Subject: Summary: Federal Cabinet Announced – May 2025

Dear Mayor and Council,

On May 13, 2025, Prime Minister Mark Carney announced the new Cabinet following the 2025 federal election, highlighting a government focus on securing Canada's sovereignty and economy, and building the strongest economy in the G7.
