Developing a Childcare Facility

In this document you will find important information about City and Provincial childcare licensing and permitting requirements and key steps for developing a childcare facility in Vancouver.

Review of Childcare Regulations in Residential Zones

- City staff from multiple departments are currently reviewing regulations related to developing childcare facilities in residential zones.
- The goal is to simplify, clarify, and streamline the permitting process.
- At this stage of the review process, we cannot guarantee specific changes or provide a definite timeline.
- Anticipate clearer details and timelines by fall 2024 upon staff submission of a report on the review process to City Council.
- If you are contemplating developing a childcare facility in a residential zone outside of current regulations, it is recommended that you wait until the review process is complete.

Licensing and Permitting Requirements for Childcare Facilities

When is a licence not required?

If care is being provided for up to 2 children, or 3 or more children who are a sibling group, and there will be no renovations to your home where you will provide care, no licences or permits are required. However, it is your responsibility to ensure the building is safe for children.

- Childcare facilities in the city of Vancouver do not currently require a City business licence.
- All childcare facilities require a Provincial <u>Community Care Facility Licence from</u> Vancouver Coastal Health (VCH).
- All childcare facilities require a City <u>Special Inspection</u> to ensure that health and safety standards are met.
- Any facility where there will be more than 8 children on the premises requires a City Development Permit (DP).
- A City <u>Building Permit</u> (BP) and or <u>Occupancy Permit</u> may also be required (see table below).



Licensing and Permitting - Key Steps

Important Information for Prospective Childcare Developers

If your childcare development proposal involves a change of use for the property, be aware that this may necessitate significant and potentially costly renovations to comply with building codes and regulations. We strongly recommend consulting a registered architect early in the design phase to ensure all requirements are met. This proactive step can help avoid unforeseen expenses and delays in your project.
