1 Ginkgo (Ginkgo biloba):
Prized for its medicinal
properties and ability to
tolerate polution, this Chinese
tree dates back to the Jurassic.
Its fan-shaped leaves turn
golden yellow in fall.



2 Hardy fuchsia (Fuchsia magellanica): A magnet for hummingbirds, this species from South America and Australia has bright fuchsia pink and purple flowers.



**3 Bald cypress (Taxodium** distichum): From the wetlands of SE USA, these deciduous conifers grow along the shore with rows of odd woody "knees" (root projections) and rusty orange needles in fall.



4 Japanese maples:
A stunning display of red,
purple, orange and gold foliage
reflect off the water of Heron



**5 BC Habitat Garden:** A forest of native trees, ferns, flowering perennials and shrubs that support wildlife with food, shelter and nesting habitat, while showcasing the beauty of our native plants.



**6 Heather Garden:** White, pink and purple heaths and heathers, with a grove of Scot's pine overlooking Heather Pond - a scene reminiscent of the Scottish Highlands and moors.



**7 Evergreen spindlebush (Euonymus myrianthus):** This woodland shrub from Western China is rare in gardens. It is grown for its fall colour and orange fruit which split open to reveal bright red seeds.



**8 Fern Dell:** A shady, peaceful grove of Douglas-fir trees, along with trees and shrubs from East Asia and an understory of feathery ferns from around the world



**9 Beautyberry:** Along this shady forest path, clusters of jewel-toned purple berries light up the bare branches of these tall graceful shrubs.



**10 Japanese Collection:** A selection of trees, shrubs and rare flowering perennials, like the wasabi plant, that are native to or grown in Japan.
