Dear Resident,

RE: Resident Parking Only Regulation Removal

The City of Vancouver is removing the Resident Parking Only (RPO) regulations on your block. We are surveying blocks to determine if RPO should be replaced with Resident Permit Parking (RPP) regulations or if they will become unregulated. **Your feedback is important to us. Please take a moment to complete the short survey**, even if you do not utilize the street for parking. If permit parking is introduced, no one is required to purchase a permit. **Please speak with your neighbours** as this results in the best outcome for the block. Rental units and secondary suites (legal or not) are all encouraged to take the survey.

If more than half (50% + one vote) of the total households on the block vote in favour of permit parking, parking regulations will be installed in the coming months.

If less than half of the block's total households vote in favour of permitted parking, the parking regulations will be **removed** in the coming months, and the block will be **unregulated**. Survey results will be emailed to participating residents.

What if the survey doesn't pass?

The existing Resident Parking Only (RPO) signs will be removed, and the block will become unregulated.

Survey Details

Each household can submit one vote. Separate suites, such as a basement suite or a laneway house, are considered independent households and can submit an individual vote. However, shared accommodations, like roommates or family members living in your household, cannot vote separately. If more than 50% of your block votes in favour of RPP signs, new regulations will be installed. Households that take the survey but don't vote Yes or No, will be removed from the household total used to calculate the result.

Why change the current regulations?

The Resident Parking Only (RPO) program was discontinued in 2010 as it was challenging to enforce and inconvenient to residents. The Residential Permit Parking (RPP) allows unrestricted street parking for permitted vehicles and provides guests and service providers with part-time and overnight parking options.

What is Residential Permit Parking (RPP)?

Residential permit parking (RPP) allows residents access to street parking by reserving spaces for permit holders. This is crucial in high-demand areas near popular destinations and transit stations, providing residents with convenient parking options. Resident Parking Only (RPO) blocks located within 800 meters of transit stations will be the priority for surveying.

What will my street look like if the new signs are installed?

Your block will have a combination of full-time permit parking and 2-hours, except with permit regulations. Vehicles with valid permits can park in either zone at all times. The time-limited signs may match nearby parking regulations for consistency. For example, if there are parking restrictions in the area that are 2 hours, except with a permit, Monday through Saturday, from 8 a.m. to 8 p.m., the regulations on your block will likely be the same.

How much do permits cost?

Most blocks will become Vancouver Resident Permit Parking (VRPP) zones. VRPP permits are currently \$75.90 (\$72.29 + \$3.61 GST) per vehicle per year. The fee is prorated if you purchase them midway through the year. VRPP zone permits expire at the end of February annually. RPO blocks close to an established permit zone may be combined with that zone. For example, some RPO zones near the Cambie Village permit area may be added to the Cambie Village zone. It's important to note that some established zones have different permit expiry dates and permit rates. All residential parking permits increase annually.

Who is allowed to buy residential parking permits?

Parking permits are available to residential addresses that have permit parking regulations posted on their block. Your vehicle must meet the eligibility requirements for an annual permit. Commercial addresses and buildings with ground-floor commercial uses are typically not eligible. Vehicles displaying a disability placard can park for up to 3 hours, and carshare vehicles (Modo, EVO) have permits that allow them to use the zone.
