Highlights: Monthly Labour Force Survey Data, February 2021

- Employment in Vancouver increased from 1,443,300 to 1,459,200 for a gain of 15,900 (1.1%) jobs between December and February
- The unemployment rate increased by 1.5 percentage points to 7.9% in Vancouver between December and February as more people entered the labour force
- Nationally, the unemployment rate decreased by 0.4 percentage points, to 8.2%.
- Cumulatively, employment in the region has decreased by -29,200 (-2.0%) since February 2020

Purpose of this memo

This memo highlights Labour Force Survey (LFS) data published by Statistics Canada for the 2month reference period from December to February. The LFS provides estimates for the unemployment rate and employment totals by industry and occupation on a monthly basis. The information presented in these memos illustrates the impact of COVID-19 on Vancouver's labour force and economy over a 2-month period since the Pandemic began. Staff in Planning, Urban Design and Sustainability will provide an updated bi-monthly memo as new data is released. This information is meant to be viewed in conjunction with other socio-economic and community statistics to form a cohesive picture of the City's current state and assist with recovery and resilience planning. This information will be posted to the City website and shared with the business community.




Important notes about the data


The statistics presented in this memo are for the Metro Vancouver region as the Census Metropolitan Area (CMA) is the smallest geography level available for LFS data tables published by Statistics Canada. Throughout this memo, the term "Vancouver" refers to the Vancouver CMA. The LFS data used to create the statistics presented in this report are not seasonally adjusted¹.

Changes in employment totals and unemployment rate

Employment in Vancouver increased from 1,443,300 in December to 1,459,200 in February for a gain of 15,900 (1.1%) jobs. Since December, the unemployment rate increased by 1.5 percentage points to 7.9% in Vancouver. In February 2021, the region had -29,200 (-2.0%) less employed workers than a year prior in February 2020. Despite this slight decrease, it is a significant improvement in employment, which peaked in April 2020 where a total loss of 251,200 (-17.2%) employed workers was recorded since February 2020. Nationally, the unemployment rate decreased by 0.4 percentage points between December 2020 and February 2021 and is now to 8.2%.

The fluctuations in employment levels from March 2020 to February 2021 reflects changes to public health restrictions and other measures, including allowing non-essential businesses to reopen. A number of major orders related to the COVID-19 pandemic issued by various levels of government were active during this reference week (February 14th to February 20th). Please see Figure 7 for a full list of announcements and orders made since the previous reference period. Appendix A shows all prior announcements and orders starting on March 12, 2020. The next bi-monthly labour force survey memo will be distributed in May, which will include new data for March and April.


Changes in employment totals and unemployment rate – three-month moving average

The following sections highlight statistics related to employment change by industry and occupation that are published as a three-month moving average for Vancouver; therefore, data published for February is an average of December, January and February. Using this three-month moving average data, employment in February was 1,448,800 and the unemployment

rate was 7.8%. The following chart shows the monthly change of employment and the unemployment rate using three-month moving average employment data.





Industry overview

Employment in the professional, scientific and technical services industry experienced the largest two-month gain in Metro Vancouver, increasing by 13,500 workers (8.4%). The second largest sector employment increase was in the health care and social assistance sector, which gained 9,600 workers (5.7%). The third most employment gains was in business, building and other support services, which increased by 4,700 jobs (8.1%). Between December and February, employment in the accommodation and food services declined by 12,100 people, a decrease of -10.6% of its workforce. The second most loses were seen in finance, insurance, real estate, rental and leasing, which increased by 5,000 workers (-4.3%). Manufacturing declined by 5,000 workers (-5.2%) over the two month period.

Occupation overview

Occupation employment data for Vancouver is published as a three-month moving average; therefore, data published for February is an average of December, January and February. Employment in natural resources, agriculture and production occupations experienced the largest 2-month gain in Metro Vancouver, increasing by 11,000 jobs (6.4%) between December and February. The second largest increase was in health occupations, which gained 10,300 workers (11.0%). The third largest employment gains were in occupations in trades, transport and equipment operators, which increased by 8,000 jobs (4.6%). Between December and February, employment in sales and service occupations experienced the largest decrease with 7,100 less workers (-2.2%). The second largest loss was attributed to business, finance and administration occupations, which experienced a decrease of 7,200 jobs (-2.9%). Occupations in art, culture, recreation and sport declined the third most, with a loss of 4,400 (-7.6%).




Figure 4 – Employment change by occupations in Metro Vancouver, December to February

The largest increase in employment by detailed occupations was for professional occupations in natural and applied sciences, which increased by 15,000 (+13.7%) workers between December and February. Other occupations with the most employment gains from December to February include:

- Transport and heavy equipment operation and related maintenance occupations (+10,300; +21.8%)
- Middle management occupations in trades, transportation, production and utilities (+7,600; +27.6%)
- Care providers and educational, legal and public protection support occupations (+6,800; +50.7%)
- Assisting occupations in support of health services (+6,200; +24.0%)

Figure 6 – Most employment gains by detailed occupation, December to February



The largest decrease in employment by detailed occupations was for service supervisors and specialized service occupations, which lost 10,900 (-19.7%) workers since the previous month. Other occupations with significant employment losses include:

- Professional occupations in business and finance (-10,100; -11.0%)
- Specialized middle management occupations (-7,900; -14.2%)
- Technical occupations in health (-4,400; -14.7%)
- Technical occupations related to natural and applied sciences (-4,000; -6.4%)

Government orders

A number of major orders related to the COVID-19 pandemic have been issued by various levels of government since March 2020.
