Subject: 2024 BC Minister Mandate Letters Released

Dear Mayor and Council,

On January 16, the mandate letters for BC Cabinet Members were released and can be found here.

All mandate letters include an expectation to:

- Grow the economy by creating good jobs across British Columbia.
- Reduce costs for families.
- Strengthen health care.
- Make our neighbourhoods and communities safer.

The mandate letters are also clear that action on climate change as well as advancing reconciliation and the implementation of the *Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples Act* are foundational and the responsibility of every Minister.

The letters also outline that "we have established an accord with the BC Green Caucus that supports our shared commitment to ensuring stable governance focused on delivering progress and tangible outcomes for British Columbians. The commitments in that accord complement the direction in these mandate letters."

The <u>Agreement in Principle</u> between the BC NDP Caucus and the BC Green Party Caucus outlines a four-year framework for cooperation and responsible government and establishes that basis for which the Green Party Caucus will provide confidence in an NDP Government. It outlines multiple areas of policy initiatives and 2025 deliverables including health care, mental health care, housing, homelessness, and climate.

It is also important to note that all mandate letters task Ministers to review all "existing programs and initiatives to ensure programs remain relevant, are efficient, grow the economy, and help keep costs low for British Columbians. This is important in the context of current Provincial budget constraints, our climate targets, and the threat of American tariffs." The Minister of Finance has also been tasked to "[p]ut BC on a clear path to balanced budgets and maintain the province's debt to GDP ratio as among the best in Canada."

Outlined below are additional mandate letter commitments that are of particular relevance to the City of Vancouver.
