

In May 2012, we launched the Grandview-Woodland Community Planning process.

We started by:

- Holding open houses
- · Meeting with specific groups youth, the urban Aboriginal community, Vietnamese seniors, Chinese, and Latin American residents
- · Holding special events storytelling night, walking tours, dialogue session and photo
- Creating an on-line and paper questionnaire
- · Connecting via social media
- · Talking to you on the street
- Having a booth at several community events (e.g. Car-Free Day, Italian Days, Stone Soup Festival, National Aboriginal Days and others).

Altogether, we met with over **2,000** people; involved hundreds in asset mapping; received letters, emails, and phone calls; and sent out dozens of tweets; and had over **780** questionnaires submitted! Thank you for your involvement, enthusiasm and input!

What is a community plan?

A Community Plan is a framework that guides positive change and growth over 20-30 years. It integrates policy on land use, housing, transportation, parks and open space, arts and culture, the environment and more.

Why is a community plan important?

As Vancouver and Grandview-Woodland continue to grow, a community plan will guide growth in a way that meets the needs of the neighbourhood, Vancouver as a whole, and the region.

Who creates a community plan?

We all do! Throughout the planning program, staff will seek to engage the broadest range of people in Grandview-Woodland, including those of different cultural backgrounds, ages, incomes, renters and owners.

When will the plan be finished?

The Grandview-Woodland Community Plan program will take place over 18-21 months.


Different types of outreach were used to engage different populations. We used our questionnaire to get input from the general public, asset mapping to capture the ideas of children, youth, and seniors, and small dialogue sessions to get First Nations, newcomers, youth, families, and other nationalities involved. We also came out some of your favourite community festivals including Car Free Day and National Aboriginal Day.

We met with approximately 100 people at our small-group dialogue sessions. Here's a look at the break-down:












How satisfied are you with the Grandview-Woodland neighbourhood?








How satisfied are you?




How important are the following consideration to the neighbourhood?




What type of housing does Grandview-Woodland need more of?



- You'd like to see more diverse housing types and mixed-use buildings
- You're concerned about protecting heritage
- Consideration of the height of any new buildings is a key issue.



5 Grandview-Woodland LOCAL ECONOMY

We heard that

retaining local business, increasing employment opportunities and expanding the location of shops beyond the Drive is very important.

Where should these new services go? You said...

Hastings Street: needs more shops, grocery stores, professional services (e.g. doctor's office), and live music and pubs (things to make it more lively at night).

Victoria Drive: more small shops on Victoria Dr

Commercial Drive: more shops near Hastings St. and at the Broadway SkyTrain Station area; wider sidewalks to accommodate pedestrians and patios; and affordable rents for retail

Industrial area: desire to increase the array of options in the industrial area, especially arts and culture uses, while respecting the role of the industrial lands in the local economy.

Residential area: consider small commercial areas within residential areas (e.g. Victoria or Dundas).



The arts and culture sector plays an important role in the city's cultural economy. Production, performance, and presentation spaces are all needed in Grandview-Woodland.






How satisfied are you with your sense of safety?

- More drop-in resources and housing services for people who are homeless




On the asset map:

- Providing more housing and support services is key to fostering personal safety.





Degree of satisfaction with neighbourhood parks:




- You want more live concerts on the streets and in parks, as well as more cultural festivals like Italian Days and Car Free Day.

- You want to see more Aboriginal art and design to respect Grandview-Woodland's high aboriginal population.






How satisfied are you with the following transportation aspects of Grandview-Woodland?
