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1. MESSAGE FROM THE GENERAL MANAGER, ACCS

I am pleased to present the 2024 ACCS Grant Impact Report on behalf of Arts, Culture and Community Services (ACCS) and share the impact resulting from Council-approved grants throughout the year.

Through Council-approved grants, and in alignment with *Vibrant Vancouver: City Council's Strategic Priorities*, ACCS supports non-profit organizations (NPOs) on behalf of the City, investing \$34.3M in 2024. City-funded NPOs deliver services and programs that have a significant impact on both the individuals they serve and the community broadly. This third annual ACCS Grant Impact Report seeks to capture the impact and share stories of resilience, creativity and unity that have emerged from these grants.

On behalf of ACCS, I thank all NPO grantees for their contributions to City Council's strategic objectives, including supporting vibrancy and diversity, housing, safety and security and contributing to a healthy, inclusive and equitable community.

I also extend my appreciation to staff in ACCS including staff from Arts, Culture & Tourism (ACT), Social Policy & Projects (SPP), Housing & Homelessness Services (HHS), Department Services & Partner Agreements (DSPA) and Financial Services for their insights and contributions throughout the granting and reporting cycle.

We will continue to enhance future reporting to ensure the impact of the City's grant investment is captured and communicated.

2. OVERVIEW AND STRATEGIC ALIGNMENT

The work of ACCS advances approved City strategies and Council's objectives as outlined in *Vibrant Vancouver: City Council's Strategic Priorities*. ACCS collaborates with program partners, other City departments, senior government, public partners and community members to serve the City's diverse communities.

Council-approved grants invest in the local community to help build a more vibrant, equitable, safe and healthy City where everyone can thrive. These grants can only be directed to non-profit organizations and often serve as an initial investment that leverages additional resources from other levels of government or foundations. This in turn maximizes the City's impact by attracting incremental support from the public and private sectors.

ACCS GRANTS INCLUDE:

- **Operating Grants** Operating grants support NPOs with operating costs to deliver programs and services.
- **Capital Grants** Capital grants support NPOs with facility upgrades and maintenance, planning for space and for the purchase of space.
- **Below-Market Leases** Below-Market leases provide NPOs with access to City-owned or leased land or spaces at below-market rents to deliver programs and services. Recipients include Neighbourhood Houses, childcare centres, shelters and cultural spaces such as theatres and museums.

GRANTS ARE DISTRIBUTED BASED ON FOUR AREAS WITHIN ACCS:

- Arts, Culture & Tourism
 Childcare
- Social Policy & Projects
 Housing & Homelessness Services

ACCS granting processes reflect the City's strategic focus on good government through responsible financial management and a consistent focus on improvements in process, reporting and value. In Section 7, granting methodologies and continuous process improvement information is included for the work undertaken in 2024.


2.1 STRATEGIC ALIGNMENT OF THE GRANT PROGRAM

GRANT ALIGNMENT WITH VIBRANT VANCOUVER


While many programs and services supported by grants often contribute to more than one Vibrant Vancouver priority, for simplicity, each grant has been assigned a single primary Vibrant Vancouver priority above.

3. SUMMARY OF TOTAL GRANTS FOR DISTRIBUTION IN 2024

In 2024, the City of Vancouver provided \$34.3M in Council-approved operating and capital grants to NPOs providing services in the Arts, Culture & Tourism, Social Policy, Childcare and Housing & Homelessness Services sectors.

- In 2024, operating grants totaled \$27.9M, which included \$22.1M approved in 2024 and \$5.8M approved in prior years under multi-year grants. Council also approved \$5.5M in grants earmarked for future year distribution, the impact of which will be included in future years' Grant Impact Reports. Additional details are provided in Section 4.
- In 2024, capital grants totaled \$6.3M. Highlights and additional details are provided in Section 5.
- For leases, the difference between the below-market amount and the estimated market rent is considered a City grant, as described in Section 6.

In the following sections, key metrics, impacts and highlight stories are included.



4. ACCS OPERATING GRANTS

ACCS operating grants support NPOs with their core operation or program/project costs. These grants are funded by the ACCS Operating Grants Budget and occasionally by other funding sources, such as ACCS Operating Budget reallocation, other City departments or funding from external sources.

4.1 ARTS, CULTURE & TOURISM OPERATING GRANTS

4.1.1 Overview and Strategic Alignment

For 2024, Council approved approximately \$14.4M (\$14.3M funded by Arts, Culture and Tourism Operating Grants and \$0.1M funded by other operating budgets) distributing 495 grants: 454 arts and culture operating grants, 37 sports hosting and tourism grants and four other operating grants. These grants facilitated specific projects, operations and capacity-building initiatives to enrich cultural programs and services and engage the public; provided space for artists and cultural groups to produce and present cultural works; and supported various tourism initiatives.

4.1.2 2024 Operating Grants Summary

2024 Arts, Culture and Tourism grants funded through the Operating Grants Budget are summarized in Table 4.

4.1.3 Key Metrics and Impacts

In 2024, Arts, Culture and Tourism grants had a significant impact across the City, supporting a wide range of artistic disciplines, the creation of new works and cultural events and programs to engage the public. Grants also stimulated full-time employment and paid work for artists, opportunities for public engagement and numerous opportunities for people to participate as volunteers. Key metrics and impacts of these grants are summarized below.


4. ACCS Operating Grants (continued)

Table 7 below highlights the diverse revenue sources generated by cultural grantees beyond the City's funding. For every \$1 the City grants, an estimated \$14.50 is raised through other sources, underscoring the shared value of supporting arts and culture held by the private sector, business sector, the public and other government funding agencies.



NUMBER OF CULTURAL PROJECT GRANTS BY NEIGHBOURHOOD




CULTURAL PROJECT GRANTS BY DISCIPLINE




The map above illustrates the distribution of grantees and total Cultural Operating Funding by neighbourhood, supporting 149 organizations with \$8.6M. HOLY CROW ARTS SOCIETY, COMMUNITIES AND ARTISTS SHIFTING CULTURE GRANT RECIPIENT

Photo credit: Georgie Lawson <u>Holy Crow Arts Society</u> is an Indigenous-led theatre company that produces original works and collaborative artistic projects. Founded in 2020 by Artistic Director Justin Neal of the Skwxwú7mesh Úxwumixw (Squamish Nation), the organization received \$17,000 over two years for development and production through the <u>Communities and Artists Shifting Culture</u> program, towards the world premiere of *Keepers of the Salish Sea* in November 2024 at the Cultch's Historic Theatre.

Written by playwright Justin Neal, SFU 2024/2025 Shadbolt Fellow in the Humanities and directed by acclaimed Inuvialuk/Dene/Cree director Reneltta Arluk, the production had a cast and crew of 20 Indigenous and non-Indigenous artists and played to an audience of 898 for a run of 11 performances. Focusing on an Indigenous man's journey of cultural and environmental reclamation, the play puts Local Nation canoe culture centre stage after receiving extensive cultural assistance from Skwxwú7mesh knowledge keepers, Squamish Ocean Canoe Family, including Shucks Larry Nahanee Skipper, Sempúlyan Stewart Gonzales, K'etximtn Alroy Baker and Tesaxlewet Mabel Nahanee Language and Cultural Advisors.

VANCOUVER LATIN AMERICAN FILM FESTIVAL, CULTURAL LEARNING & SHARING AND CULTURAL OPERATING FUNDING RECIPIENT

<u>Vancouver Latin American Film Festival (VLAFF)</u> recently celebrated its 20th festival. Since 2003, VLAFF has provided audiences with the unique opportunity to watch inspiring and innovative films and interact with guest filmmakers from across Latin America and the diaspora. The small staffing team of 6 people engage more than 6,000 artists and audiences each year.

In 2024, VLAFF broadened operations behind the scenes to support four emerging Latin American film programmers in the months leading up to the 10-day film festival in September 2024. The Mentorship Program for emerging Latin/e/x Film Programmers at Vancouver ran for six months from April-September 2024. Mirella Livoti, Tadeo Rios Davila, Lucas Almonte and Pau Arratia worked with mentors Valentina Acevedo Montilla and Daniela Rodriguez Chevalier and other VLAFF filmmakers, cultural leaders and community partners, like Echo Park Film Centre and Tajuu Consulting. Together the emerging filmmakers embarked on an artistic programming and administration mentorship.

At the end of the process, the four artists gained a practical toolkit and a robust ethical framework that will enable them to approach their curatorial practice in a restorative and impactful way, centring accountability, integrity and community care.



ALL MY RELATIONS INDIGENOUS SOCIETY, CULTURAL INDIGENOUS GRANT RECIPIENT



<u>Vancouver Indigenous Fashion Week (VIFW)</u> has become a vital pillar of the city's arts and culture scene, celebrating the creativity and traditions of Indigenous designers while fostering understanding between Indigenous and non-Indigenous peoples. Founded by Joleen Mitton in 2017, the fifth edition was held from November 20-23, 2024, at the Queen Elizabeth Theatre and featured 32 designers whose work enriched Vancouver's vibrant artistic community.

Highlights included runway shows featuring sustainable and upcycled designs, an artisan market and mentorship programs. The Opening Night - Red Dress Event was dedicated to honouring missing and murdered Indigenous women, girls and 2SLGBTQ+ community members and underscored the event's cultural and social significance.

VIFW not only celebrates Indigenous artistry but also strengthens Vancouver's identity as a space for diversity, storytelling and meaningful cultural exchanges.

<u>The Festival of Recorded Movement (F-O-R-M)</u> is a celebration of movement-based filmmaking, showcasing the artistry and storytelling of the human body in motion. The 2024 edition, held in Vancouver from November 8-16, featured films by Canadian youth and emerging artists, emphasizing innovation and diversity.

Highlights included screenings of genre-defying films, interactive workshops, live artist talks and a residency program exploring technology and movement. These activities fostered collaboration and creativity, connecting artists and audiences through shared experiences. F-O-R-M's commitment to amplifying underrepresented voices enriched Vancouver's cultural landscape, offering fresh perspectives and inspiring dialogue.

By centring movement as a medium for storytelling, F-O-R-M contributes to Vancouver's reputation as a hub for experimental art and cultural exchange. The festival continues to push boundaries, creating a platform for artistic growth and celebrating the limitless possibilities of movement on screen.

New Performance Works fosters innovation in contemporary dance and interdisciplinary performance, supporting artists in experimentation, collaboration and artistic growth.

In 2024, the organization celebrated their 30th anniversary as a support and presenting organization for dance artists. They marked the occasion with Ripple Effects, a retrospective interview series celebrating 30 voices from their past, alongside an in-person archival retrospective. Their season included six presentations, four of which were world premieres by local artists. Other programs included Share Dance, which expanded to include trauma-informed training for any dance facilitators in Vancouver; their Cohort Program, an annual mentorship program around the business of creating dance; and In Practice, a professional development program for dance teachers and leaders. They also continued to provide strategic management and administrative support services and staff support to individual artists and small artist-led dance companies.

4.2 SOCIAL GRANTS

4.2.1 Overview and Strategic Alignment

For 2024, Council approved approximately \$10.5M (\$7.8M Social Operating Grants and \$2.7M other operating grants) distributing 281 operating grants: 174 social operating grants and 107 other operating grants. Recognizing that social services are a shared responsibility with senior levels of government, these grants supported social service NPOs that provide direct social services to individual residents and to organizations that help NPOs improve their ability to deliver integral services.

The Social Policy & Projects department administers the Social Operating Grants and Childcare Grants. They also manage grants funded by other external budget sources, including:

- Edgewater and Hasting Social Responsibility Funds (BC Lottery Corporation (BCLC) contributions from Vancouver-based gaming revenue) and
- Building Safer Communities Fund (Ministry of Public Safety and Emergency Preparedness).



4.2.3 Key Metrics and Impacts

In 2024, Social Operating Grants had a far-reaching impact across the City, supporting NPO services delivered both in person and online. Approximately 451,748 people accessed these services (this may represent multiple interactions by the same person). Additionally, 46 organizations received organizational capacity building support through the City's grant-funded partnership with Vantage Point, an NPO offering education and training opportunities to NPO leaders.

SOCIAL GRANTS BY NEIGHBOURHOOD




The map above depicts the areas of impact as determined by grantee address and reporting. Each dot represents a grant to an organization. The purple dots represent organizations supported through Social Operating Grants. The yellow dots represent services supported through external funding sources such as responsibility funds and federal programming.

Shading represents the funding amount distributed in specific neighbourhoods. The darker the shade, the more grant dollars the area received. Note that not all neighbourhoods have eligible organizations providing services.

For each neighbourhood, each grantee within borders is pooled and the dollar amount tallied. For services that are citywide (online or mobile services), the funding amount was pooled and distributed amongst city neighbourhoods proportionate to population. Some operators have multiple locations and this map may not include every location a grantee operates out of and those impacts.

3 Multi-service agencies are defined as those that serve a cross-section of demographics including children, families, youth and seniors. Programming from these organizations tends to serve people with intersecting service needs that could not be accurately captured elsewhere in these mandates. An example of this is Neighbourhood Houses, which regularly receive funding through the City's Neighbourhood Organization Grants, as well as other program-based funding; for this reason, this bar is higher proportionate to other mandate areas.

This chart reflects the following grant streams: Core Support Grants, Multi-Year Funding, Sustainable Food System, Indigenous Healing and Wellness, Social Innovation Project, Social Responsibility Fund, Neighbourhood Organization Grants, Hastings Legacy Fund, Building Safer Community Program Refugee, which supports people who are both 2SLGBTQIA+ and new to Canada. Therefore, the sum amount of funding shown per group will exceed the actual total amount of funding distributed due to the intersectional nature of the NPO sector.

4.2.4 Highlight Stories

DIGNITY SENIORS SOCIETY (CORE SUPPORT GRANT)

Dignity Seniors Society was awarded a Core Support Grant in 2023 and 2024. This grant has helped to support basic operating costs and the organization's stability post COVID. Dignity Seniors Society supports Vancouver's 2SLGBTQIA+ older adults/elders with volunteers working 1-1 with the community in their homes, long-term-care facilities and plans to also soon offer volunteers in hospital settings. With the City's grant, Dignity Seniors Society has been able to leverage other funders to support its programs, thus amplifying its impact with the City's grant.

SOUTH VANCOUVER NEIGHBOURHOOD HOUSE – GROWING COMMUNITY THROUGH FOOD (SUSTAINABLE FOOD SYSTEMS)

Serving the diverse communities of Sunset, Victoria-Fraserview and Killarney, the bustling South Vancouver Neighbourhood House runs a plethora of food security programs, from low-barrier groceries and meal delivery to drop-in meals and community kitchens. In 2024, the Neighbourhood House received a \$17,000 Sustainable Food Systems Grant through the Social Policy Operating grants to coordinate the South Vancouver Neighbourhood Food Network (SVNFN). It is one of 13 such networks currently funded by the City to foster a more resilient food system at the neighbourhood level by connecting agencies, catalyzing action and sharing both knowledge and skills.

SVNFN highlights from the last year included collaborating with several new organizations to jointly deliver an annual harvest festival. They also welcomed new members into the network such as the Vancouver Fruit Tree Project and the Punjabi Market. With a broader reach and more organizations in the fold, the network is strengthening its collective ability to address the growing levels of food insecurity affecting South Vancouver residents.

4.2.5 Building Safer Communities Program Grants

Overview

In 2024, Council approved multi-year grants totaling over \$2.7M under the federally funded Building Safer Communities Program (BSCP) Grants to support the implementation of the Youth Safety and Violence Prevention Strategy. Through three granting streams, funding supports community-based organizations to build the capacity of the sector, deliver early violence prevention programs and coordinate youth action projects in alignment with the priorities of the strategy.

4.2.6 BSCP Highlight Stories

YO4YOUTH HUB

With support from a BSCP Youth Violence Prevention Program grant the "Yo4Youth Hub" program has significantly impacted the communities they serve by connecting disconnected and under-served youth to healthier peer groups and vital community resources. By identifying communities in need and working through local schools and community centres, they successfully fostered meaningful relationships and increased access to free programs that support youth development. Their efforts have particularly focused on easing the transition from elementary to high school, a time marked by increased stress and vulnerability for many young people. By targeting elementary schools and their corresponding high schools, they have created smoother transitions for Grade 7 students moving into Grade 8. This approach has not only reduced anxiety but has also helped students establish positive connections early on. As a result of their program, participating youth have reported feeling a stronger sense of belonging, improved access to enriching activities and greater confidence in navigating social and academic challenges. They have also observed an increase in engagement with community centre programs, demonstrating the effectiveness of this strategy of bridging the gap between youth and available resources.

SAFE & SOUND

Since receiving their BSCP Youth Violence Prevention Program Grant in 2024, Safe & Sound has made progress in accomplishing four interconnected goals: helping youth feel safe, supported and connected in their community; actively preventing youth from becoming involved with gangs; safeguarding youth against becoming victims of violence; and strengthening partnerships with other youth-serving community organizations. The Safe & Sound program has done this by recruiting 47 at-risk youth from Musqueam Reserve (12), Strathcona Elementary (18), Seymour Elementary (10), Ray-Cam Cooperative Centre (4) and Collingwood Neighbourhood House (3) and delivering a range of programs to them: Indigenous cultural programs - 2 weekly Drum and Dance Group programs, including hiring a new Coordinator who is Kwakwaka'wakw from the Namgis Nation who is helping Indigenous youth explore their roots; Life Skills training - cooking, navigating transit, civic engagement; Safety workshops and activities - self-defense training, online safety workshops, transit safety; recreation outings - fitness, arts and culture, civic events; employment training - media skills including photography, interviewing and filming, work as junior leaders at Active Play and Drum Group programs. Safe & Sound has collaborated with new community partners, including BSCP partner agencies CityHive and Love BC and deepened their partnerships with the City of Vancouver, the Vancouver Park Board, the Vancouver School Board and Raincoast Conservation Society.

4.3 CHILDCARE OPERATING GRANTS

4.3.1 Overview and Strategic Alignment

For 2024, Council approved approximately \$2.2M in Childcare Operating Grants across 71 grants to support essential childcare programs. The 2024 grants are funded by the 2024 Childcare Operating Grant Budget as well as the Childcare Reserve and are administered by Social Policy and Projects as part of the overall Social Grants program. Grants prioritize childcare service providers with a track record of supporting children and families facing vulnerabilities, amplifying the economic, social and overall health benefits of accessing high-quality childcare.

4.3.2 2024 Operating Grants Summary

2024 Childcare Operating Grants funded by the Childcare Grants Budget and Childcare Reserve are summarized in Table 14.



The map above is based on grants distributed under Childcare Enhancement Grants, Childcare Project grants and Childcare Reserve grants (totaling \$1.9M in 63 grants distributed in 2024). Childcare Project grants supported NPOs' Childcare Program Development, Childcare Research, Policy Development and Innovation and Program Stabilization initiatives.

Each dot represents a grant to an agency (see Legend for type). The darker the shading in the map, the more grant dollars the area received.

4.3.4 Highlight Stories

MOUNT PLEASANT NEIGHBOURHOOD HOUSE (CHILDCARE PROGRAM DEVELOPMENT GRANT)

The City of Vancouver has long supported the creation and expansion of childcare programs in public facilities in recognition of their fit with mandate for education and stability in neighbourhoods. Starting April 1st, 2025, Mount Pleasant Neighbourhood House provides childcare services in a 4th floor rooftop space at the newly rebuilt Eric Hamber Secondary School. With the support of \$55,196 of Childcare Program Development Grant funds for supplies, staff training and start-up and in partnership with the Vancouver School Board, 69 infants, toddlers, preschool-aged children and their families will be able to take advantage of full-day, high-quality early years programming at affordable rates.

4.4 HOUSING & HOMELESSNESS SERVICES OPERATING GRANTS

4.4.1 Overview and Strategic Alignment

For 2024, the City provided \$0.9M distributed across 33 grants (32 Housing and Homelessness grants and 1 other operating grant). The source of funding for these grants was the Housing & Homelessness Services' 2024 Operating Budget and Empty Homes Tax (EHT). Housing and Homelessness grants support NPOs to deliver programs and projects to benefit people experiencing or at risk of homelessness, people living in supportive housing and renters at risk of losing their homes.

4.4.2 2024 Operating Grants Summary

2024 Housing and Homelessness Operating Grants funded by the Operating Grant Budget are summarized in Table 16.

4.4.4 Highlight Stories

WISH DROP-IN CENTRE SOCIETY: WISH SUMMER FOOD FESTIVAL SERIES AND HEAT SAFETY CARE PACKAGES (HOMELESSNESS SERVICES GRANTS)

In 2024, WISH Drop In Society received \$3,000 from HHS for their 2024 WISH Summer Food Festival Series and Heat Safety Care Packages Project. Through this grant, WISH was able to provide nourishment and care to the street-based sex work community WISH serves through two outdoor BBQ events. These gatherings blended cultural food-sharing and social connection with a practical focus on summer heat safety. The ripple effects of this grant extended far beyond the BBQs themselves. Trust and rapport between participants and WISH staff deepened, encouraging greater engagement with WISH's wraparound services.

5. ACCS CAPITAL GRANTS

5.1 OVERVIEW AND STRATEGIC ALIGNMENT

The City supports NPOs, co-ops and Local Nations to plan, purchase, renovate or expand City and/or community owned or leased spaces through capital grants. Grants support infrastructure for arts and cultural, social, childcare, housing and shelters.

Capital grants are guided by *Vibrant Vancouver: City Council's Strategic Priorities* and approved City strategies, City by-laws and partnership agreements with senior government in areas such as childcare, community safety, etc.

In 2024, City Council approved 105 capital grants valued at \$6.3M to support NPOs with capital infrastructure upgrades, facility maintenance, planning for space and for the purchase of space in support of priority needs for Vancouver communities.

The sources of funding for capital grants are the ACCS 2023 – 2026 Capital Plan, Province of British Columbia, enabled through the Provincial childcare Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) and Real Estate & Facilities Management (REFM) Capital budget.

- Childcare Small Capital grants-funded projects (\$153,059 in total) supported accessibility and health and safety upgrades to comply with childcare licensing regulations. The grants also tried to balance geographic service needs across neighbourhoods including Hastings-Sunrise, Renfrew-Collingwood, Mount Pleasant, DTES, Strathcona and Westside neighbourhoods.
- Housing & Homelessness Capital grant-funded projects (\$2,415,220 in total) supported a range of projects as summarized in the table below; these capital grants improve the livability, safety and access to adequate and affordable housing. The grants funded essential capital repairs while maintaining affordability for residents through investments in improvements such as building envelop repair, new appliances, HVAC systems, fire safety machinery, security systems, art installations and outdoor amenity spaces.

5.4 HIGHLIGHT STORIES

5.4.1 Arts, Culture & Tourism

MABUHAY HOUSE SOCIETY, CULTURAL INFRASTRUCTURE GRANT RECIPIENT

Mabuhay House Society is the lead organization partnering with the Province on the Filipino Cultural Centre project in British Columbia. The organization was incorporated and registered in BC as a non-profit in 2021, as a response to the community's passions toward developing intergenerational and intercultural spaces which highlight the many contributions of Filipino-Canadians in BC and Canada.

Mabuhay House was recommended for a \$50,000 matching grant to develop a feasibility study for the Filipino Cultural Centre that includes operational planning, amenity planning and strategic planning.

DUNDARAVE PRINT WORKSHOP, CULTURAL INFRASTRUCTURE GRANT RECIPIENT

Dundarave Print Workshop and gallery is a 50+ year old artist-run centre and printmaking facility on Granville Island that offers artists affordable memberships for the use of a fully equipped shared studio and gallery space.

Dundarave was recommended for \$58,500 for a capital improvement project for their facility that includes ventilation and plumbing upgrades and accessibility improvements. These renovations, identified through a two-year planning process, will enhance the workspace, attract new members and support teaching and mentorship programs.

WONGS' BENEVOLENT ASSOCIATION, CULTURAL INFRASTRUCTURE GRANT RECIPIENT - FOR CHINATOWN

The Wongs' Benevolent Association was recommended for \$100,000 for the second phase of critical capital improvements to the historical Hon Hsing building in Chinatown, including envelope stabilization, moisture protection and HVAC installation. Their goal is to sustain ongoing cultural activities while nurturing the growth of new legacy businesses. Through their efforts, the association plays a pivotal role in educating the public about Chinese Canadian history, tradition and culture, leveraging platforms such as the Hon Hsing Athletics Club and Mon Keang Language School.

VINES ART FESTIVAL SOCIETY, SMALL GRANT RECIPIENT

Vines is an arts organization that supports artists working toward land, water and relational justice, with a focus on marginalized voices. The organization nurtures artistic development, hosts an annual festival and year-round events and presents free public art across Vancouver and beyond.

Vines was recommended for \$22,000 to support improvements, including electrical and safety upgrades, to the newly established "Vines Den", a multi-use space for artistic production, rehearsals, workshops and community gatherings. The Den was created following a 2022 Cultural Infrastructure Grant recommendation to support space planning and research.

5.4.2 Social

SOCIAL INFRASTRUCTURE IMPROVEMENT PROJECTS

In 2024, Social Capital Grants continued to prioritize social infrastructure improvements that enhance health & safety, resiliency, food security and accessibility for vulnerable populations and equity-seeking groups including sex trade workers, survivors of sexual violence, Indigenous communities, people with disabilities, families and seniors, etc.

5.4.3 Childcare

CHILDCARE INFRASTRUCTURE IMPROVEMENT PROJECTS

In 2024, Social Childcare Small Capital grants continued to support infrastructure improvements that enhance health, safety, resiliency, accessibility and quality of childcare facilities for families and children. The grants provided funding for upgrades, renovations or repairs to existing childcare spaces to comply with health and safety regulations or other licensing requirements.

5.4.4 Housing and Homelessness Services

UNION GOSPEL MISSION'S MEN'S ALCOHOL & DRUG RECOVERY PROGRAM

(SUPPORTIVE HOUSING CAPITAL GRANT)

Union Gospel Mission is an urban relief organization based in Vancouver's Downtown Eastside. With locations throughout Metro Vancouver, UGM is ideally positioned to help those who need it most. The heart of UGM is to break the cycle of poverty, addiction and despair and to offer dignity to those who feel cast aside and a chance for transformation and integration into healthy communities and lifestyles. Through a comprehensive continuum of care including outreach, meals, emergency shelter, alcohol & drug recovery, education programs, affordable housing and programs for children and families. UGM offers help and hope while creating brighter futures for men, women, children and families struggling in our communities.

The grant funding was used for UGM's Men's Alcohol & Drug Recovery program which is housed in its six-story, multipurpose facility that was opened in 2011 at 601 E Hastings Street. There are currently 62 residential suites in this live-in program. With increased higher temperatures during the summer months, the funding secured portable air conditioning units for each suite to help the men live more comfortably during times of heat waves and above seasonal temperatures.

ZHONGSHAN LUNG JEN BENEVOLENT SOCIETY (240 KEEFER) (CHINATOWN HOUSING PARTNERSHIP GRANT)

Formed in the early 1900s as a result of discrimination against people of Chinese descent, Chinese Societies were established as non-profit organizations to provide safe social spaces and serve as mutual aid organizations, supporting their community members with finding employment, helping with family remittances and accessing affordable housing. Today, Chinese Societies represent key cultural, heritage and housing assets in Chinatown. Ten Chinese Societies own and operate a total of approximately 238 SRO rooms in the Downtown Eastside, some with rents as low as \$200/month.

The Societies are facing mounting financial pressure as the low rents have prevented their ability to adequately maintain capital assets. The Chinatown Housing Partnership Fund distributed \$1.6M in capital grants to 6 Chinese Societies to assist in carrying out critical building upgrades including repairing leaking roofs, replacing heating systems and restoring exterior envelopes. Funds also helped to improve livability, safety and accessibility for tenants with renovations to common washrooms, showers and kitchens.

DTES SRO COLLABORATIVE - BOLTS (BUILDING OPERATIONS LED BY TENANTS) SRO UPGRADING GRANT.

The \$75,000 grant to the DTES SRO Collaborative Society in March 2024 supported capital improvements in eight privately-owned SROs through expansion of its BOLTS program. BOLTS crew members assist their neighbours with minor repairs, cleaning and maintenance requests in order to maintain a better standard of living for all tenants in the buildings. Tenants supported by the BOLTS program have shared stories with City staff about the benefit the BOLTS program has had in their building, one such story is highlighted below:

In July, two individuals needed bed bug fumigation at the [....] Hotel and had to prepare their rooms for the fumigation process. The BOLTS volunteer helped both of them by moving furniture, cleaning up, throwing away garbage and sorting and organizing belongings. One of the individuals was ready on the scheduled day and his room was successfully fumigated. However, the other person, whom the BOLTS volunteer had been assisting for weeks, cancelled on the day of the fumigation. As a result, the tenant received a verbal warning from the landlord who said he could be evicted. In early August, the tenant started to become more comfortable again and was proactive in seeking support from BOLTS again. His room has begun to improve, but there was a significant amount of work to be done. With over 20 years of accumulated clutter and no regular cleaning schedule, it is a massive undertaking. The BOLTS volunteer continued to support into late August and the tenant was able to get his room prepped for fumigation. And it happened! The tenant was given a new bed and mattress. The relationship between this tenant and the BOLTS crew member demonstrates the time and effort required to build trust. The landlord in this building has seen the SRO Collaborative in action and now typically calls us before he needs to evict, which helps slow down the eviction process.

6. ACCS BELOW-MARKET LEASE GRANTS

6.1 OVERVIEW AND STRATEGIC ALIGNMENT

The City provides social, cultural, childcare and homelessness services spaces at below-market rent, in which NPOs are typically responsible for programming and operating costs, some maintenance and other expenses as set out in the leases. Currently, most NPO's are also responsible for the improvements and renovations to the spaces as needed to deliver their services. Council approves the leases and the difference between the below-market amount and the estimated market rent is considered a City grant.



7. GRANTING METHODOLOGIES

In alignment with *Vibrant Vancouver: City Council's Strategic Priories* regarding good government, grants are generally accessed through open calls. In specific instances, an invitation approach is used to lower barriers and ensure access for under-represented groups or to fulfill a specific policy direction. Community organizations apply to grant programs through an online platform. NPOoperator-calls- for-leases occur through the City's procurement process or similar grants, using a shared online platform.

Grants are adjudicated through a thorough review process, deploying community adjudicators and staff expertise and experience, in alignment with City policies and best practices.

All grants must be approved by City Council, as outlined in Sec. 206 of the Vancouver Charter. Staff recommendations are presented to and considered by Council with two-thirds affirmative votes required for approval. Council can also approve program parameters to allow staff to administer funding providing rapid and critical assistance.

ACCS granting teams work with Legal Services to create and implement relevant funding agreements. Recipient organizations are required to report back on previous grants or throughout leases. **Grant Assessment/Adjudication Process** (for Open Call grants)

8. CONTINUOUS PROCESS IMPROVEMENT

The ACCS granting program is continuously evolving to improve efficiency, enhance impact and improve access and inclusion. Key focus areas for program improvements in 2024 that will continue in future years, include:

Completing a Municipal Grants Jurisdictional Review

In response to Council direction on July 25th, 2023, ACCS undertook a jurisdictional review of six municipalities to compare granting models, funding programs and best practices in service delivery. The research indicated that ACCS grant programs are largely in line with other cities and offered some areas for improvement, including expanding multi-year funding, continuing efforts to provide outcomes-based metrics and include community voice in decision making where possible.

Aligning with Vibrant Vancouver: City Council's Strategic Priorities

Council directed staff to recommend a new categorization structure for social grants based on the *Vibrant Vancouver: City Council's Strategic Priorities* 2023- 2026, nominally with four (4) or five (5) top level category headings, under which social grants must fall. In response to the direction, starting in 2025, social grants are categorized into 5 *Vibrant Vancouver* categories as approved by Council in November 2024. Additionally, ACCS grant categories for Arts, Culture & Tourism, have been updated to align with Council Priorities.

Expanding Multi-year Grants:

Continuing to expand multi-year grants to streamline processes and to lower administrative burden for organizations with demonstrated history of meeting program priorities. Multi-year grants were introduced in 2022, with groups invited into three-year funding commitments based on alignment with civic priorities and consistent delivery of programs and services. In 2023, 55 organizations were invited into multi-year funding, with an additional 26 organizations added in 2024 and plans to invite additional organizations in 2025.

Reviewing Traditional Processes:

Ongoing review of existing procedures to identify and simplify processes to reduce barriers to funding, including simplifying application forms, offering workshops to navigate the application process and offering alternative approaches to grant applications.

Community Voice in Decision Making:

Further expansion of community involvement in application evaluation and funding recommendations, especially for grant streams focused on supporting equity-deserving groups. The Indigenous Healing and Wellness Grants incorporated community adjudicators into the assessment process in 2024 with plans to expand involvement in 2025.

Improving Access:

Continued work to identify barriers to funding and increase access to underserved communities. Actions taken include the translation of grant notices and program information to increase accessibility of grant programs.

Implementing Audit Report Recommendations:

Implementing the ten recommendations outlined in the June 2024 <u>Childcare, Cultural and Social Non-Profit Leases</u> <u>Audit Report.</u>, including recommendations related to reporting, operational and procedural improvements.
