This memo provides an update on the work underway to address the March 2, 2022 Council motion "A Regulatory Framework to Enable Innovative Urban Activation".

Background

In March 2022, Council passed a <u>motion</u> directing staff to report back in Q2 2023 with a review of the regulatory framework to enable innovative urban activation projects on underutilized public and private properties, and provide recommendations to address the current challenges for enabling activation projects with a goal of streamlining and simplifying the approval process.

Discussion

Urban activation projects add vibrancy to the City and are currently facilitated through Business Licences, Special Events, temporary time-limited Development Permits, and Development Permits that allow ongoing and permanent activities. The City supports and enables a diversity of urban activation projects through the existing approval process, including arts and cultural events (i.e. Vancouver Pride Street Party 2022; Il Mercato Italian Market), and seasonal activities (i.e. Summer Mini Music Pop-Up; Spot Prawn Festival; Urban Roots garden market; Bloom; Christmas market; summer patios). These activities make up a small subset of overall enquiries and development permits. The unique aspects and function of each event adds to the



complexity of its review, which can involve several City Departments and branches and/or external groups (i.e. VPD, VCH) depending on its operations, size, set up, number of people attending and location. As the 2023 summer season approaches, staff continue to support applicants as they navigate the approval process for these types of activities on both public and private property.

Given the complexity and scope of these types of activities, support for urban activities will be integrated into various City initiatives. These initiatives are underway to enhance the activation of urban environments, and span many City Departments.

On private property, staff are actively working to deliver ongoing permitting and licensing improvements. These comprehensive improvements will have cascading impacts for a range of applications and permits types. While this work is not specific to urban activation, these initiatives will enhance overall user experiences for applicants through streamlining and simplification efforts.

At a broader city-level, urban activation is also being realized through several related motions, which focus on supporting a connected and culturally vibrant city. Work on these motions have areas of overlap with the urban activation motion and will inform future policy and potential regulatory changes.

The following table displays current motions that will contribute to urban activation and event initiatives, including work underway from Engineering Services, DBL and ACCS. The table also identifies the anticipated response dates to Council:
