LICENSE YOUR DOG







If you live in the City of Vancouver and own a dog that's older than three months, you need to get a licence. Not only is it a City by-law, it's protection for your pet. Dogs who get lost and are not wearing a licence have a much more difficult time being reunited with their owners.

By buying your dog licence, you are supporting the operations of Vancouver Animal Services and providing valuable information to the City so that we can offer the services you and your dog need.

PICK UP AFTER YOUR PET



Let's enjoy our parks and green spaces together! Pick up after your pet – not only is it civilized and expected of you, it's required under the City's by-laws. So do your DOO diligence and bring extra doggie bags on your daily walks.

USE A LEASH



Well-trained dogs who respond to commands can enjoy off-leash privileges in 36 parks throughout Vancouver during designated times. These sites are not exclusively for dogs and must be shared with all park users. Leash your dog if it exhibits aggressive behaviour or is not under voice control. If your dog is prone to biting, City by-laws require that you muzzle your dog.

Off-leash hours are posted in each park. For a list of off-leash parks, refer to the following pages of this book or visit **vancouver.ca/parks**.

DOG OFF-LEASH LOCATIONS

Please respect the rights of other park users, especially those who don't appreciate dogs as much as you do. In Vancouver parks, dogs can run off leash only in these locations during posted designated times. Off-leash hours vary from park to park - the hours are posted in each park and at: vancouver.ca/parks

Your pet is your responsibility and must be responsive to voice commands. when off leash. Remember that dogs are not permitted at any time on beaches except these three locations during designated times and only in the marked off-leash areas:





TREAT YOUR DOG WELL



It takes more than food, water and exercise to keep a dog healthy. Dogs also need social interaction – talk to them and play with them. They're intelligent creatures and crave your attention. Teaching your dog basic obedience is a good way to bond with your dog and makes them better behaved in public places. Take your pet to the veterinarian for annual check-ups. Spay or neuter your dog to prevent unwanted puppies. Don't leave your dog in the car during warm weather – the heat can kill your dog.

IN CASE OF AN EMERGENCY





In a disaster, you and your pets could be on your own for 72 hours or more. Vancouver Animal Services will be part of the City's overall emergency response in the event of a disaster. Dog rescue and dog reception centres will be part of the services offered to dogs and dog owners. The Emergency Pet Registry will let us know how many dogs live with you and will also give you the best chance of being reunited with your dog. Be prepared!

You can buy a licence online at: **vancouver.ca/pets** or in person at Vancouver Animal Services, 1280 Raymur Avenue, or at Vancouver City Hall, 453 West 12th Avenue.

RENEW YOUR LICENCE

You can renew online at: <u>vancouver.ca/pets</u>, phone **3-1-1**, or renew in person at either Vancouver Animal Services or Vancouver City Hall.

BENEFITS OF A DOG LICENCE

Dog licence fees contribute to funding for Vancouver Animal Services which helps lost or abandoned dogs. A dog licence is also the best identification a dog can have if it gets lost. Other benefits listed from DL brochures.

INFRACTIONS AND MINIMUM FINES*

BY-LAW INFRACTION	FINE
Dog without a Vancouver licence or not wearing the tag	\$ 250
Dog running in public at large or off-leash other than in an off-leash park during posted hours	\$ 250
Dog running on bathing beach	\$125
Aggressive dog that isn't muzzled	\$500
Not picking up after your dog	\$ 250
Dog barking or howling when it is unreasonably disturbing the peace and quiet, rest, enjoyment, comfort or convenience of a person not on the same premises	\$ 250
Not giving proper care to your dog	\$ 250
Dog confined or tethered in an inhumane way	\$ 250
Dog unsecured in the back of an open truck	\$125


CAN YOU FIND KIKI THE CAT?

DO YOU KNOW YOUR DOG BREEDS?


Print the name of the dog breed on the line underneath each dog. Answers are upside down at the bottom.




ORIGAMI DOG FACE

Origami is the Japanese art of folding paper into decorative shapes and figures.





Fold in where the dashed lines are.






Fold in both pieces of paper.




Fold in where the dashed line is at the bottom.
