Thanks for the note. I understand the frustration - I am frustrated as well. I am also a Yaletown resident not too far from the site. I am doing what I can to improve conditions around the site, in terms of increased cleaning resources and corporate security attendance, with escalation to VPD as necessary. Several changes to the exterior of the site are to be made as well. In addition, the lease ends in March 2024 and the city has indicated to the operator that it's unlikely to be renewed.

I agree that the operator does not have the resources or expertise to successfully manage the public realm outside the site, and staff are meeting with them (Raincity) regularly, as well as Vancouver Coastal Health (co-operator), regarding the city's and neighbourhoood's concerns over the management of the public realm.

I was not on council at the time that this particular OPS location was approved - to be clear, I would not have supported it at this location as I did not think it was suitable in terms of size and location and was vocal about my concerns as a nearby resident.

>> - Additionally, the City has contracted First Trauma Scene to address bio-hazards and clean up support at 11AM each day Monday to Friday as well performs a pressure rinse twice a week as well as pressure washing every







RE: 1101 & 1105 Seymour – City's Response to Safety and Security Challenges

I am writing today to update you on some immediate changes in our approach as landlord to managing the outdoor area around this City-owned property: 1101 & 1105 Seymour Street.

Over the past decade, this neighbourhood along with other areas of Vancouver has experienced increases in people without housing and many who are struggling with mental health and/or substance use. Over time, we have worked together with you as neighbours to identify ways to support these residents while maintaining safety for tenants, clients, City staff, neighbours and the public.

The security and safety of our staff, residents, non-profit tenants, and building is the highest priority for the City. Since November 2022, we have been piloting the use of a Community Navigator to help mitigate these issues. We have had some notable success with this partnership still in its early days; however, the scale of challenges have increased over recent months.

Issues like abandoned waste, biohazards, erection of structures, littering, and loitering around the building continue to pose significant safety risks for residential and non-profit building tenants and their staff and the public, in particular around entrances, the accessibility ramp, and fire-escapes. Instances of verbal harassment and intimidation around the building directed towards building tenants the public and staff persists.

On April 2, 2023, a violent incident occurred outside 1105/1101 Seymour that impacted staff from Housing Operations, Gathering Place and the Overdose Prevention Site. As a result, we have instituted additional interim safety measures while a sustainable and effective safety program is established.



Some of these interim measures include:

- Additional onsite Corporate Security and more frequent building rounds to de-escalate disputes
 around the building, address problematic congregating, and excessive by-law infractions,
 particularly around building entrances, the accessibility ramp, and fire escapes;
- Structured integration of daily biohazard cleanups by bio-recovery technicians who will focus on exterior walkways and sidewalk areas;
- Earlier involvement of City sanitation crews to address excessive litter, abandoned waste, and structures around the building to better mitigate fire safety and health risks;
- Engaging the City's Homelessness Services Outreach team to connect with individuals around the building experiencing homelessness and who maybe seeking shelter within the immediate vicinity;
- Support for regular check-ins with the VPD Community Officer and utilization of escalation pathways through 911, as required.

These measures are intended to address the ongoing and evolving conditions that are having significant detrimental impacts on our Housing Operations team, our tenants, and neighbours. As we develop a more robust program to ensure safety for all of our tenants, staff, and public, we'll be sure to engage non-profit tenants for feedback. Staff will be in touch soon to discuss how we might move forward in developing a new safety program for this building.

The following statement was provided to all reporters, as well as the additional details below:

The City of Vancouver remains very concerned about the high level of overdose deaths in Vancouver and is very supportive of harm reduction services such as overdose prevention sites. We recognize the important life safety and security these services provide to people who use substances and have a long history of supporting harm reduction approaches in partnership with Vancouver Coastal Health and community organizations.

Last week, the City confirmed for VCH that we will not be renewing the lease at 1101 Seymour Street when it expires in March 2024. We provided this early confirmation to ensure VCH has sufficient time to explore other options for overdose prevention services in the downtown south, an area of significant need. While it is unfortunate that 1101 Seymour Street has proven unviable for sustained operations for this service, we will continue to work with VCH to support responses to the overdose crisis in this neighbourhood and across the city.

The City is thankful for the partnership with VCH and the numerous non-profit service providers who operate services at 1101 Seymour St.

Any word on why the site wasn't viable?

We have been challenged to manage the extensive congregation outside of this location. Many of the people who gather at this site are not clients of or associated with the OPS, however the outdoor socialization draws many others to the area, the cumulative effect resulting in significant operating challenges for current and neighbouring operations and services.

 Modification of Lease for Supporting Women's Alternatives Network (SWAN Vancouver) Society, and Lease for RainCity Housing and Support Society for Overdose Prevention Site, both at 1101 Seymour Street

At the reconvened Council meeting on October 13, 2020, Council heard from speakers and referred questions to staff, debate and decision on the report dated September 8, 2020, to the Council meeting on October 20, 2020, as Unfinished Business.

Council also had before a Memorandum from Sandra Singh, General Manager, Arts, Culture and Community Services, dated October 19, 2020, that informed Council that based on what was heard at Council on October 13, 2020, the Funder has requested an amendment in the report to allow for a direct lease with the City for this site to address public concerns. Based upon discussions with the Funder, staff recommended changes to the report for Recommendations B, C and D only pertaining to RainCity Housing and Support Society.

MOVED by Councillor Kirby-Yung SECONDED by Councillor Hardwick

- A. THAT Council authorize the Director of Real Estate Services to negotiate and execute the modification of an existing lease (the "SWAN Lease") with Supporting Women's Alternatives Network (SWAN Vancouver) Society ("SWAN") for premises located on the 1st floor at #101 1101 Seymour Street (the "Leased Premises"), to incorporate any required changes to the SWAN Lease to effect the following modifications:
 - i. Removing the current 1st floor unit 101 (580 square feet of exclusive use area) from the Leased Premises, and replacing it with unit 325 on the 3rd floor (1,654 square feet of exclusive use area), as shown on Appendix A, thereby increasing the total exclusive use area of the Leased Premises by 1,074 square feet for a new total of 1,654 square feet. The increased floor area results in a commensurate increase in the amount payable at the current rate as "Building Operating Costs" as provided for in Sections 1.08 and 1.09 of the SWAN Lease (from currently \$4,930/annum to \$14,059/annum, plus applicable sales taxes);
 - ii. The modification of lease (the "Modification"), including for clarity the increase to Building Operating Costs referenced in Recommendation A.i above, shall take effect on November 1, 2020 (the "Effective Date"). SWAN shall be permitted early possession of the new location of the Leased Premises beginning October 16, 2020, to accommodate the move and transition of operations by SWAN from their current unit 101; and
 - iii. The Modification shall incorporate any changes to the SWAN Lease as deemed necessary to effect the provisions as set out in this Recommendation A, but shall otherwise be on the same terms and conditions set out in the SWAN Lease, and upon such other terms and conditions to the satisfaction of the Director of Legal Services in

consultation with the General Manager of Real Estate and Facilities Management and the General Manager of Arts, Culture, and Community Services;

FURTHER THAT as the rent for the additional floor area to be included in the Leased Premises will be below the applicable market rate and includes rent-in-lieu of property taxes, Recommendation A constitutes a grant valued at approximately \$42,423 per annum for the incremental floor area of 1,074 sq ft, and approximately \$65,333 per annum for the new total floor area of 1,654 sq ft, based on the current year of the Term.

Council agreed to sever the vote on the components of the motion. A was put and CARRIED AND BY THE REQUIRED MAJORITY (Vote No. 06516) with Councillors De Genova and Hardwick opposed. B to D was put and CARRIED AND C BY THE REQUIRED MAJORITY (Vote No. 06517) with Councillors De Genova, Dominato, Hardwick and Kirby-Yung opposed. E to F was put and CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY (Vote No. 06518) with Councillors Boyle and Swanson abstaining from the vote.

FINAL MOTION AS APPROVED

- A. THAT Council authorize the Director of Real Estate Services to negotiate and execute the modification of an existing lease (the "SWAN Lease") with Supporting Women's Alternatives Network (SWAN Vancouver) Society ("SWAN") for premises located on the 1st floor at #101 1101 Seymour Street (the "Leased Premises"), to incorporate any required changes to the SWAN Lease to effect the following modifications:
 - i. Removing the current 1st floor unit 101 (580 square feet of exclusive use area) from the Leased Premises, and replacing it with unit 325 on the 3rd floor (1,654 square feet of exclusive use area), as shown on Appendix A of the Report dated September 8, 2020, entitled "Modification of Lease for Supporting Women's Alternatives Network (SWAN Vancouver) Society, and Lease for RainCity Housing and Support Society for Overdose Prevention Site, both at 1101 Seymour Street", thereby increasing the total exclusive use area of the Leased Premises by 1,074 square feet for a new total of 1,654 square feet. The increased floor area results in a commensurate increase in the amount payable at the current rate as "Building Operating Costs" as provided for in Sections 1.08 and 1.09 of the SWAN Lease (from currently \$4,930/annum to \$14,059/annum, plus applicable sales taxes);
 - ii. The modification of lease (the "Modification"), including for clarity the increase to Building Operating Costs referenced in A.i above, shall take effect on November 1, 2020 (the "Effective Date"). SWAN shall be permitted early possession of the new location of the Leased Premises beginning October 16, 2020, to accommodate the move and transition of operations by SWAN from their current unit 101; and
 - iii. The Modification shall incorporate any changes to the SWAN Lease as deemed necessary to effect the provisions as set out in A of this resolution, but shall otherwise be on the same terms and conditions set out in the SWAN Lease, and upon such other terms and conditions to the

satisfaction of the Director of Legal Services in consultation with the General Manager of Real Estate and Facilities Management and the General Manager of Arts, Culture, and Community Services;

FURTHER THAT as the rent for the additional floor area to be included in the Leased Premises will be below the applicable market rate and includes rent-in-lieu of property taxes, Resolution A constitutes a grant valued at approximately \$42,423 per annum for the incremental floor area of 1,074 sq ft, and approximately \$65,333 per annum for the new total floor area of 1,654 sq ft, based on the current year of the Term.

B. THAT Council approve the following government health agency to occupy and be the leaseholder #101 – 1101 Seymour Street, being a 580 square foot portion on the 1st floor of the social service centre (the "Centre") at 1101 Seymour Street, legally described as Parcel Identifier: 029-321-808; Lot 1 Block 93 Plan EPP40740 District Lot 541 NWD Group 1 (the "Property"):

Vancouver Coastal Health Authority ("VCH").

- C. THAT Council authorize the Director of Real Estate Services to negotiate and execute a lease agreement with Vancouver Coastal Health Authority ("VCH") for #101 1101 Seymour Street (the "VCH Lease"). The VCH Lease shall be based on the following terms and conditions, and upon such other terms and conditions to the satisfaction of the General Manager of Real Estate and Facilities Management, the General Manager of Arts, Culture and Community Services and the Director of Legal Services:
 - Term and Renewal Options: One year and 5 months commencing November 1, 2020, plus one renewal option for a further two (2) years;
 - ii. Rent and Operating Costs: Total Rent of \$27,840 per annum, inclusive of payment in lieu of property taxes, plus applicable sales taxes.
- D. THAT no legal rights or obligations be created or arise by Council's adoption of A, B and C above unless and until the Modification and the Vancouver Coastal Health Authority Lease have been executed and delivered by the respective parties.
- E. THAT Council direct staff to attach conditions to the proposed lease for Vancouver Coastal Health Authority (VCH) for an Overdose Prevention Site at 1101 Seymour Street that addresses requirements for exterior building and site cleanliness, expectations for minimizing discarded needles and drug equipment outside the OPS, lists expected hours of operation, provides a plan for managing any queuing outside the building exterior, and provides ventilation in relation to adjacent residences, businesses and public realm;

FURTHER THAT staff report back by the end of November 2020 on measures that can be taken by the City in order to mitigate any impact on neighbouring residents and businesses, including increased sanitation services to deal with

any increase in discarded needles, feces and waste in the public realm, and including specific attention to Emery Barnes Park in consultation with the Vancouver Park Board;

AND FURTHER THAT staff also consult with the VPD and Vancouver Coastal Health regarding measures that would best support smooth operation of the new OPS, including monitoring of the site in order to identify and respond to issues.

F. THAT, concurrent to the consultation outlined in E above, Council direct staff to work with Vancouver Coastal Health (VCH), VPD, and relevant stakeholders, and consider prioritizing OPS locations in neighborhoods with the greatest need and risk of overdoses, informed by data including recent overdose deaths;

FURTHER THAT through the lens of the Four Pillars Drug Strategy, Council also direct staff to work with and request VCH to consider the feasibility of deploying a number of mobile OPS locations, in addition to, one permanent location, with consideration for moving forward with the shared goal of preventing overdose deaths citywide.

G. THAT Council direct staff to work with Vancouver Coastal Health and the operator of the Overdose Prevention Site at 1101 Seymour Street to enable and accelerate access to safer supply in accordance with new powers granted by the Province of BC including, but not limited to, provisions allowing the prescription of safe supply by nurses outside of a medicalized setting.

PURPOSE

The purpose of this email is to provide an update regarding the Overdose Prevention Site at 1101 Seymour Street.

The City signed a lease agreement with VCH for an Overdose Prevention Site (OPS) at 1101 Seymour Street as per Council's approval on October 20, 2020. The operator of 1101 Seymour is Raincity Housing and Support Society and the OPS opened on Tuesday, March 2, 2021.

Staff worked with Vancouver Coastal Health to create a set of operational conditions, incorporated within the lease to meet the set requirements outlined in the Council report addressing: building cleanliness, hours of operation, a plan for managing queuing, and ventilation. This memo provides a further update on OPS data for 1101 Seymour within the first 3 months, steps taken to address issues, and future opportunities to mitigate community concerns.

BACKGROUND

In April 2016, following a significant increase in opioid-related overdose deaths from drug poisoning, a public health emergency was declared in BC. During the COVID-19 pandemic,



overdose death rates in Vancouver and BC have increased, counteracting progress in reducing deaths in 2019. There were over 400 overdose deaths in Vancouver in 2020, with an average of 6 deaths per week reported by the VPD and an average of approximately 100 calls the VFRS responds to per week. The situation has worsened. As of mid May, based on VPD and Coroner reports 161 people have died from overdose in the city this year, which is an average of 8-9 deaths per week, and 1,770 have died since the Public Health Emergency was declared in April 2016.

No one has died at an OPS- these services remain critical life-saving services in Vancouver.

In October 2020, staff brought the recommendation for decision to Council due to 1101 Seymour being a City-owned site – other OPS services open and operate without Council decision in the DTES and at St. Paul's Hospital.

In February 2021, VCH signed the lease for 1101 Seymour who sub lease to Raincity Housing Support Society. The site, named the Thomus Donaghy OPS, has operated since March 2, 2021 from 10am – 10pm, 7 days a week.

DISCUSSION

Considerable community concern was raised during the 1101 Seymour Council meeting in regards to safety and cleanliness in and around the area with a new OPS at this location.

Council added recommendations to the staff report to address community concerns (see Appendix A, below). Staff, VCH, and Raincity Housing Support Society continue to work collaboratively to address any site issues that arise at the new OPS.

- The operating conditions were integrated into the lease with Vancouver Coastal Health addressing: building cleanliness, hours of operation, a plan for managing queuing, and ventilation (see Appendix A);
- The operator is in contact, and collaborates with, other building tenants to address any issues;
- The operator (RainCity) monitors, to a reasonable extent and during operating hours (10am-10pm), the state of the sidewalk on the exterior of the building, and clean up discarded harm reduction materials as needed.
 - This includes 30 minute safety and access checks, which includes monitoring of any accumulated garbage on the sidewalk outside of the OPS/
 - At times, if staff are responding to a crisis such as an overdose, they will not be able to do their 30 minute check but will do so at the next available opportunity
 - The operator has shared that they support 50-70 site visits daily, and provide 1-5 overdose reversals/week
- Staff experience is that during the first year of opening new initiatives like supportive housing and overdose prevention sites operators need time to settle operations into the neighbourhood. Operators also experience heightened surveillance and scrutiny during this time which tends to decrease after the first year of operation.

- To date staff have followed up on 8 complaints, including inquiry emails from Council.
 Staff are establishing baseline data to monitor the difference in the number of complaints and issues over time
- A City working group including, but not limited to: Engineering Sanitation Services, Social Policy, Homelessness Services, and other site specific departments as needed for high profile sites such as OPS and washroom trailer program sites.

NEXT STEPS

Staff are organizing a tour in June for Mayor and Council of the OPS at 1101 Seymour so that elected officials can meet with the operator and Vancouver Coastal Health directly and ask questions and clarify concerns.

FINAL REMARKS

In conclusion, staff, VCH, and Raincity Housing Support Society will continue to respond to community concerns, while ensuring crucial life-saving supports continue.

Council directions regarding the lease conditions are below:

E. THAT Council direct staff to attach conditions to the proposed lease for Vancouver Coastal Health Authority (VCH) for an Overdose Prevention Site at 1101 Seymour Street that addresses requirements for exterior building and site cleanliness, expectations for minimizing discarded needles and drug equipment outside the OPS, lists expected hours of operation, provides a plan for managing any queuing outside the building exterior, and provides ventilation in relation to adjacent residences, businesses and public realm;

FURTHER THAT staff report back by the end of November 2020 on measures that can be taken by the City in order to mitigate any impact on neighbouring residents and businesses, including increased sanitation services to deal with any increase in discarded needles, feces and waste in the public realm, and including specific attention to Emery Barnes Park in consultation with the Vancouver Park Board;

AND FURTHER THAT staff also consult with the VPD and Vancouver Coastal Health regarding measures that would best support smooth operation of the new OPS, including monitoring of the site in order to identify and respond to issues.

The lease conditions integrated into the lease are:

Section 4.04 Additional Requirements Related to Use of Premises

- (a) Notwithstanding the Permitted Use, the Tenant shall not permit substance inhalation within the Premises. The Tenant shall refer clients requiring this type of support to a facility that offers this service.
- (b) The Tenant shall limit the hours of operations for the Premises to between 10:00am to 10:00pm daily.
- (c) The Tenant shall determine the maximum number of clients it can safely accommodate within the Premises at a given time and shall post such limitation at visible locations within and/or about the Premises.
- (d) If at any time the maximum capacity for the Premises has been reached, the Tenant shall:
 - i. facilitate in/out access and egress through the front entrance of the Building;
 - ii. ensure clients that are above the maximum capacity are escorted out of the Building; and
 - iii. ensure safe and orderly queuing along the outside perimeter of the Building.
- (e) The Tenant shall supervise clients to ensure that clients remain within the Premises, unless a client is accessing services from another Tenant within the Building.
- (f) In addition to the requirements of Sections 5.01 and 6.01, the Tenant shall be responsible for periodic inspection of the Licensed Areas and sidewalks adjacent to the Building to ensure safe pick up and disposal of any discarded drugs and needles/drug paraphernalia.

PURPOSE

The purpose of this memo is to provide an update on the conditions for the proposed lease to Vancouver Coastal Health (VCH) for the Overdose Prevention Site at 1101 Seymour Street.

The City signed a lease agreement with VCH for an Overdose Prevention Site at 1101 Seymour Street as per Council's approval on October 20, 2020. Item E requests that Council direct staff to attach conditions to the proposed lease that addresses requirements for building cleanliness, hours of operation, a plan for managing the queuing, and ventilation. Staff worked with Vancouver Coastal Health to create a set of conditions that met the requirements as per Council's request. This memo describes the conditions of the lease and the process in which they were developed.

BACKGROUND

In April 2016, following a significant increase in opioid-related overdose deaths from drug poisoning, a public health emergency was declared in BC. During the COVID-19 pandemic, overdose death rates in Vancouver and BC have increased, counteracting progress in reducing deaths in 2019. In recognition of the increased number of overdose deaths as well as increased street activity in the Granville area that has arisen since the start of the pandemic, VCH and the



City continue to work together to address the gap in harm reduction and overdose prevention services in the neighbourhood. VCH identified the need for another overdose prevention site in this neighbourhood that will provide people who use illicit drugs with a safe and life-saving space to use and access to other social supports.

Since summer of 2020, a mobile overdose prevention service has been operating near 1101 Seymour, and feedback from the operator and overdose surveillance indicates that was a suitable location to meet the demand for services in the downtown core. A more permanent, indoor location on the 1st floor of 1101 Seymour will better enable service delivery for people at risk in the area.

At a Council meeting on October 13, 2020, Council heard from speakers and referred questions to staff, debate and decision on the report dated September 8, 2020 to lease a space at #101-1101 Seymour to RainCity Housing and Support Society (RainCity) to operate an overdose prevention site, funded by VCH. The October 13th Council meeting was reconvened on October 20th, and VCH (the Funder) requested an amendment in the report to allow for a direct lease with the City for this site to address complex neighbourhood relations. On October 22, 2020 Council considered and approved staff recommendations for the City to directly lease the space at #101-1101 Seymour to VCH for an Overdose Prevention Site operated by RainCity Housing and Support Service Society.

During the Council meeting the need for an additional space for supervised inhalation was identified. Staff are working with VCH to create an inhalation tent connected to the washroom trailer site at the Murray Hotel.

The approved Council recommendation directed staff to:

- a) attach conditions to the proposed lease that addresses requirements for exterior building and site cleanliness, expectations for minimizing discarded needles and drug equipment outside the OPS, lists expected hours of operation, provides a plan for managing any queuing outside the building exterior, and provides ventilation in relation to adjacent residences, businesses and public realm;
- b) report back to Council by end of November 2020 on measures that that can be taken by the City in order to mitigate any impact on neighbouring residents and businesses, including increased sanitation services to deal with any increase in discarded needles, feces and waste in the public realm, and including specific attention to Emery Barnes Park in consultation with the Vancouver Park Board; and
- c) consult with VPD and VCH regarding measures that would best support smooth operation of the new OPS, including monitoring of the site in order to identify and respond to issues.

DISCUSSION

Staff met with VCH to discuss and draft conditions to the lease, outlined in Appendix B. The lease was signed by VCH and the site will be operational in early March 2021. In order to satisfy the Council's request to report back on the conditions of the lease, the work to date is described below.

Opening of Seymour OPS

- The lease has been signed and the OPS is scheduled to open in early March, 2021 with date to be determined due to COVID-19 vaccinations.
- VCH will be doing a "soft opening" wi operations will be fully implemented and services will be targeted to drug users by word of mouth versus a wide-scale public promotion.

Site Monitoring

VCH shared their commitments and perspectives regarding these conditions. According to the VCH team:

- The operator (RainCity) will monitor, to a reasonable extent and during operating hours, the state of the sidewalk on the exterior of the building, and clean up discarded harm reduction materials as needed.
- Although minimal queuing is anticipated, decals may be placed to support physical
 distancing in the queue, and staff and peers will be assigned to deal with crowd control.
 VCH will be reviewing the operator's COVID-19 safety plan closely, as is the norm with
 all VCH Overdose Prevention Site contracts.
- It is not anticipated that the new Overdose Prevention Site will result in increased discarded needles in the public realm, including Emery Barnes Park. However, VCH contracts a range of needle sweep programs the neighbourhood.
- Perceptions of police surveillance can act as a barrier to accessing health services.
 Therefore, VCH is recommending that there be no exceptional police monitoring of the new site. Instead, VCH and the operator will work with the VPD's neighbourhood liaison to proactively resolve any emerging issues, and phone the police in the case of emergencies.

In addition, staff will monitor existing data routinely collected on requests for needle pickup and cleaning re: feces for any changes or increases and will respond as needed.

Consultation with Tenants

In December 2020, a community engagement session for the Granville area hosted by BC Housing and involving COV, VCH and the DVBIA, discussed the Seymour OPS as part of their agenda. The majority of participants were pleased with improvements to the area because of increased needle pick up by Spikes on Bikes (run by PHS) and Street Youth Job Action (run by Directions). Only one member disagreed with this assessment.

In addition, staff hosted a meeting specifically about the Seymour OPS with VCH, RainCity and the tenants of 1108 Seymour on December 9, 2020. The purpose of the meeting was to provide tenants with the opportunity to hear more about the OPS and to ask questions or share any concerns. The meeting was attended by representatives from AIDS Vancouver, SWAN Vancouver, and Aunt Leah's Place, VCH, RainCity and the City. The tenants raised issues related to security, privacy, and hours of operation, and VCH, RainCity and City staff discussed current and potential solutions to mitigate risks. All tenants each expressed their support of the OPS and recognized the necessity and importance of the work to the wider community and to

their respective program participants. As an outcome of the meeting, the tenants agreed to coordinate regular meetings amongst themselves to exchange information as well as build relationships through events such as a community potluck.

Additional Consultation

Staff have been and are currently engaged in conversations with the following City departments regarding various aspects of the OPS at Seymour and future considerations:

- VPD for considerations related to monitoring, security and safety around the OPS.
 Staff have followed up with Superintendent Howard Tran and Sgt. Chris Burnham. Some of their concerns include:
 - Boundaries of the area to be cleaned by the site , including sidewalks, lane, Emery Barnes; and
 - Frequency of cleaning as per above.

VPD has also confirmed they will be in the area to assist with issues and will encourage people to use at the OPS.

- Parks for considerations related to Emery Barnes Park. Staff from Parks have expressed the following concerns:
 - Concern about potential increase in garbage, camps and human waste requiring an increased workload for Operations in Emery Barnes Parks; and
 - Will provide Enforcement Officers with an option to help engage people at risk or at odds with Park users.
- Engineering for considerations related to sanitation:
 - May be potential increase in need for cleaning, and the frequency and breadth of cleaning provided by the OPS; and
 - Engineering will track 311 requests for needle pickup up, street cleanup, and will liaise with DVBIA during bi-weekly calls.

TIMELINE

The Indoor OPS officially opened on March 1, 2021.

Staff will continue to engage City departments and to work with VCH to integrate any feedback into relevant aspects of the OPS moving forward.

NEXT STEPS

- Request Parks to monitor debris/garbage and issues in Emery Barnes park to inform whether additional service is needed.
- Request to Housing to monitor any complaints or issues from tenants of 1101 Seymour (City-owned site) related to the OPS and work with VCH and Housing to respond appropriately if needed.

- Staff to monitor City data on requests for needle pick up and cleaning re: feces, as well as monitoring of DVBIA data, and will respond if any increase is noted.
- Inhalation tent/outdoor OPS to open end of March 2021, operated by Atira at Murray Hotel washroom trailer site.

FINAL REMARKS

In conclusion, the City has completed the lease agreement, VCH tenants in 1101 have been consulted, mechanisms have been set up to support future risk mitigation, and the indoor OPS site is now open. City staff will continue to work with VCH and City departments to monitor the site and surrounding area and to address any emerging concerns.

Hi Paul – can you please forward this statement to Mayor and Council:

Unfortunately I am not able to attend today's council meeting. However, I would like to voice strong support for the staff recommendation to provide the RainCity Housing and Support Society with a lease to operate an overdose prevention site at 1101 Seymour Street.

We are still in the midst of two public health emergencies: the opioid overdose emergency and the COVID-19 pandemic. For people living with substance use disorder in Vancouver using illegal substances, the risk of overdose death is greater than their risk of severe COVID-19. The Vancouver Police Department reported that there were 14 suspected overdose deaths in Vancouver last week, the second-highest weekly total since City staff started tracking VPD-reported deaths in 2016. The city centre has consistently seen the second highest number of overdose deaths in our region after the downtown eastside (DTES). Historically people at risk of overdose who live downtown have had few options for supervised consumption, often being forced to use alone, in parks or alleyways, or to travel to the DTES to visit Insite. The new overdose prevention site that is being proposed for 1101 Seymour St will provide an important, life-saving opportunity for people to use their drugs in a safe environment. It will also offer opportunities for access to treatments and supports when through referrals to our VCH Overdose Outreach Team.

Overdose Prevention Sites operate under a provincial ministerial order, which permits their operation without exemption under section 56.1 of the federal Controlled Drugs and Substances Act. Due to the nature of the emergency, which requires public health to move quickly to establish services, the order does not require community consultation. However, we have full confidence in RainCity as a service provider, and our staff with work closely with stakeholders to ensure impacts to the surrounding community are minimal.

Analysis from the BC Centre for Disease Control clearly demonstrates that overdose prevention services have saved lives, and I would remind Mayor and Council that they are an essential component the work required to address the opioid overdose crisis as outlined in my Chief Medical Health Officer Report of 2018 (http://www.vch.ca/Documents/CMHO-report.pdf).

Thank you for your ongoing support in addressing the opioid overdose emergency in Vancouver.

2020 Annual City Clerk's Correspondence Report

City Clerk's Office

March 19, 2021

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1. Introduction

The purpose of this report is to provide an annual review of the correspondence received in the City Clerk's Office by the Election and Business Services, Mayor's Office, Legislative Operations, and External Relations and Protocol groups in 2020. This excludes correspondence by other branches such as Access to Information and Archives as they report their own metrics annually, and Board of Variance as their correspondence data is not currently tracked. The data provided in this report also excludes correspondence that were sent directly to the Mayor and Councillors' unique email addresses unless they were requested to be entered into the case management system.

The majority of correspondence covered in this report relates to Mayor and Council correspondence, which includes feedback on Council agenda items, service requests, enquiries, complaints, comments, and petitions. In addition to Council correspondence, the City Clerk's Office also processes Public Hearing correspondence, speaker requests, legal documents, risk management claims, and event invitations. Other services also include City Hall tours/official visits, the City Hall Illumination Program, half-mastings, events, and ceremonies. Data from 2020 has been collected for these services and will be discussed in further sections. Comparisons with data collected in previous years will also be provided if the information is available.

2. Summary of 2020 Correspondence Trends

With the onset of the COVID-19 pandemic in March 2020, this unprecedented situation became a central topic of concern throughout the majority of the year. This significantly increased Mayor and Council correspondence volumes as well as decreased the amount of events as in-person gatherings were limited to ensure the safety of the public and City staff. A high-level summary of the data collected in 2020 is displayed in Table 1 below.


3. Correspondence Improvements in 2020

In 2020, the City Clerk's Office implemented the following improvements to the correspondence process:

• New Council Correspondence Dashboard

 A new <u>interactive dashboard</u> was created to display high-level correspondence data to help Mayor and Council with their decision making process. A screenshot of the dashboard is below:





New Public Hearing Web Form

 A new Public Hearing web form was launched to replace the <u>publichearing@vancouver.ca</u> email. This reduced the amount of resources previously required to review emails and prepare them for distribution.

Website Improvements

 The rezoning and Public Hearing web pages on the City's website were updated to clarify the feedback submission process and to provide more education on the rezoning process.


4. 2020 Mayor and Council Correspondence

Mayor and Council correspondence is managed by the Council Correspondence Coordinator from the Business and Election Services group (more information is provided in Appendix A). In 2020, Council received a total of 11,331 correspondence items, which was a 75% increase from the 6,443 correspondence items received in 2019. Correspondence volumes typically increase during the weeks Council meetings are held and when there are specific topics of interest. As shown in Figure 1, volumes usually decrease during Council breaks in August and between December and January. Correspondence volume trends in recent years have been similar, where the volumes typically increase in July before the summer break in August as well as from September to November.

With the onset of the COVID-19 pandemic in March 2020, Council received an unprecedented amount of correspondence and increased volumes throughout the rest of the year. Most of the comments in



March were related to COVID-19 and approximately 1,900 comments were received over a one-week period through an organized campaign regarding the 2020 Cultural Grants.



4.1 Categories and Topic Trends


Similar to previous years, the highest volume of correspondence in 2020 fell under the City Administration category (as shown in Figure 2), which includes correspondence related to the 2020 Cultural Grants, lease for an overdose prevention site at 1101 Seymour St, and 2021 Capital and Operating Budget. At the end of March, approximately 1,900 comments regarding the 2020 Cultural Grants were received through the Contact Council web form within a one-week period. The majority of these comments were part of a campaign from BC Alliance for Arts + Culture, whose members submitted template letters urging Council to approve the grants.

With the onset of the COVID-19 pandemic, the City had to adjust its services to adhere to public health orders and ensure the safety of its residents. As this became a significant issue in Vancouver and across the world, there were a variety of concerns related to service/industry closures, physical distancing enforcement, housing/homelessness support, and financial relief. Comments relating to COVID-19 fell under the Police, Fire, and Public Safety category, which was the second most popular category for 2020.




In 2020, the Defund the Police movement was a significant event, which lead to the Vancouver Police Department (VPD) receiving increased scrutiny by the public. As a result, Council received a high volume of comments relating to the Decriminalizing Poverty and Supporting Community-led Safety Initiatives motion, Ending Street Checks in Vancouver motion, and the VPD's 2020 Operating Budget.

Other important topics received were related to the Climate Emergency Action Plan and Prohibition of "No Pets" Clauses in Rental Contracts motion. A complete list of the popular topics from 2020 is provided in Figure 3.








4.2 Local Area (Neighbourhood) Volumes and Trends

Local areas (neighbourhoods) are identified by the constituent's residence as well as two other classifications below:

- Non-Vancouver Residents: Residents who do not live in Vancouver.
- Unknown: No address or neighbourhood provided.

Similar to 2019, the neighbourhoods with the highest volume of correspondence in 2020 were Downtown, Kitsilano, Mount Pleasant, West End, and Grandview-Woodland (Figure 4).






The neighbourhoods that had the most correspondence based on their population size, however, were West Point Grey, Strathcona, Downtown, Mount Pleasant, and Kitsilano. As displayed in Figure 5, 3.93% of West Point Grey residents wrote to Mayor and Council in comparison to 2.60% of Downtown residents (which had the highest number of actual correspondence received).

With a few exceptions, Figure 5 also illustrates that those residing in the north-western neighbourhoods of Vancouver generally write to Mayor and Council more often than residents of the south-eastern neighbourhoods.





The most popular topic across the majority of the neighbourhoods was the 2020 Cultural Grants. However, Table 2 shows the other most popular topic was usually local to the neighbourhood. For example, West Point Grey residents were most concerned about the use of the Jericho Hostel to house unsheltered residents; Strathcona residents were most concerned about the homeless encampment at Strathcona Park; and Downtown residents were most concerned about the lease for an overdose prevention site at 1101 Seymour Street.




Figure 6 - 2020 Correspondence Sources

As displayed in Figure 6, 84% (9,481) of correspondence items were received through the Contact Council web form in 2020. As 2020 is the third year the web form has replaced the mayorandcouncil@vancouver.ca email, constituents are becoming more familiar with the web form and email campaigns have also begun using it as well. The City Clerk's correspondenceclerk@vancouver.ca email also stopped receiving Council Correspondence in April 2020, and began redirecting constituents to use the web form, contributing to the higher use of the web form.


4.4 Correspondence Response Rates

All constituents receive an acknowledgement confirming receipt of their feedback when they use the Contact Council web form or call 3-1-1. However, not all constituents provide their contact information or may provide invalid/incorrect contact information. Some constituents also prefer not to be contacted and want their identity to be anonymous. Therefore, it is impossible to respond to 100% of all comments received.

In 2020, 90% (10,189 correspondence items) received a personalized response addressing the topic of concern, some including links for more information and additional contacts. This exceeded the goal set for 2020 to respond to at least 80% of correspondence, and is also a 15% increase to the 75% response rate in 2019.




Figure 7 - 2020 Response Rates



The majority of responses are provided by the Council Correspondence Coordinator, unless information is required from department staff, typically when the topic is of a complex or specific nature. Since 2017, the Correspondence Coordinator has developed a response repository consisting of information collected from the Civic Engagement & Communications department, City's website, past staff responses, information bulletins, news releases, and daily media summaries. These response templates are used to respond to common or hot topic items.

Similar to previous years, the majority of correspondence that required staff response fell under the Development, Buildings & Licensing (28%), Engineering Services (26%), and Planning, Urban Design, & Sustainability (14%) departments as the correspondence specified certain projects, sites, and locations.

Figure 8 - 2020 Staff Responses by Department






Similar to 2019, the average correspondence case response time was eight business days in 2020, which is within the 10 business day Service Level Agreement (SLA).

As shown in Figure 9, response times were the shortest in March and from August to November 2020 as most correspondence received were regarding the Council agenda items that had email response templates already prepared by the Correspondence Coordinator.


The response times were highest in February 2020 as Council received a high volume of correspondence related to the Wet'suwet'en protests. Information was requested from the VPD's Emergency Operations and Planning Section (EOPS) to create a response template on this topic. However, since the EOPS was busy managing the protests as they were happening, which took place over several weeks, the information to prepare the response was received after the SLA had already passed.

Response times also exceeded the SLA in January and December 2020 as more staff were away during the winter break and the correspondence was responded to following their return.



As displayed in Figure 10, the response times and correspondence volumes in 2020 had an inverse relationship where response times decreased when volumes increased. When correspondence volumes increased, they were mostly related to hot topics or Council agenda times, which had response templates already prepared. Therefore, responses were sent out quicker when Council received high volumes on the same topic as opposed to when volumes were lower and more specific responses had to be prepared.





5. Mayor's Office Correspondence

The Mayor's Office manages correspondence received through 3-1-1 and the Mayor's online contact form. In 2020, a total of 8,101 correspondence items were received, 56% (4,501 correspondence items) of which were from the same resident. The Mayor also receives correspondence from the public through the Kennedy.Stewart@vancouver.ca email and by physical mail, but the volumes and topics are not tracked. The correspondence topics received by the Mayor's Office tend to be similar to the correspondence received by Mayor and Council.

6. Public Hearing Correspondence

Public Hearing correspondence is managed by the Meeting Coordinators from the Legislative Operations group. Public Hearing correspondence is processed differently than other Mayor and Council correspondence as the constituent's full name and comments are made publicly available on the City's website.

In March 2020, the new Public Hearing correspondence web form launched to replace the publichearing@vancouver.ca email, which was fully discontinued in September. Prior to the web form, processing emails (especially for high profile items) was challenging for the Meeting Coordinators to distribute to Council in a timely manner. The web form was created to reduce the amount of resources required to review emails and prepare them for distribution.

In 2020, 3,253 Public Hearing correspondence items and 4 petitions with 6,107 signatures were received by the City Clerk's Office. The volumes of correspondence usually vary in each Public Hearing, but increase for rezoning applications that are of interest to residents. The correspondence volumes based on the Public Hearings scheduled in 2020 are displayed in Figure 11 and the most popular Public Hearing items are listed by date in Table 3 below. Due to the COVID-19 pandemic in 2020, Public Hearings were cancelled at the end of February to April. When Public Hearings resumed in May, they were convened electronically.





Speakers are also accepted for Public Hearings and the volume of speakers typically correlate with the volume of correspondence as there were more speakers during the Public Hearings in January, July, September, and October. In 2020, 522 speakers were registered and 458 speakers were heard.


After registered speakers have been heard, the Mayor or Chair of the meeting calls for additional speakers. If there are additional speakers, the number of speakers heard may exceed the number of registered speakers. As shown in Figure 12, the number of speakers heard exceeded the number of speakers registered during some Public Hearings in May, June, and October.

Typically, the number of speakers heard are lower than the number of registered speakers as some speakers do not end up attending. Prior to the COVID-19 pandemic, speakers attended Public Hearings in person. However, when Public Hearings convened electronically beginning in May 2020, a new phone-in option using Telus Portal was introduced which enabled speakers to participate remotely.





As displayed in Figure 13, there was a 10% increase in the number of speakers heard in 2020 in comparison to 2019. This may be due to the introduction of the phone option as speakers did not have to commute to City Hall and could phone in from a location convenient to them.




7. Council and Standing Committee Meeting Speakers

Speaker requests for Council and Standing Committee meetings are managed by the Meeting Coordinators from the Legislative Operations group. The public can register to speak up until one hour before the meeting is scheduled to begin.


Similar to Public Hearings, the number of speakers vary depending on the topic. Council and Standing Committee meetings are normally held in-person; but due to the COVID-19 pandemic in 2020, the meetings were convened electronically from April to December and speakers attended by phone.

In 2020, 233 speakers were registered and 147 speakers were heard during Council meetings (Figure 14).





In 2020, there were 1,040 registered speakers and 502 speakers heard during Standing Committee meetings (Figure 15).






In February 2020, Council directed staff to implement a pilot initiative that would allow registered speakers who missed their speaking time to have an opportunity to speak after the registered speaker's list concluded. During the pilot project, 51% of speakers were heard at Council and Standing Committee meetings. Out of the 649 speakers heard, 94% (611) spoke during their turn and 6% (38) missed their turn, but were able to speak when the Chair of the meeting went over the registered speaker's list again. Whether the speakers accidentally missed their turn or chose to speak at the second opportunity, the pilot made it more convenient for speakers to participate in the meeting.

8. Legals, Risk Claims, Invitations, and Tours

The City Clerk's Office receives a variety of other documents unrelated to the correspondence addressed to Mayor and Council. These include legal documents, risk management claims, and event invitations, which are managed by the administrative staff from the Business and Election Services group.

In 2020, the City Clerk's Office received 103 legal documents, which is a 57% decrease from the 239 legal documents received in 2019 (Figure 16).




The City Clerk's Office receives two types of claims: Charter Notices and ICBC claims. In 2020, 814 risk management claims were received, which is a 13% increase from the 722 risk claims received in 2019 (Figure 17).





In 2020, 109 event invitations were received by the City Clerk's Office, which is a 63% decrease from the 294 invitations received in 2019 (Figure 18). The volume of event invitations decreased significantly due to the COVID-19 pandemic as public health orders limited in-person social gatherings and large events.



City Hall campus tours are normally provided to new City of Vancouver employees, school groups, and community organizations by the administrative staff. In 2020, 65 attendees participated in four tours between January and February, which was significantly less than the 46 tours attended by 1,211 people in 2019. Two of the tours were for new employee onboarding and the other two tours were for post-secondary school groups. Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, all tours were cancelled from March to December as public access to City Hall was restricted and social gatherings were limited.



9. External Relations and Protocol

External Relations and Protocol (ERP) is responsible for arranging official visits, managing international relationships, managing the City Hall Illumination Program and half-mastings, as well as organizing Council awards, honours, events and ceremonies.

With COVID-19, ERP's work changed significantly in 2020 and the following data demonstrates ERP's accomplishments for the year.

- Arranged five official visits including a visit by the Governor General of Canada, the Government
 of Sweden, Ambassadors, and Consuls General. Typically, between 15 and 20 official visits are
 organized per year; however, visits were discontinued in March 2020 when the COVID-19 global
 pandemic was declared by the World Health Organization.
- Organized 11 events, ceremonies, and recognitions to honour the City's Official Celebrations and Observances: 3 in-person events including Lunar New Year, Black History Month, International Women's Day, 3 hybrid events including Italian Heritage Month, Remembrance Day and Pride Launch, and 5 online recognitions for World Refugee Day, National Indigenous Day, Eid, Diwali, and International Day for Persons with Disabilities. ERP normally organizes inperson events; however, all in-person events were cancelled in March due to restrictions on public gatherings and physical distancing measures. ERP quickly transitioned to hybrid events and virtual acknowledgements.
- Organized 60 micro-wedding ceremonies as part of the City Hall pilot wedding program.
- Organized **61 City Hall Illuminations** for a wide range of significant days, and directed the **Canadian flag be lowered for 10 Council approved observances**.

10. Looking Ahead to 2021

Building on the improvements made in 2020, staff will work towards implementing the following goals in 2021:

- Successfully migrate from the current case management system for Mayor and Council
 correspondence (Lagan) to the new Engagement Management Professional (EM Pro). With the
 launch of EM Pro, there will also be opportunities to improve the current reporting system. EM
 Pro is scheduled to launch in October 2021, and City Clerk's staff will be working on the new
 system with 3-1-1 and the Digital Team over the summer.
- Work with Intergovernmental Relations Office to streamline the Mayor and Council enquiry
 response process. Council enquiries originating from constituents are tracked by the City Clerk's
 Office and Council enquiries to staff are tracked by Intergovernmental Relations.
- Continue to improve the average response times for Council correspondence, ensuring all months fall within the 10 business day SLA.



Appendix A. Mayor and Council Correspondence Project Background

Prior to 2016, correspondence directed to Vancouver Mayor and Council was primarily received through the mayorandcouncil@vancouver.ca email account and all emails were forwarded directly to all members of Council. Under this model, however, responses to constituents could not be tracked and there was no clarity as to who would be responding. Members of the public could also receive different responses if members of Council requested different staff to respond, resulting in a duplication of work and inconsistencies.

In order to remedy these issues identified by members of Council and the City Manager, City Clerk's staff introduced a new, more centralized model for receiving, tracking, and responding to Council correspondence.

In 2016, the City Clerk's Office hired a Council Correspondence Coordinator who would be responsible for receiving, preparing, responding to, and reporting out on all correspondence received to Council. Shortly thereafter, a new case management system, Lagan (the same system as used by the 3-1-1 Contact Centre), was implemented to track and report out on correspondence.

The role and responsibilities of the Correspondence Coordinator include:

- Reviewing all correspondence and setting standard classifications for categories and topics
- Responding to correspondence and coordinating responses from department staff, while ensuring the 10 business day service level agreement (SLA) is met
 - Work with Civic Engagement and Communications as well as other City departments to develop hot topic response templates to respond to in-the-moment issues
- Reviewing, preparing, and sending out reports:
 - Daily Feedback Report Details of feedback received from the previous day
 - Council Item Report Provided just before council meetings (includes correspondence relating to items on the agenda, which were received after the last Daily Feedback Report was sent, as well as a tally for how much correspondence are in support, neutral, or opposed to the Council items)
 - Biweekly Dashboard High level report outlining trends prior to a Council meeting
 - Monthly Report Internal report with an overview of correspondence trends, sources, response rates, and department volumes/response times
 - Annual Report Summary of correspondence from the previous year


In mid-2017, the mayorandcouncil@vancouver.ca email was replaced by the Contact Council web form, which directly integrated with Lagan. All correspondence directed to Council have been tracked in Lagan since then. A single point of contact from each department was also identified to funnel cases requiring a response from staff. These department leads coordinate responses with staff within their department and ensure that the Correspondence Coordinator is made aware when a response has been provided so that the response can be captured and the case can be closed. Staff also implemented a service level standard, which is to respond back to all correspondence received by Council within 10 business days.



This new process allowed for:

- Increased accountability and efficiency when responding to citizens;
- Valuable data trends that can be reported out to help Council with decision-making;
- Streamlining the process for coordinating responses from staff; and
- Improvements to the administrative process for managing, tracking, reporting on, and responding to correspondence.

As a result of these new processes and the classification work that the Correspondence Coordinator does, staff can now provide more detailed reports on Council correspondence volumes, trends, and issues. Below is an overview of the current Council correspondence process:



Note: Correspondence items from Councillors are only tracked when requested by the Councillor.

> There have been additional new steps taken recently, here are some more specifics:

- > City of Vancouver Corporate Protective Services (CPS) staff are called in regularly during day time hours. A progressive community member engagement strategy is employed prior to activating an escalation process that involves CPS.
- > During the day, a Resident Assistant and/or Resident Manager is on site. A Community Navigator has been contracted (Mission Possible) to support the engagement of people around the building during peak hours (targeting 8am-6pm Monday through Friday & 10am-6pm on weekends where resources are available). If structures are erected etc., and people are unresponsive to engagement by operations staff and/or the Community Navigator, issues are escalated to CPS. Based on recent activity, CPS have attended the site at least once and often multiple times a day, in addition to VPD.
- > Over night, Resident Assistants float between four buildings including 1105 Seymour. CPS (through a third party contractor) performs mobile rounds at (or about) 11pm after OPS closes, 1am to support structure removal and crowd management, as well at 6am to help clear sites before the Resident Assistant arrives at 7:30am for the day shift.
- > Additionally, the City has contracted First Trauma Scene to address bio-hazards and clean up

support at 11AM each day Monday to Friday as well performs a pressure rinse twice a week as well as pressure washing every other week. > Hopefully this information is helpful. Hi Peter and Brian,

I did a really deep dive into the history and timelines related to the **OPS in Yaletown** and the property in general. There is an interesting development history on the property and also several parallel threads that all come together as the OPS (e.g., the prior OPS at St. Paul's, the Howard Johnson opening and Oppenheimer Park decampment, and PHS operating a Mobile Overdose Prevention Unit van in the area around 2020)... **Ultimately, it all leads to the OPS being located there in the present**.

Bear with me here because I've gleaned some things from various reports etc. that might prove helpful in better understanding things and also might offer some potential actions we could propose.

The short version is that **the building at 1101 Seymour Street was built as an in-kind CAC contribution from the Wall Corporation** as part of their redevelopment at 1300-1320 Richards Street.

If you go back a decade or so, and before the 1101 Seymour Street site was redeveloped, there was a 2-story building located on the property that housed <u>Positive Living BC</u>, and <u>AIDS Vancouver as its subtenant</u>. During the rezoning process in 2012/2013, both of these organizations expressed a desire to return to the new building once it was complete. They were **joined by SWAN** (and possibly a few others in the 4-stories that were dedicated in the new building for social service provision.

In October 2020, Council approved a "lease modification" for SWAN that moved them upstairs in the building and cleared the way for RainCity to use that space on the ground level for the OPS.



In April 2016, following a significant increase in opioid-related overdose deaths from drug poisoning, a public health emergency was declared in BC. During the COVID-19 pandemic, overdose death rates in Vancouver and BC have increased, counteracting progress in reducing deaths in 2019. From January 1 to July 31, 2020, the BC Coroners Service reported 223 overdose deaths in the City of Vancouver. In May, June and July 2020 more than 170 deaths across BC, were recorded; the highest since the onset of the pandemic. Our current climate is now shaped by dual public health emergencies: the ongoing overdose crisis, and the COVID-19 pandemic. The increase of overdose deaths is due to a number of factors, including social isolation and an increase in the toxicity of the illegal drug supply.

City staff have been working to implement over 31 actions from the Mayor's Overdose Emergency Task Force, approved in 2018. In partnership with a range of frontline organizations including Vancouver Coastal Health ("VCH"), Indigenous partners and people with lived experience, Mayor and Council have advocated for changes to save lives. To create safer spaces and prevent overdose deaths, the City works in collaboration with Vancouver VCH to support and advocate for a safe supply of drugs, and to support overdose prevention sites where there is supervised consumption, peer witnessing, and provision of harm reduction services.

The decline in overdose deaths prior to COVID-19 was seen in part due to the increase of overdose response and prevention services, including overdose prevention sites as well as take home naloxone kits and improved emergency response. RE: 1101 & 1105 Seymour – City's Response to Safety and Security Challenges

I am writing today to update you on some immediate changes in our approach as landlord to managing the outdoor area around this City-owned property: 1101 & 1105 Seymour Street.

Over the past decade, this neighbourhood along with other areas of Vancouver has experienced increases in people without housing and many who are struggling with mental health and/or substance use. Over time, we have worked together with you as neighbours to identify ways to support these residents while maintaining safety for tenants, clients, City staff, neighbours and the public.

The security and safety of our staff, residents, non-profit tenants, and building is the highest priority for the City. Since November 2022, we have been piloting the use of a Community Navigator to help mitigate these issues. We have had some notable success with this partnership still in its early days; however, the scale of challenges have increased over recent months.

Issues like abandoned waste, biohazards, erection of structures, littering, and loitering around the building continue to pose significant safety risks for residential and non-profit building tenants and their staff and the public, in particular around entrances, the accessibility ramp, and fire-escapes. Instances of verbal harassment and intimidation around the building directed towards building tenants the public and staff persists.

On April 2, 2023, a violent incident occurred outside 1105/1101 Seymour that impacted staff from Housing Operations, Gathering Place and the Overdose Prevention Site. As a result, we have instituted additional interim safety measures while a sustainable and effective safety program is established.



Some of these interim measures include:

- Additional onsite Corporate Security and more frequent building rounds to de-escalate disputes
 around the building, address problematic congregating, and excessive by-law infractions,
 particularly around building entrances, the accessibility ramp, and fire escapes;
- Structured integration of daily biohazard cleanups by bio-recovery technicians who will focus on exterior walkways and sidewalk areas;
- Earlier involvement of City sanitation crews to address excessive litter, abandoned waste, and structures around the building to better mitigate fire safety and health risks;
- Engaging the City's Homelessness Services Outreach team to connect with individuals around the building experiencing homelessness and who maybe seeking shelter within the immediate vicinity;
- Support for regular check-ins with the VPD Community Officer and utilization of escalation pathways through 911, as required.

These measures are intended to address the ongoing and evolving conditions that are having significant detrimental impacts on our Housing Operations team, our tenants, and neighbours. As we develop a more robust program to ensure safety for all of our tenants, staff, and public, we'll be sure to engage non-profit tenants for feedback. Staff will be in touch soon to discuss how we might move forward in developing a new safety program for this building.

RE: 1101 & 1105 Seymour – City's Response to Safety and Security Challenges

I am writing today to update you on some immediate changes in our approach as landlord to managing the outdoor area around this City-owned property: 1101 & 1105 Seymour Street.

Over the past decade, this neighbourhood along with other areas of Vancouver has experienced increases in people without housing and many who are struggling with mental health and/or substance use. Over time, we have worked together with you as neighbours to identify ways to support these residents while maintaining safety for tenants, clients, City staff, neighbours and the public.

The security and safety of our staff, residents, non-profit tenants, and building is the highest priority for the City. Since November 2022, we have been piloting the use of a Community Navigator to help mitigate these issues. We have had some notable success with this partnership still in its early days; however, the scale of challenges have increased over recent months.

Issues like abandoned waste, biohazards, erection of structures, littering, and loitering around the building continue to pose significant safety risks for residential and non-profit building tenants and their staff and the public, in particular around entrances, the accessibility ramp, and fire-escapes. Instances of verbal harassment and intimidation around the building directed towards building tenants the public and staff persists.

On April 2, 2023, a violent incident occurred outside 1105/1101 Seymour that impacted staff from Housing Operations, Gathering Place and the Overdose Prevention Site. As a result, we have instituted additional interim safety measures while a sustainable and effective safety program is established.



Some of these interim measures include:

- Additional onsite Corporate Security and more frequent building rounds to de-escalate disputes
 around the building, address problematic congregating, and excessive by-law infractions,
 particularly around building entrances, the accessibility ramp, and fire escapes;
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- Earlier involvement of City sanitation crews to address excessive litter, abandoned waste, and structures around the building to better mitigate fire safety and health risks;
- Engaging the City's Homelessness Services Outreach team to connect with individuals around the building experiencing homelessness and who maybe seeking shelter within the immediate vicinity;
- Support for regular check-ins with the VPD Community Officer and utilization of escalation pathways through 911, as required.

These measures are intended to address the ongoing and evolving conditions that are having significant detrimental impacts on our Housing Operations team, our tenants, and neighbours. As we develop a more robust program to ensure safety for all of our tenants, staff, and public, we'll be sure to engage non-profit tenants for feedback. Staff will be in touch soon to discuss how we might move forward in developing a new safety program for this building.

- Please see http://www.vancouver.ca/graffiti for information on graffiti management. In this case, because it is our building (i.e., public property), we take care of it. Action had already been initiate by staff.
- Even though we are proactively managing this site with help of Mission Possible and Corporate Security, we are not able to be there every moment 24/7 we are doing periodic checks of the site so it is possible that between checks and asking people to remove structures, new ones get set up. (It is likely this will happen as it does in other areas of the downtown.)
- The site is on Engineering's Urban Issues crew daily route and people can also call 311 to report any structures, etc. for removal.
- While we have implemented this new approach to respond to the immediate safety concerns, we will be meeting with the NP site tenants to see if we can work together to create and implement a collaborative and sustainable approach to outdoor site management.

Coroners Service reports show the recent majority of toxic-drug overdoses are increasingly occurring via inhalation, and there are no safe inhalation spaces in Vancouver's West End, making this OPS space even more vital.

The site offers access to harm reduction tools, including sharps containers for safe disposal of drug paraphernalia; sterile drug-use equipment; respite from extreme weather; etc.

Overdose prevention services mitigate collective risk of bloodborne infections

The site provides a sense of community–drug users are able to access a space where they are unlikely to be discriminated against for their drug use.

Snacks and beverages are available to folks in need of nourishment
