




We need your input

The Vancouver Park Board is developing a new Master Plan for John Hendry Park. A Master Plan will outline a vision and a number of improvements for the park. We need your input so that we can ensure community values, interests and needs are reflected in the plan.

Initial planning process began and was paused until key Park Board-wide strategies were completed, particularly the People, Parks and Dogs: A Strategy for Sharing Vancouver's Parks.







Draft Vision Statement:

John Hendry Park is an oasis encompassing Trout Lake and surrounding green space in the centre of East Vancouver. The park supports a healthy diversity of natural and urban wildlife, while also providing a space for recreation and relaxation. It is a place that connects nature and our community, bringing together people of a diversity of ages, backgrounds, and interests to pursue fun and celebrate life among friends, family, and neighbours. It is the heart of a healthy, green, and connected East Vancouver community.

What's a vision?

It describes a long-term picture of where the park will go. It guides decisions and reminds people about the intent for the future.



Draft Objectives:

Protect Natural Spaces including Trout Lake.

Ensure Ecological Gains by protecting, adding, and enhancing healthy ecosystems.

Support the City's Commitment to a Green Vancouver by incorporating current policies and guidelines.

Provide Diverse Recreational Options including a balance of spaces for active recreation and for quiet relaxation.

Support Safety & Accessibility and create a park for all residents.

Create Coherent Park Design that flows and connects park uses, facilities, and natural areas.

Manage Costs by making changes with capital, operational, and maintenance considerations in mind.

What's an objective?

Objectives support the vision by providing specific guidance for specific projects – if a project meets these objectives, it will support the intent for the future park.













PREVIOUS RECOMMENDATIONS

IMPROVING THE EXPERIENCE OF PARK USERS

- Develop Additional Picnic Shelters*

 Keep the existing shelter and add one or two more.
- Provide Public Washroom Access at the North End of the Park

Work with stakeholders to develop a facility that has public washrooms, with potential to integrate other functions such as change rooms for field users. Subject to 'Washroom Strategy for Parks'.

- Add benches, picnic tables, seating features and drinking fountains throughout the park.
- Install Boardwalks and Lake Lookouts in Key Locations

Provide opportunities for people to access lake views while minimizing impacts through replacement or improvement of boardwalks and lookouts.

- Add updated signage throughout the park including entry signs, maps, wayfinding, distance markers, code-of-conduct signs, and interpretive elements.
- Improve Services to Accommodate Events*

Provide power hook-ups and drinkable water connections to support special events.

SUPPORTING AND ENHANCING NATURAL HABITAT

Improve Existing Natural Habitat Areas

Increase biodiversity and access to natural habitat by improving and expanding natural areas.

Create New Natural Areas

Add natural areas such as pollinator gardens, demonstration gardens that provide education, woodlands, and other natural areas.

Support Restoration of Trout Lake Bog

Support efforts to restore and expand the existing bog, a rare habitat in Vancouver.

Increase Trees and Include Interpretive Elements*

Continue to add trees in strategic locations and consider tree identification signs so people know what each tree is.

IMPROVING WATER RESOURCES

Direct Internal Park Run-Off to Trout Lake

Reduce rainwater flowing to the City's storm sewers by cleaning and directing park run-off into Trout Lake.


Integrate Neighbourhood Stormwater Daylighting and Management


Reconnect John Hendry Park to the water system by diverting and cleaning a portion of neighbourhood stormwater in the park.

Trout Lake Water Quality Treatment and Monitoring

Take steps to improve water quality in Trout Lake to support recreational swimming and reduce closures.

















CIRCULATION







DOG OFF-LEASH AREA

ZONE 4

Existing Conditions

John Hendry Park's existing dog off-leash area is a well-used 7-acre (2.8 ha) site at the north end of Trout Lake. There are some signs, but the extents of the area are currently not well-defined. The existing off-leash area includes:

- » Lake access for dogs
- » Open lawn areas
- » Mature trees
- » Park pathways
- » Benches
- » Dog waste bins



Background

The Vancouver Park Board adopted its *People, Parks, and Dogs Strategy* in 2017, which provides a framework to deliver well-planned and designed parks that accommodate park users both with and without dogs. In the strategy, John Hendry Park is classified as a Destination Dog Off-leash Area, which means it serves people and pups living within a 35-minute walk or short drive of the park.

Several design guidelines from the *People, Parks, and Dogs Strategy* will need to be followed when preparing a recommendation for John Hendry Park's off-leash area, including:

- » Increase park safety and comfort for all (dogs, dogowners, non dog-owners)
- » Improve universal access to and in the off-leash area
- » Clearly mark off-leash area boundaries and setbacks
- » Keep a space large enough for a destination off-leash area (minimum of 1.2 ha / 3.0 acres)
- » Provide adequate setbacks or secure boundaries between the off-leash area and less compatible uses (e.g., ecologically-sensitive areas, sports fields, multiuse trails, playgrounds)
- » Install new signs to clarify rules and educate users



During the 2015 master plan process, the most frequent concerns identified about the dog off-leash area included:

- » Lack of clear boundaries between the dog off-leash area and the rest of the park.
- » The lake loop trail leads people through the dog off-leash area and some non-dog owners are uncomfortable with potential dog interactions.
- » Off-leash dogs in other parts of John Hendry Park.



FARMERS MARKET

About

The Trout Lake Farmers Market was conceived of and developed by community members in 1995. It was the first open-air farmers market to operate in Vancouver!

The farmers market occurs every Saturday between May and October, from 9am - 2pm. With 60+ farms and vendors, and several food and coffee trucks, the market attracts many to John Hendry Park. The market is currently held in the north parking lot and during the 2015 master plan process, there were many discussions and ideas about where the market's future.

Where Should it Go?

In 2015, several locations were identified as having potential for the future farmers market. At this stage we'd like to revisit these and identify other options as we work towards identifying a preferred farmers market location for the future.

1 NORTH PARKING LOT

The market remains in its current location at the north end of the park.

SOUTH PARKING LOT

The market utilizes the existing parking lot and driveway at the south end of the park.

NORTH OF TROUT LAKE COMMUNITY CENTRE

The area with the existing all-weather field becomes an event space to host the farmers market and other celebrations.

WEST OF TROUT LAKE COMMUNITY CENTRE

The market utilizes the open space between the community centre and Victoria Drive.

What is Important?

We are updating a list of criteria that will be used when evaluating potential locations for the future market.
Preliminary criteria include:

- » Access to drinking water and power hooks-ups
- » Close to public washrooms
- » Maintains the same amount (or more) space
- » Minimizes impacts to other park uses including community centre parking
- » Minimizes impacts to neighbourhood residents to the extent possible
- » Provides easy access and circulation for vendors
- » Provides easy access to market visitors
- » Others to be determined

About

Today there isn't a community garden in John Hendry Park. The Master Plan process is an opportunity to think about if there should be!

The existing Cedar Cottage Community Garden is currently located at the corner of Victoria Drive and Hull Street. Part of the garden is on City land that is designated for future affordable housing. This means the garden will need to be relocated. The Cedar Cottage Community Garden has submitted a proposal to the Vancouver Park Board to consider the southeast corner of John Hendry Park as a potential new home.

As part of the John Hendry Park Master Plan, we'd like to discuss if a new community garden is an appropriate use in John Hendry Park, and if so, how it can best fit within the park.









Goals of the Cedar Cottage Community Garden:

- » To promote food security
- » To provide space for growing in the city where green space is at a premium
- » To create a sense of community and connections within the neighbourhood
- » To create a safe, welcoming space for neighbours to gather and spend time
- » To share knowledge about growing

PLAYING FIELD IMPROVEMENTS

ZONE 4

About

Playing fields in John Hendry Park are well used by a variety of community organizations. Participants in the 2015 master plan process noted that they value the central location and community atmosphere they experience when playing at the park. However, John Hendry Park's fields can be difficult to maintain due to boggy sub-surface conditions, which contribute to instability and issues with drainage.



Throughout the process we will be studying the current fields, what's working well and what's not, and steps to updating the field system for the future.

The Existing Fields

See map on back for locations of each field.



NORTHWEST SOFTBALL FIELD

Typical Users: recreational softball

Frequency of Use: Moderate (spring - summer)

Previously Identified Issues:

- » Uneven field surface
- » Size is limited by adjacent trees and roads
- 1B

NORTHWEST MINI SOCCER FIELD

Typical Users: soccer, ultimate frisbee, yoga, quiddich, kids camps, events, casual sports

Frequency of Use: High (fall - spring)

Previously Identified Issues:

- » Wet conditions at certain times
- » Uneven field surface
- » Trees limit the field size and level of play
- » Damage from dogs (e.g., holes)



ALL WEATHER FIELD

Typical Users: soccer, rugby, softball, events

Frequency of Use: High (year-round)

Previously Identified Issues:

- » Conflict with balls entering the parking lot
- » Conflict with proximity to walking path
- » Dusty in summer
- » Lack of shade
- » Uneven and sloping surface



SOUTHWEST SOFTBALL FIELD

Typical Users: recreational softball

Frequency of Use: Low (spring - summer)

Previously Identified Issues:

- » Overall poor condition
- » Uneven field surface
- » Insufficient size (field is too short, small backstop)



LITTLE LEAGUE BASEBALL FIELDS (3)

Typical Users: baseball (Trout Lake Little League)

Frequency of Use: High (spring - summer)

Previously Identified Issues:

- » Some uneven field surfaces
- » South field in lesser condition than others
- » Some deteriorating fencing / backstops



NORTHEAST FIELD

Typical Users: rugby, ultimate frisbee, grass volleyball, gaelic football

Frequency of Use: Moderate (year-round)

Previously Identified Issues:

- » Poor drainage make the field unusable during certain times
- » Uneven field surface
