don't leave within seven days. The flyers also include threats against Insite, the supervised injection site near Main and East Hastings streets.

PARKS

Crab Park

Primary Messages

- The Vancouver Board of Parks and Recreation agrees that encampments do not represent an appropriate solution to the homelessness crisis and are deeply concerned about the safety and wellbeing of people experiencing homelessness across Vancouver, including those unhoused and sheltering on Hastings and CRAB Park.
- The Park Board is working with our colleagues at City of Vancouver as they work to find solutions to the street encampments on Hastings.

Secondary Messages

- o In 2020, the Park Board amended the Parks Control By-law to allow for limited temporary overnight sheltering in parks. A GM order allows for daytime shelter in certain areas, like CRAB Park. This is intended to provide support to people who are unhoused and who have no other shelter option, but is not intended for people to set up structures in perpetuity.
- We believe that all people and communities in Vancouver, regardless of their ethnicity, gender, religion, race, financial status, sexual orientation, abilities, or age deserve the right to access quality parks, recreation and nature, and the opportunity to

partake in social, cultural and recreational activities to acquire physical literacy skills, to express and enjoy culture, and to connect with community. We are guided by the centering of equity within VanPlay, our strategic framework.

What is happening at Crab Park?

- We are seeing some increase in people sheltering in parks, including an increase in the number of tents in Crab Park from 75 in spring to 100+ in the last month. Our staff have been able to verify 75 residents.
 - We have expanded and increased engagement with those sheltering in the park, meeting weekly with the community to build trust and support them into more permanent shelter. We are bringing partners to these engagements, including Indigenous health and outreach teams, Vancouver Coastal Health and Vancouver Fire Rescue Services. We have also engaged with nearby residents and welcome more conversations as they arise.
 - Supporting human rights needs such as access to washrooms and electricity, and cooling misters during heat emergencies.
 Staff help facilitate other services, such as showers, food, and other support services, which are located nearby in the Downtown Eastside.
- As a signatory of a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) with the City and Province, the Park Board has committed to helping prevent encampments in Vancouver Parks and is responsible for enforcing bylaws when suitable spaces are available for people to move indoors.
 - ALL PARKS: The Park Control Bylaw allows for temporary overnight sheltering in parks. This is intended to be as a last resort, and shelters must be taken down and moved by 8 a.m. each day. Temporary shelters cannot be within 25 metres of a playground or school, or at beaches, sportsfields, golf courses, community centres, off-leash dog areas, etc.
 - **CRAB PARK:** The General Manager has dedicated a temporary area for overnight and daytime sheltering. This area is at capacity to maintain everyone's safety. The remainder of the park will follow the Park Control Bylaw and will only allow for temporary overnight sheltering.

Why is this taking so long? When will the camp be shut down?

- The City, Vancouver Board of Parks and Recreation, and BC Housing continue to take collective action to address the critical needs of people experiencing homelessness.
- We recognize that homelessness is a complex issue. Often, people experiencing homelessness have experienced trauma in the past, and can have a low level of trust in government and other organizations. We, along with our partners, have committed to taking an approach that is respectful of individuals and their personal needs, in a way that is trauma-informed and people-centered.

Encampments continue to be an issue in the city – why not make them permanent and offer services to people sleeping in the park?

• We recognize that people are experiencing homelessness for a number of different reasons and many people do not want to move into housing but encampments are not a permanent solution. We have serious concerns regarding encampments given the history of serious health and safety incidents often associated with them therefore we are prioritizing the creation of additional accommodation for people experiencing homelessness.



Has the Park Board been engaging with the community around Crab Park?

• We have had several proactive conversations with residents who live near the park. We have heard their concerns and are open to more conversations with them. If they reach out to the Park Board, we will connect them with the right person to meet with.

Is the Park Board going to go after another injunction?

• The Park Board is working with our legal team to ensure that all of the rulings within January 2021 judgment are addressed. With this said, our primary focus continues to be working with our partners to help support individuals experiencing homelessness in the park by connecting them with indoor spaces and other services.

It's been one year, there's still an encampment. What will be done to end this situation?

• The best way to end this situation is to work with those sheltering in the park and support them into more permanent housing. Evicting unhoused people from the park will only move them to other parts of the city. We are focused on addressing the root causes of homelessness and helping the people experiencing it. That's why we're supporting the work of our partners to move as many people as possible to indoor shelter and facilitating connections with a variety of organizations to provide help to those who are experiencing homelessness.

Why is a shaded area in CRAB Park fenced off during a heat wave?

- The Vancouver Board of Parks and Recreation works from a perspective of dignity and human rights for all parks and recreation users. An area in CRAB Park is currently closed for remediation due to items found embedded in the soil. While this area offers some shade, there are other areas in the park that provide shade as well.
- Supporting people in CRAB Park, particularly on hot days, is a priority for our staff. Our park rangers and City outreach staff regularly perform wellness checks and provide people with water. They also provided people with information on cooling centres and other near-by services (this information was handed out to individuals directly and posted on site). A mister and running drinking water are also available on site to help people keep cool.

East Hastings St. Progress Update

City staff have been working with non-profit partners and other levels of government to support those sheltering outdoors on East Hastings St. in the Downtown Eastside (DTES) while working on the removal of structures that pose a significant risk.

Staff have made steady progress to carry out the voluntary removal of structures from high priority areas along East Hastings St., such as building entryways and exits, and removing high-risk flammable materials. Engineering staff have also been removing more than 2000 kgs of materials per day.

We are approaching this in a manner that respects the challenges faced by individuals experiencing homelessness, while remaining committed to maintaining the health, safety, cleanliness and accessibility of City streets in the DTES.

Since the Fire Chief's Order was issued on July 25, 2022, the City has increased staffing and resources to encourage and assist people to voluntarily remove their structures, store their personal belongings and move from the area. These efforts were underway prior to the issuance of the Chief's Order and are continuing with the aim of addressing the serious life safety risks, as well as to ensure that sidewalks remain accessible and sanitary and to ensure continued access to adjacent buildings.

The risk of fires resulting in further losses of affordable housing in the DTES remains a serious concern. Most recently, on Monday, August 22, a fire that started on the exterior of 568 Powell St. resulted in extensive damage to three buildings, displaced 59 residents, sent one person to the hospital and injured one firefighter.

The City acknowledges that some people sheltering on East Hastings Street and in other public spaces do not have options to move indoors and we have been working closely with BC Housing to urgently find places for people who are sheltering outdoors.

The City also understands that some people moving off East Hastings Street may need to shelter overnight in public spaces. This is a near-term option as the City continues advocating and working with senior governments for more housing and support services.

While the assisted removal of structures is ongoing, getting important resources and supports in place on Hastings for those who are sheltering outdoors and for other area residents and businesses has been a priority for the City.

The City is currently providing or working on the following support:

- **The City's Homelessness Services Outreach Team** continues to engage regularly with individuals experiencing homelessness or at risk of homelessness, to support their needs as related to accessing income, housing and other supports.
- **Counselling/Mental Health & Healing and Wellness Supports for Indigenous peoples:** the City is working with Aboriginal Front Door to provide cultural supports, counselling and access to healing circles for Indigenous peoples.
- **Food Services:** the City is providing funding for food services for hundreds of daily meals. Meals are being provided through A Better Life Foundation and with community partners working with Aboriginal Front Door.
- Access to Storage/Drop-In Spaces: Funded by the City, Aboriginal Front Door and Atira have initiated daily storage programs as part of their drop-in and outreach programs. This week (Aug 22) the Aboriginal Front Door (AFD) Drop-In at 390 Main will be open 4 hours (104m-2011), increasing to 816001817 next week and 16 hours until end of October 2022. The Atira SheROes Outreach team supporting storage for women

and gender diverse people receives drop-offs from Monday to Friday from 8:30am-10:30am, with access 7 days a week from 4-6pm. The City is also working with CleanStart to gather, label, track and move belongings for people who choose to move into storage. Longer-term storage facilities and additional sites are being explored.

- **Gender and Sex Worker Safety:** Due to the increase in gender-based violence along the blocks, the City has been and will continue to fund Mission Possible for community navigator support 13 hours/day, 7 days/week. This program supports safe access to the Downtown Eastside Women's Centre (DEWC) and to the Olivia Skye residence at 41 East Hastings. PACE is also providing outreach to sex workers who are living unsheltered along East Hastings.
- Access to Washrooms: Washroom hours have been increased so that these will be accessible nearly 24 hours/day. The City has allocated funding to operate a new mobile washroom on Gore and Hastings, replacing the Overdose Prevention Society (OPS)-operated washroom at 99 West Pender as part of the City's Washroom Trailer Program. An Automated Public Toilet at Pigeon Park that had broken down is being replaced and both the toilet and mobile trailer will be fully operational by next week. There is City-funded peer supervision at both the mobile trailer and Pigeon Park washrooms to ensure safe access. Additional indoor washrooms are available at Drop-In spaces.
- **Sanitation Crews:** City crews continue to increase street and sidewalk cleaning daily, and the community partnerships have been integral as we work to address the life safety risks as identified in the Fire Chief's Order.

Poverty, homelessness, mental health and substance use are a result of systemic drivers and we are working closely with senior government who have the mandate and funding to address these underlying issues. This is a complex effort and the City appreciates the work of the many community organizations and social enterprises who have been contributing expertise and effort as well as the support of BC Housing and Vancouver Coastal Health.

We recognize that this work will have an emotional impact on the community and everyone involved. City staff are conducting the work with thoughtfulness and care of the residents and their circumstances.





This matches a reduced level of staffing on weekends from Engineering as well.

We have had some success lately with a reduction in the level of combustibles on the street, more access to FDC's and doorways that were previously blocked and more residents taking up the offer of putting their belongings into the wheeled totes provided by Engineering.

Yesterday, was a decision point for VFRS, where Acting Fire Chief Tyler Moore and myself walked the encampment and determined to continue with Phase 1 Operations for the time being.

FPO Staff as well as Engineering will continue to have conversations with the residents of the encampment to ask them to decamp, declutter and dispose of unwanted items in the roll off bins provided.

Approximately 30 SRO rooms have come available with another 20 expected next week and another 20 the week after. This will help give the residents some viable housing options and assist in the difficult process of decampment. There are conversations happening at the Provincial Level as well to try and lend the City of Vancouver some further support for housing as they are starting to realize the full extent of the issues that this encampment presents. \~

Thanks for everyone's patience as we work through this extremely difficult issue. There is still much work to do to complete the work that the Fire Chief's Order highlights, however, at this point I am happy to say that we have made some positive progress.
