

On Saturday, October 17, Vancouver voters will decide on:

- 1 Mayor
- 10 City Councillors
- 7 Park Board Commissioners
- 9 School Trustees
- 3 Capital Plan questions
- 2 plebiscite questions

Each position is elected at large, meaning each position represents the entire city. Positions are held for a four-year term.

Are you a Vancouver voter?

To vote, you must meet all of the following qualifications:

- You are 18 years old or older on Election Day (October 17, 2026)
- You are a Canadian citizen
- You have lived in B.C. for at least six months immediately before the day you register
- You live in Vancouver (no minimum days required) or own property in Vancouver
- You are not disqualified by law from voting

Permanent residents cannot vote.

If you live or own in UBC or University Endowment Lands (UEL) and do not live or own property in Vancouver, you can only vote for School Trustees.

If you own property in Vancouver but live somewhere else in BC, you may be eligible to vote as a Non-Resident Property Elector (NRPE) if you have owned the property for more than 30 days, and will need to provide additional documentation at the voting place. Visit vancouver.ca/NRPE or call 3-1-1 for more information.

Are you registered to vote?

If you voted in the last provincial election, you are on the Vancouver Voters List and will not need to register again. Find out if you are registered: visit vancouver.ca/vote or call 3-1-1.

If you are already on the Voters List, you will have received a Voter Information Card in the mail. Bring this card with you to the voting place for faster processing time.

If you are not registered, there are two ways to register when you vote:

Option 1

Provide two pieces of identification (ID):

- Both pieces must show your name
- At least one piece must show your address
- At least one piece must include your signature

Examples of acceptable IDs:

- BC Driver's Licence or BC Services Card
- Canadian passport or citizenship certificate
- Student or employee card
- Bank or credit card statement
- Utility bill or e-statement (shown on a phone)
- Hospital identity bracelet
- Indigenous community membership card
- Prescription medication container

Option 2

Provide one piece of ID and make a solemn declaration:

If you only have one piece of ID, you can make a solemn declaration to confirm your identity and address.

How can you vote?

1. In advance:

October 3, 7, 10 and 13, 8 am to 8 pm
Any of the 59 advance voting places

2. On Election Day:

Saturday, October 17, 8 am to 8 pm
Any of the 85 voting places

3. Vote by mail:

Any voter can choose to vote by mail. Return postage is free within Canada.

- a. Apply:** Request your package by October 5 at noon. You can apply online at vancouver.ca/vote, by calling 3-1-1 or by visiting the Election Office (305 West 8th Ave.).

- b. Delivery:** Ballots will be mailed out or ready for pick-up starting September 29.

- c. Return deadline:** Your ballot must be received by 8 pm on October 17. Detailed instructions and drop box locations are included in your vote by mail package.

Note for UBC and UEL voters:

UBC and UEL voters can vote at any of the 59 advance voting places, and also at UBC - AMS Student Nest (6133 University Blvd.) on October 7 and 13 (8 am to 8 pm). On Election Day, UBC and UEL voters can only vote at UBC - AMS Student Nest (6133 University Blvd.) or University Hill Secondary School (3228 Ross Dr.), 8 am to 8 pm.

1. TRANSPORTATION AND STREET INFRASTRUCTURE

Are you in favour of Council having the authority, without further assent of the electors, to pass by-laws between January 1, 2027, and December 31, 2030, to borrow an aggregate \$292,000,000 for the following purposes?

A. Bridge and structure infrastructure

To provide for major maintenance, rehabilitation, reconstruction and enhancement of the City's bridge and structure infrastructure, including repairs and structural work on the Granville Bridge and Cambie Bridge.

\$154,000,000

B. Pavement and sidewalk infrastructure

To provide for major maintenance, reconstruction and enhancement of the arterial and neighbourhood transportation networks, and sidewalks.

\$92,000,000

C. Traffic signals and street lighting

To provide for major maintenance, replacement and enhancement of traffic signals and street lighting that are beyond economical repair or no longer meet operational requirements.

\$46,000,000

If this question receives the assent of the electors, Council has the power, without further assent of the electors, to pass by-laws, as and when Council considers appropriate, to borrow money for the projects described up to \$292,000,000.

EXPLANATORY NOTE FOR QUESTIONS 2 AND 3:

- Community facilities include buildings such as community centres, pools, rinks, libraries, childcare facilities, cultural facilities, and social facilities.
- Civic facilities include buildings such as fire halls, police buildings, administrative facilities and service yards.

2. COMMUNITY SERVING AND CIVIC ESSENTIAL INFRASTRUCTURE

Are you in favour of Council having the authority, without further assent of the electors, to pass by-laws between January 1, 2027, and December 31, 2030, to borrow an aggregate \$438,000,000 for the following purposes?

A. Renewal and upgrades of community facilities

To provide for replacement, renewal or rehabilitation of community facilities, including aging community centres, pools or other community facility projects including buildings such as rinks, libraries, childcare facilities, and social facilities.

B. Renewal and upgrades of other community serving and civic facilities

To provide for replacement, renewal or rehabilitation of other civic essential facilities, including fire halls, service yards, and other cultural facilities including Vancouver Civic Theatres.

3. PARKS AND OPEN PUBLIC SPACES INFRASTRUCTURE

Are you in favour of Council having the authority, without further assent of the electors, to pass by-laws between January 1, 2027, and December 31, 2030, to borrow an aggregate \$60,000,000 for the following purposes?

A. Renewal, maintenance and upgrades of parks

To provide for renewal, ongoing capital maintenance, renovations or other upgrades of parks, park buildings and features within parks such as the seawall, pathways, playgrounds, playfields and sport courts.

Plebiscite questions

Vancouver voters will be asked the following non-binding questions:

Vancouver has experienced unprecedented levels of street disorder, open-air hard drug use, and disruption to community safety and individual health.

Therefore,

PLEBISCITE QUESTION 1

Are you in favour of the City of Vancouver strengthening its laws to forbid open-air hard drug (Heroin, Meth, Fentanyl, and Crack) use in public spaces?

YES, I am in favour.

NO, I am opposed.

PLEBISCITE QUESTION 2

Should the City of Vancouver formally ask the Province of BC to convert portions of the old St. Paul's Hospital, or another similar site, into a secure medical facility that provides acute voluntary and 100-plus involuntary care beds for individuals posing a serious risk to themselves or others due to severe substance use and mental health disorders?

YES, I am in favour.

NO, I am opposed.
