This memo provides an overview of TransLink's upcoming Burrard Peninsula Area Transport Plan (BP ATP) project.

Burrard Peninsula Area Transport Plan

The Burrard Peninsula Area Transport Plan (BP ATP) will identify and prioritize actions for the transportation network within the Burrard Peninsula. This area encompasses Burnaby, New Westminster, Vancouver, and Electoral Area A, which includes the University of British Columbia (UBC) and the surrounding University Endowment Lands (UEL).

The study area also includes the traditional and unceded territories of several Indigenous Nations including Kwantlen First Nation, Kwikwetlem First Nation, Musqueam Indian Band, Squamish Nation, Tsleil-Waututh Nation, and Qayqayt First Nation.

Guided by Transport 2050, the Regional Transportation Strategy, and the vision of 'Access for Everyone', the BP ATP will help City staff and TransLink prioritize future investments – both in operations and infrastructure - in the transportation network, allowing everyone to connect to the people, places, and opportunities they want to.

The planning process began earlier this year and is expected to take 2 years to complete, with the first phase of public engagement scheduled for September/October 2023.

WHAT IS THE BURRARD PENINSULA AREA TRANSPORT PLAN?

The Burrard Peninsula Area Transport Plan (BP ATP) will identify and prioritize actions related to transit, cycling, walking, driving, and goods movement for the transportation network within the Burrard Peninsula. The BP ATP planning process is already underway and is expected to take approximately two years to complete, with the adoption of the final plan expected in early 2025. When complete, the BP ATP will help TransLink prioritize future investments over the next 15 years.

WHAT'S IN SCOPE?

The BP ATP will focus primarily on the local transit network, including transit priority infrastructure. The ATP will also consider active and safe streets as they relate to walking, cycling, and micro-mobility. We will also develop recommendations around the Major Road Network and regional goods-movement.

Out of scope are detailed implementation decisions about transportation operations (e.g., scheduling) and matters of regional significance (e.g., funding sources, transit fares), including parallel planning processes relating to specific rapid transit projects such as UBCx or the Burnaby Mountain Gondola.

WHAT'S COMING UP?

In late September 2023 we will launch the first round of public engagement. This will involve an online survey, stakeholder workshops, and social-equity focused forums with key stakeholders (e.g., students and youth, seniors, new Canadians, urban Indigenous). Phase 1 engagement will also include engagement with transportation and mobility industry bodies.

WHAT DO YOU NEED TO KNOW?

- The BP ATP project structure includes both a Senior Advisory Committee and Technical Advisory Committee, each composed of local government and partner agency staff. These committees will be engaged throughout the planning process where they will provide feedback and direction from a local government and partner agency perspective.
- To advance the Transport 2050 vision of *"Access for Everyone"*, the ATP planning process will seek out meaningful opportunities to advance reconciliation and social equity. This includes direct engagement with Indigenous Nations with traditional and unceded territories within the study area, to be conducted through TransLink's First Nations Transportation Program.
- The Burrard Peninsula ATP is an unfunded plan, but alongside Transport 2050, the 10-Year Priorities, and area plans for other sub-regions, the ATP will be a primary input to the development of future Investment Plans and guide how we prioritize investments in transit and transportation service and infrastructure over the next 15 years.

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WHAT'S THE STUDY AREA?

WHAT'S THE PLANNING TIMELINE?

2023: Phase 1 – Issues and Opportunities

During this phase, we will ask people about how they travel in the area, what's working and what could be improved. We will also evaluate the design and recent performance of the transportation network and explore how land use and travel patterns will change over the next 10 to 15 years.

2024: Phase 2 – Priority Actions

During this phase, we'll develop a range of recommended actions relating to the transit network, cycling and walking, as well as driving and goods movement. Towards the end of 2024 we'll ask the public for feedback on these actions and how to prioritize them for implementation over the next 15 years.

2025: Finalizing the plan

We will look to complete the planning process and finalize the plan in early 2025. Although the BP ATP is a TransLink plan, through ongoing collaboration with local government and partner agency staff we will endeavour to develop a plan that achieves local government support.
