Mayor and Council,

Further to Paul's update below, following the devastating mass casualty incident at the Lapu Lapu Day festival last night, the City has received an outpouring of requests to connect to civic leaders during this time of shock and grief.

In collaboration with Filipino BC and other Filipino community organizers, staff have been working this afternoon with the Mayor's Office to organize an event to enable community members to connect with the Mayor and Council and other civic leaders. This will be a quiet, informal time to gather and there will be no formal remarks. In addition to inviting Council, VPD Acting Chief Steve Rai and City Manager Paul Mochrie will be there to be with community as well.

Subject: Lapu Lapu Festival incident: key messages as of April 27 @ 12:45 pm

Mayor and Council,

I am writing in follow up to my previous messages pertaining to last night's tragic mass casualty event at the Lapu Lapu Day Block Party and in regard to sharing information with the media and public.

A press conference led by Mayor Sim will be held at 2 pm today in the City Hall media studio. The press conference will be livestreamed at <https://youtube.com/live/6fcYeonlf24?feature=share>.

The City has stood up the webpage [Vancouver.ca/lapulapu](https://vancouver.ca/lapulapu) as a source of truth for the latest information, with banners across Vancouver.ca.

Given the significant media interest in this horrific incident, misinformation is circulating. We ask for your assistance in keeping public information accurate and not ahead of the VPD's investigatory work. We request that you use the following key messages in speaking with media at this time.

"Do-not-swim" lanes

- Inquiries related to the nature of the incident, the perpetrator or casualties should be handled by the VPD and not speculated upon until facts are confirmed. For your awareness:
 - The VPD has confirmed 11 fatalities with a number of additional individuals injured.
 - The VPD has confirmed that VPD has a history of contact with the suspect related to mental health issues.
 - The VPD are confident that this was not an act of terrorism.

Overarching

- The City of Vancouver extends its deepest condolences and unwavering support to the Filipino community and to all those impacted by this tragic incident. Our thoughts are with the victims, their loved ones, and everyone affected during this difficult time.
- All Canadian flags displayed on flagpoles with halyards on City of Vancouver and Park Board buildings will be flown at half-mast from now until further notice, in honour of the victims of the Lapu Lapu Festival incident.

Event Planning

- As with all events permitted by the City of Vancouver, the Lapu Lapu Day Block Party organizers worked closely with the City and VPD and other partners on a risk assessment and safety plan for their event.
- FEST (Festival Expediting Staff Team) Committee, which includes the City of Vancouver, VPD, VFRS, and other partners created the safety plan for this event.
 - There was also a traffic management plan in place which included some localized road closures and parking restrictions to allow for emergency access and event use.
 - Heavy vehicle barriers were not deployed at this event, as the risk assessment conducted by the FEST Committee determined they were unnecessary given the event's size, location, and the fact that activities were held on school grounds rather than streets.
- Per the VPD, 3,200 events and protests are assessed for safety and risk annually (2,200 public events, 1,000 protests). There is a standardized process for this work.

Community Supports
