 your answers to the Capital Plan borrowing questions, and
 choose a convenient day and place to vote.
- 2. **Take note of your preferred candidates** and their numbers on the ballot, and mark your ballot correctly.
- 3. **Leave plenty of time to vote** Choose the best voting option for you: Vote in advance for shorter wait times, vote by mail (free return postage) for extra convenience, or vote on Election Day on Saturday, October 15.

Why vote?

On Saturday, October 15, 2022, Vancouver voters will vote for:

- 1 Mayor
- 10 City Councillors
- 7 Park Board Commissioners
- 9 School Trustees

Our elected officials make important decisions that directly affect our daily lives.

Also on the ballot

Voters will be asked if they support the City borrowing money for three areas of major capital projects, as outlined in the 2023-2026 Capital Plan. Find out more information on page 22 or at vancouver.ca/capital-plan.



Who are you voting for?

Mayor and Councillors

Vancouver City Council includes 1 Mayor and 10 Councillors. City Council approves the City's annual operating budget (\$1.747 billion in 2022). The budget funds City services including:

- Emergency services (including fire and police)
- Libraries
- Garbage collection and recycling
- Water and sewer services
- Arts, culture, and civic theatres
- Roads, sidewalks, and street lights

Council makes decisions including:

- Policies and priorities for Vancouver
- Long-term plans for Vancouver and its various communities
- By-laws affecting businesses, building, noise and land use
- Development projects
- Annual property tax rate

Council also decides the Capital Budget (\$2.8 billion 2019-2022) including:

- Housing and childcare
- Water, sewer and green infrastructure
- Parks, culture and community facilities
- Transportation and roads
- Emerging priorities



Park Board Commissioners

The Vancouver Park Board includes 7 Commissioners.

The Park Board operates:

- More than 240 parks including Stanley Park
- 24 community centres with pools, rinks, fitness centres and fields
- Street trees
- Public marinas
- Three golf courses

School Board Trustees

The Vancouver School Board (School District No. 39) includes 9 School Trustees.

The School Board provides the following services in Vancouver, the University of British Columbia (UBC) Lands and University Endowment Lands (UEL):

- Elementary education
- Secondary education
- Community education
- Specialized education services

The provincial government funds the School Board's operational and capital budgets. School taxes are included separately in property taxes.

Are you a Vancouver voter?

To vote, you must meet all of the following qualifications:

- ☐ You are 18 years old or older on Election Day (October 15, 2022)
- ☐ You are a Canadian citizen
- ☐ You have lived in B.C. for at least six months immediately before the day you register
- ☐ You live in Vancouver (no minimum days required)
- ☐ You are not disqualified by law from voting

Permanent residents who have not yet become Canadian citizens cannot vote.

If you live in UBC or University Endowment Lands (UEL) and do not own property in Vancouver, you can only vote for School Trustees in the Vancouver election. Instead of voting for a Mayor and Councillors for the City of Vancouver, you are eligible to vote for a Director to represent you in the Metro Vancouver Regional District Electoral Area A Election. Check if you are registered

If you voted in the last B.C. provincial election (October 2020) and are a Vancouver resident, you are automatically on Vancouver's Voters List and will not need to register again. Find out if you are registered: visit vancouver.ca/vote or call 3-1-1.



If you are already on the Voters List, you will receive your Voter Information Card, which you may show at your voting place.

There are two ways to register when you vote:

Option 1. Provide **two** pieces of identification (ID):

- Both pieces must show your name
- At least one piece must show your address
- At least one piece must include your signature

Examples of acceptable IDs

- Band membership card or Certificate of Indian Status
- BC CareCard
- BC Driver's License
- BC Identification Card (BCID)
- BC Services Card
- Canadian Citizenship Card
- Canadian Passport

- · Debit or credit card
- Government cheque or cheque stub
- Old Age Security Identification Card
- Prescription medication containers
- Property tax assessment/notice
- Social Insurance Number Card
- Student card
- Utility bill

Option 2. Provide **one** piece of identification and **make a solemn declaration** (ID):

If you have only one piece of ID, you may also make a solemn declaration in front of the person in charge of the voting place to confirm your identity and where you live.

If you have no fixed address

If you live in Vancouver and have no fixed address or postal address, you can register to vote by giving the name and/or address of a shelter or social service agency you go to in Vancouver, or the address of your voting place.

If you are a student


If you are a student and meet all of the qualifications listed in this guide, you may register to vote.

If you are a Non-Resident Property Elector

To register as a Non-Resident Property Elector (owns property in Vancouver but does not live in Vancouver), you will need to provide additional documentation at the voting place. Visit vancouver.ca/vote or call 3-1-1 for more information.

Voter Information Card

If you registered in advance by August 15, 2022, you will receive a Voter Information Card in late September 2022. Everyone at the same address with the same last name will get their Voter Information Cards sent in one envelope. You do not need a Voter Information Card to vote, yet you could have faster processing times at the voting place with your card.



How can you vote?

You can choose one of the following ways to vote:

1. Vote in advance

On October 1, 5, 8, 11 and 13, you may vote at any Vancouver advance voting place between 8 am and 8 pm. For a full list of advance voting places, see page 16.

2. Vote on Election Day

On Saturday, October 15, you may vote at any Vancouver voting place between 8 am and 8 pm. Your voter information card includes the voting places near you. For a full list of voting places, see page 16.

3. Vote by mail - free return postage

Voting by mail is now available to all eligible voters. You may request to vote by mail until Thursday, September 29 at 5 pm in order for you to receive your ballot by mail, with enough time for you to mail it back to the Vancouver Election Office.

To request a mail ballot, apply online at **vancouver.ca/vote-by-mail**. If you do not have access to a computer or if you need assistance, call 3-1-1 if you are a registered voter or visit the Vancouver Election Office (305 West 8th Avenue) to apply in person.



Request to vote by mail starting on Tuesday, September 6 at 10 am until Tuesday, October 11 at 5 pm.

There are two ways to get your vote by mail package:

- **1. Receive your package by mail:** You must apply by Thursday, September 29 at 5 pm. Packages will be mailed out starting on Tuesday, September 27.
- 2. Pick up your package: You must apply by Tuesday, October 11 at 5pm. Packages will be ready for pick up at the Vancouver Election Office (305 West 8th Avenue) starting on Tuesday, September 27 at 8:30 am until Friday, October 14 at noon. It will take two business days after we receive your application for your package to be ready for pick up.

If you decide to pick up your package (or designate a person to pick up your package), please have a photo ID that has your (or designated person's) full name and signature.

We recommend that you review the Canada Post mail and parcel delivery time standards to help you plan the return of your ballot. Ballots received after 8 pm on Saturday, October 15, will not be counted. Postmarks will not be considered valid for the return of completed ballots.

Marking your ballot in person

You will be marking your ballot behind a designated privacy screen.

1. On the ballot, you will see an oval similar to this: to the left of the name of each candidate or question. Using the special pen provided, fill in the oval like this:

To protect your privacy and to keep your vote a secret, please do not take a photo of your ballot and/or inside the voting place.

- 2. Vote for the candidates you want:
 - Up to 1 Mayor
 - Up to 10 City Councillors
 - Up to 7 Park Board Commissioners
 - Up to 9 School Trustees

You can vote for less than, or up to the number of candidates indicated, but not more.

- 3. If you make a mistake on marking your ballot, you can get a new ballot by letting the election official know.
- 4. After you are finished with marking your ballot, please put it inside the folder to keep your vote a secret, and bring it to the voting machine. The election official will help you put your ballot inside of the machine for counting after the close of voting.

Names in random order on ballot

Like in 2018, names on the ballot will be in random order, NOT alphabetical order. Names will have numbers in order beside them to help you remember and find your preferred candidates. See the list of candidates and the order of their names on page 27 of this or visit vancouver.ca/vote.



Accessible voting

Accessing the voting place

Voting places:

- Are usually accessible by people who use wheelchairs, mobility scooters, strollers and canes. Voters who cannot enter a voting place can vote outside the building (at the curb or designated spot in the parking lot).
- Most have universal washrooms inside or nearby
- Have chairs available
- Have a priority line for the following people no questions asked
 - Older adults,
 - People with disabilities,
 - People who are immunocompromised,
 - People who are pregnant,
 - People who have children with them, or
 - People who require a low-stimulation environment (for example, because of mental health concerns, anxiety, developmental and cognitive disabilities)

Ways to vote

The following options are available to eligible voters who need them:

1. Vote by mail.

This option will allow you to vote from home. Please see the vote by mail information on page 8.

2. Vote by the curbside of a voting place on any of the advance voting days (October 1, 5, 8, 11, 13) or on Election Day (October 15).

When you arrive at a voting place, park at the designated curbside voting spot and call the Vancouver Election Office at 604-829-2010. At that point, an election official will come outside to help you vote. Please visit vancouver.ca/vote to check accessibility options for each voting place and to check which voting places offer curbside voting.

3. Use an assistive ballot-marking device during advance voting.

If you need help to mark your ballot and want to use an assistive ballot marking device, please go to Roundhouse Community Centre (181 Roundhouse Mews) or Trout Lake Community Centre (3360 Victoria Drive) during advance voting days (October 1, 5, 8, 11, 13).

The device can help mark your ballot with:

- Sip-and-puff, paddle or other accessibility devices
- Audio instructions and braille markings on paddles and buttons
- Large print or high-colour contrast

Instructions on how to use the device will be available onsite, including in braille.

American Sign Language (ASL) will be available by video chat on advance voting days.


4. Bring someone you know to the voting place to help you, or get help from an election official on any of the advance voting days or on Election Day.


You can choose to:

- Bring someone you know to the voting place. Let an election official know, as the person helping you will have to take an oath of secrecy.
- Get help from an assigned election official. All election officials take an oath to keep your vote a secret.

Help in other languages

When you go to vote (during advance voting days on October 1, 5, 8, 11, 13 or Election Day), you can:

- Ask for an election official who speaks your language to help you.
 Election officials who speak another language will be wearing a tag that says which language(s) they speak.
- Bring someone you know to the voting place. Let the election official know, as the person helping you will have to take an oath of secrecy.

Ballot marking instructions will be available in the following languages, in addition to large print (in English):

- Traditional Chinese
- Simplified Chinese
- Tagalog
- Punjabi
- Vietnamese
- Korean
- Spanish
- French
- Farsi
- Japanese

American Sign Language (ASL) will be available by video chat on advance voting days (October 1, 5, 8, 11, 13).

If your language is not listed above, we can also connect you over the phone to someone who can help you understand the ballot marking instructions. This service is available at the voting place in more than 180 languages.



All current B.C. Provincial Health Orders will be followed.

To prioritize everyone's safety, you can expect the following precautions at your voting place:

- There will be a one-way entrance for most voting places.
- All election officials will have COVID-19 safety training.
- All election officials will have been vaccinated against COVID-19, consistent with the City of Vancouver policies.
- There will be a limited number of people allowed inside the voting place at the same time.
- Physical distancing will be managed.
- Disposable masks, gloves, and hand sanitizer will be available for free.
- Physical dividers will be in place.
- Surfaces and pens will be sanitized frequently.

Here are ways you can help protect yourself, election officials and fellow voters at the voting place:

- Wear a mask that covers your mouth and nose.
- Respect everyone's space.
- Stay at home if you are sick and choose another way to vote.



Remember, you may vote by mail instead of voting in person. You can also vote in advance to avoid lineups on Election Day.

Capital Plan 2023-2026

A Capital Plan is a four-year investment plan for the City's amenities and infrastructure, including

- Parks and seawall:
- Streets and sidewalks:
- Water and sewer pipes:
- Community facilities such as childcare, recreation centres and libraries;
- Affordable housing (in partnership with provincial and federal governments)
- Municipal facilities such as service yards and public safety facilities such as fire halls;
- And more.

Investing in amenities and infrastructure helps keep Vancouver running smoothly and contributes to our quality of life — how we move, enjoy public spaces, stay safe, mitigate the impacts of and adapt to climate change and receive clean water and other core services.

A large portion of the Capital Plan focuses on the much-needed work to maintain and renew existing amenities and infrastructure around Vancouver to keep them in good shape. The Capital Plan also includes funding to advance climate mitigation and adaptation work, and sets aside funding to leverage senior government partnerships. The remainder of the Capital Plan is for investments in new and expanded amenities and infrastructure to help serve our growing population and economy.

ent in City

The 2023-2026 Capital Plan consists of \$3.5 billion of investment in amenities and infrastructure. The Capital Plan was approved by City Council in June 2022, after a round of public engagement in which close to 4,000 citizens participated.

The Capital Plan is funded from a variety of sources, including property taxes, utility fees, contributions from development, and contributions from partner agencies. In considering its debt capacity and to maintain its AAA credit ratings, the City balances the use of capital reserves, pay-as-you-go, and debt financing in our financial strategy. The City is required to obtain voter approval before it can borrow the money, which is why there are Capital Plan questions on the ballot in the municipal election.

A total of \$495 million (out of the \$3.5 billion) is proposed to be funded through borrowing that requires voter approval in the municipal election on October 15.

Three questions will be asked:

- 1. transportation and core operating technology: \$173.45 million
- 2. community facilities: \$162.07 million
- 3. parks, public safety, and other civic facilities; climate change adaption, and other emerging priorities: \$159.47 million

The exact wording of the questions on the ballot is as follows:

1. TRANSPORTATION AND CORE OPERATING TECHNOLOGY

Are you in favour of Council having the authority, without further assent of the electors, to pass by-laws between January 1, 2023 and December 31, 2026 to borrow an aggregate \$173,450,000 for the following purposes?

A. Street and Bridge Infrastructure

To provide for major maintenance, reconstruction and enhancement of the arterial and neighbourhood transportation networks, sidewalks, greenways and cycle routes and to undertake major maintenance of bridges and other structures, including repairs and structural work on the Granville Bridge and Cambie Bridge.

\$94,250,000

B. Traffic Signals and Street Lighting

To provide for major maintenance, replacement and enhancement of traffic signals and street lighting that are beyond economical repair or no longer meet operational requirements. \$54,300,000

C. Electrical Services in Public Spaces

To provide for increased availability of electrical services in public spaces including uses such as electrical vehicle and bike charging, electrical kiosks for food trucks, filming and events, and lighting in public gathering spaces. \$8,500,000

D. Core Operating Technology

To provide for renewal and enhancement of the City's core operating information technology systems such as fiber, data centres, servers and applications that are critical to the delivery of and access to City services and programs. \$16,400,000

If this question receives the assent of the electors, Council has the power, without further assent of the electors, to pass by-laws, as and when Council considers appropriate, to borrow money for the projects described up to \$173,450,000.



EXPLANATORY NOTE FOR QUESTIONS 2 AND 3:

- Community facilities include buildings such as community centres, pools, rinks, libraries, childcare facilities, cultural facilities, social facilities and affordable housing.
- Civic facilities include buildings such as fire halls, police buildings, administrative facilities and service yards.

2. COMMUNITY FACILITIES

Are you in favour of Council having the authority, without further assent of the electors, to pass by-laws between January 1, 2023 and December 31, 2026 to borrow an aggregate \$162,075,000 for the following purposes?

A. Renewal of Vancouver Aquatic Centre

To provide for replacement, renewal or rehabilitation of the Vancouver Aquatic Centre. \$103,000,000

B. Renewal and Upgrades of Community Facilities

To provide for replacement, renewal or rehabilitation of community facilities, including RayCam Community Centre and Childcare and/or other community facility projects. \$59,075,000

Total**\$162,075,000**

If this question receives the assent of the electors, Council has the power, without further assent of the electors, to pass by-laws, as and when Council considers appropriate, to borrow money for the projects described up to \$162,075,000.
