Stuart and Nugget



Q: What made you interested in becoming a volunteer with Neighbourhood Cleanup Programs?

A: I love the city where I was born and raised. My street and the ones that I've been accustomed to use during my regular runs have become increasingly littered with trash and cigarette butts. I learned that COV had an Adopt a Street program, and committed to do my civic duty while walking my dog, Nugget.

Q: What do you enjoy most about volunteering?

A: I enjoy trying to make a difference in my community. I've got to know my neighbors who would stop to ask me what I was doing with a bucket and gripper. I've receive multiple compliments and thank you's for my efforts. It's a great feeling.

Q: Are you involved in any other volunteer activities?

A: Nugget is a therapy dog, and we are volunteers at Mount St. Joseph hospital for over five years. We see the seniors in long-term care, patients in acute care, geriatrics, medicine, emergency, and not forgetting the countless overworked administrative staff, nurses, and doctors.

Q: Any funny or interesting volunteer related stories you wish to share?

A: After our pet therapy shift, Nugget and I were doing a perimeter trash clean-up around the hospital (where we collected 564 cigarette butts in addition to an abundance of litter) when we heard a shout from nowhere,

"Hey, you guys are awesome!" I looked around and the voice came from a guy from a 3rd floor apartment across the street. The guy asked what our names were, said he's been watching us do this on various days, and thanked us profusely on behalf of the neighborhood. With the rather loud conversation taking place, there were other people looking at us and thought perhaps that we were arguing about something.

Q: Anything else you might like to share with other volunteers?

A: I believe doing a street clean-up is something not common to most people but definitely needs the message conveyed: littering is not cool. It's been too easy to say, "It's not my responsibility"; however, I have learned that taking ownership of doing what's right is empowering. Leading by example has to start with doing. Hopefully community clean-up initiatives will become a regular practice by all.

Q: What made you interested in becoming a volunteer with Neighbourhood Cleanup Programs?

A: I was interested in volunteering to do park cleanups because I think it is a great way to give back to and care for the community I live in. It's also a great example of showing my dedication to caring for the environment and is something I would like to continue in university and as a career.

Q: What do you enjoy most about volunteering?

A: The sense of accomplishment I get when I see the amount of trash we have collected and how much better the park or neighbourhood looks. It makes me feel great about the work we are doing.



Q: Are you involved in any other volunteer activities?

A: I also volunteer with SPES (Stanley Park Ecology Society) in their DIRT Program (Dedicated Invasive Removal Team). This organization goes to different areas of the Park (mainly trails) and maps/removes invasive plant species that have taken over.

Q: Any funny or interesting volunteer related stories you wish to share?

A: An interesting find during a clean up was discovering an ID card from the early 90s! I found this extremely interesting because it makes me wonder how it got there and how long it has been there for. You never know what you may find when volunteering for organizations like this.

New Equipment Cleaning Instructions – Neighbourhood Cleanup Party

To prevent the spread of germs or diseases, after your cleanup is complete, all pickers and equipment must be cleaned and ready for the next group to use. This ensures the safety of both participants and staff. Please refer to the following instructions before packing up any equipment. Failure to return clean equipment could result in future cleanup equipment requests being rejected.

Make sure you have the following with you before you start your cleanup:

- quat/simple green/sanitizing spray for the picker ends/handles
- bucket or container with water (eg: you could reuse empty yogurt containers or other old containers for this if you do not have a bucket)

* Participants (or organizers) are responsible for sourcing the above equipment

After your cleanup is complete

- 1. Please return all unused bags and gloves so we can pass them onto the next recipient.
- 2. Please rinse out picker ends in a bucket/container with water to get rid of any mud/dirt.
- 3. Please spray the picker ends and the picker handle with a sanitizing spray to kill off any germs/bacteria that could remain on the pickers.
- 4. Let the pickers dry out to prevent rusting and to prevent the duffle bag from getting wet and muddy.

Fall Odds and Ends

Leaf Bags

Are you interested in getting free paper leaf bags (while quantities last) for your fall leaf removal? If so, the City of Vancouver has partnered with City Farmer to hand out free leaf bags for residents. You can visit City Farmer, located at 2150 Maple St, anytime Monday/Wed-Saturday from 9am-4pm to pick up your leaf bags. Please call (604) 736-2250 prior to arrival so staff know to expect you.

Alternatively, you can arrange to pick up the leaf bags at the Solid Waste Programs office located on the 14th floor of 450 SW Marine Dr. Please email <u>cleanup@vancouver.ca</u> at least a week prior to pick up so the team can have sufficient time to prepare your order.



Garbage Bags

We will be transitioning towards one-size garbage bags after finishing our current inventory. The new bags are drawstring style and will be sized in between the existing small and large bags. For our Adopt-a-Block volunteers, we also offer reusable buckets as an alternative to bags.

Adopt a Catch Basin

Fall and winter months could mean heavier rain or snow. With falling leaves and other debris of city life, clogged catch basins can lead to flooded streets and trash washing into adjacent waterways.

Fortunately, we benefit from a small army of 'adopters' who give their time and energy to keep neighborhood catch basins clear.
