Chinatown seeks volunteers to join new safety program

A new pilot initiative to enhance safety for residents, seniors and local businesses in Chinatown will be launched this month in Vancouver.



The pilot, convened by the Chinese Cultural Centre and supported by the City of Vancouver's Chinatown Legacy Stewardship Group, is a community response to increasing street safety concerns in the neighbourhood, which has seen many storefront closures and fewer visitors to the area during the past year.

The program, which will run until October 2021, is seeking volunteers among interested members of the public to join and support the program over the next few months.

Modelled after the Neighbourhood Watch program, the initiative aims to engage local storefront business operators, residents and volunteers to be the eyes and ears in the neighbourhood, to report crimes in a timely and appropriate manner, and to offer bystander support to victims of crime when it is appropriate and safe to do SO.

Volunteers and businesses will receive proper training and have opportunities to learn about issues in the neighbourhood, and to support Chinatown. The program will also collect data and information to measure program success and for future actions.

"Theft, vandalism, discarded needles, and various sidewalk safety issues continue to impact local residents and businesses alike and require more support and responses from the community," said Fred Kwok, Chair of the Chinese Cultural Centre and the Chinese Benevolent Association. The Centre has been a victim of racist/hate graffiti and numerous acts of vandalism.

By heightening awareness and helping to increase a sense of safety for those visiting, living or working in Chinatown, the pilot initiative hopes to form a stronger network of people who will help address safety issues in the Chinatown neighbourhood.

Chinese Canadian Museum wins Public Histroy Prize

A Seat at the Table: Chinese Immigration and British Columbia, an exhibition co-produced by the Museum of Vancouver and UBC in partnership with the Chinese Canadian Museum of BC, has been awarded the Public History Prize from Canadian Historical Association.

Using food and restaurant culture as an entry point, the project highlights stories that reveal the great diversity of immigrant experiences and communities immigrants develop. It also addresses themes of belonging, racism, agency, resilience and reparation as important facets of the complex picture of Chinese migrants and their descendants in the province.

The annual Public History Prize recognizes work that achieves high standards of original research, scholarship, and presentation, and brings an innovative public history contribution to its audience.

Meanwhile, in celebration of Chinese Cultural Heritage Week in BC, the Chinese Canadian Museum is convening a discussion to explore the important role that selfdocumentation plays in preserving and sharing the diverse histories and experiences of Asian Canadian communities.

Artist Studio Awards now open for applications

The City of Vancouver's 2022-2025 Artist Studio Awards program is now accepting applications from eligible artists.

This program awards seven studios at below-market rates to low-income artists working in any artistic discipline at a critical moment in their career. Studios are leased to the awarded artists for approximately three years.

In recognition of systemic barriers facing racialized artists, the 2022-2025 program will dedicate all seven studios to low-income Vancouver-based artists who are Indigenous and/or racialized. A minimum of three studios will be awarded to Musqueam, Squamish, and Tsleil-Waututh artists. Application deadline: Wednesday, August 4, 2021, at 4pm.

Chinatown gets \$50,000 in graffiti mitigation grants to help clean up neighbourhood

Vancouver City Council has approved \$500,000 in grant funding to its 22 Business Improvement Areas (BIAs) for graffiti removal and mural repair in response to impacts seen during the pandemic.

This funding includes grants of \$50,000 each to Chinatown and Downtown Vancouver, two neighbourhoods that have seen some of the highest impacts of graffiti. The BIAs have expressed an urgent need to address graffiti during the summer before the anticipated return of customers as pandemic restrictions are eased.

The City notes that there has been a rise in nuisance graffiti from 2019 to 2020 during the COVID-19 pandemic, with an 87% increase in 3-1-1 service requests.

"Unauthorized graffiti is a concern for many communities and graffiti removal takes up significant business, resident, and our resources.

"We support a Graffiti Management Program that provides strategic direction and programs to manage graffiti and graffiti removal services on City-owned properties.

"Businesses and property owners are responsible for removing graffiti from their property, but we all have a collective responsibility to manage graffiti and be stewards in our neighbourhoods," the City says.

As part of the Free Paint Program, property owners can receive free paint for graffiti removal twice per calendar year.

Chinese seniors

Villa Cathay, a care home dedicated to serving Chinese seniors in Strathcona since 1973, is seeking public support to complete Phase 2 of its Rejuvenation Project which aims to provide 97 additional beds for seniors on waiting lists.

The non-profit care home is required to fundraise \$6M in order for the entire project to finish by the end of 2021.

Phase 1 of the project, which includes a new 10-storey tower housing 127 private rooms and supplementary service areas, was completed in November 2019.

BC Historical Federation funds Chinese Exclusion Act exhibition

The Chinese Canadian Military Museum Society, in collaboration with other community partners, is launching a major exhibition in 2023 to mark 100 years since the passing of the Chinese Exclusion Act, which banned the entry of virtually all Chinese immigrants for almost a quarter-century.

As one of the three recipients of the BC Historical Federation's Centennial Legacy Fund awards, the project aims to find and scan aging C.I. certificates, identity documents issued to all Canadian-born Chinese as part of the Exclusion Act, and support a broad, province-wide engagement and community collection exercise in 2021 and 2022.

The majority of these documents have been lost or thrown out. Very few are in public archives and any surviving certificates are buried in family collections. The certificates collected in this research project will form the most comprehensive archive of its kind in Canada.

唐人街徵求義工加入 新計劃改善區内治安

一項為唐人街居民、長者和商戶改善治安的新試驗計劃將 在本月展開。



這計劃是由市府委任的文化傳承督導組制定和支援,作 為社區關注去年區內每况愈下街頭治安情况導致不少店 鋪關門和遊客銳減的回應。計劃將會由目前至至10月期 間實施,現正徵求有興趣的公眾人士在未來數月加入成 為義工。

該項計劃是仿效鄰社守望的型式,讓區內的商戶、居民和志愿人士成為社區的耳目,以迅速和適當的方法舉報罪案,並在安全和適當時候向受害者人士提供旁觀者的支援。



所有義工和商戶都會接受正規訓練,並有機會認識到社區內各種議題和如何向唐人街提供支援。該計劃亦會收集數據和資訊以審視計劃的成效和協助規劃未來的行動.

大溫哥華中華文化中心和中華會館主席郭英華說:「盜竊、破壞、棄置針筒以及其他治安議題持續影响本區居民和商戶,這需要社區更多支援和作出回應。

「這計劃可提高人們的安全意識和幫助訪客、居民或是 在唐人街工作的人士增加安全感,並希望藉此打造一個 更强有力的網絡,讓人們可以協助解决唐人街的治安問 題。」

唐人街獲5萬元撥款協助清除區內塗鴉

溫哥華市政府宣布向市內22個商業促進會撥款50萬元,以協助各社區清理在新冠肺炎疫情期間出現的嚴重塗鴉情况及作為維修壁畫之用,在疫情中受到塗鴉行為影響最嚴重的唐人街及溫市中心兩個商業促進會可各獲得5萬元資助。

市府稱市內多個商業促進會 表示有緊急需要在夏季處理 市內的塗鴉,以便迎接預計 在疫情限制放寬時回來的顧 客。

市府指出在2019至2020年疫情期間,造成滋擾的塗 鴉事件有所上升,由市府 3-1-1熱線收到的服務要求 增加了百分之87。

市府稱:「這些未經許可的 塗鴉行為引起多個社區的關 注,而清除塗鴉令商戶和居 民花費了很多資源。

「我們支援一項整合性的 塗鴉管理計劃,這項目



自1973年開始在士達孔拿 區為華裔長者提供長期護理 服務的華宮安老院,目前正 為完成第二期重建計劃展開 籌款活動,以便向輪候冊上 的長者提供97個額外床位。 籌款目標是\$6百萬元,整項 重建工程預計在2021年終 完成。



該項工程的第一階段包括新建一座10層高、設有127個私人房間的大樓和其他輔助性服務設施,這階段已在2019年11月完成。

卑詩歷史聯合會 資助《排華法》 研究展覽

加拿大華裔軍事博物館與 其他夥伴組織聯手計劃在 2023年舉辦一個大型展 覽,以標記《排華法》通過 100周年。在這法案下,長 達約四份一世紀的時間內差 不多所有華裔人士都被禁止 進入加國。

這個計劃是三個榮獲卑詩歷史聯合會頒發「世紀遺產基金」項目的其中一個。研究的目的是支持一項在今明兩年進行的廣泛和遍及全省的參與活動和社區搜集行動,藉以查找和掃描當年向所有加國華裔人士發出的身分證明文件並向公眾展覽。



這些文件大部分已遺失或被 丟棄,所以很少在公共檔案 中發現,其餘倖存的證書多 為私人家庭收藏。在這個行 動中收集到的證書,將會成 為加拿大同類型中最全面的 檔案資料。

此外,由加拿大華裔軍事博物館理事 Catherine Clement 撰寫的 "廣角鏡 下的唐人街:周耀初滄海遺珠攝影集"亦在上月榮獲卑詩歷史聯合會頒發 "歷史性寫作省督勛章" 和\$2,500元獎金,這是本省最大的歷史性寫作獎項。

由該著作收錄溫哥華攝影師 周耀初所拍攝超過600張的 照片,已全數捐贈給溫哥華 檔案處收藏。
