1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Since being confirmed as a Host City in 2022, the Host Committee has advanced a phased outreach program to build public awareness for the FIFA World Cup Vancouver 2026™ (FWC26) and provide timely information on community impacts and opportunities. Outreach has focused on early communication, direct engagement with impacted groups, and encouraging community involvement.

The purpose of this document is to provide a high-level overview of stakeholder relations and community outreach activities from early 2024 to present, organized by key areas of interest. Appendix A lists the organizational stakeholders the Host Committee has met with to date.

Regular updates will continue to be provided through memos to Council and other ongoing communications.

Key areas of work include:



Supporting business and industry readiness through regular updates, sector briefings and advance information for stadium-area businesses, and updates to local Business Improvement Associations.



Enabling community participation through the Community Activation Playbook, information sessions, and meetings with more than 80 community groups and event organizers on tournament-period events.



Developing the V1 Draft Human Rights Action Plan through discussions with advisory committees, service providers, community organizations and human rights advocates.



Proactively connecting with stadium-area residents, businesses, and other stakeholders—as well as communities near other FWC26 venues—through mail-out notifications, meetings and information sessions to outline temporary event-related changes and support match-day preparedness.

Upcoming outreach will focus on residents, businesses and other groups near key FWC26 venues to share updates, build awareness and excitement, and provide an opportunity to ask questions. This includes additional updates for the stadium-area community, including engagement with the Host Committee's Stadium-Area Residential Building Group.

2. COMMUNITY OUTREACH OVERVIEW

The Host Committee's community outreach has focused on a broad ecosystem of businesses, residents, and community groups to better understand their needs and perspectives in the lead-up to the tournament, supporting the overall goal of delivering a positive experience for everyone.

In 2025 alone, the Host Committee delivered more than 150 community outreach activities, connecting with thousands of people. These ranged from one-on-one meetings to in-person sessions drawing over 500 participants.

Consistent with the "Inform" level of the International Association for Public Participation (IAP2) Spectrum of Public Participation, the Host Committee is committed to providing information on community impacts and opportunities. Information is shared through information sessions, stakeholder briefings, online resources, and ongoing coordination with partner organizations and stakeholders. This approach helps communities prepare for the tournament, understand temporary event-related changes, and identify opportunities to participate in and contribute to city-wide celebrations.

While outreach is primarily focused on information-sharing, stakeholder feedback has helped inform planning and operational considerations where feasible and is considered alongside technical, financial, and legal factors.

3. OUTREACH ACTIVITIES BY THEME

BUSINESS AND ECONOMY

Hosting seven 2026 FIFA World Cup matches in Vancouver is projected to generate over \$1 billion in visitor spending, \$1.7 billion in provincial economic output and create over 18,000 jobs between 2026 and 2031.¹ The event will attract one million out-of-province visitors, boosting tourism, increasing tax revenues and supporting local businesses, with long-term benefits that extend beyond the tournament.

To maximize these economic benefits, the Host Committee and the City of Vancouver's Business and Economy Office is working with business and industry partners to share timely information, highlight tournament-related opportunities and ensure businesses are well positioned to welcome visitors.

Examples of this work include:



Facilitating regular touchpoints with Business Improvement Associations, including technical updates on temporary by-law changes, event-related road closures, FWC26 wayfinding and dressing program, and other relevant topics. There has also been direct outreach and dialogue on specific topics such as the impacts of road closures and opportunities for pedestrianization and community activation on Granville Street.



Providing tailored, sector-specific briefings for key industry groups such as local utilities, hospitality sector and film industry. Coordination is also ongoing with the broader business and economic ecosystem, including provincial, regional and local partners, to support an investor engagement strategy that maximizes opportunities for economic benefit while showcasing Vancouver's vibrancy and diversity.



Making information available to stadium-area businesses to support business readiness, with a focus on properties and businesses with a higher direct impact. This includes ongoing outreach to major businesses along Pacific Boulevard, supplemented by mail notifications and information sessions in September and October 2025 for stadium-area and downtown businesses. Core information is available on the Host City websites, including match schedules, details on event-related road closures and guidance on planning FWC26 events through the Community Activation Playbook.

Questions and comments have varied by group, with strong interest in community activation and a focus on understanding road closures and other operational impacts to support advance planning.

COMMUNITY ACTIVATION AND EVENTS

As a Host City, Vancouver has a once-in-a-generation opportunity to showcase our city and deliver a world-class experience for residents, businesses and visitors. Community activation efforts focus on working with local businesses, community groups and event organizers to celebrate the sport, showcase our vibrant culture, and bring people together to enjoy the matches and related festivities. This including enabling annual events— an important part of Vancouver’s cultural fabric—to continue throughout the tournament period, where feasible.

Key outreach activities have included:



Publishing the Community Activation Playbook in September 2025, with a revised version released in February 2026. Updates include new content on match schedules (dates and times), alignment with FIFA’s Public Viewing guidance, updated information on event and activation permitting, additional planning considerations for community events, and an expanded section further outlining important dates in the “Controlled Area” (i.e., the 2 km radius around BC Place Vancouver and 100 m around FIFA Fan Festival). Partnering with Destination Vancouver to broaden awareness of community activation opportunities across the hospitality sector, from what to expect on match days to guidance on how businesses can market FWC26-related events, celebrations and promotions using Destination Vancouver’s “home turf” branding toolkit. Destination Vancouver resources can be found [here](#).



Connecting with more than 80 different community groups and event organizers to review annual and new events during the tournament period, with attention to public safety, mobility and operational considerations. Engagement occurred between January 2024 and March 2026, with conversations in 2025, to confirm the 2026 annual event calendar. In addition to community groups, the Vancouver Police Department (VPD) and Host Committee hosted a session for Vancouver-based Community Policing Centres, focusing on neighbourhood-level safety.



Hosting a series of information sessions for ethnocultural and community groups in October and November 2025, including with places of worship and local cultural centres, inviting groups to get involved and contribute to city-wide celebrations. Follow-up meetings regarding event permitting details are being addressed through business-as-usual processes within each City department.

Key themes from outreach included: interest in getting involved; keen interest in watch parties and public viewing; clarity on brand protection requirements, including the use of sponsor logos; and questions about financial support. Many of these topics are addressed in the updated Community Activation Playbook, and more information on public viewing is now available on FIFA’s website.

HUMAN RIGHTS ACTION PLAN

As a Host City, Vancouver has recognized the opportunity to showcase our commitment to social responsibility and deliver a world-class experience that is inclusive, safe, and equitable for everyone.

The FWC26 V1 Draft Human Rights Action Plan is a FIFA requirement of all 16 Host Cities and Vancouver's builds upon the robust social policy frameworks of our local, provincial, and federal partners to meet FIFA's standards while honouring the unique needs of local communities.

The City of Vancouver's draft Human Rights Action Plan aligns with FIFA's Human Rights Framework and outlines the City's commitment to protecting and upholding internationally recognized human rights standards throughout the planning and delivery of the World Cup.

The draft Human Rights Action Plan was developed in close consultation with the Province of British Columbia, as well as through meetings with many community-serving organizations and other relevant interest holders. This broad approach provided opportunities for people to share their perspectives on the range of human rights considerations included in this draft Action Plan.

The Host Committee's approach has been rooted in a non-extractive engagement model that prioritizes the deep, existing contributions of community groups to avoid consultation fatigue and respect their time and insights. By grounding the Plan in the foundation of the City's strategies and policies such as its Accessibility, Equity and Healthy City strategies, we are ensuring that tournament-specific outreach is purposeful, respects our residents' previous work, and strengthens the cultural and social fabric of Vancouver long after the final match.

Key outreach activities have included:



Holding meetings with **12 City of Vancouver Advisory Committees** as well as with **City's MMIWG2S+ Advisory Committee**.



Speaking with delivery partners, public agencies, community-serving organizations and advocacy groups as well as focused discussions with gender-safety organizations — a full list can be found in Appendix A of the V1 Draft Human Rights Action Plan.

Informed by these sessions, the V1 Draft Action Plan addresses 13 priority areas, including housing displacement prevention, rights-respecting security, freedom of assembly, and gender-based violence prevention. The V1 Draft Action Plan was released on February 19, 2026, with the Final Plan to be released in May before the tournament begins.

VENUE-SPECIFIC COMMUNITY IMPACTS

Additionally, the Host Committee is working closely with communities surrounding key FIFA World Cup 2026 venues to share timely information, understand local interests and ensure residents, businesses and community organizations are supported throughout tournament planning. Outreach efforts focus on early awareness, clear communication about potential community impacts and opportunities to participate in Host City activities.

Stadium-Area

Beginning in September 2025, the Host Committee launched community outreach to stadium-area residents, businesses and other groups to build awareness and excitement for FWC26 and provide advance notification of road closures. As part of this initial phase of outreach, the Host Committee:



- Sent postcards to approximately 12,000 residents and 2,300 businesses
- Provided a briefing for more highly impacted businesses adjacent to the stadium
- Held online information sessions for stadium-area businesses, residents and stakeholders
- Met with dozens of stakeholders regarding stadium-area topics.

Hastings Park/PNE

In early 2026, the Host Committee began outreach to residents and stakeholder groups in and around Hastings Park to share early information about FIFA Fan Festival plans and respond to initial questions. Activities included mailed notifications to approximately 5,000 residences, digital outreach through local channels and an online information session, with a second session for the business community planned for late March.



As part of this outreach, the Host Committee also met with the Vancouver Skateboard Coalition to outline the scope of the FIFA Fan Festival Vancouver and explain security requirements related to temporary facility closures. Information about park access and other frequently asked questions is available on the Host Community website.

Killarney Park Training Site



The Host Committee continues to engage in operational-level discussions with Killarney Community Centre staff and nearby Vancouver School Board schools to support planning for the training site. Conversations focus on day-to-day coordination and approaches to mitigate potential community impacts.

Key themes and areas of community interests have centred on traffic management, including stadium-area road closures; park access at Hastings Park (e.g. disappointment around temporary closure of the Hastings Skatepark); and general interest in ticketing and opportunities to participate, including through the volunteer program, and as vendors.

4. NEXT STEPS: PLANNED OUTREACH

Upcoming outreach activities will focus on connecting with residents, businesses and other key groups near FIFA venues , including Hastings Park/PNE, Killarney Park and the stadium-area, to continue to build excitement, provide key updates, and address operational considerations with impacted groups.

The Host Committee recently launched a Stadium-Area Residential Building Group to support clear, timely communication between the FWC26 Vancouver Host Committee and residential buildings directly affected by event-related road closures in the stadium-area. Outreach to businesses, BIAs and the broader stadium-area community will continue through early spring, including a number of public and stakeholder information sessions.

In coordination with the Province, a consular engagement strategy was developed, and an initial briefing was delivered to the Consular Corps of BC in January. Further outreach to consulates and embassies is planned for the near horizon, including a follow-up briefing in early April.
